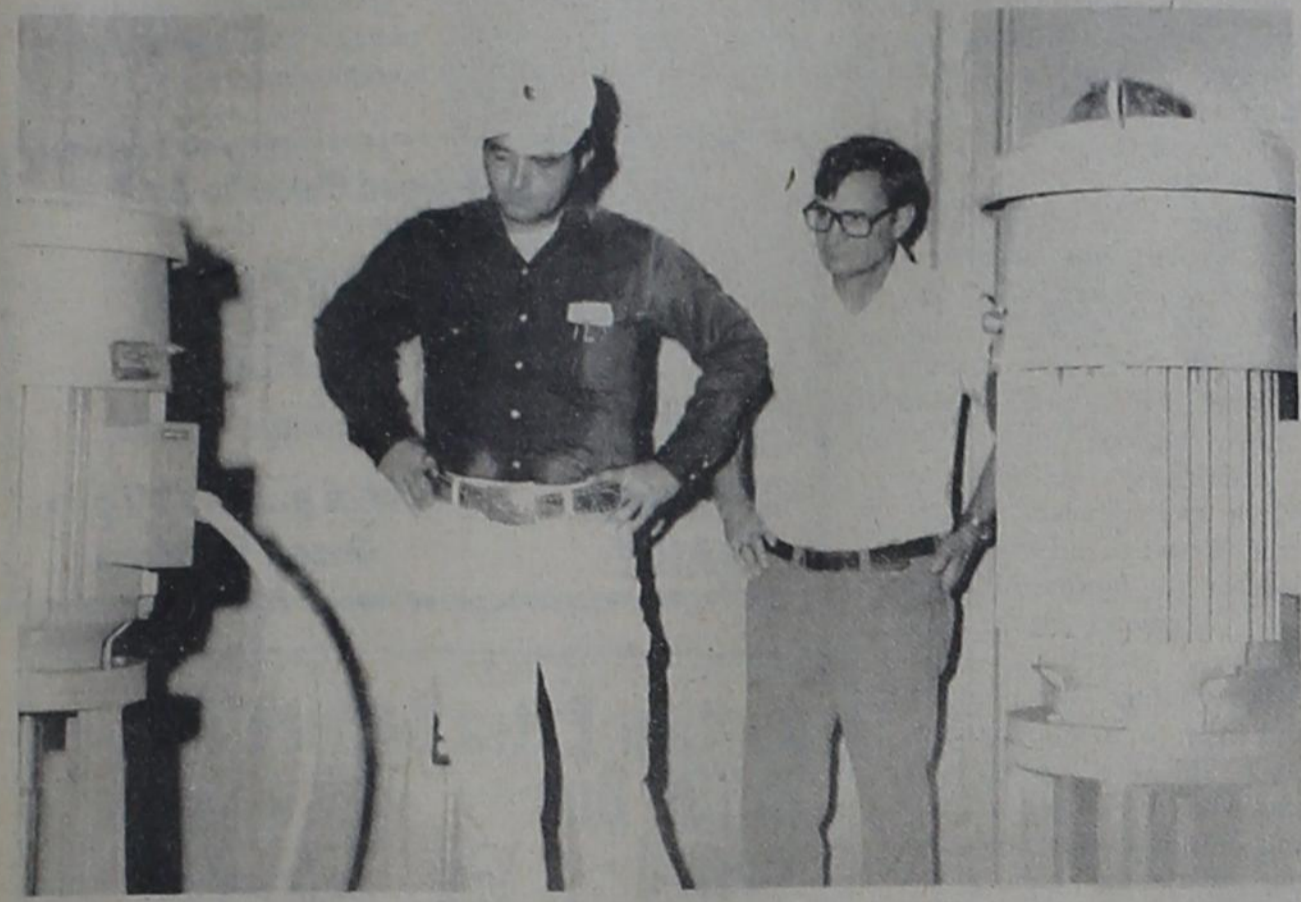

Pied Pipers Hand Moguls Second Defeat Of Season

Munday Moguls suffered a 21-7 defeat by the Hamlin Pied Pipers at Hamlin Friday night. Hamlin won the toss and elected to receive. Moving the ball to the Moguls 32 they were forced to punt on 4th and 7. After a 15 yard punt the Moguls took over on the 17. Three plays later on 4th and 11, Welch dropped back to punt formation and sent the ball 44 yards to Hamlin 40. Again on 4th and 3 Piper Vance Lakey punted to the Moguls 1 foot line with Douglas Michalik returning the ball to the five yard line. Munday moved the ball to the 15 yard line just shy of a first down and with fourth and inches punted the ball to have it brought back for off sides against Hamlin giving the Moguls a first down on the 20. After three plays Munday punted the ball to Hamlin 36 with a return to the Pipers 44. One rushing play of 2 yards and two incomplete passes Hamlin punted to Munday 18 where a fumble by the Moguls left Hamlin with the ball on the 9 yard line. Vance Lakey, Piper fullback, went over from the 2 with Mike Davis adding the 1 point PAT. On the ensuing kickoff a fumble occurred with Hamlin John Barrera recovering the pigskin on Munday 34. Moving the ball to the 32 they were forced to punt trying to put it out-of-bounds and doing so on the 13 yard line. Three plays and a minus three yards Welch punted to the Hamlin 48 with a return to the 34 where a 15 yard penalty for holding put the ball back on the 49. Nine plays later, all on the ground, Hamlin scored from the one on a keeper by quarterback Todd Marshall. Davis kicked the PAT making the score Hamlin 14, Munday 0. Dockins took the kickoff and returned it to the 50 yard line. Three passes to Douglas Michalik from Randy Routon set up the only Mogul score of the contest. On fourth and 2, Routon hit end Larry Welch for a 42 yard TD. Welch added the PAT with 1:17 left in the half. Two incomplete passes and one rushing play netted the Pipers 0 yards. Lakey punted to the Mogul 30 yard line with a five yard return by Mogul Douglas Michalik. Piper Todd Marshall then went to work on defense intercepting his first of three Routon passes for the evening. Hamlin then threw what appeared to be a touchdown pass to Mario Quintanilla only to have it ruled incomplete as he was out of the end zone on the completion, with the first half ending. The Moguls took the second half kickoff with Michalik returning it to the 32 yard line. Fullback Otis Adams carried twice for 11 yards and a first down. Routon was dropped on pass in the backfield on two attempts for a minus 11 yards and Munday punted to the 24 with a return to the 50 yard line. Hamlin then marched 50 yards on 9 plays to score their final points of the night. Marshall scored from the 8 yard line and Davis

added the one point conversion. On fourth and 2 Welch punted the ball to the 14 and a clipping penalty on the Pipers moved the ball back to the 10. Moving the ball to the 37 and 4th and 3 Hamlin punted to the 33 where a return of 3 yards left Munday on the 36. A pass from Routon to end Bobby Therwhanger gave Munday a first and 10 on the 49. An incomplete pass to Welch and Piper Marshall grabbed his second interception. On 4th and 1 Lakey netted a first down. Craig Paylor added 4 yards and Johnny Dockins contributed

9 for another 1st. A pass to Michalik for 12 yards and the Moguls gathered their first three 1st downs in a series for the night. On 4th and 8 a pass to Welch was incomplete and Hamlin took over. Three plays later Hamlin punted to the 28 with a return of 6 by Michalik. Marshall then intercepted his third pass of the evening. After making a first down on 4th and 8 Lakey punted to the 20. Routon hit Michalik for 4, Monty McAfee for 22 and Michalik for 21 yards as the game ended. District play begins Friday night in Munday against Quannah.

Swine Exhibits At Stockshow Terminal

A meeting of the Knox County Junior Livestock Show was held Monday, October 2 beginning at 7:30 p.m. in the Knox City Vo-Ag building. The minutes of the previous meeting were approved as read. New swine health regulations affecting the barrow and breeding show were discussed. Under these new regulations all swine on exhibit at the county show must have a negative test for pseudorabies within the 30 days prior to the show. Breeding swine must have a negative pseudorabies and brucellosis test, individual temperature and vaccination for Leptospirosis. David Counts moved to make the market swine classes terminal with all swine on exhibit going to slaughter and also to allow gilts to be shown in the market classes. Louis Baty seconded the motion which carried. Tom Brockman moved to

cancel all of the swine breeding classes. Jimmy White seconded the motion which carried. Other items discussed included ordering of certificates for the buyers, which Tommy Antilley will have printed. David Counts and Marion Waggoner volunteered to take the 8x10 photographs of the champion animals and buyers. A list of prospective judges was selected by the agent and ag teachers. Member Towns Receive New Water Supply

Are you ready? By the time this edition reaches the subscribers of the member towns of the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority, you should be drinking from a new water supply. According to Pete Beecher, general manager of the Authority, the four member towns will be tied into the Miller Creek Reservoir water supply this week. Goree was first to receive the long awaited thirst quencher Monday night at 10:00 p.m. Knox City was added Tuesday morning at 9:00. Munday received the water Wednesday and Haskell will be receiving their water today. Beecher stated, "It will take approximately one week for the people to get the true taste and value of the water. This is due to the fact that not all the lines in a town can be drained completely. After a week the lines should be carrying the new water supply with no well water left in the cities systems." Reports received from the State Health Department show no bacteria found in samples taken by them or submitted by the Authority. The reservoir is filled to capacity with 25,520 acre feet of water, according to Beecher. One acre foot of water contains 325,850 gallons. Consumption of well water by the member towns shows an annual 400 million gallons used by the four cities. In the sterilization process of lines and storage facilities approximately 4 million gallons was required to

complete the job. Another 4 million gallons was treated and used to fill the lines and storage tanks with approved water for drinking. Negotiations for the Miller Creek project started back in 1957. The dam was completed in August of 1974. Reports of 8 to 16 inches of rainfall the first week of

August 1978 between Munday and Haskell, on the Reservoir's watershed, filled the reservoir to capacity and saw an overflow for several weeks. We now have a new water supply and as soon as the water rates are established the Courier will publish them.

Council Appoints Mrs. Cure Temporary Judge

The City Council of the City of Munday, Texas met September 26, 1978 in Special Session at 7 p.m. at the Munday City Hall. Members present: A. Dale Selzer, Mayor, and Aldermen Jessie Andrade, Von Marr, M. M. Booe, Donald Hobert and Ray Lynn Hardin. Members absent: None. Mayor Selzer called the meeting to order and led in prayer. Minutes of the September 12, 1978 meeting (regular) were read. Hobert moved for approval with no alterations. Hardin seconded. All in favor. Mayor Selzer read a proposed resolution and a quit claim deed from the City of Munday to Bobby J. Hamilton and wife Clo Nita Hamilton for the following property in Munday, Knox County, Texas: Six feet along and parallel with the East boundary line of the North One-half of Lot One in Block No. Seventy. Four of the J. T. Lee second addition to the town of Munday, Knox County, Texas, as filed for record in the office of the County Clerk of Knox County, Texas. Consideration, Ten Dollars. This property is needed to complete a sale and Bobby D. Burnett has examined the instruments and recommended passage by the Council. Booe moved the Mayor be authorized to execute the necessary instruments and that a full copy of the resolution, deed and City Secretary's acknowledgment be filed in the deed files of the City. Andrade seconded. All members voted in favor.

The Council next considered appointment of a temporary judge for City Corporation Court. This appointment is to be made for temporary replacement of Omar Cure (who is ill) until he is able to return to work on a full time basis. After discussion, Marr moved that Dr. Dale Selzer, Mayor be authorized to appoint Mrs. Omar Cure as temporary Corporation Court Judge on the same salary basis as Omar Cure. Hardin seconded. All members voted in favor. Salaries and allowances of City employees were reviewed and employee duties and job requirements were evaluated. After discussion and review of City Budgetary Requirements, the City Council voted the following changes upon a motion by Marr: Increase in salaries, Sue Baker \$25.67 mo., Mary Cartwright \$25.67 mo., J. B. Tomlinson \$5.00 mo., Marty Navaratte \$35 mo., Salvador Sosa \$70 mo. No other salary changes were made. Vehicle allowance increases: E. Y. Johnson \$15 mo., Walter Hertel \$30 mo. Hardin seconded the motion. All members voted in favor. No other business presented. Meeting adjourned. Note (Employees drawing overtime wages are frozen at 9-1-77 rate then being paid).
