City-County Library Board Elects Board Members

The nominating committee of the City-County Library Board met in a recent meeting and submitted recommendations for the election of three board members. The nominating committee is appointed by the Knox County Commissioner's Court, the City of Munday, the Munday United Fund and the Munday Chamber of Commerce. Their representatives are: County Judge Homer T. Melton, M. M. Booe, alderman, the City of Munday, Father Bartholomew Landwermer, chairman of the United Fund and Mrs. Callie Ann Combs, manager, Munday Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture.

Retiring from the library board this year were: Bobby D. Burnett, Mrs. Ann Abell and Mrs. Darlene Bellinghausen of Knox City. Each of the retiring board members were re-elected by the board after the nominating committee made their recommendations.

Officers for the fiscal year were elected. Re-elected were: Bobby D. Burnett, pres.; Mrs. Ann Abell, vice pres.; Mrs. Karen Longan, rec. sec.; Mrs. Donald Hobert, librarian. Hold-over directors are: Mrs. Herschel Cowan, Mrs. Ruth Brown, Mrs. Charles Griffith, Ben-

jamin, Mrs. Dean Nuckols, Goree, and M. L. Waggoner.

The budget was adopted. The board approved the employment of Mrs. Alene Beaty as provided under the STEP program through a contract agreement with the West Texas Council of Governments and the City of Munday. She will work as assistant to the librarian sixteen hours each week. The board voiced appreciation to the City Council for providing the library with added personnel as summer reading programs and increased traffic in the library has begun.

The library, in cooperation with the Texas State Library System, sponsors a summer reading program for school and preschool students who read a minimum of 10 books during the summer months. Upon achieving the requirements, the student will receive reading certificates for their participation.

During the fiscal year, 8,835 books were checked out. This year, so far, the librarian has supplied fifty-four 16-mm films for school use and civic programs. This is furnished through the major resource center at Abilene and is available to any group of citizens upon request. There is a time limit on the usage of the film. Recently, a new film-strip projector, complete with audio has been permanently placed in the library with 30 film strips and cassettes designed for pre-school and elementary grade levels. These include fairy tales, seasons, holidays and other entertaining stories of educational value to the young children. As long as the City-County Library continues to be a member of the major resource system, the equipment, film-strips, both permanent and loan, in addition to new permanent loan books will be made available at no additional

costs to the library. According to Mrs. Hobert, "The benefits to the people of Knox County since becoming a member of the Texas Library System have been most gratifying. With our limited income, it would be impossible for the library to provide the films, equipment and books that we have enjoyed during the past three years. This year, the

systems grant will be a 16 mm film projector for the library which together with additional new books, and the loan of others ranging from 3 months to 6 months, we certainly have one of the best equipped libraries in this entire area. New books are arriving daily, so be sure to take advantage of what we have to offer for summer entertainment."

Sales Tax Rebates Increase For First Half Of 1978

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Thursday that city sales tax allocations for the first half of 1978 are running a healthy 17.5 percent ahead of last year.

Bullock announced that his office has sent checks totaling \$60.9 million to 900 Texas cities as their June share of the local option one percent tax.

The latest checks raise the cities' share to date this year to \$196.5 million, compared to \$167.2 million for the first half of last year. That's a 17.5 percent increase.

Of the state's larger cities, Houston continued to chalk up the biggest percentage

increase in city sales tax collections.

The city received a check for \$12,356,904, bringing its total for the year to \$40.8 million, a 20 percent increase over the same period last year.

City sales tax allocations for the year are up 11 percent in Dallas, 15 percent in Fort Worth, 10 percent in San Antonio and 17 percent in Austin.

The tax is collected by local merchants along with the state sales tax and is rebated to the cities monthly by the Comptroller's Office.

Cities receiving rebates in Knox County were: Munday, \$5,153.09; Knox City, \$5,220.73; Goree, \$642.06 and Benjamin, \$474.49. Weinert in Haskell County was mailed a check for \$346.96.

Police Report

This report covers almost one month.

The Dept. issued 18 traffic citations and 14 warnings.

The Dept. also arrested 1 DWI who pleaded guilty and paid a fine in County Court. There were 2 emergency ambulance runs. Fifteen to twenty people were ordered out of the pool after closing hours and steps have been taken to prevent this from occurring in the future.

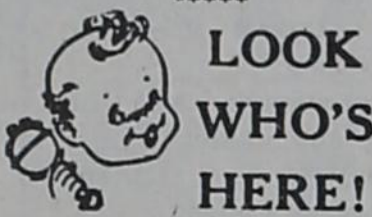

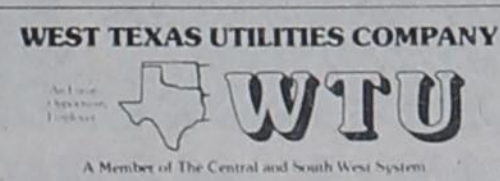

Don't take your farm chemicals for granted. You can get into trouble if you do. Many cases of insecticide poisoning often is passed off as a "bad case of nerves" during planting, so take care. Don Kuhlman, extension entomologist at the University of Illinois, says prolonged handling of toxic products over a 15-20 day planting period could produce blurred vision, headaches, nausea, chest constriction, and possible death. Insecticides as a group are more potent than herbicides. Here are a few safety procedures to cut down the risks in using insecticides, pesticides, and herbicides: Stay upwind when mixing or pouring pesticides; Avoid inhaling fumes or dust; Wear long-sleeved shirts when handling chemicals; Wear rubber gloves while mixing or pouring; Wear unvented goggles and other protective clothing as suggested by the pesticide label; Avoid slopping or over-filling. *****

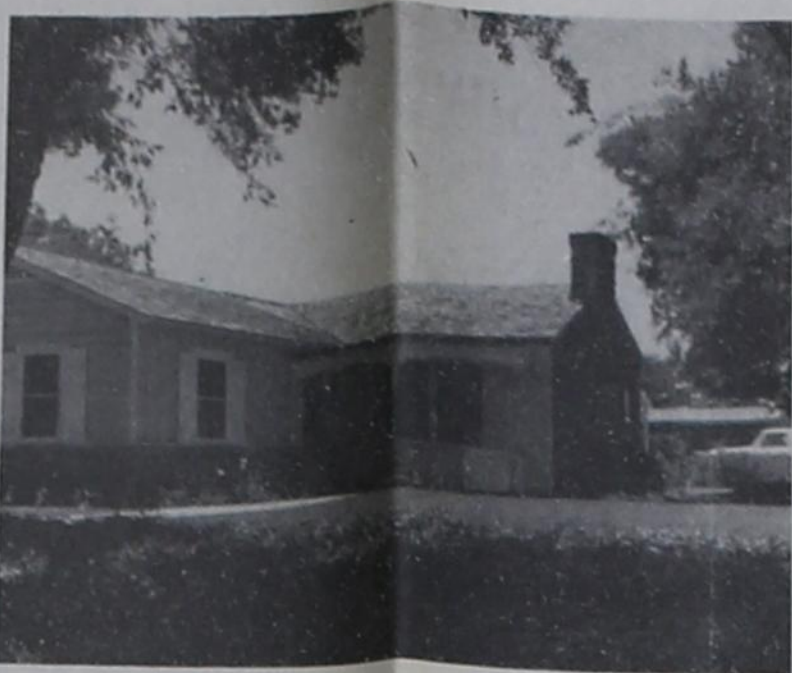

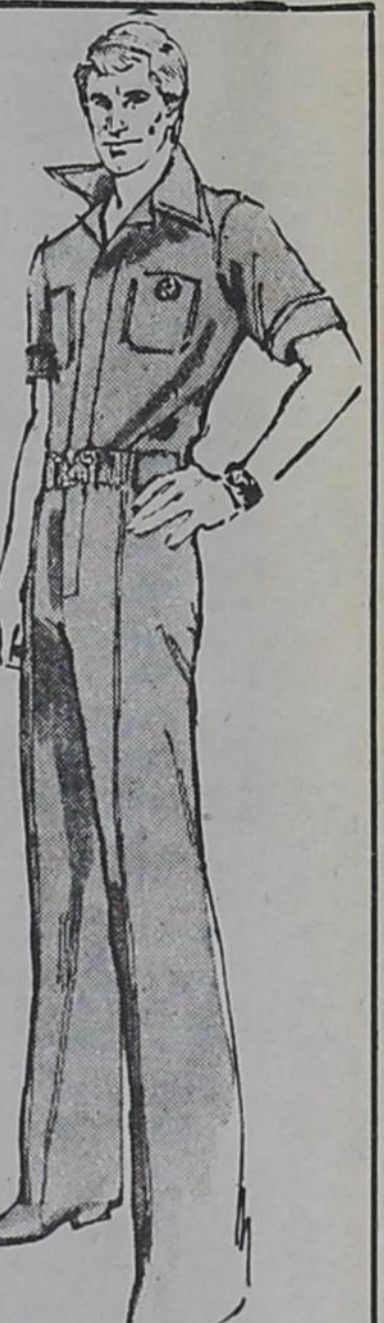

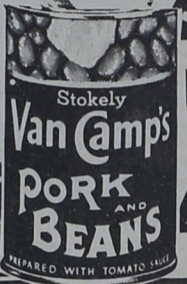
