The board of directors, administrator and entire staff of the Knox County Hospital extended wishes for a happy and prosperous new year, as the hospital began its forty-fifth year of service.

The Knox County Junior Livestock Show, "The largest show in history", was held January 8 and 9 in Knox City. Joe Glynn Nelson showed the grand champion boar. This was followed by the annual awards banquet on January 14. Cynthia Partridge was crowned 1971 livestock sweetheart.

Mrs. Penny Winchester's home economics style show was held on January 21.

Wallace Moorhouse Insurance Agency completed 55 years of service in Knox County.

There was a "skip" in newspaper files from July 29, 1971, which was the last of the Munday Times on file.

On October 21, the Munday Courier became Munday's official paper - a successor to The Munday Times, which did not publish on October 14, when official voluntary bankruptcy proceedings were initiated.

New County Agent To Assume Duties Jan. 15

Jim Mazurkiewicz will officially assume his duties as the new Knox County Extension Agent, January 15, 1980.

Mr. Mazurkiewicz was reared in Waller County and graduated from Waller High School. He is also a Texas A&M graduate with a BS degree in Animal Science. He was on the meats and livestock judging while a student at A&M.

After receiving his degree, he worked one year in Chicago as a USDA meat grader. He has served the last twenty months as assistant County extension agent at Seguin in Guadalupe County. While in Seguin, Mr. Mazurkiewicz developed outstanding pro-

grams in livestock and poultry as well as other programs in areas of the 4-H program. He was also 4-H coordinator of Guadalupe County.

He is married to a native of Houston. His wife's name is Kathy and the couple have no children. They have purchased the Tommy Antilley residence in Benjamin and will be making their home there in the near future.

Cotton Report

Local cotton prices were up from a week ago, according to Garland Dye, Office in Charge of the Munday Classing Office.

Demand was good for most qualities of cotton with mike readings in the 3.5 to 4.9 range. Grade 31, Staple 32 brought 63.10 to 64.10 cents per pound. Grade 32, Staple 33 brought 65.55 to 66.55 cents per pound. Demand was light for cotton miking below 3.5. Prices for these qualities ranged from 6 to 13 cents above corresponding loan values. Farmers received around 105 dollars per ton for cottonseed.

Farmers in the Munday territory have virtually completed cotton harvesting operations. There is, however, a sizeable volume of seed cotton presently stored in modules awaiting ginning.

The Munday Classing Office classed 16,233 samples during the week ending Friday, December 21st. This brought the total for the season to 123,421.

Grades were mostly unchanged from a week earlier but staple length was longer. Grade 32 made up 31 percent of the total followed by Grade 31 with 26 percent. Grade 41 was 17 percent and Grade 42 was 18 percent. Staple lengths were mostly 32 and 33. Staple 32 comprised 42 percent of the total and Staple 33 made up 34 percent. Staple 34 accounted for 10 percent. Micronaire readings continued to hold up fairly well. Sixty-nine percent miked in the 3.5 to 4.9 range. This compared to 68 percent a week ago. Fifteen percent miked 3.3 to 3.4 and 13 percent miked 3.0 to 3.2.

Local Men To Attend Conference

Dr. Bill Kingston and David Bordovsky, associated with Texas A&M Research Station in Munday, will be attending the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Annual Conference, January 9-11, at Texas A&M University.

Concerns that mark the start of the new decade, including tight energy supplies, inflation, budgets and inconsistent crop surpluses, will be addressed during the three day conference for scientists based at A&M, at the various A&M research and extension centers, and at TAES research stations around the state.

Almost 500 scientists of the Experiment Station - the state's agricultural research agency - will attend.

The year of 1979 and the decade of the 70's has become history and we have embarked upon a new year - 1980. During the last few days many have taken a look at the year just completed. Some have looked with a desire to regain lost experiences, others have taken the look and will use it as a guide into the future.

We have hopes for the new year: hopes for peace, hopes for a release of hostages, hopes for financial security, hopes for a great outpouring of God's Spirit. Amidst the hopes, however, are a number of fears. These will vary from one person to another, but many persons fear the mundane - the everyday routines of life and allow fears to interfere with their ability to function and serve God and others.

In the midst of the hopes and fears we have today, God has a word for us. Speaking to John on the Isle of Patmos he said, "Behold, I make all things new." (Rev. 21:5) This, I believe, is our Lord's word for all who find life dull, wearisome, and meaningless.

We have been wishing our neighbors and friends a Happy New Year. What would it take to make this year a happy one? I am sure a variety of answers will come in response to such a question and most of them would be related to external circumstances: a better job

—with more money, a nicer home, more friends, more congenial neighbors, and the list could go on and on. I have a feeling that if a particular person received all the "things" they thought would make them happy this year, it would still not be enough.

Happiness is found, not in external circumstances, but in ourselves. All too often we allow external circumstances to control and dictate how we feel. Many will experience pain, heartache, sorrow, or difficulty during this year, but those who continue to receive the Lord Jesus Christ into their hearts and walk with him in life will sense a newness regardless of the trials that come their way. Newness in life is experienced as we are "in Christ" and allow him to lead us into the future. The Apostle Paul wrote to the Corinthians, "If anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; the old has passed away, behold, the new has come." (2 Corinthians 5:17).

Savings Bonds Series EE, Now On Sale

The Treasury Department announced that the new Series EE savings bonds on sale effective January 1, 1980, are called United States Energy Savings Bonds, Series EE, and will receive a 1/2 percent bonus if held to maturity.

The interest rate on U. S. Energy Savings Bonds, Series EE, will be increased from 6.5 percent to 7 percent for bonds held for the full 11 years to maturity. Series E bonds that have not finally matured and U. S. Savings Notes ("Freedom Shares") will also receive the 1/2 percent bonus if they are held for 11 years from the date of the first semiannual interest period that begins

on or after January 1, 1980. Bonds and notes redeemed earlier will not receive the bonus.

The redesignation of the bonds as Energy Savings Bonds is intended to help focus attention on the national goals of reducing energy consumption and increasing domestic supplies. The bonds were known as Defense Bonds before and after World War II and as War Bonds from 1941 to 1945 reflecting the national concerns of those times. The Energy Savings Bonds will assist in financing the large Federal energy expenditure required in the coming years.

After June 30, 1980, all U. S. Savings Bonds bought

through payroll savings plans will be Energy Savings Bonds, Series EE. Series H and HH Savings Bonds will not be affected by these changes.

WTU's Paint Creek Station Targeted For Solar Study

The possibility of using solar energy to generate electricity at one or more of West Texas Utilities Company's power plants will be examined in a study being conducted by the Company's Plant Operation Department in cooperation with the Energy Systems Group of Rockwell International.

The study will take nine months and will be completed in June or July, 1980.

Targeted for the study is Unit Number Four at WTU's Paint Creek Power Station, which is located on Lake Stamford, between Haskell and Stamford. The unit was completed in 1971 and is the largest and newest of Paint Creek's four generating units. All are presently powered by natural gas, with oil used as a back-up fuel.

If results of the study are favorable, a proposal will be submitted to the Department of Energy for a grant to aid in constructing the equipment needed to re-power the unit with solar energy. WTU officials, however, emphasized that the program in its current stage is strictly a research project.

"At best, the project is several steps away from becoming a reality", said Randal Meador, WTU Vice President and Director of Engineering.

Meador said six similar studies are being made with United States Department of Energy funding and support, and that only two projects will be granted funds to aid in construction. The cost of constructing the two projects will be shared by DOE and the winning utilities.

By funding these demonstration plants, the DOE hopes to lower the cost of the solar equipment by mass production to make solar electric generation economically feasible in the near future. The selection of the projects to be granted construction funds will be based on the percentage of the cost to be shared by the utility and the engineering quality of the repowering system.

Paint Creek Unit Number Four has a generating capacity rated at 110,000 kilowatts. For purposes of

the study, the unit would be converted to allow 60,000 kilowatts to be generated at full load on solar power, with the remaining 50,000 kilowatts generated with natural gas or fuel oils. This would allow about 55 percent of the electrical output of the unit to be generated on solar power during the day.

The solar system developed by the Energy Systems Group of Rockwell International consists of a solar collection system, a solar receiver, and a heat exchanger system. The solar collection system consists of more than 9,000 mirrors, or heliostats, which would be installed in an area of 385 acres surrounding a 410-foot solar receiver tower.

The heliostats would be computer controlled to track the sun and reflect the ray of the sun onto the solar receiver located at the top of the 410-foot tower. The reflected sunlight would heat liquid sodium within the solar receiver vessel to a temperature of 1100 degrees Fahrenheit. The hot sodium would be pumped from the solar receiver vessel to the plant, where the sodium would be used in heat exchangers to heat water into steam. The steam would power the existing turbine generators.

After the sodium goes through the heat exchangers, it would be pumped back to the solar receiver to be reheated and used again.

Sodium was chosen for a heat-transfer agent because it has great heat transfer capabilities and because it is readily available. The use of sodium as a heat exchanger fluid will make it possible to store surplus heat throughout the day and to allow the turbine generator to operate at full load during the daylight hours and for up to three hours after sundown.

Another plus for the sodium cycle is that all of the heat exchangers and pumps that would be used in the sodium cycle heat exchange system have already been built and tested. The test work was conducted by Rockwell International in conjunction with the nuclear Clinch River Breeder Reactor Plant Project in Ohio.

The Paint Creek study will be WTU's first in-depth look at solar power generation, although the Company has been involved in other areas of research. For many years WTU has contributed to nuclear fusion research by the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation at the University of Texas. With other members of the Central and South West Corporation, its parent company, WTU is involved in a coal gasification project in South Texas, and in geothermal research in West Texas.

All eight of WTU's existing major generating units use natural gas as a primary fuel with oil as a backup fuel. WTU is beginning to diversify its fuel resources as preliminary environmental and engineering work is now being done for Oklahoma Power Station, a proposed coal-fired plant near Vernon, which is scheduled for commercial production in 1987.

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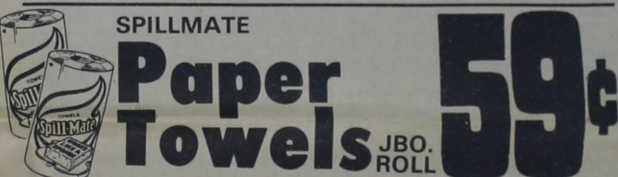
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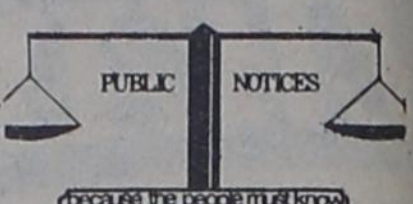
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Rosa Beasley Funeral Held In Knox City

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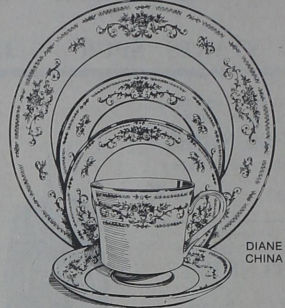
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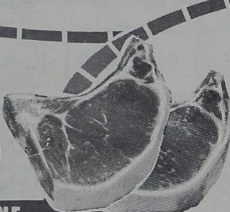
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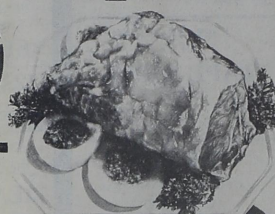
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
