Knox City To Host Annual Junior Livestock Show Friday, Saturday

The Annual Knox County Junior Livestock Show will be held in Knox City at the bus barn west of the gym

beginning Friday, January 5th and will last into the evening hours Saturday, January 6th.

FFA and 4-H members, under the supervision of their advisors, have been preparing their entries for

approximately two weeks. Washing, clipping and grooming the animals has turned part of the Christmas vacation into long cold hard work.

Vocational ag teachers who have provided the guidance for this year's exhibitors are: Jim McCright and Tom Brockman, Munday FFA; Leon Burkhart and Jim Dillon, Knox City FFA; Buddy Hale, Benjamin FFA and Tommy Antilley, County Extension Agent.

Judges for this year's show are: broilers, Marvin Henry, County Agent, Archer County; sheep, Buddy Lodgson, County Agent, Hall County, Memphis; and swine and beef, Jerry Hawkins from the ag department of Clarendon Junior College.

Broilers will be shown at 2:00 p.m. Friday at the same time sheep are being judged. Saturday morning at 10:00 market swine including guilts and barrow will be shown. Immediately following the swine division heifers and steers will be judged.

A change in the swine division this year will see all the entire sold at the end of the show. A floor buyer will purchase all swine entries at market price.

The top two animals in each class will make the premium sale at the end of Saturday's activities. An exhibitor is allowed one animal in the premium sale. If an exhibitor wins in two classes he can have one in the sale and the other class will move down to the 2nd and third or 1st and third place or whatever place down the line it takes for an exhibitor to have only one animal in the premium sale.

Weather may have an effect on the crowd for the annual show, but remember these exhibitors have worked hard in raising and preparing these entries and could use your support and encouragement in the once a year show.

Weather Hinders Ginning

As of Monday, January 1, 1979 only one gin in the Munday area reported they were ginning the cotton on the yard. Munday Gin and Seed Inc. was ginning trailers of cotton that had been scooped off on the top by the farmers owning the

seed cotton. Other gins reported too much sleet, snow and moisture on the top of the loaded trailers to allow ginning. The procedure for ginning the wet loads is slow, but managers hope to have the yards clean by the time the weather permits the farmers to return to the fields for gathering more cotton.

Gin yards are covered up with the white product and most report large ricks of cotton in the field.

Rhineland Co-Op gin leads the area in bales weighed in with 4612 and 938 on the yard. Following Rhineland are: Knox Prairie Seeds Inc., 3823 and 400 on the yard; Munday Gin and Seed Inc., 2403 with 250 on the yard and Goree Producers 2268 and 350 on the yard. Reports from three of the

four gins shows approximately 3500 bales in ricks. This is broken down to Rhineland, 2000; Knox Prairie, 925 and Munday, 517.

The weather has halted the gathering of the money crop in Knox County with some guessing the crop at being one-half off the stalks.

Water Problems Due To Break In Main Line

Water users in Munday experienced low pressure and no water at times Monday due to a break in the 8 inch main just south of Stewarts Texaco. The break occurred around 7:30 p.m. Sunday and three city employees began the repair work earlier Monday morning during the freezing temperatures.

Approximately 25 to 30 customers were without water Monday evening and night but water was restored to them Tuesday at 3:00 p.m. Walter Hertel, city administrator, Salvador Sosa and Cruz Aguilar worked in the freezing temperatures finding valves and shutting off the leak in the main line. After restoring the water to the main line two valves dropped a gate and further work will be required.

At the present all water users in Munday are back on the water supply.

Snow In Time For New Year

Four Homes And Three Businesses Constructed In The City For 1978

Building permits were filed with the City of Munday for four new homes, three new businesses, two additions to existing homes and three for improvements in the later part of 1977 and 1978. One business and one home was finished in 1978 being started in 1977.

New homes, businesses, additions and improvements totalled approximately \$235,000.00. Last years figure was approximately \$347,000.00. Eight new homes were finished in 77 and the four in 78 are the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Cotton Smith, Tommy Harlan, and in the finishing stages the home of Mr. and Mrs. Milton Escamilla. The other home is being build by Dave Oxford

and will be put on the market. These homes total approximately \$121,000.00. Additions to the homes of J. M. Christensen and Daniel Ramirez and improvements to the homes of Jimmy Reddell and Russell Penick were about \$36,400. New businesses totaled approximately \$74,000.00 in construction. Included in this figure were Ralph's Auto Repair, Dairy Queen and Jewel Box. One new business, Allsup's Convenience Store, was built in 1977.

Contracting the building of three of the new homes was local contractor John Lee Wilde. M. M. Booe contracted the building on the Christensen's home. Ralph's Auto Repair was started by

Homer Ralston of Benjamin. According to permits issued by the City of Munday this is all the work that has been done in the City for the year 1978.

Fire Dept. Gets Check

The Munday Volunteer Fire Department received a check for \$75.00 recently from Texas Farm Bureau Insurance Companies as an expression of thanks for the Department's work on the property of Munday Gin & Seed Co. of Munday.

The money will be used for their loss prevention program.

The Texas Farm Bureau Insurance Companies pay volunteer fire departments this amount when the department works at a fire in rural areas, involving property insured by them.

The Insurance Company believes volunteer fire departments have contributed to reduce the amount of loss involved by fire and more important, to prevent fires. It is their hope this money will help the Munday Volunteer Fire Department in their program.

Competitive foods are any foods sold in competition with the type A lunch required in the national school lunch program.

Last April, the agriculture department proposed to restrict - until after the last school lunch period - the sale of candy, soda water, frozen desserts and chewing gum sold in vending machines, on a la carte lines or at snack stands.

More than 2,100 comments were received on the April proposal and they "raised some significant issues which deserve additional public scrutiny," Foreman said. "Therefore, we are withdrawing the April proposal and will use the public meetings and written comments to help form the basis for a new one."

The meetings will be held Jan. 30 in Nashville, Tenn., Feb. 6 in Detroit, Mich., and Feb. 13 in Seattle, Wash. They will focus on developing competitive food standards that consider nutrition education, health, eating habits and the local administration of an impact on the school food programs.

Last year, Congress authorized the secretary of agriculture to regulate the sale of foods of limited nutritional value that are offered in competition with the national school lunch and breakfast programs.

In the comments received on the April proposal, 82 percent favored the regulation or some variation of it; 18 percent opposed it.

Foreman said the three public meetings were scheduled "in line with the

City Council Minutes

The City Council of the City of Munday, Texas met December 18, 1978 in Special Session at 7 p.m. at the Munday City Hall.

Members present: A. Dale Selzer, Mayor, and Aldermen M. M. Boos, Donald Hobert, Ray Lynn Hardin and Von Marr.

Members absent: Jesse Andrade.

Mayor Selzer called the meeting to order. Also in attendance at the meeting was Sue Baker and Mary Cartwright. Purpose of the meeting, the Mayor said, is to further discuss a proposal by City Administrator Walter Hertel, that the City discontinue assessment and collection of school taxes. Reasons given were basically the same as those given on December 12th at the regular meeting. Legislative and School Tax Practices Board Requirements will continually enlarge and create too much additional burden for the

City office force to properly handle business of the City, the Administrator said.

A lengthy discussion was held in this regard. After discussion, the Council requested that Mayor Selzer call for a joint meeting with the School Board as soon as possible and inform the Board that the City of Munday will discontinue tax assessment and collection for them as soon as possible after January 1, 1979. City personnel will continue to collect taxes until after Jan. 31, 1979 and also mail out new delinquent notices in February 1979 if the School Board requests this help. Also additional help will be supplied, if requested, to facilitate an orderly transition to be completed prior to equalization board meetings in 1979.

No other business presented. Meeting adjourned with unanimous approval.

STUDY INCOME EXPENSES

Also, if your income meets expenses but leaves no extra money, be just as strict. Do not buy anything on credit until income is higher or expenses are lower.

This is especially important for consumers already making credit payments.

MAKE BUDGET
After studying income and expenses, make budget - or spending plan - to cover all expenses and other things you need or want.

Be sure the budget allows your monthly income to cover monthly expenses - plus savings.

Consider credit buying ONLY if the budget shows more income than expenses each month.

SET LIMITS ON CREDIT
Set limits on credit. This is the first and most important one factor in controlling credit.

Limit credit to amounts you can pay safely out of current and future income. Be sure future income is a "certainty."

CREDIT DANGER SIGNALS
Crisis can threaten even the most workable budget or spending plan. Stay alert for credit danger signals. If you answer "yes" to any of the danger signals below.

it is time to postpone buying any more on credit - until you can answer "no" to all the signals:

Are you near, or at the limit, on your "lines of credit"?

Are you extending payment schedules? That means are you taking 60 to 90 days to pay bills you once paid in 30 days?

Can you only make the "minimum" payment on your revolving charge accounts?

Are you using your savings to pay current bills? Do you worry a lot about money?

Are you unsure about how much you owe?

What Makes The Soil Fertile ?

The production on any portion of land is dependent upon the chemical nutrients that are found in the soil. The most common nutrients being nitrogen, phosphorus, and potassium. These nutrients mix with water and move to the root zone of a plant. The abundance of the nutrients in the soil is known as soil fertility.

For a soil to be fertile, it must have a structure that will enable air, water, and nutrients to pass through it. The structure of the soil is very important in attaining plant growth. The size and shape of each soil particle is important to the general make-up of the soil structure. Air and water must be able to move freely through the soil if the potential fertility that is essential for plant growth is to be used.

The soil is a complex substance formed by living

organisms, soil bacteria, fungi, one-celled animals, plant roots, and many other micro-organisms. They all help maintain the soil structure as well as the fertility. We can see that soil fertility and maintenance for productivity depends as much on living plants and animals of the soil as upon the existence of inorganic minerals within the soil.

The cycle of breakdown and decomposition of plant and animal waste, which will circulate minerals back through the soil, is due largely to the work of soil bacteria and fungi. In some soils the minerals are maintained through the action of nitrogen fixing bacteria. These bacteria take nitrogen from the air and convert it into soil nitrates. If some form of these activities are not going on within the soil, it will

become infertile.

To maintain a healthy soil structure a minimum amount of tillage is required. Soil structure can be broken down by heavy compaction with successive tractor trips over the land. Soil organisms living near the soil surface can be destroyed by high soil temperature. A cover mulch or some type of crop residue, needs to be left on the soil surface to maintain moisture and a moderate soil temperature. A limited amount of tillage, proper management of resi-

dues on the soil surface, and use of herbicides for weed control will assure a healthy soil structure. A soil test will indicate if the soil is low in plant nutrients. Commercial fertilizer can be applied, or a soil building legume such as guar, peas, vetch, and alfalfa can be grown to supply the needed nutrients.

Farmers Tax Deadline Approaching

While most taxpayers have until April 15 (actually April 16) to file their 1978 income tax returns, farmers and ranchers face a much earlier filing date.

Agricultural producers who do not file an estimate of their income by Jan. 15 and do not pay estimated taxes must file their tax returns and pay due taxes by March 1. However, if farmers file an estimate, they have until the April 16 deadline to file final returns, points out Ashley Lovell, economist in management with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Lovell notes several considerations for Texas farmers and ranchers as they prepare their 1978 income tax returns. Filing requirements for 1978 are the same as in 1977. For example, an individual must file a return if his gross income is \$2,950 or more, and a married couple under 65 years of age must file if their joint income is more than \$4,700. If both are 65 or older, they may make \$6,200 before a return is required.

The Revenue Bill of 1978 specifies that for tax years ending after August 15, 1971, single purpose livestock, poultry or horticultural structures are eligible for investment credit. Examples of special purpose structures qualifying as livestock facilities include those used to breed chickens or hogs, to produce milk from dairy cattle, and to produce feeder cattle or pigs, broiler chickens, or eggs. Facilities must include, as an integral part of the structure or enclosure, equipment to contain livestock and to provide water,

feed and temperature control, if necessary.

Effective for sales after Oct. 31, the amount of net capital gain a noncorporate taxpayer may deduct from gross income is increased from 50 to 60 percent. Thus, only 40 percent of net capital gain is to be included in gross income. For sales before Nov. 1, the former deduction of 50 percent of net long-term capital gain over net short-term capital

loss applies.

Another change concerns tax credit for energy-saving improvements and renewable-energy equipment installed in homes.

For information on other changes in the Revenue Bill of 1978 and for assistance in filing your income tax return, Lovell suggests several IRS publications (1979 editions) - "Your Federal Income Tax" and the "Farmer's Tax Guide."

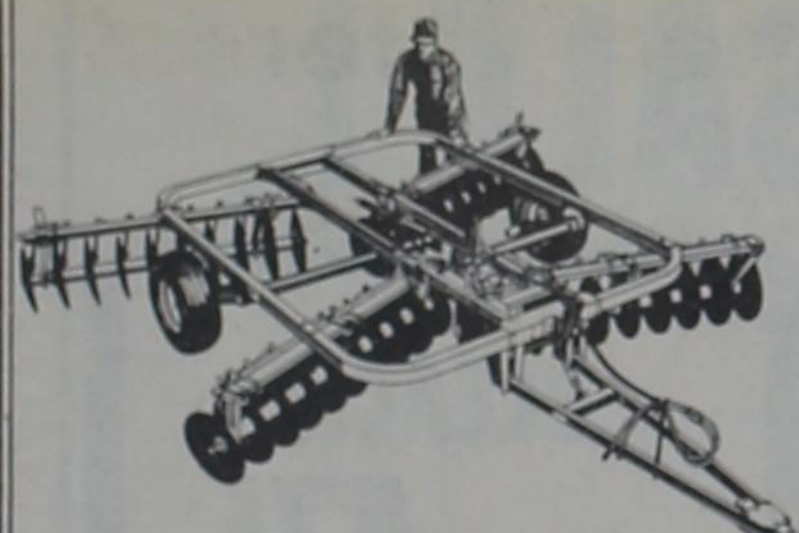

When temperatures drop and snow and sleet hit, livestock gains slack off. However, Wayne Booser, a Texas A & M Extension economist, may have a solution to that problem. He's feeding stockers a ration of grain and 50% broiler litter. "Broiler litter reduces the risks of drought or cold weather that cut into livestock gains," he says, and "can increase stocking rates and produce acceptable gains at reasonable costs with this ration." He suggests using litter on which at least 3 batches of chickens have been produced to ensure adequate protein content. Protein content normally ranges from 18 - 23%. Start feeding calves at 350-400 lbs. and don't push calves higher than 850-900 lbs. Broiler litter, if used correctly, can be a valuable component in an efficient profitable livestock feeding program. *****
