Work of making new installations and improvements in Munday's water system, with the view of getting a state approved system, is continuing as rapidly as possible, according to Walter Hertel, city

On Tuesday night, September 25, the first of several approved valves was installed. This work necessitated cutting off some 600-odd water customers for a period of better than six hours. The cutoff was at 11 p.m., after preliminary plans had been made, and water

Moguls Play Hosts To

was turned back on at 5:30 a.m. Wednesday. This time was selected so minor inconvenience would be experienced by Munday citizens during cutoff time. The second valve, as well

as a new fire hydrant, was installed on Tuesday, October 2. Water customers in the eastern part of Munday were without water for some four and one-half hours for this installation.

As each valve is installed, fewer customers will be inconvenienced when additional installations are made, Hertel said.

When all work is completed, the city can control the flow of water in the entire system and be able to do repairs on line breaks without cutting off water service to large portions of the city. Then Munday will receive state possibly approval of its water

Goree Man, Avid Motorcycle Fan Since 1933, Riding At Age 65

Mopeds and motorcycles have caught people's interest in the past few years for various reasons. Fads come and fads go, but it was no fad for Vernon Routon of Goree, when in 1933, at the age of 19, he purchased his first motorcycle - a Harley Davidson twin 45 - his dream come true!

This was 46 years ago and Mr. Routon's love for motorcycles has never wavered.


With his first cycle he "just rode and rode and rode" he says, "country riding and to area towns of Benjamin, Knox City, Seymour and Haskell." In other words he caught the fever at a tender age and it never left

A riding buddy of Mr. Routon's was Pascal Peysen. Also Wilkie Guinn would sometimes ride behind Peysen. Even though they ordinarily rode on streets and country roads for enjoyment, trying tricks was a trait they acquired too. On occasion they have been known to go around a certain curve in Munday by a certain ice house while standing on their cycle seats and holding hands. Mr. Routon does admit to antics such as this but quickly adds, "We didn't make a habit of it".

But it does cause one to ponder the fact they were able to think on their own; and, today we could blame it on television.

Not only does Mr. Routon love cycles, but he reads anything about motorcycles he can find and always has. He has subscribed to a motorcycle magazine for

"In 1936, Mr. Nick Peysen, Pascal's father, 'souped up' my cycle for a race I had entered at the Haskell Fair.

Though my dad never forbade me to ride - it rained that day and the race was cancelled. My father always said that rain saved his son's life", reminisced Mr. Routon. Strangely enough after that day, even though he continued to ride, he never entered another race.

He relates stories, too, about his girl friends riding behind him on their dates. Gas was cheap and they could cover a lot of territory. The old line about running out of gas was never used but he did break a chain one night - or did he? He declares he did!

In all his years of riding, he has never had an accident with his cycle. He does, however, tell of a bicycle "getting out from under him" once and "skinning him up somewhat".

There were some years in the midst of making a living that Mr. Routon did not own a motorcycle - the love was there but the tractor was always calling. Mrs. Routon explains, "Even when he didn't own one, he asked to ride anyone's cycle that was available; it is in his blood."

Then one day he did it again - purchased him a cycle. He encouraged his son Jimmy to ride and bought Jimmy three different motorcycles while he was growing up.

Jimmy now lives in Lubbock and has two cycles of his own. He rides both in enduro (obstacle) courses and street riding.

Randy Routon, a grandson of Munday, has a motorcycle. "Randy and I ride together", states Mr. Routon with a pleased look.

Ricky Coody, another grandson, whose parents are Ronald and Jeanette Coody of Farmers Branch, also owns a cycle, riding it to school and for pleasure.

Mrs. Routon has ridden at different times behind her son and both grandsons, and rides behind her husband often. She doesn't ride alone but enjoys going to area towns with her husband, as well as traveling country roads and riding to their

At age 65, Mr. Routon has been retired from farming four years but he has no intention of retiring from his

motorcycle. This is rather obvious,

and mashed and served with butter. A hint of cinnamon or nutmeg is a nice addition. to cooked pumpkin.
