

As of July 26, 1979 homestead exemptions had been claimed by 355 people in Munday school district. exemptions. In other words \$2,214,760 worth of property that has been taxed in the past can not be taxed this year. This is a loss in tax dollars of \$32,114.02, based on 1978 tax rate.

The Texas legislature has passed this bill as a tax relief amendment. However, in retrospect, the Munday Independent School District will have to have this amount replaced in tax dollars to operate the school as usual.

The State is going to reimburse 45% or less of the loss to the school districts. The exact percentage will be lecided by the legislature at a later date. The school districts will need to apply for reimbursement by November 1.

Hence, to make up the balance of the tax loss the local school board must increase the tax rate for the residents of the Munday school district in order to meet overall operating expenses and to overcome the exemption loss. Inflationary times such as these might well cause an increase in taxes, but the exemption allowed by the legislature has made it a necessary reality.

Texas Wheat Growers Elect New Directors

Three new directors have been elected to the Texas Wheat Producers Board. Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has announced.

Robert Graves of Perryton will represent the Northern Plains area; Leo Witkowski of Hereford, the Central Plains area, and Winston Wilson of Quanah. the Rolling Plains area. Wilson is also president of the National Association of Wheat Growers.

The board of directors oversees the research, promotion, marketing, and educational programs of the Texas Wheat Producers. Three directors are chosen every other year to comthe nine-member board.

The Texas Wheat Pro ducers is one of the eight commodity boards which are administered by the Texas Department of Agriculture. Under the Commodity Referendum Law, farmers can form a statewide association and assess fees on marketed produce to create funds for their programs. The Department certifies their elections and

assists them in their goals. Other members of the Board are Dwight Hamilton of Olney, Otis Harman of Tulia, Ken Kendricks of Stratford, W. R. Moore of Munday, and Troy Sloan of Spearman. C. L. Edwards of Panhandle is the current chairman. Bill Nelson serves as the executive director for the Board.



We may have to build friendships established on principles in God's Word.

One episode in the famous friendship of David and Jonathan crystallizes the essential nature of a godly became aware that Saul had come out to seek his life while David was in the wilderness of Ziph at Horesh." (I Sam. 23:15-18) In this last meeting. Jonathan lives out five essential features of a biblical friend-

The first characteristic is giving. A friend is one whose needs you can meet - not one who meets your needs. True friendship begins with the commitment to be a friend, not to have a friend.

Second, a friend encourages his friend in God. Jonathan went to David because he knew that David had been grossly mistreated and betrayed. He knew that David faced bitterness and discouragement, so he encouraged him.

Re-examine your friendships to discover whether you are encouraging your friends in God. Are you having a positive spiritual impact on their lives? It is amazing how often Christian friends never pray together or discuss God's Word.

A third mark of friendship is common interest. C. S. Lewis observed that "lovers are always talking to one another about their love; friends hardly ever talk about their friendship." The quality of a friendship is nearly always determined by the quality of that which we have in common. We share our lives with people who share a like vision. With some the link is sports, with others occupation, etc.

A fourth mark of friendship comes from Jonathan's words: "You will be King over Israel, and I will be next after you" (I Sam. 23:17). Jonathan renounced the throne because he knew David was God's choice to be King. A friend is someone committed to helping his friend realize God's purose and potential.

Finally, true friendship declares its commitment. "So the two of them made a covenant before the Lord." (I Sam. 23: 18) They were committed to one another.

Too often we drift in and out of relationships, but David and Jonathan teach us the value of commitment. Before we can be a friend

"Every year in late August, there are complaints that full size pecans are turning black and dropping off the trees," said Dr. Robert W. Berry, area plant pathologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "The nut is filled with a dark liquid having a very bad odor."

The problem is stem end blight, sometimes called sticky shuck. And now - the end of July - is the time to combat it, Berry said.

It is caused by a disease that attacks the pecan when the nut is starting to form a shell and the internal part is just a bag of liquid, the Extension plant pathologist explained. That should be about July 25 in the Rolling and High Plains, but because of recent cool temperatures will probably be four or five days later this year, Berry

The problem is treated by a fungicide program starting when the nut is reaching this susceptible "water embryo" stage, Berry said. The fungicide to use is benomyl, which is marketed under such trade names as "Benlate," "Greenlight Systematic Fungicide," and "Fertilome Systematic Fungicide," he said.

Three applications, one every seven days, is needed, the plant pathologist said. The first should be made about July 25-28, when the pecan is full of liquid; the second about August 1-3, and the final application should be made about August 8-10. Berry cautioned users carefully to follow the manufacturer's directions on the label of the brand of fungicide being

Seventy-Two Year Old Man Sentenced

A 72-year-old Arkansas man has been sentenced in Federal Court for defrauding the Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program, James Harper, Manager of the Vernon Social Security Office announced today.

Robert L. Vaughan, Jr., of Fayetteville, was sentenced by U. S. District Judge Paul X. Williams to five years probation and ordered him to repay \$6,382.00 he had received in SSI payments to which he was not entitled.

Vaughan was charged with making false statements about his financial resources in his claim for SSI payments.

SSI is a program which provides case assistance to the needy who are over 65, blind or disabled.

"It is our duty to help needy aged, blind and disabled people," Harper said, "But we are determined that money intended for the needy will not go to people not in need. We will continue to seek out and prosecute those who falsify the record to qualify for assistance intended for the poor."

The Vaughan case was developed by a unit of fulltime investigators who are assigned the job of investigating SSI and Social Security fraud in the Five-State Dallas Region. There are 26 fraud cases in various stages of prosecu-

Nutrients Are Recycled By Cut Grass

Mulching lawnmowers that cut up grass clippings and deposit them back on the lawn are an excellent way to recycle plant nutrients, says lawn care expert Dr. J. B. Beard, a professor in Texas A&M University's Department of

Soil and Crop Sciences. Although the mulching mowers eliminate the raking and bagging of cut grass, there is some concern that returned clippings will form thatch, a layer of dense brown organice debris that can cause great problems for homeowners.

Beard contends there is no truth to the theory that grass clippings contribute to thatch build-up.

"On the contrary", he says, "the disposal of clippings is wasteful. There are nutrients in grass that are beneficial to a lawn and if they are not returned in some manner, fertilizer Mrs. Abigail Reynolds must be added instead." ****






