## Telephone Installed In Library

City County Library now has a telephone and you do not need to call Chamber of Commerce to reach them. The new number is 422-4877. Edith Hobert, librarian, expressed her hopes that the public would jot down the number and feel free to call.

Remember, too, there is a book drop outside the front of the building to leave books when they are closed. Library hours are morning hours, 10:00 to 12:00 and in the afternoon, 2:00 to 5:00. They are open Monday through Friday each week.

## Change Likely In School Tax

The school tax rate for next year will likely be slightly increased, in the opinion of Supt. Douglas Myers. The rate is scheduled for discussion and adoption at the school board's regular meeting next month.

Supt. Myers said that due to increased inflation, loss of oil values and loss of revenue due to less than 100% reimbursement on homestead exemptions for elderly, the rate for 1979 will likely have to be set at \$1.75 (\$1.50 for maintenance and 25 cents for interest and sinking bonds). The rate for the past several years has been \$1.45 (\$1.25 for maintenance and 20 cents on bonds.)

## School Board Minutes

## Munday Students Attend State FFA Convention

Local FFA chapter members attended the 51st Annual Convention of the Texas Association of Future Farmers of America, July 10-13, 1979, at the Lubbock Memorial Civic Center. Attending the convention were Greg Walling and Stephen Schumacher.

More than 5,000 persons attended the four day convention, the highlight of the year's activities in FFA. Some 1,600 voting delegates representing 917 chapters in the state were on hand to elect officers for the coming year and to honor outstanding members of the organization.

Texas is the state with the largest membership in FFA. There are more than 60,000 members and the national organization has drawn many of its national officers from the ranks of the Texas membership. The current national FFA Western Region Vice-President is Elvin Caraway from Spur.

The convention had as its theme "A Brighter Future - A Golden Past." Created in 1928, the Future Farmers of America has had almost a million members since its inception. In its first half century, the organization has been noted for its distinguished contributions to youth, leadership, agriculture and vocational education. Current FFA programs encompass every phase of agriculture from livestock production to development of leadership to agricultural economics.

At the convention, outstanding FFA members were recognized for significant achievement in FFA programs including supervised farming, agribusiness and leadership. Also, more than \$300,000 in college scholarships was presented to 70 FFA members by nine organizations that are long time supporters of FFA.

## Goree Woman Heads Breath Of Life Drive

Mrs. Barbara Bowman has accepted the Chairmanship of the Annual Fall Campaign on behalf of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation. She will be recruiting volunteers within the Community to plan a "Breath of Life Campaign" to take place this fall in Goree. The purpose of this Fall Campaign will be to provide the Community with information about Cystic Fibrosis and to raise funds to support research, education and care programs for children affected by cystic fibrosis, and other lung-damaging diseases like severe asthma, chronic bronchitis, and bronchiectasis.

Cystic Fibrosis is the number one genetic killer of children. Approximately one in every twenty Americans is a symptomless carrier of the recessive CF gene. Cystic Fibrosis is inherited when both parents carry the recessive gene. At the present time, no cure for Cystic Fibrosis is known.

## City Sales Tax Rebate Tops 1978 Figure

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said rebates to Texas cities of the one-percent optional city sales tax during 1979 are running about 10 percent ahead of payments for the same period last year.

Bullock said Texas cities have received \$241.5 million in rebates during the first seven months of this year compared to \$216.3 million through July of 1978.

The July allocations for the more than 900 Texas cities who share in the rebates will amount to \$23.5 million.

For the period ending June 28, 1979 Munday received \$1,630.99 while \$889.32 was received for the same period of 1978.

For this same period in 1979 Knox City received \$2,192.46 and in 1978 \$1,109.17.

### District Play-Offs To Be In Graham, July 23-24

Munday advanced to the District Little League Play-offs Tuesday night with a 15-6 victory over Knox City.

Munday was host team Monday and Tuesday nights at Putnam Field for the area play-offs with teams from Seymour, Crowell, Knox City and Munday participating.

Knox City advanced to Tuesday night play by beating Crowell 8-6, while Munday was romping over Seymour nine to zero.

Ricky Bishop, manager of Knox City all-stars, won the flip of the coin and chose to be the home team. Umpires for the game were: Richard Poteet, behind the plate, and Larry Walling on first base, both from Seymour; Hershel Tankersley of Knox City on second, and Frank Jackson of Munday on third.

Knox City came back and scored 2 runs on 1 hit.

In the second, Smith was safe on an error and nine men came to bat. Five runs were scored on 2 hits before Knox City could get 3 outs. Castorena struck out the side for Knox City in the bottom of the second.

Third inning Munday pushed across 6 runs on 4 hits with 2 men left on base. Knox City committed 2 errors.

Knox City sent 8 men to the plate, scoring 2 runs on 2 hits, and left 3 stranded in the bottom half of the third. Munday pushed across 1 more run in the last 3 innings on 1 hit while Knox City scored 3 runs on 3 hits.

Castorena struck out 11 and walked ten. Knox City pitchers managed only 2 strike outs while giving 493 walks.

In the first game of Little League play-off, Munday

night, July 16, Knox City, as home team, faced Crowell, as visiting team. Knox City downed Crowell eight to six.

Correll pitched the six innings for Knox City, with Carter and Rousch being leading hitters, each with two hits.

Knox City team garnered seven hits with seven men left on base and one error.

## City Council Minutes

The City Council of the City of Munday, Texas met July 10, 1979 at 7 p.m. at the Munday City Hall in Regular Session.

Members Present: Mayor A. Dale Selzer and Aldermen Ray Lynn Hardin, M. M. Boone, Von Marr, Jessie Andrade, and Donald Hobert.

Members absent: none. Mayor Selzer called the meeting to order. Hardin led in prayer at the Mayor's request.

Minutes of the June 12 regular and June 15 special meeting were read by City Secretary Heffel. Marr moved for approval. Hobert seconded. All in favor.

Bobby Hutchinson of Munday Ambulance Service met with the council. Possible purchase of a radio was discussed. Also coverage while Saffel is at National Guard duty was discussed. The City Secretary was instructed to handle in same manner and at same rate as last year, Hutchinson to cover for Nix 2 Fridays at \$20.00 day extra pay and Gene Brown to cover while Hutchinson is on vacation (see last year for rate if Brown is available).

The Council next considered the rate charge on ambulance calls to Abilene and Wichita Falls. After Discussion Marr moved the above time off plan be approved and the Abilene and Wichita Falls rate set at \$110.00 per trip. Hardin seconded. All for. (All other rates remain as now set.)

The Council decision as to radio purchase was delayed for further study to weigh benefits of a new type system as well as possible funding from another source. City operating funds are low at this time due to the street seal-coat payment due.

Next discussed was a request from Munday Gin & Seed Co. for permission to install a culvert in the City's drainage ditch system South of the gin plant. After discussion, Hardin moved the installation be permitted if the following requirements are met: a satisfactory agreement, in writing, is to be made; culvert size and other conditions shall be agreed upon by Bobby Hutchinson and City Administrator Hertel; a maintenance agreement is to be required of

Wildcat locations have been made on farm and ranch land owned by several local people, all to be about 10 miles east of Weinert. Benson Mineral Group Inc. of Denver has staked the following locations:

No. 1 Baker - meg, a 1,000 foot venture, is located on a 1,355 acre lease.

No. 1 Bowman - BMG is spotted on the same survey as the Baker lease, and will go to 975 feet on a 390-acre lease.

No. 2 Bowman, in the same area, will go to 975 feet.

No. 1 Broach - BMG, on the same lease location, will also go to 975 feet, and is northeast of Weinert.

Three test locations have been staked on the 1,250 acre Ferris lease, nine miles east of Weinert. All will go to 1,000 feet.

**Water Authority Minutes**

North Central Texas Water Authority met in regular session, Tuesday, July 10, 1979 at 8:00 p.m., at the Water Authority office in Munday.

Directors present were R. C. Couch, Jr., Thomas W. Watson, Willie B. Neighbors, Jack Beaty, Lee Bruce and Joe Clonts. Directors absent were Leon Burkham and Clint Norman. Others present were Charles Chapman, Billy Harris and Pete Beecher.

Mr. Couch called the meeting to order and asked for the reading of minutes from the previous meeting. There being no additions or corrections, the minutes stood approved as read.

The Board then reviewed the list of monthly bills and approval was given the bills be paid as listed.

Next for Board consideration was an issue concerning the recently enacted tax laws. Mr. Neighbors moved that the Board pass a resolution to continue taxing automobiles and ag-use land within the Authority's jurisdiction for the 1979 tax rolls. Mr. Clonts seconded this motion and the Board vote was unanimous in favor. Motion carried.

The Board then reviewed a proposed Engineering Contract by Freese & Nichols of Fort Worth. Freese & Nichols being the Consulting Engineers on the building of the project, they proposed to do further work with the Authority when there was a need for engineering services and charges for their services were predetermined in the contract. By doing this, misunderstandings could be minimized and the Authority would have technical advise readily available when needed. The Board elected to study the contract and act on it at the next meeting of the Board.

News media has asked for copies of the minutes to be used for publication in the local newspaper. Instructions were given to the general manager to notify all the local newspaper personnel the minutes were available if they wanted to pick up copies at the Authority office.

The towns of Asperment, Rule, Rochester and O'Brien, with whom the Authority had committed to sell water had sent their signed Contracts for signatures and final approval by the Authority Board. Following discussions, Mr. Watson moved the contract signing be held up at this time, pending confirmation of the Engineers as to the yield of water for the reservoir. Mr. Beaty seconded and the Board vote was all in favor. Motion carried.

There being no further business before the Board, adjournment was at 10:50 p.m.

Hardin seconded. All for. Booe moved the meeting adjourn. Hobert seconded. All in favor.

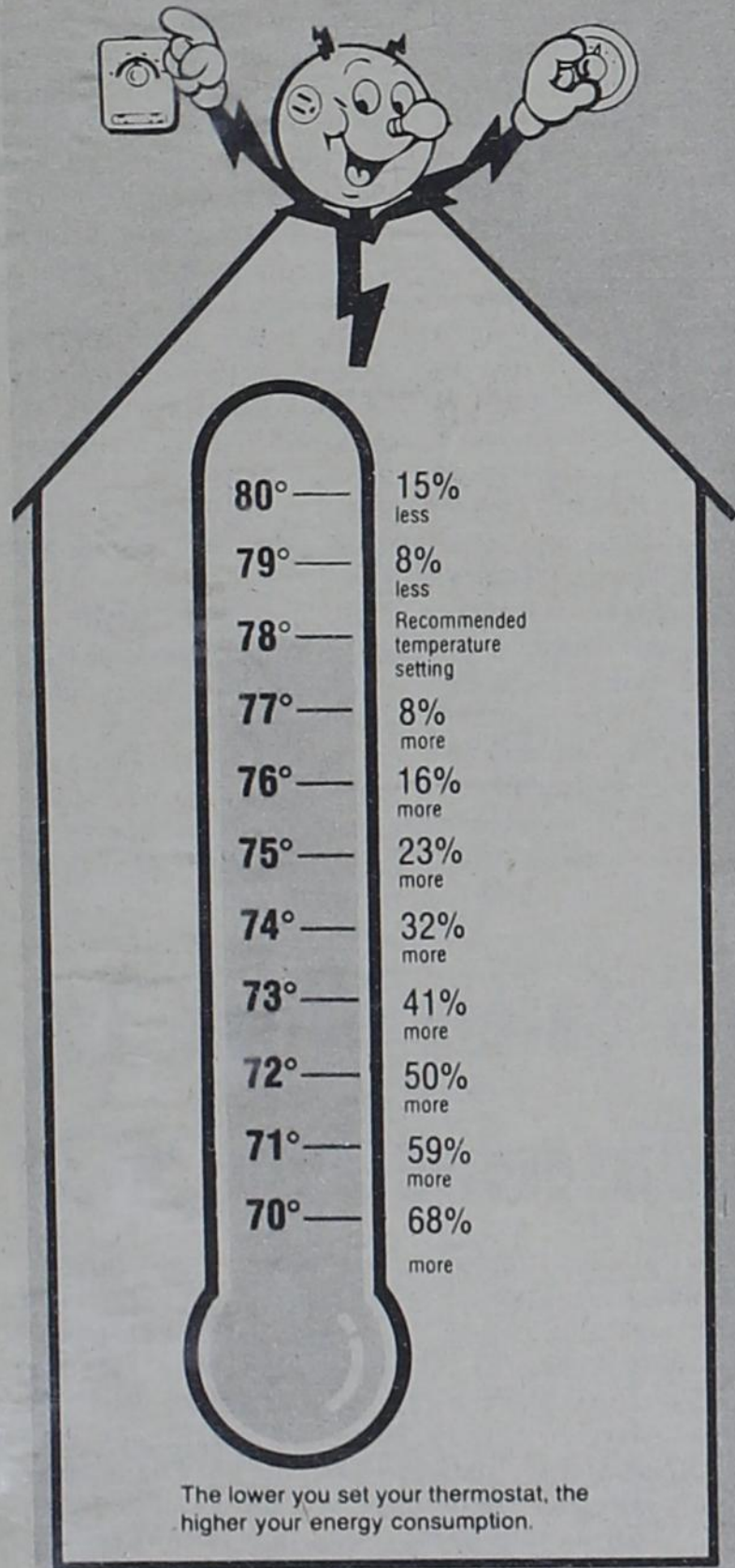
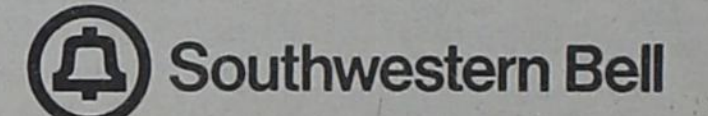

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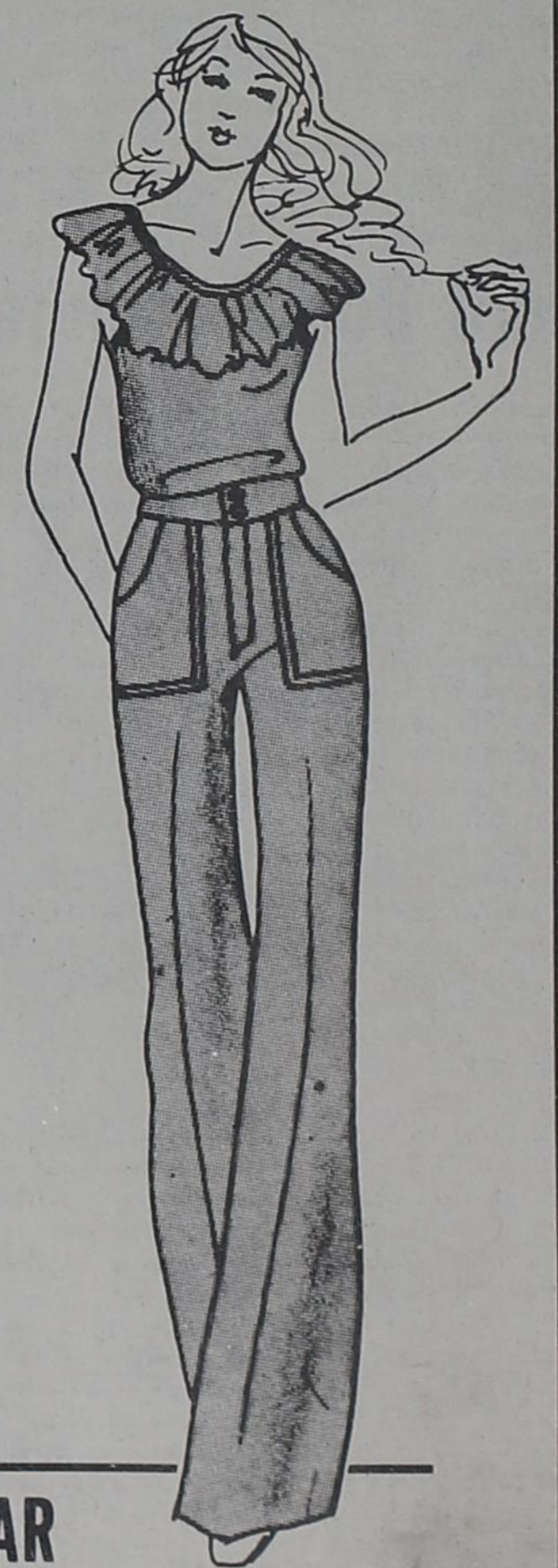

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## Variety Of Flours From Texas Wheat

Texas wheat reaches today's consumer in the form of many well-liked foods - such as bread, breakfast cereals, rolls, pancakes, biscuits, macaroni, spaghetti and noodles, a foods and nutrition specialist says.

But first, Texas wheat is milled into flour, explains Mary K. Sweeten with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

This flour is then marketed in several forms, each suited to a particular type of baked product.

Most of today's flour is enriched - meaning that thiamin, niacin, riboflavin and iron are added to bring the amount of these nutrients within limits specified by the government. Calcium may also be added, Ms. Sweeten continues.

These are types of wheat flour available:

Enriched all-purpose flour - the kind usually sold for home use - is suitable for most home baking. Generally, it is a blend of hard and soft wheat flours, but it can be milled entirely from soft wheat.

This flour contains sufficient gluten - a protein - to form an elastic framework that is delicate enough for cake-making and strong for bread-making.

Cake flour, milled from soft wheat, is lower in protein than all-purpose flour and usually is enriched. It is very fine and uniform and makes tender, delicate cakes. It is not suitable for bread-making.

Self-rising flour is all-purpose flour with leavening ingredients and salt added. It is convenient for use in biscuits and other quick breads.

One cup of self-rising is equal to one cup enriched flour plus one and one-half teaspoons baking powder plus one teaspoon salt.

Whole-wheat or graham flour is milled from the whole kernel and contains all the B-vitamins, iron and other nutrients naturally present in wheat. Whole-grain products also provide fiber.

The volume of breads made with whole-wheat flour may be lower and the texture coarser than those of breads made with all-purpose flour because of the weaker gluten strength of the whole-wheat flour.

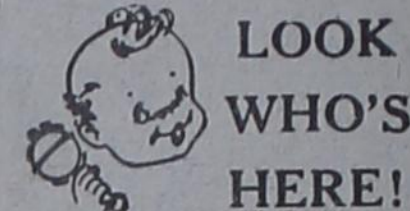

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### GRASSHOPPERS PLAGUE VARIOUS AREAS OF TEXAS

Some 1.5 million acres of rangeland are being treated with malathion in a cost-share program with ranchers and the Texas U. S. Departments of Agriculture.

A special bait using toxaphene can be prepared to control grasshoppers along field margins and roadsides.

### OXYGEN-LESS PONDS PROBLEM TO FISH

Lack of oxygen in farm ponds can be a real problem for fish during hot summer weather, says a fish disease specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Oxygen in water is usually lowest at dawn and during cloudy days. Excessive algae growth, overstocking a pond with fish and overfeeding fish contribute to oxygen depletion problems.

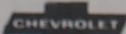

# In Touch

By REV. JAMES MALONEY

In Psalms 68:6a, we read that God sets the solitary in families. Here we see in the scriptures the importance of the family unit.

Paul wrote, in Ephesians 5:32, that the union of a man and a woman in holy matrimony is a mystery. This mystery typifies the mystical union between Christ and His bride, the Church. As Christ so loved the Church and gave Himself for her, so ought men to love their wives. If the husband is loving his wife as he should, it will not be difficult for the wife to be subject unto her husband, as the Church is subject unto Christ, (Ephesians 5:22-24).

For our own happiness, God has set up a Divine Order in which a household can operate smoothly and harmoniously. If every member of the family would recognize and function in the position that God has intended that person to fill, the home would be joyful and prosperous. I Corinthians 11:3 tells us that the head of every man is Christ, the head of the woman is the man, and the head of Christ is God. Living in this Divine Order becomes a delight instead of a drudgery when we realize it is not slavery when we submit to another's authority. In fact, it is quite the opposite within the Kingdom of God, for a master is but a servant of all.

Each husband needs to realize the significance of his position as the spiritual priest of his home. He is responsible to God for the welfare of his family, and the spiritual and material benefit of each member. As the priest of his home, he must daily pray for his family and stand against all of the fiery darts that Satan would hurl.

Every wife needs to consider whether she is following the example of Sarah who submissively followed her husband, (I Peter 3:1-6). This is not to say that a woman cannot express her ideas in decision-making, for God has granted sound judgment and wisdom to her as well as the man. Many men find the counsel of a godly wife a great asset. A sweetly submitted wife causes her husband to desire to serve her even more!

One reason for many home failures is a lack of confidence between husband and wife. A woman may feel insecure because her husband does not readily accept the leadership role in the family, and she finds herself being forced into taking his position. Husbands may likewise have a lack of confidence in their wives because some women cannot seem to keep from gossiping about family matters, and consequently belittle the

images of their husbands.

Mutual esteem and a correct appreciation of the place which God has assigned to each, are the primary conditions of happiness in marriage. If we esteem a person who occupies a high public office, how much more should we esteem that person set next to us in marriage? To be designated "husband" or "wife" by God is to enter upon a position of highest dignity and trust in His Kingdom.

The husband lives under the authority of Christ and is responsible to Him for the leadership of the family. The wife lives under the authority of her husband, and is responsible to him for the way she orders the households and cares for the children. The children live under the authority of both parents, obeying them as it pleases the Lord.

However, a family that has not been born into the Family of God can never attain the beautiful relationship that God has intended. In addition, neither can a Christian home lacking a family altar of prayer and Bible reading produce an atmosphere into which the presence of the Holy Spirit will feel invited.

## Tax Return Due July 31 For Quarter

July 31, 1979, is the date by which employers must report on Form 941 Social Security and withheld federal income taxes for the second quarter of 1979, and pay any taxes due, the Internal Revenue Service said. If the quarterly liability (reduced by any deposit during the quarter) is \$200 or more, the unpaid balance must be deposited.

This deadline does not apply to those employers who make timely deposits of the full amount of tax due in Federal Reserve or approved commercial banks. They are allowed until August 10 to file Form 941, "Employer's Quarterly Federal Tax Return."

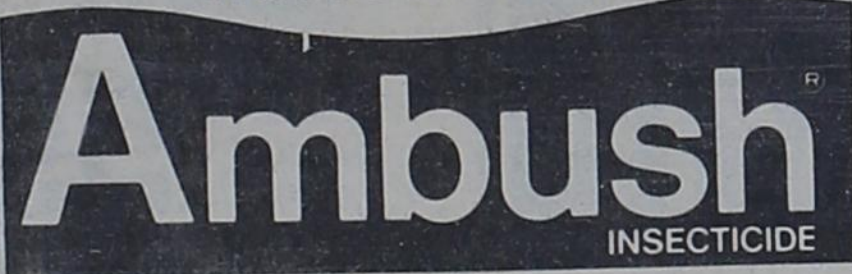
