Good health is a wonderful possession.

Trouble is, perhaps, we don't protect it enough.

Many of us, in fact, most of us, just take health for granted. As long as we have it and are able to do anything we want to do, we just go ahead and do it. Our health is not a matter of great importance, it seems.

That is until we begin to lose it!

We've heard of people of means who said they'd give everything they own if they could just get their health back. When health ebbs, the value of money decreases.

That's why, we guess, so many people are solicitous of our health. Many times the words of greeting: "How are you?" mean more than just a daily method of saying howdy.

Many things have been invented in recent months and years that warn us of health hazards.

Some time ago, the tobacco industry was compelled to put a warning on cigarette packages that "the surgeon general warns that tobacco may be injurious to your health."

They say cholesterol is not good for your health, and that people should resist the enjoyment of eating foods high in cholesterol fats.

Other foods are bad for the heart; some make your blood pressure run higher than a kite; your liver is liable to get up under certain food stimulants. Carrots are good for your eyesight; allergies make your eyes water; your nose run and your sinuses smart like nobody's business.

In efforts to "make us" protect our health, our national government sometimes gets into embarrassing situations. Take the fear of swine flu just about a year ago. Uncle Sam spent a lot of money trying to produce enough to vaccinate the nation against an outbreak that never came.

Deaths that were blamed on the vaccine caused the program to be suspended at times. Now, they claim that the entire program, including vaccine costs and suits filed against the government because of deaths attributed to the vaccine, are going to cost around \$1 billion.

They're attempting to ban the use of saccharin because some rats came up with cancer after being subjected to massive doses.

The McDonald hamburger chain and glass manufacturers suspended use of their decorative promotional glasses because the beautiful decals with lead on the outside might contaminate liquid on the inside. McDonald's is using Massachusetts officials for permission to continue distributing their glasses.

Quite often, we find medicines advertised to "take only as directed" as a health measure, an overdose of something good can be something bad.

And then, there's coffee! A certain publication came up with a summary, such as:

## Haskell Man Named Munday Police Chief

Gerald Clyde Saffel, 34, of Haskell, was employed as chief of police for the City of Munday on Tuesday, July 12, at a meeting of the City Council.

The city had been without a police chief since the resignation of Noel Jordan, which became effective around July 1. The city has been under police protection during this period, however, by the sheriff's department, extra authority granted Burns Ray, and with Gene Nix of Gove filling in about two days a week.

Mr. Saffel is a native of Hale, where he completed his elementary and high school work. He also attended Hardin-Simmons University and the New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary. He is also serving as pastor of Pinkerton Baptist Church.

His experience in law enforcement includes two years with the Haskell Police Dept., March, 1974 to October, 1975, and again July 1976 until the present time. He also served eight months as deputy sheriff at Aspermont.

He completed 240 hours of basic law enforcement training at Texas A&M College and holds an intermediate certificate from the State of Texas.

He and his wife, Donna Elaine, have two children. They will be moving to Munday as soon as living accommodations are available.

Mr. Saffel is a chaplain in the National Guard and will be on active duty for some two weeks in August. He expects to assume his duties in Munday around August 15.

## Wheat Yield Meeting Set

There will be a wheat production short course tonight (Thursday) beginning at 7:30 p. m. in the assembly room of the county courthouse, according to Tommy Antilley, County Extension Agent.

The program will include Emory Boring, Extension Entomologist, who will discuss damaging insects, infestation levels causing economic damage, beneficial insects and control measures for greenbugs. Also, Dr. Dale Lovelace, Extension Agronomist, will discuss variety selection, management and cultural practices for grazing or grain harvest and the importance of fertilization including types, rates, method and timing of applications.

All producers are invited to attend this very informative meeting. Maximum yields are important, especially in years of low prices. Activities conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are open to the public regardless of age, sex, race, socio-economic levels, religion or national origin.

The 49th annual state convention of Texas Future Farmers of America was held in Fort Worth on July 12-15. Theme of the convention was "FFA-Agriculture's New Generation."

Election of 1977-78 president, Elvin Caraway, Area 1 candidate from the Spur chapter, was elected to succeed outgoing president Ken Johnson of Nacogdoches.

# Weinert Leads Fun Fling, Third Event Friday Night

At the conclusion of Friday night's "Whing Ding, Fun Fling," the second session of competition, Weinert's team was leading all competition by a margin of 11 big points. Munday held second place, with a total of 64.1 points to Weinert's 75.5.

Other teams in the competition are: Knox City, with 53.6; Gilliland, with 46; Gove, with 42, and Benjamin, with 36 points.

The five games of the second series were reeled off in rapid succession, exciting time taken out for protests and disagreements. They consisted of the following: Waterhole No. 3: First player on each team had a football between the knees and a full bucket of water in each hand. He ran to the waterhole (trash can) to deposit water, then returned to the next player.

Eligement: Male players competed. Each dashed from starting point to first stop where he found a closed suitcase. He opened suitcase and fanned items of female clothing, such as: large dress, pair of hose, set of neck beads, wig, suitcase and wheel barrow. He rushed to second stop and jumped into wheel barrow held by a teammate, who pushed him back to the finish line.

Intertube Relay: Player with help of partner puts three innertubes around his body; at first stop three more are added. At this point, remaining two team members lay him down and roll him across finish line. Bringing in the Wash: At sound of whistle, player

mounts bicycle and rides 15 yards to obtain first piece of laundry. As he rides beneath the line, he grabs wash from line and returns it to another player. This is repeated until all four have "brought in the wash."

Steal the Watermelon: Player (blindfolded) takes three melons from water tank and transfers them to another blindfolded partner, who passes it on to a third person. The team completing with best time wins.

As the Fling Ding passes half time, next Friday night's contest will consist of: Hop Along Sackily, Whing Ding birthday party. The big foot frolic, Super duper water blower, and running the trolline. At this

point, they say any team can win.

Next Friday nights events will determine the three teams holding top place. These three will compete on Friday night, July 29, for the championship title.

More interest is being shown as the Fun Fling progresses, and sponsors are well pleased with proceeds being taken in toward the purchase of a new ambulance for the Munday area.

A representative of KAUZ-TV, Channel 6, will be here next Friday night to make recordings of activities pertaining to the new ambulance and Fun Fling competition.

## Funds For Area Schools Increased By Legislature

Munday schools will receive approximately \$5,300 additional dollars from the State of Texas, according to Senator Ray Farabee. The State Legislature in Special Session last week adopted a new public school finance plan which will benefit area school districts and taxpayers.

Senator Farabee said, "The new education law represents a balanced approach to school funding and is a great improvement over past plans. The new plan provides for local property tax relief, increased salary benefits and additional sums for equalization aid."

Farabee voted to concur in House amendments to the original Senate Bill stating, "Under the new plan, rural areas will fare better. This legislation uses agricultural values based on productivity in its apportionment of state and local fund requirements."

The Legislature passed the new law during the first week of the Session. The prompt action by the House and Senate will allow local school districts to set their budgets immediately for the 1977-78 school year.

The school bill was boosted in the House by State Representative W. S. (Bill) Healy. Schools of Knox County will benefit in excess of \$189,000.

Following a study of the city's budget in a hearing on Tuesday night July 12, members of the City Council voted to increase the charge for services. This increase will be noted on water bills mailed out on September 1, 1977, the new rate going into effect with the July 30-August 30 reading.

The increase is as follows: Water rate, from \$4.50 to \$5.00, increase 50 cents; sewer rate from \$2.00 to \$3.00, up \$1.00; garbage collection from \$2.00 to \$3.00, up \$1.00. You will be billed for the three services a total of \$11.50, an increase of \$2.50.

"We regret having to take this action," council members stated, "but we must have this increase in order to operate the city on minimum requirements. After examining the budget, we concluded the increase was imperative to keep our city out of the red."

An examination revealed the following estimated receipts for the year at \$276,881.00, while the estimated disbursements climbed to \$304,206.00. This showed a deficit of \$27,325.00.

Meeting with the council members were Irene Earle, Thelma Maxton and A. L. Awalt, who reviewed fundraising activities for the new ambulance and announced plans for the remaining "Fun Fling" activities for July. Council members commended this group and expressed their willingness to cooperate 100 per cent in these efforts.

## Munday Edged Out 16 to 11 In Playoff

The season has ended for the Munday all-stars!

Entering the play-offs last Monday night at Seymour, local all-stars began racking up scores for an impressive beginning in their first game-but, as one fan put it, they played a good game but errors proved to be the winning factor for Knox City.

The first game of the evening was between Seymour and Crowell, with Seymour taking charge by a score of 10 to 7.

Munday's all-stars led in the first inning against Knox City, 2 to 0; then were 8 to 1 at the end of the second, 10 to 1 when the third closed, 10 to 7 in the fourth, and from there on it was downhill.

Knox City gained a 13 to 10 lead in the fifth, and defeated the locals 16 to 11 in the sixth.

Munday had a lot of fans "on deck" to witness the play-off games.

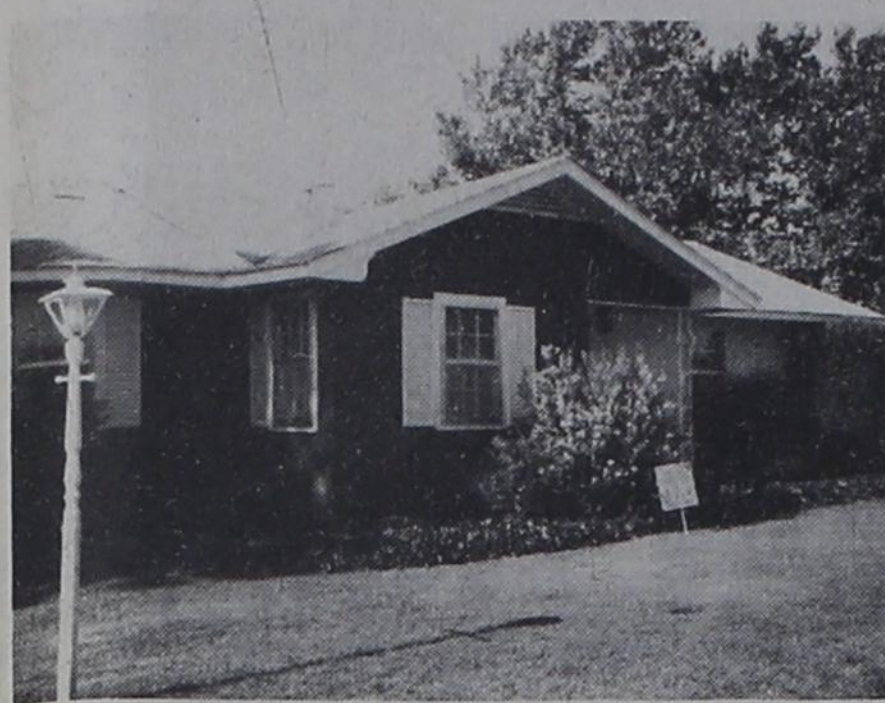
Pallbearers were Charles Phillips, Philip Homer, James Amerson, Walter Owen, Dayton Land and Ronnie Gryder.

**Blackout Not Likely For WTU Patrons**

West Texas Utilities Co. customers are using record amounts of electricity this summer, but generation engineers say the system is capable of supplying any demands.

Three new record peaks have been set and daily consumption is running above average. But in response to questions prompted by the recent New York blackout, WTU officials said that the projected peak will be within the system's generation and transmission capacity.

Carl Yancy, WTU systems operation manager, said it is "highly unlikely" that a blackout similar to the one in New York could occur here. "Of course no one can be absolutely certain, but there is no doubt in my mind that our system is reliable," Yancy said.

He explained that WTU's

eight major power stations are strategically located near the load centers and that the transmission network is designed to eliminate too much dependence on one plant.

Total generating capacity is 1,055,500 kilowatts, Yancy said, and the all-time consumption peak so far was 747,000 kilowatts, which was recorded at 5 p. m. on Monday, July 11. Last year's record peak was 725,000 kilowatts on Aug. 11.

WTU officials have forecast a summer peak of 785,000 kilowatts, which is 270,000 kilowatts below the company's generating capacity. This reserve of about 26 per cent is considered good by national standards.

And the reserve would more than make up for the loss of the company's largest generating facility, which is the new 200,000 kilowatt unit at the Fort Phantom Power Plant near Abilene.

Though the system is geared up for any emergency, company spokesmen acknowledge there is no

sure guarantee against an electrical outage, particularly those caused by acts of nature.

Yancy said the last system-wide blackout occurred in April, 1961, when a phone wire broke and fell into the Paint Creek substation. The outage spread throughout the system, although all service was restored completely within 40 minutes.

Since then, automatic oil circuit breakers have been

installed to prevent a recurrence.

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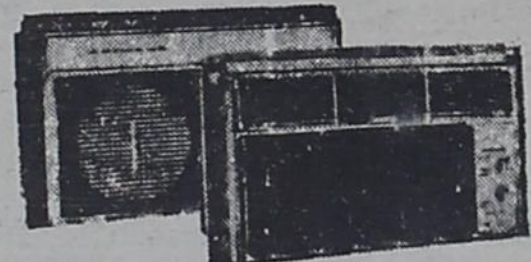

## TEXAS TALK

Weaning calves between 25 and 75 days of age may not be practical in every case, but Kansas and Louisiana State University animal scientists say it will work in special situations. They found, for example, cows with early-weaned calves cycled during the first month after calving, compared to fewer than 80% of nursing cows; early-weaned calves gained faster; by weaning calves early, cows can be maintained on less feed of poorer quality; early weaning may fit fall-calved herds on poor-quality winter pastures, and it can be helpful with second-calf heifers. The goal is to cheapen the cost of early weaning. When grain prices are high and cattle are cheap, it doesn't pay to wean calves early, but that could change as producers go to intensified beef production systems.

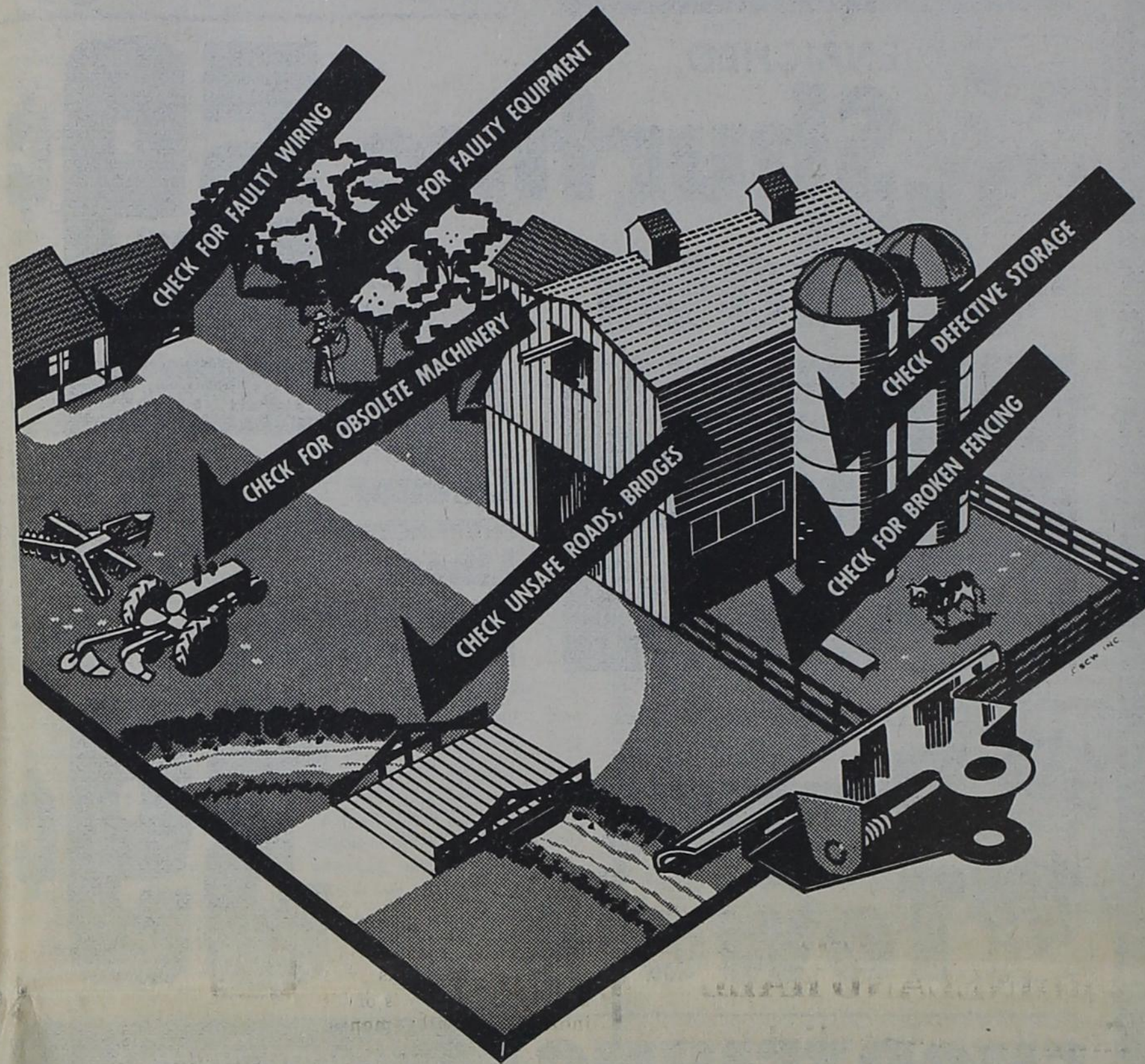

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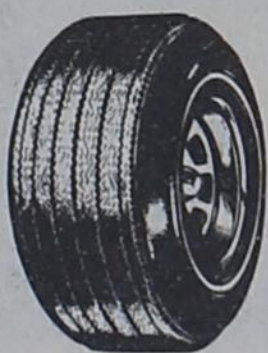
