## Chad Williams Announces For District Attorney

"I, Chad Williams, would like to announce that I am a candidate for the office of District Attorney for the 50th Judicial District, which includes the counties of Baylor, Cottle, King and Knox.

"I am a lifelong resident of Texas, born and raised in Graham, Texas. I attended Angelo State University and Southwest Texas State University, where I graduated in 1980. I attended St. Mary's University Law School, where I received my law degree in 1982. I was licensed by the State Bar of Texas on May 23, 1983.

"Though I previously held the job as District Attorney and resigned from it, I am entering the race because, as a resident of this District for over seven (7) years, there needs to be a choice for District Attorney between a candidate who is a full fledged resident and taxpayer in this District as opposed to someone who has placed a residency here for less than one (1) year for political purposes.

"We need a District Attorney who knows where the problems are and who is accessible to the law enforcement officers and who

is accessible to the public.

"As a current resident of Baylor County and a former resident of Knox County, and in my service as District Attorney for Cottle and King Counties, I know where the problems are, and I am currently accessible to the law enforcement officers, and most important, I am accessible to the public.

"I am proud of my record as District Attorney, particularly, the fact that I did not plea bargain drug cases. I truly feel I made a difference as a prosecuting attorney.

"I am a member of the State Bar of Texas, American Bar Association, State Bar College, and Texas Trial Lawyers Association, and I am licensed to practice law in the State of Texas and the United States District Court of the Northern District of Texas. I came to Seymour, Baylor County, Texas, in July, 1984, where I have been in private practice. Prior to that, I was employed as an attorney by the Texas General Land Office in Asutin, Texas.

"I ask for your support and vote on March 10, 1992, for the office of District Attorney for the 50th Judicial District."

## Cotton Harvest Competes With Rainy Weather

As usual, area cotton farmers are competing with heavy rains to complete their harvest. It seems that every year about "stripping time", the skies open up over Knox and Haskell counties to drench the fields and slow down the harvest.

Local gins continue to operate in an effort to complete the '91 season before the cotton suffers even more water damage.

According to authorities at the Rhineland Co-Op Gin, they have ginned 8,000 bales thus far and are about two-thirds finished.

Knox Prairie Co-Op, who also

stated that they are about two-thirds through the crop, have processed about 5,300 bales.

Goree Producers Co-Op has ginned a little over 4,000 bales to date, with 600-800 bales still in the fields.

Pat Hutchinson of Munday Gin and Seed reports that they have ginned approximately 3,000 bales and are about three-fourths finished.

Now would be a good time for that famous Texas wind to blow and the sun to smile on local fields, so the 1991 cotton harvest can be completed.

The chairman of this year's show is Lloyd Don Welch of the Brazos Valley Young Farmers, sponsors of the event.

Superintendents of the individual divisions are David Bordovsky and Donald Lucas, rabbits and poultry; Jon Godsey, John Lee Nelson and Rickie Herring, swine; George Oustad, sheep; and Fred Carver and Wendell Partridge, cattle.

Judges for this year's event include David Finley, rabbits; Ed

Blankenship, poultry and sheep; John Chumbley, swine, and Richard Spencer, beef.

The show is under the direction of the Knox County Junior Livestock Board. Serving on this board are David Bordovsky, chairman; John Lee Nelson, vice-chairman; George Oustad, secretary; Diane Herring, treasurer, all of Munday, and board members, Lloyd Don Welch and Maynard Moore of Munday; Jack Whitten and Max Rainwater, Benjamin; and J.M. Emerson and David Albus, Knox City.

The show will begin at 9:00 o'clock Friday morning and continue through the premium sale, which begins at 2:00 p.m. Saturday. The public is invited to come and view the animals and support the youth of Knox County.

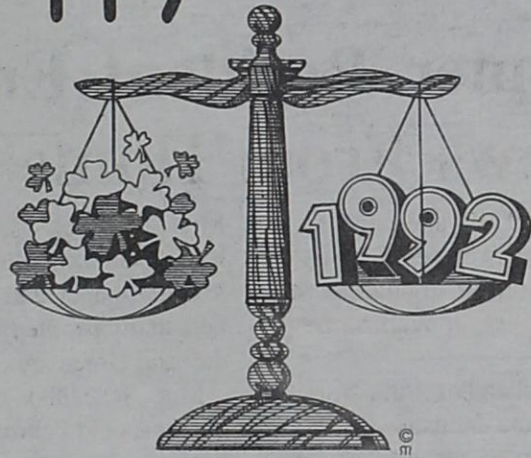

**VA Cuts Homebuyer Interest Rate To Lowest In 14 Years**

The Veterans Administration has slashed interest rates on VA loans to 8%, the lowest in 14 years, in an attempt to give veterans a better chance to buy homes.

"This puts VA-guaranteed interest rates at a full two points below where they were in 1990 and clears the way for even more U.S. military veterans to buy and

own their first homes," said U.S. Senator Phil Gramm.

The senator also expressed hope that the interest rate cut would stimulate the economy.

"Veterans who already own homes under VA loans should consider refinancing at this new, low rate," Gramm said.

He noted that the rate cut means the typical mortgage payment under a VA loan will drop by \$121 a month.

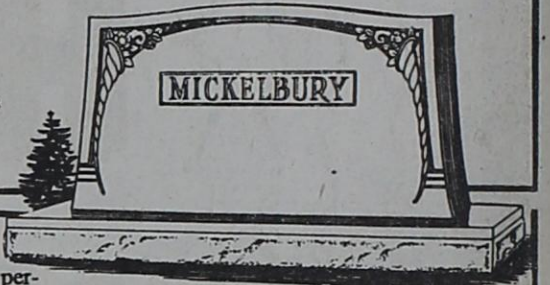

## Social Security Payments To Increase For 1992

A 3.7% cost-of-living adjustment will affect the amount of Social Security and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) payments received in January.

This change raises the maximum Social Security retirement benefit to \$1,088 a month and the Federal SSI payment to \$422 a month for an individual and \$633 a month for a couple.

The tax rate for Social Security remains unchanged at 7.65% each for employees and employers.

amount of money a beneficiary can earn and still receive full Social Security benefits. The limits for 1992 increase from \$7,080 to \$7,440 for beneficiaries under 65; from \$9,720 to \$10,200 for people 65 to 69. The earnings limits do not apply to people 70 and older.

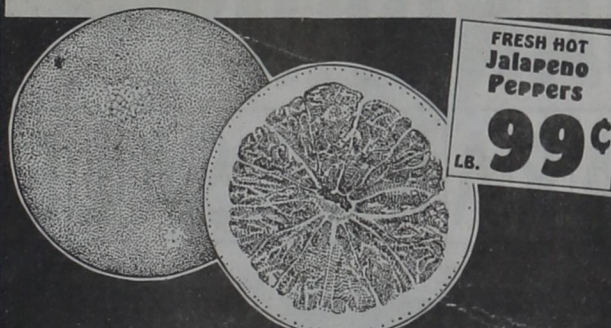
