The Sunset Homecoming became a reality Sunday morning, October 7, at 9:00 a.m. with guests registering in the Munday Community Center.

Before this registration could take place, a tremendous amount of preparation for the homecoming was made by approximately fifteen workers. Officers for the homecoming were Pete Beecher, president; Arnold Land, vice-president; and Winters Matthews, secretary. All of the workers would admit that it took a lot of time to make the necessary preparations but they would quickly add, "It was all worth it!"

One hundred ex-students registered and there were 180 in attendance. Everyone brought food, spread it together for an old fashioned "dinner on the ground" type meal in the Community Center.

There was "food plenty" for everyone and food left. In fact some was shared with the residents of Leisure Lodge which pleased everyone.

A majority of guests came, registered and stayed the day. Some registered and then went to local church services and returned for lunch and to begin their visiting.

Roddy Griffith, a member of the class that graduated in 1942, was the one present who had traveled the farthest. Mr. Griffith lives in Burbank, Calif. ## Work Continues For Approved Water

Work of making new installations and improvements in Munday's water system, with the view of getting a state approved system, is continuing as rapidly as possible, according to Walter Hertel, city administrator.

On Tuesday night, September 25, the first of several approved valves was installed. This work necessitated cutting off some 600-odd water customers for a period of better than six hours. The cutoff was at 11 p.m., after preliminary plans had been made, and water

was turned back on at 5:30 a.m. Wednesday. This time was selected so minor inconvenience would be experienced by Munday citizens during cutoff time.

The second valve, as well as a new fire hydrant, was installed on Tuesday, October 2. Water customers in the eastern part of Munday were without water for some four and one-half hours for this installation.

As each valve is installed, fewer customers will be inconvenienced when additional installations are made, Hertel said.

When all work is completed, the city can control the flow of water in the entire system and be able to do repairs on line breaks without cutting off water service to large portions of the city. Then Munday will possibly receive state approval of its water system.

**Goree Man, Avid Motorcycle Fan Since 1933, Riding At Age 65**

Mopeds and motorcycles have caught people's interest in the past few years for various reasons. Fads come and fads go, but it was no fad for Vernon Routon of Goree, when in 1933, at the age of 19, he purchased his first motorcycle - a Harley Davidson twin 45 - his dream come true!

This was 46 years ago and Mr. Routon's love for motorcycles has never wavered.

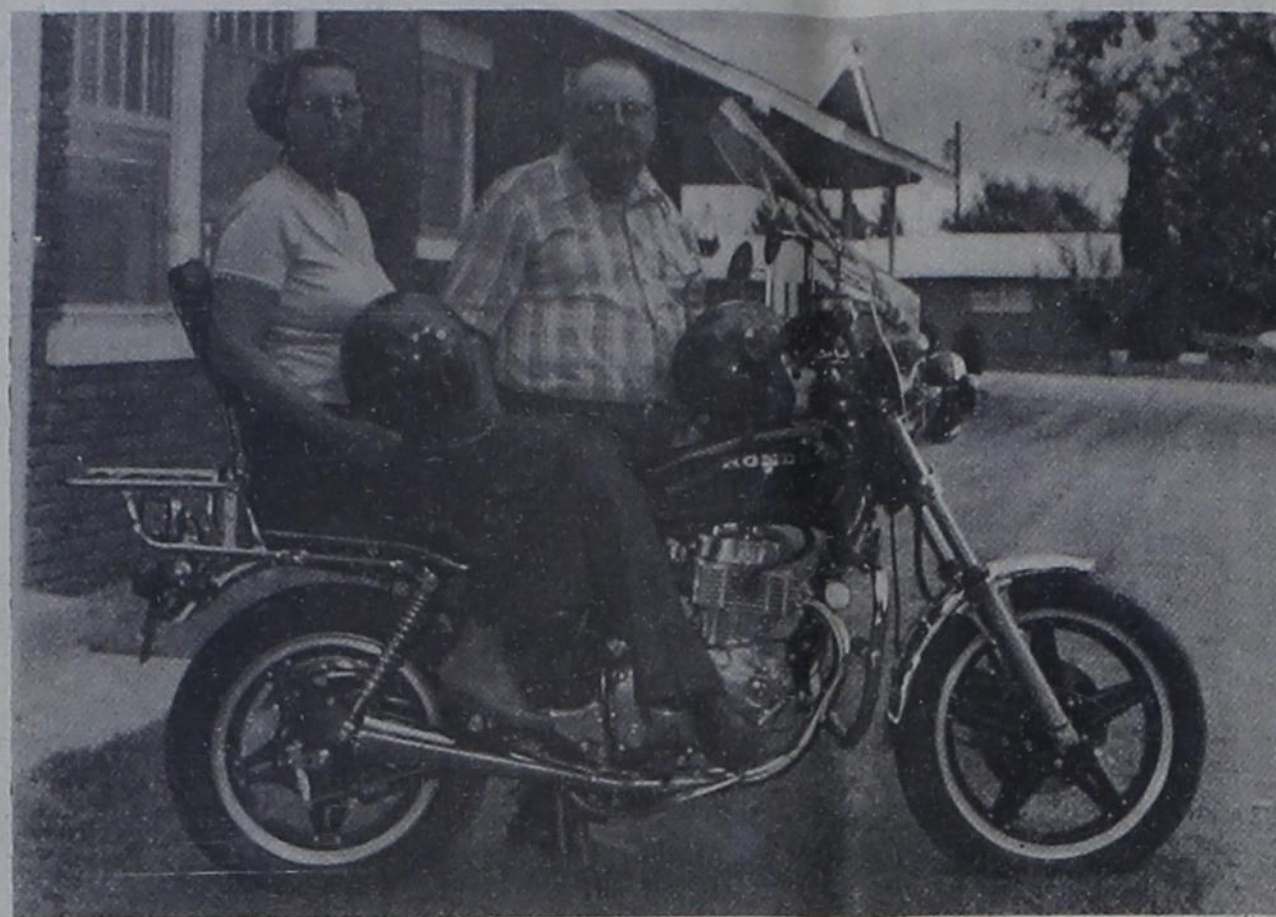
With his first cycle he "just rode and rode and rode" he says, "country riding and to area towns of Benjamin, Knox City, Seymour and Haskell." In other words he caught the fever at a tender age and it never left him.

A riding buddy of Mr. Routon's was Pascal Peysen. Also Wilkie Guinn would sometimes ride behind Peysen. Even though they ordinarily rode on streets and country roads for enjoyment, trying tricks was a trait they acquired too. On occasion they have been known to go around a certain curve in Munday by a certain ice house while standing on their cycle seats and holding hands. Mr. Routon does admit to antics such as this but quickly adds, "We didn't make a habit of it."

But it does cause one to ponder the fact they were able to think on their own; and, today we could blame it on television.

Not only does Mr. Routon love cycles, but he reads anything about motorcycles he can find and always has. He has subscribed to a motorcycle magazine for years.

"In 1936, Mr. Nick Peysen, Pascal's father, 'souped up' my cycle for a race I had entered at the Haskell Fair.

Though my dad never forbade me to ride - it rained that day and the race was cancelled. My father always said that rain saved his son's life", reminisced Mr. Routon. Strangely enough after that day, even though he continued to ride, he never entered another race.

He relates stories, too, about his girl friends riding behind him on their dates. Gas was cheap and they could cover a lot of territory. The old line about running out of gas was never used but he did break a chain one night - or did he? He declares he did!

In all his years of riding, he has never had an accident with his cycle. He does, however, tell of a bicycle "getting out from under him" once and "skinning him up somewhat".

There were some years in the midst of making a living that Mr. Routon did not own a motorcycle - the love was there but the tractor was always calling. Mrs. Routon explains, "Even when he didn't own one, he asked to ride anyone's cycle that was available; it is in his blood."

Then one day he did it again - purchased him a cycle. He encouraged his son Jimmy to ride and bought Jimmy three different motorcycles while he was growing up.

Jimmy now lives in Lubbock and has two cycles of his own. He rides both in enduro (obstacle) courses and street riding.

Randy Routon, a grandson of Munday, has a motorcycle. "Randy and I ride together", states Mr. Rou-

ton with a pleased look. Ricky Coody, another grandson, whose parents are Ronald and Jeanette Coody of Farmers Branch, also owns a cycle, riding it to school and for pleasure.

Mrs. Routon has ridden at different times behind her son and both grandsons, and rides behind her husband often. She doesn't ride alone but enjoys going to area towns with her husband, as well as traveling country roads and riding to their farm.

At age 65, Mr. Routon has been retired from farming four years but he has no intention of retiring from his motorcycle.

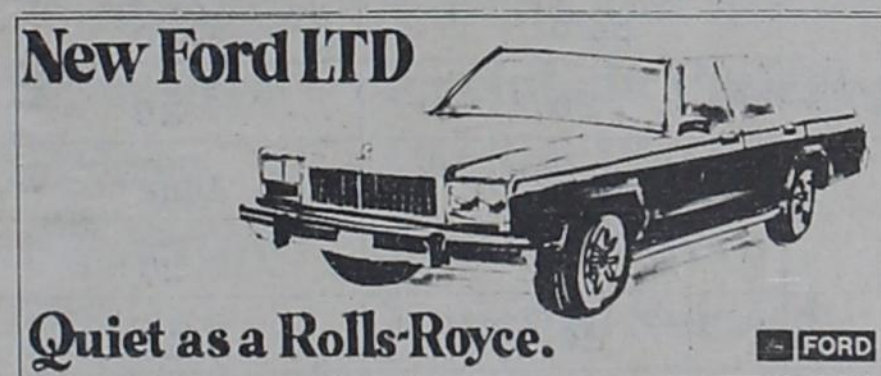

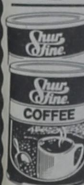

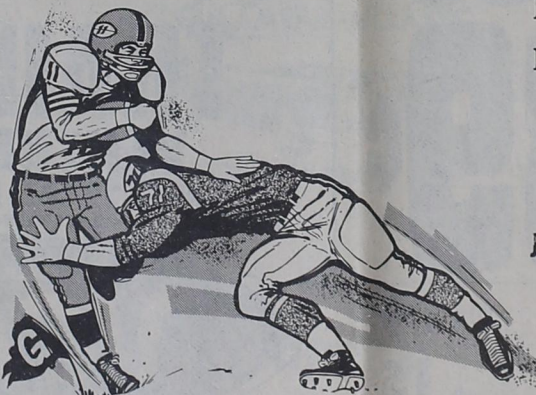

## The 'Book' Report

Bright orange pumpkins are a welcome symbol of harvest, Halloween and fun.

The pumpkin has probably been included in more fairy tales and legends than any other vegetable. In "The Legend of Sleepy Hollow," a ghost lifts his pumpkin head from the pommel of his saddle and hurls it at the fleeing Ichabod Crane. In India the stories are told of a pumpkin filled with water in which swam a large fish. Intent on taking the fish, four brothers lifted the pumpkin to carry it away

but became frightened and dropped it. The flood of water that poured out from cracks in the shell covered the world. What more romantic story than that of Cinderella and the golden coach? Who could forget Peter-the-pumpkin-eater who found a pumpkin large enough to contain his wandering wife?

The custom of making jack-o-lanterns began in Scotland. If not for a quirk of history, today's jack-o-lanterns might have been made from turnips instead of

pumpkins.

Scottish children carved their jack-o-lanterns out of large turnips and put candles inside them. When families moved from the old world to America, they brought their Halloween customs with them, but not their turnips. They found pumpkins a good substitute.

In this country, pumpkins were grown more easily and were readily available for Halloween time. Also they didn't have to be hollowed out and were easier to work with than turnips.

Pumpkins can be used like other winter squashes - in pies, custards, breads and puddings. As a vegetable it can be baked and glazed with brown sugar and butter; or boiled, drained,

and mashed and served with butter. A hint of cinnamon or nutmeg is a nice addition to cooked pumpkin.

Whether you use them for eating or making scary jack-o-lanterns, you'll do well to follow these buying tips:

\*Like other winter squash, pumpkins should be mature and have a rich, orange color.

\*They should not be broken or cracked, and should be free from soft spots and excessive scarring.

\*They should be clean.

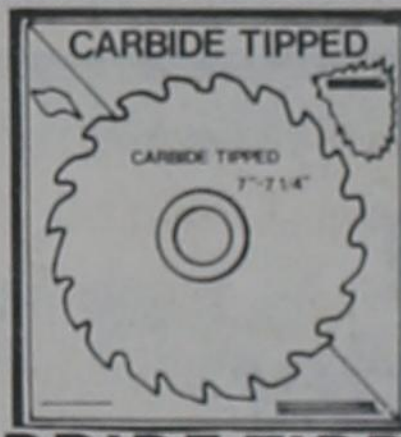

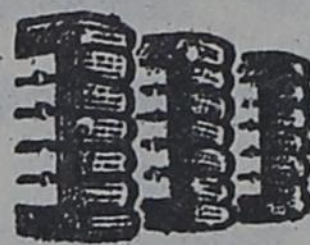
### REPORT ON COTTON PROGRESS

While in The Courier Pat shared some interesting facts with us which we will pass on: Slick Myers harvested 55 bales off approximately 65 acres which is harvesting over 3/4 bales to the acre, and received a 25.55% turnout. The bales are averaging about 515 pounds each and seed averaging about 750 pounds per bale. They are figuring about 2000 lbs. burr cotton per bale.

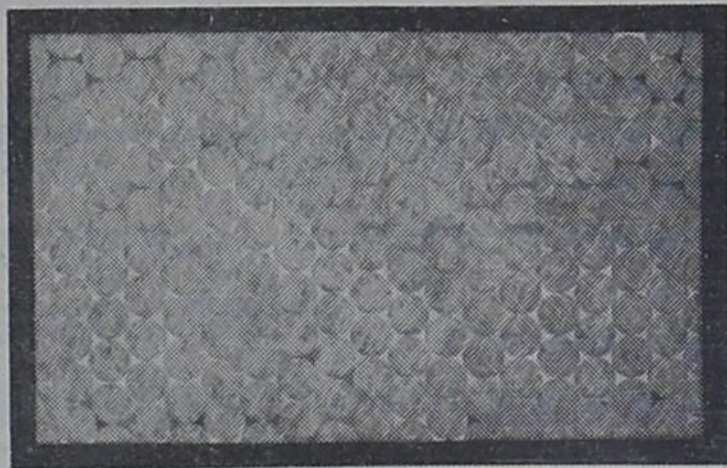

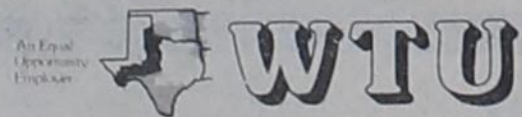


