farmers were in the midst of three very important stages of activity that meant a lot to, not only them, but to everyone.

Cotton was being, or had been, planted. People in this activity had been cooperating with the uniform planting date of June 20 as an effective means of combatting the worst evil of the cotton industry, the boll weevil.

The best they could hope for was that the weather would also co-operate and allow plenty of time for their cotton to grow, put on fruit and finally mature before the icy breath of Old Man Winter put a stop to such activities.

There was wheat in the fields, and ripe unto harvest. The grain would be safer in the elevators or storage bins than in the field, and efforts were being made to bring this about.

The many acres of potatoes were reaching the harvest stage--ready to be dug from the ground, processed and sold to the buyers and eventually be turned into "food for the masses".

Even at best, farmers found themselves involved in three activities at one time, each of which was designed to put a bulge into their pocketbooks or bank accounts, or to take care of that loan.

But the weather didn't co-operate to the fullest extent, or not at all in many instances.

Most of the remainder of June was fraught with disaster for the farmer--the person whose primary job is to feed the nation and the world.

They found the hail and wind and rain had flattened much of their acreage, making freshly-planted rows as flat as the level floor. Cotton had gone byebye, much wheat had been destroyed (though some had completed harvest just ahead of disaster), and spuds were either damaged or endangered.

When TV commentators gave a 20% possibility of rain each night, we could be pretty well assured that the Munday area would receive upwards from an inch by sunrise next morning!

Finally the faucet was turned off, and we were reminded of what one person said while in conversation with us: "I guess when it does quit, it won't rain another drop!"

Buoyed with the hope and the possibility of further credit, farmerfriends set about to make the best of the situation, battling against time with cotton. Some took another route and diverted cotton acreage to other crops; and now they are in the process of needing and wanting and praying for rain on these crops, something that didn't seem probable while the wet spell was upon us.

Applications Being Taken For Insurance On Wheat

Wheat growers interested in all-risk insurance for their 1983 crops should contact their insurance agent as soon as possible, according to F. W. "Ted" Crouch Jr., All-Risk Insurance Field Operations Director. Although the deadline to obtain wheat insurance isn't until September 15, Crouch suggests three reasons why growers should begin making their plans now. First, early consideration will provide additional time to develop a program of insurance coverage that best meets the

individual policy-holder's needs.

Secondly, it can be useful to farmers to have their insurance arranged before they visit with their lenders about production loans. Insurance helps to minimize the uncertainty involved in the yearahead cash flow projections that many lenders today require.

Third, an early application allows additional time for growers to verify yield records that may enable them to qualify for increased insurance protection.

Crouch points out that the expanded and revised wheat insurance program now in effect provides a variety of ways for producers to tailor their coverage to their needs for insurance protection and to their budgets. For example, policies offer a choice of production guarantees as well as a choice of indemnity payments for each bushel of loss.

The ASCS county office has a list of local private agents who are handling the federally-backed insurance policies.

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
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
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Wedding Vows Exchanged By Lezlie Gass, Thomas Parrish

Advice Knox County Extension Agent Drying Fruits And Vegetables At Home Got an over-abundance of apricots, peppers, onions or any other fruit or vegetables? Has the thought, "What am I going to do with all of this," ever crossed your

mind? Try drying your fruits and vegetables! Drying is one of the oldest methods of food preservation known to mankind. It also is one of the simplest methods. It requires only basic equipment. Any special equipment that is needed usually can be made at home at little to moderate cost.

Successful drying depends upon the removal of enough moisture from the food to prevent spoilage. This must be done as fast as possible at a temperature that does not seriously affect the flavor, texture and color of the food. If the temperature is too low at the beginning, the food may undergo undesirable microbiological changes before it dries adequately. If the temperature is much too. high and the humidity too low, the water-filled cells of the food may expand and burst, or the food may harden on the surface. This makes it more difficult for the moisture to escape and the food to dry properly.

* The flavor of dried fruits and vegetables will be different from their fresh, canned or frozen counterparts.



Conservation Tillage Helps To Fight Erosion Of Soils

Conservation tillage practices can help Texas farmers fight both soil erosion and the cost-price squeeze. burn said.

A survey conducted by the U. S. Department of Agriculture Soil Conservation Service and released this year indicates that soil erosion rates exceed five tons per acre per year on more than five million acres of Texas "Farmers are vitally con-

cerned about the problem with erosion because their future and ours depend on the productivity of the soil," said Dr. Ed Colburn, agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

"Many of our farmers are simply trying to survive in the short run and feel they cannot afford using many good conservation practices," he said.

However, they can use conservation tillage practices as a low-cost method to attack soil erosion. Of course, these practices do not come without some demands and

The agronomist said there are many degrees of tillage involved in the concept of conservation tillage, reduced tillage and minimum tillage. These all refer to the reduction of trips across fields from those normally used in conventional tillage.

"It may be simply a reduction from 10 tillage trips over the field to six in a season, no seedbed preparation or stale seedbed preparation, or onceover planting with a no-till planter," Colburn said. "No-till systems where no seedbed preparation is done or no cultivation is practiced is the most extreme form of conservation tillage," he

noted. "This system requires a no-till planter and total substitution of chemicals to control weeds and prevent yield losses." Reduced tillage or no-till

farming may save equipment, time, labor, fuel and money, but the difficulty farmers have with conser-

Oftentimes birds find your ripe tomatoes about a day before you do. And they eat holes in every tomato they can find about the time it turns red. These holes or damaged spots often become infested by various types of insects and rot-type diseases. The result is obvious - fewer tomatoes for the dinner July 21. table.
