

Cotton Lost To Fire On **Rhodes Farm**


At approximately 11:30 a.m., Tuesday, October 11 the Munday Fire Department answered an alarm to the Clifford Rhodes farm, southwest of Munday.

Floyd Reed, who farms the Rhodes land, had about 7 bales of cotton on a trailer when the fire broke out. Mr. Reed was not present when it started, but according to Milton Escamilla, he had dumped seven baskets in the trailer.

The cotton was insured. The trailer lost two tires in the fire and extensive damage was reported to the sides.

As of press time the origin of the fire was undetermined.


possible, because Crowell always likes to keep possession. We had some extra help in




