Munday Defeats Knox City For Little League Title

Paul Mints, Munday All Star catcher, scored the winning run on a steal from 2nd base with two outs and the score tied 14-14 in the bottom of the sixth. Going into the sixth, Knox City lead by a score of 12-10 and obtained two runs in the top of the inning to lead by 14-10 with Munday coming to bat in the bottom. Robert Hemphill, pinch hitting for pitcher Pat Angerer, lead off with a triple to right field. Tracy Wallace followed with

trip to first on a fielders error then advanced to second on the throw. Frankie Stinnett then doubled to score two runs making the score 14-12 in favor of Knox City with no outs. Greg Urbanczyk then singled to score Stinnett. Then Mints singled scoring Urbanczyk to tie the game. Two outs by Kip Cotton and Quinn Smith followed before Mints stole home and the game was over. Dwayne Watkins went

the six innings as pitcher for Knox City allowing 15 runs, 10 hits, 11 strike outs, 8 base on balls and 3 hit pitches. Stinnett started the pitching duties for Munday allowing 8 runs, 2 hits and 4 base on balls before Pat Angerer relieved him and struck out the last 3 batters in the first. Angerer pitched outstanding baseball allowing 6 runs on 4 hits, 9 strike-outs and 5 base on balls. For the second night in a row, Cotton and Mints carried the big bats for their team. Fielding plays by Vasquez, Stinnett and a strong throwing arm by centerfielder Kip Cotton, played a major role in holding Knox City after the first inning. Mints played the most impressive game behind the plate in refusing to allow runners to steal home. A throw by Cotton to Mints in the sixth cut the lead runner. Both players made outstanding catches and put out a lot of effort to cut the runner. Munday All Stars as a team played a game of sportsmanship with the ability to play as a team. They are to be commended for their winning efforts and displaying sportsmanship as an individual and a team member.

The coaching staff of Daniel Ramirez and Larry Thompson, provided the leadership and knowledge to produce a winning team. You may not agree with their decision during the game, but after winning the Area II playoff, you can't say they gave up when the going got rough. They used their experience to help the team defeat the opponents and assure the All Stars a trip to the District playoff to be held in Crowell Monday and Tuesday, July 24 and 25. FOOTBALL AROUND THE CORNER District 7-A Favorites Picked

The Haskell Indians have been picked by Dave Campbell, in the Texas Football magazine, as the predicted winners in this year's District 7-A football. Additional depth and 13 returning starters for the 9-3 district winners could mean another championship for the Indians. Fullback Ronnie Hise will head the backfield with his 4.7 speed.

Munday Moguls are predicted to give Haskell a run for the district crown. All Area 7-A linebacker Ronnie Phillips will spearhead the defensive unit for the Moguls. Defense is expected to be the strong point of the team. According to coach Steve Rodgers, "I believe we are picked a little high in the district race, as we should be somewhere around the fourth place finishers." Munday returns 7 defensive and 6 offensive starters from last year's 7-2-1 club. Others joining Phillips in the defensive line-up are Ralph Hernandez and Otis

Adams, tackle; Larry Welch and Phil Johnson, ends and Lenny Welch, linebacker. Vying for the defensive back positions are Keith Sanders, Kevin Herring, Billy Welch, Doug Michalik and Ison Murray.

Down from District 2-AA and chosen as the third place finisher is the Quannah Indians with a 1-9 record as a 2-AA team. Fourteen returning starters and two backs that have an impressive 4.4 and 4.6 in the 40 could spell trouble for the predicted first and second place finishers.

starters the Crowell Wildcats hold fourth place in the predictions. Outstanding end, DeWayne Dishman, will return to add his abilities in the aerial attack. William Carol and Wade Davis are the mainstays in the defensive line as tackles for the Wildcats.

The Dragons of Paducah are listed in the fifth slot according to their quickness

and experience which may lead to further improvement as the team returns 10 starters, 5 each way.

Knox City Greyhounds with a general lack of size holds down the sixth place finish in the predictions. Size may be a factor but the Hounds will be in there to the finish.

Rounding out the district with the Aspermont Hornets, who finished the season last year with a 1-9 record. Seven offensive and six defensive starters return to this year's line-up.

The re-alignment of District 7-A this year has added Quannah and dropped Rotan and Hamlin in district play. Predictions are just "predictions", the contest is never won or lost by the same. You play and win or lose, whatever has been predicted is not always right. *****

Munday Sets New High With 116 On July 15

A record breaking heat wave has plagued the Munday area for over thirty days now with an all time high being reported by Goodson Sellers, U. S. Weather Observer, on Saturday, July 15, when the thermometer registered 116 degrees.

For thirteen days the official temperature has registered 100 degrees or more. From June 18 to July 17 the area has experienced only 2 days below 100. Both of these days were recorded at being 99 degrees.

In listening to some of the older residents and farmers around the Munday area this is the driest they can remember since back in 1934 or 36. Thirty-five was a pretty good year before it turned dry again in 36. In checking with Sellers his records date back to December of 1946 and the highest and nearest to present date for the high temperature was July 26, 1954 when the mercury climbed to 112

degrees. With no official records for 1934 or 36 we looked back in the Munday Times and discovered the editions printed in 1934, but 36 was missing.

Here are some of the conditions and stories from 1934:

October 18, 1934 MUNDAY COUNTRY RECEIVES MORE THAN INCH RAIN

The Munday country received the first good rain in several months on Wednesday evening when 1.19 inches were registered here and reports from over the trade territory indicate that approximately this much fell over the area.

This was the first rain over this section amounting to as much as an inch since May 24, at which time 1.55 inches was registered here, according to records kept by H. P. Hill.

The rain will prove of great value to farmers, enabling them to sow winter feed crops.

November 8, 1934 RAINFALL ONLY 11.98 INCHES TO DATE FOR YEAR

Rainfall since January 1 over the Munday country has totaled only 11.98 inches, according to a tabulation compiled by A. E. Whittemore, who for many years has kept an accurate gauge on precipitation here and has reported same to the Department of Agriculture. Mr. Whittemore's figures for the various months up to November 1, follow:

January - 0.28, February - 0.11, March - 3.29, April - 1.40, May - 2.71, June - 0.50, July - 0.20, August - 0.67, September - 0.62, October - 1.20.

1934 COTTON CROP ABOUT ONE-SIXTH OF THE 1933 CROP

The 1934 cotton crop in Knox County was only about one-sixth of the 1933 crop, according to figures given out by Hoyle A. Sullins, estimator for the Department of Commerce. The figures as of December 24th show that there were 9,182 bales ginned in the county this year compared with 54,869 last year.

3-INCH RAINFALL ADDS OPTIMISM TO KNOX COUNTY FOLKS

A three inch rain during the week has occasioned more optimism than anything that has happened in these parts in many moons, and farmers and business men alike are looking forward to the future with optimism. On Monday, November 19, 1934, the rainfall amounted to 1.12 inches and on Wednesday the precipitation amounted to 1.66 and slight showers have brought the total for the week up to 3 inches according to A. E. Whittemore, and the manner in which the rain has fallen gives a good season in the ground, since it fell slowly and all soaked into the earth.

Farmers residing in the tight-land district, who have been forced for many weeks to haul water for livestock and domestic consumption are jubilant, as all tanks are filled and there will be no more water shortage soon.

Referring back to the November 8, 1934 rainfall to date, Munday for the year 1978 is behind the total through the month of July. In 34 the total was 9.49 including July and to date in 78 the total is 8.61. Following is the rainfall per month for 1978:

January - 0.60, February - 2.19, March - 0.67, April - 0.50, May - 2.08, June - 2.12, July - 0.45.

Knox County History Is Being Published

The "Knox County History," which was written by Mrs. Bruce Campbell, is being re-issued. The book is the original manuscript published in 1966 with the addition of a complete index of names and subjects. There is also an errata page which lists any errors in the spelling of names, etc.

The Truscott Historical Committee has undertaken this project with the permission of the Knox County Commissioners Court. They were responsible for compiling the index and copies of

the manuscript were given to persons in each county community to verify names, events and other items. One-third of the profits will be donated toward a Knox County museum.

to be published as required by law with a full copy to be recorded or filed in the City Ordinance file, same to be made a part of the original ordinance. Marr seconded. All members voted for.

Police Dept. business is set out below and the following action is recorded. Chief Saffel said Gene Nix hours on duty last month was 10.8 hrs. a day. Night work was also given as part of the reason for a raise request by Chief Saffel. After discussion, Marr moved that Nix salary be increased by \$50.00 per month beginning August 1, 1978. Hobert seconded. Carried.

Next request by Chief Saffel was fingerprint kit. The Council authorized this expenditure at a minimal cost.

Expenditure of a motorcycle was discussed. Marr moved this item be tabled at this time. Hardin seconded. All for.

Chief Saffel next reported on car use, cases filed, hours worked etc. for the past 39 days.

Judge Omar Cure met with the Council. Corporate Court business was discussed and no changes in opera-

tion was recommended by the Council.

Two representatives of Danrick Construction Co. met with the Council in regard to a possible new sub-division. Cost estimates were discussed for sewer, streets, and water service for this new area. Mayor Selzer reported that City funds are not budgeted for this project nor a part of it. No action was taken.

Hobert moved the City try 12 new ACU meters 5/8 x 3/4 at \$24.50 each exchange provided the Water Department heads approve. Marr seconded. All for.

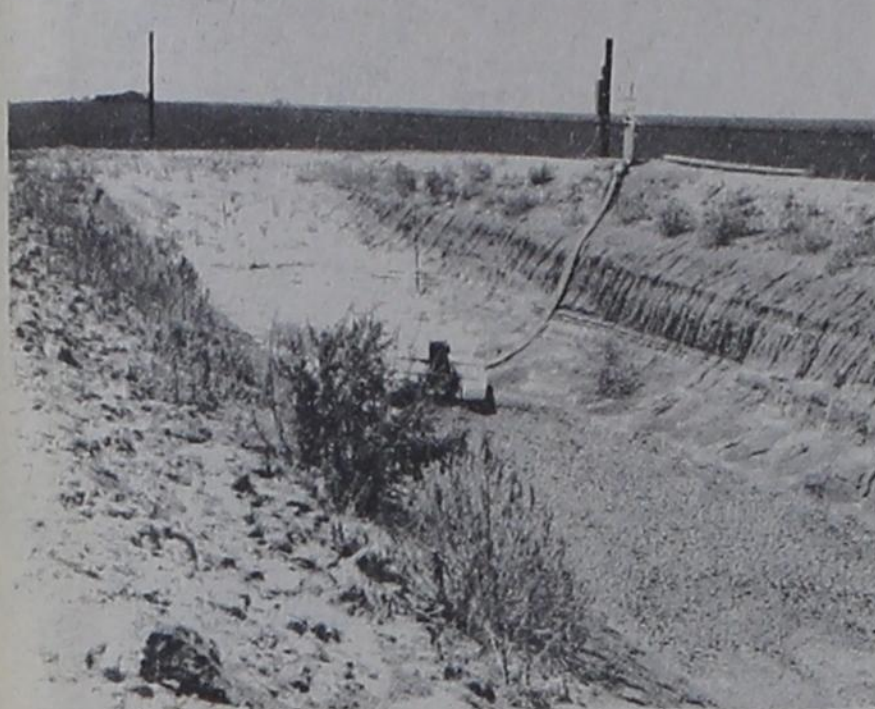
The City Administrator was authorized to proceed with the changeover on the bed and lift on the 1955 Chevrolet truck to the 1973 Chevrolet truck. Hardin moved that the 1955 Chev. truck be advertised for bids in two issues of the Munday Courier with timing for sale as required by law as soon as available after removal of the bed and lift. Andrade seconded. Carried with all in favor.

The Council discussed requirements by the Texas Department of Health Resources in regard to a new sewer permit. Improvements in operational procedure at the plant are now being incorporated. Contracts with irrigation water users must be renewed in writing for long term usage within the next 60 days (approx.) Other requirements will also be made. The Council authorized the administrator to take necessary steps as needed to secure the new required permit.

Next discussed was a new permit requirement at the sanitary landfill. Steps are being taken at this time in regard to space measurements, Soil Conservation Service report and many other details in regard to securing landfill operational approval. A public hearing will be called at a later date in regard to the landfill. The administrator was instructed to take needed action to secure approval.

Hobert moved bills be paid as follows: From Airport funds \$19.34; from Ambulance funds \$144.28; from Swimming pool funds \$358.83; from Operating funds \$8738.13. Andrade seconded. All for. Marr moved the meeting be adjourned. Andrade seconded. All for.

Conservation Of Water Supported By SCS

Water is the lifeblood of any area. Therefore, it becomes the responsibility of each person to use the water the best possible way. At this time ground water is short, many wells are low or dry. Irrigation water running off our cropland is not only wasteful, it also carries sediment, chemicals and plant foods with it. These can become a pollution problem farther down stream.

Irrigation water can be collected, stored, and transported for re-use with a tail-water (irrigation water runoff) recovery system, according to Arche Lieb of the US Soil Conservation Service. A tail-water recovery system not only reduces pollution by collecting the water that runs off while irrigating, but also conserves irrigation water supplies and carries plant foods back onto the cropland.

The following items are needed to have a successful tail water recovery system: 1. Collection facility - which carries water to a storage area without erosion taking place. Usually a waterway or field ditch at the lower end of the irrigation run. 2. Storage - a storage area large enough to provide needed storage, usually a storage pit, or pond completely enclosed by an embankment, with a pipe through the embankment as an inlet to the pit. Sediment traps are located outside the pit where needed. 3. Return facility - to return the water

from the storage area to the irrigation system for re-use. Usually a pump at the storage area and a pipeline back to the irrigation system.

Lieb stated technical assistance from the Soil Conservation Service assisting the Wichita Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District is available to assist farmers install tail water recovery systems. If a tail water recovery system is not practical or usable then assistance can be provided on cut-back of irrigation water to get the best possible use of water available, Lieb concluded. Don't waste water, it is the lifeblood of our agricultural community.

Farm And Ranch News Bollworm Peak Egg Lay Predicted For July 26

Emory Boring, Extension Entomologist and I have recently been checking several cotton fields around the county for insect infestations. Most fields are beyond the stage where thrips can cause damage. Light to moderate bollworm activity is present although many of the eggs present are not hatching due to the hot, dry conditions. Relatively high numbers of beneficials are present in many fields. The peak bollworm egg

lay has been predicted for Knox County for July 26. Producers are reminded that they need to continually be checking their fields for worm damage. Fields should be checked at least twice weekly and infestation levels determined by damage to green squares and numbers of small worms. All factors indicate this to be another heavy bollworm year but there is one practice that irrigated producers may use that will help in number of worms and reduce number of times required to spray. It has been shown that lush green cotton during peak egg lay will have heavy worm damage, usually more than fields that were stressed during this time. Producers should try to finish watering by July 23 and start back after August 6. This will stress cotton somewhat during the peak egg lay and make it less attractive to worms. A slight reduction in yields due to less watering could be more economical than having lush green growth and taking more worm damage plus the expense of spraying more times.

Electrostatic spraying equipment could help farmers do a better job of applying post-emergence pesticide sprays and save them money, according to Ed Law, University of Georgia ag engineer. The equipment isn't ready yet, but the basic research and development has been completed and patented. Law says his patented system overcomes the problems of earlier electrostatic machines, giving consistent results. He uses an electrostatic induction to charge the spray drops. Air transports the charged drops to the plants. The U of G engineer says his field tests indicate that producers can control insects by applying half the recommended pesticide rate in one gallon of water per acre, and that will save you money. The system appears to be adaptable to areas other than row crop spraying, too, and he is looking into orchard spraying, hoping to develop a system for use in that area.

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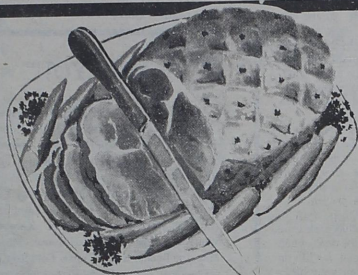

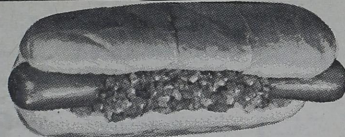
