Lions Hear Program On Bloodmobile

Shelley Wright, who is with the Red Cross Bloodmobile Center in Wichita Falls, was guest speaker at Tuesday's meeting of the Munday Lions Club, pointing out the need for blood donations in this area.

"Someone needs blood every 17 seconds in the day," she emphasized, "and records show that about 3 1/4 of the people ever donate blood. Critical months for donations are during the summer because of the hot weather and vacation periods. People just don't like to 'buck the heat' of summer in order to donate blood."

"Someone might need your blood to stay alive," she continued. "The Wichita Falls center serves 28 counties of this area, and we dispense some 350 pints of blood every week. The only way we can replace this blood is by your donations to the bloodmobile."

It was announced that the bloodmobile will be here on Monday, July 24, from 2:45 until 6:40 p.m., at the Community Center.

Latrease Lane, who helps spearhead the local blood program, was also a guest of the club.

Members absent: Dale Selzer and Donald Hobert. In the absence of Mayor Selzer and Mayor Pro-Tem Hobert, the Council appointed Von Marr to preside.

Marr called the meeting to order. M. M. Booe led in prayer at his request.

Three bids received on seal coating of streets in Munday and opened and recorded on June 23, 1978 were re-examined. Bidders were Pioneer Construction Co.; Coltharp Construction Co.; and Zack Burkett Construction Co.

Bid Opening July 13-14 On FM 266

Bids for the reconstruction of Farm to Market Road 266 in Knox County will be opened at the July 13-14 letting of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation. The project extends on FM 266 from Hefner southward to Goree, a distance of five miles.

The existing 18 foot wide asphalt highway is in poor condition and has experienced high maintenance costs. The present surface will be scarified, about three inches of new base will be added for strength, new surfacing will be applied, and the roadway will be widened to provide a 22-foot travel surface.

In addition, existing cross-road drainage pipes will be removed from four locations and new overflow sections will be constructed to provide for better drainage of reduced maintenance.

Alvin Alexander of Munday, the department's engineer in charge of the work, estimates that it will be completed within about 120 working days. Overall project supervision will be supplied by Childress District Engineer Lewis H. White.

Former Munday Merchant Dies

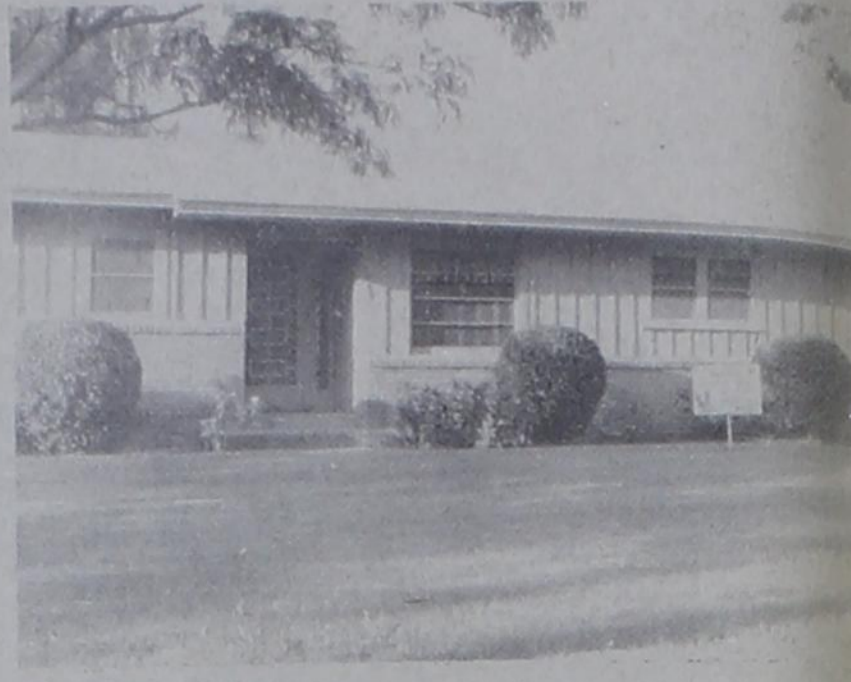

Calling upon the veterinarian as a last resort after all other means have failed is not a recommended method in swine herd management. Dr. John D. Coltrain, president, American Association of Swine Practitioners, says, "From an economic standpoint, disease must be minimized in a swine herd to achieve profits." He says the vet should be asked to provide the following in herd health management: 1) Diagnose and recommend proper treatment of disease 2) Keep current on new drugs and additives 3) Consider the economics of administering drugs in relation to economic return to the herd owner 4) Instruct the herd owner in proper handling, administering and dosage of drugs 5) Advise clients on new techniques, housing and nutrition and 6) Decide who should be called if a specialist is needed. "The veterinarian should have a special interest in management practices, nutrition, genetics, and good diagnostic capability, and the producer needs to be willing to carry out his recommendations," Dr. Coltrain says. *****

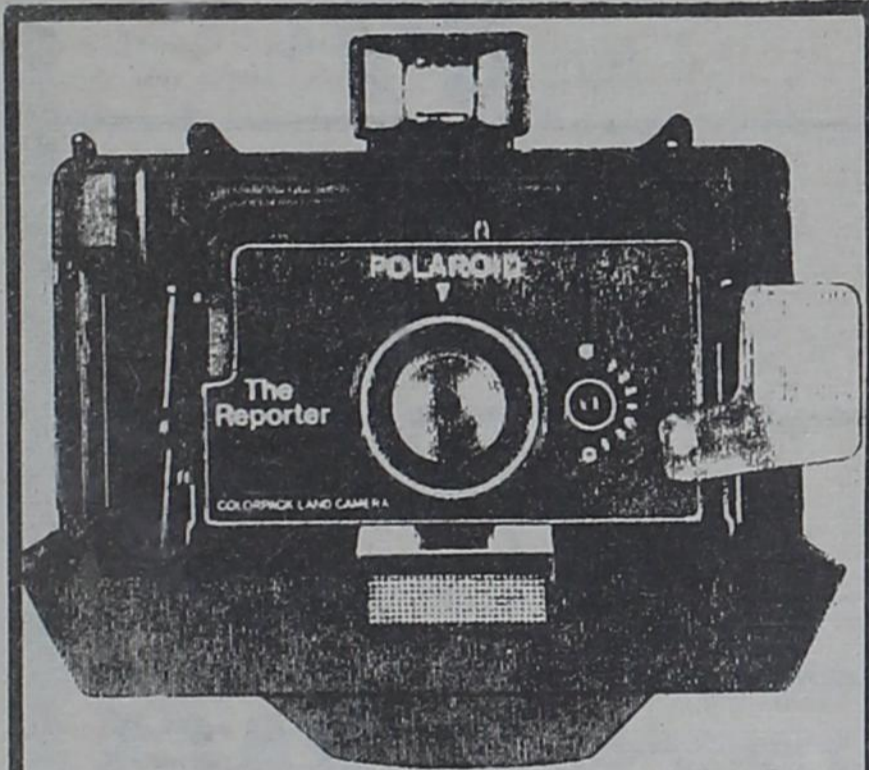
