Moguls Set Eyes On State Track Title

It came as no big surprise to anyone when the highly favored Munday Moguls breezed to a 91 point team victory in the Region II-A track meet Saturday at McMurry College in Abilene. The Moguls will enter three individuals and two relay teams in the state meet this weekend in Austin.

The Mogulettes placed fourth in the girls' division with 36 points, and will send the 800 meter relay team to state.

Coach Jim Edwards said of his Moguls, "They performed like we knew they could. These guys know how to come through when it counts."

One person who really came through was Frankie Stinnett, who not only won the 800 meters with a time of 1:59.09, but also made up a lot of ground on the third leg of the 1600 meter relay. Munday was trailing when Stinnett took the baton with instructions to try to narrow the gap as much as he could to give the final runner, Todd Thompson, a chance to overtake the leaders. Stinnett turned in his best performance in the quarter with a 47.9 leg and Thompson had no trouble keeping the lead.

Going to the state meet for the Moguls will be the 400 meter relay team, Jim Earl Dockins, Jerry Shields, Dent Offutt and Todd Thompson; the 1600 meter relay team, Shields, Offutt, Stinnett and Thompson; Hollis Adams in the discuss, Thompson in the 400 meter and Stinnett in the 800. Anthony Stinnett and Tim Collier will accompany the team as alternates.

The Mogulettes' relay team is made up of Ann Kuehler, Janet Myers, Laura Myers and Kelli Smith. Regina Jones will also make the trip to Austin as an alternate.

Girls' coach Randy Burks commented that he was proud of the girls who participated in the meet. "We almost qualified another relay team; our mile relay girls ran the fastest time we've had since I've been in Munday. Our 800 meter prelim time was slow, but the girls really poured it on in the finals. We're anxious to compete in the state contest, but it will be tough to win, as we will be up against some

fine athletes." Coach Edwards said the Moguls have a good chance to win at Austin. "I think any team that scores 50 points or better will win it, and we have the potential to score 70 points. If we just do our job we will definitely be in the running for another state title."

Also qualifying for state competition were Cathy Reagins of Goree, second in the 100 meter hurdles; George Rocha of Knox City, first in the 300 meter hurdles; and Rudy Agraz, also of Knox City, second in the 800 and 1600 meter runs. Other county athletes participating in the regional meet were Cindy Reagins of Goree, who placed third in the 100 meter dash; Linda Mayes of Knox City, who placed sixth in the 200 meter dash; and Sue Gideon of Benjamin, fourth in the mile run.

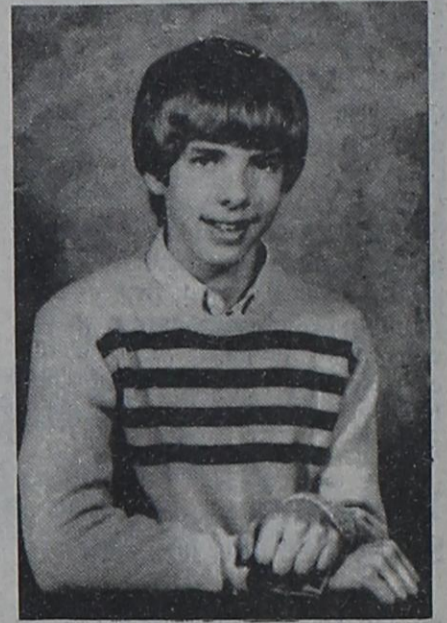

May Billing To Reflect WTU's Summer Rates

The price of electricity to residential and commercial customers of West Texas Utilities Co. will increase slightly this month as the company's summer rates go into effect.

The summer-winter rate differential for the two classes of customers was proposed by the Public Utility Commission of Texas staff during negotiations in WTU's rate case last fall.

Beginning with May billings, residential and commercial customers will be charged 3/4-cent more per kilowatt-hour. Residential base rates rise from 3.22 cents to 3.97 cents per KWh, while commercial base rates rise from 3.43 cents to 4.18 cents per KWh.

Coincidentally, there will be a fuel factor adjustment raising the cost of fuel from 3.14 cents per KWh to 3.5949 cents. This means that residential rates, including fuel costs, will go from 6.36 cents per KWh to 7.5649 cents, and commercial rates, including fuel costs, will go from 6.5 cents to 7.77 cents per KWh.

The new base rates and fuel cost factor will be effective for bills rendered during the month of May. The summer rates continue through October.

The seasonal rate differential has been used by many companies for many years. The main reason is that the cost of service is higher during the peak usage season, or summer months. Also, higher rates serve as an incentive for customers to conserve and trim the peak demand.

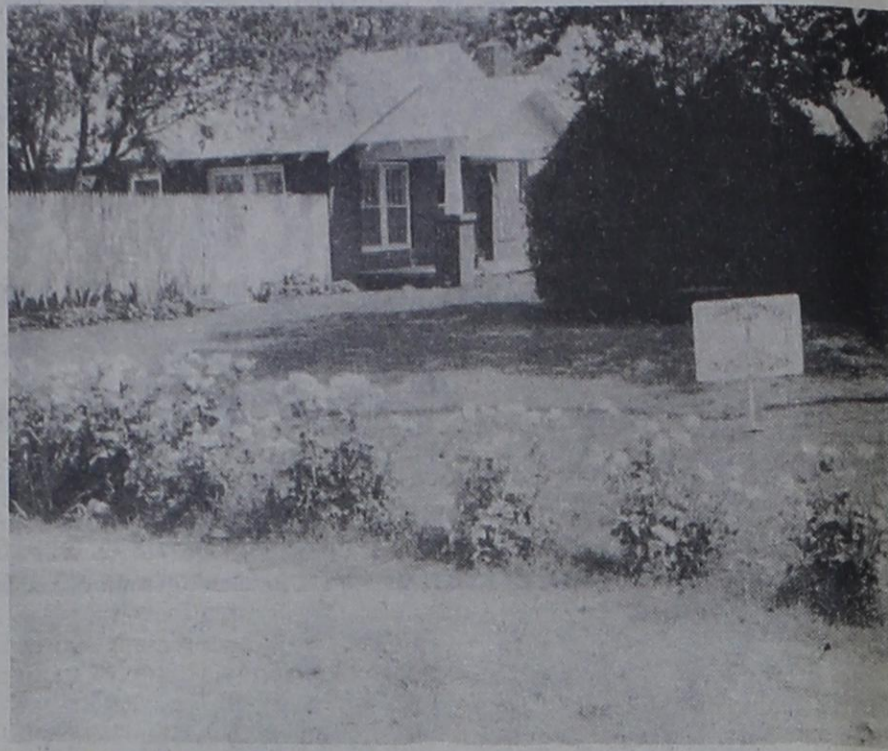

**Conditions Indicate A Good
 Year For Spraying Mesquite**

This may be the year to put the
 "whammy" on mesquite.

Soil moisture conditions are a key
 to mesquite control, and good rains
 since last fall over most of Texas
 should increase the effectiveness of
 mesquite control with foliar herbi-
 cides, says Dr. Tommy Welch with
 the Texas Agricultural Extension
 Service.

Now that mesquite is starting to

grow actively due to good soil mois-
 ture, ranchers should gear up for a
 spray program, notes Welch, a
 range brush and weed control
 specialist. Correct timing and
 proper application are most critical.

Before applying a herbicide,
 make sure mesquite leaves are fully
 extended and have turned from light
 to dark green in color, advises the
 specialists. This usually occurs
 about 40 days after bud break.

Spraying during the period of
 seed pod elongation will result in
 less control because the plants are
 using food reserves. Also, about 90
 days after bud break, control with
 foliar herbicides decreases as wax
 builds up on leaves and overall
 growth slows down, Welch says.

Proper timing also relates to soil
 temperature. Research by the Texas
 Agricultural Experiment Station
 and Texas Tech University has
 shown that soil temperature at 12 to
 18 inches of depth should be 75
 degrees F. or above for good control
 of mesquite.

Soils on upland range sites and
 soils with a higher sand content
 usually warm up faster than bot-
 tomland and clay soils. Thus ranch-
 ers need to pay attention to par-
 ticular sites when planning a mes-
 quite control program, suggests the
 specialist.

If rains during the spraying
 period start new leaf growth on
 mesquite plants, leaves should be
 allowed to mature before spraying.
 If foliage is damaged by insects,
 disease or hail, do not spray until
 new foliage has developed and
 matured, advises Welch.

Four herbicides are registered and
 effective for mesquite control on
 rangeland, says the specialist. These
 include triclopyr (Grazon ET); 2,4,
 5-T; picloram (Grazon PC); and
 dicamba (Banvel).

Triclopyr, dicamba and 2,4,5-T
 may be used alone to control
 mesquite. However, control may be
 increased with one-to-one mixtures
 of the following: 2,4,5-T and
 picloram, triclopyr and picloram,
 or dicamba and picloram. A one-to-
 one mix of 2,4,5-T and dicamba
 also may be used but generally is less
 effective than the other mixtures.

Before applying any herbicide, be
 sure to read and follow label direc-
 tions, cautions Welch.

Proper application of foliar herbi-
 cides at the right time can be a key
 step to mesquite control, reminds
 the specialist. Then follow up with
 good range management practices.

**County Receives
 Share Of Mixed
 Drink Tax Rebate**

State Comptroller Bob Bullock
 has sent checks totaling \$11.7
 million to 220 counties and 424
 cities as their share of the state's 12
 percent mixed drink tax collected
 during the first quarter of 1985.

Knox County received \$144.54 in
 the mixed drink tax rebate. The re-
 mittance was derived from a quar-
 terly revenue of \$1,156.29.

The Texas Legislature raised the
 tax from 10 to 12 percent effective
 October 2, 1984, during a special
 session last summer.

Bullock said the state collected
 \$48.7 million in mixed drink taxes
 for the first quarter at the increased
 rate, compared with \$39.1 million
 collected during the first quarter of
 1984 at the old 10 percent rate.

Texas cities and counties receive a
 share of the tax collected on mixed
 drinks sold within their boundaries
 under the law that legalized the sale
 of mixed drinks in the state.

Of the total \$48.7 million in state
 collections, counties received \$6
 million compared to \$5.8 million for
 the first quarter in 1984. Cities
 received \$5.6 million, up from the
 \$5.4 million collected during the
 same period last year. The state's
 general revenue fund received the
 balance.

Bullock said \$37 million was
 deposited in the state's general
 revenue fund from first quarter
 collections compared to the \$27.8
 million collected at the 10 percent
 rate for the same period in 1984.

The couple will exchange vows at 5 o'clock in the afternoon on Saturday, June 29, at St. Joseph's Catholic Church in Rhineland.



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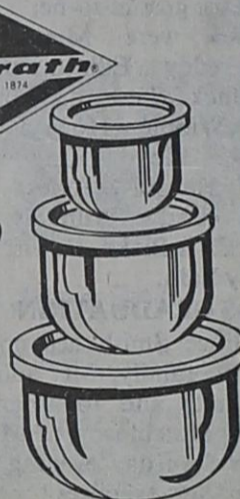
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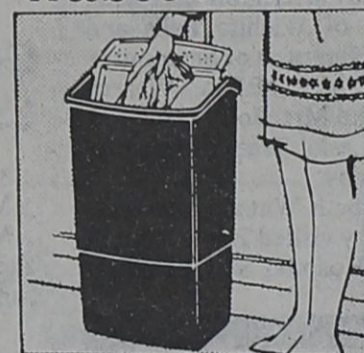
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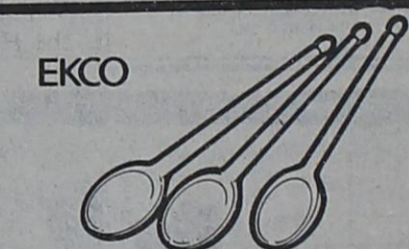
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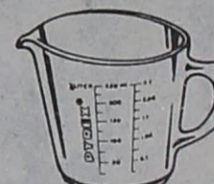

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
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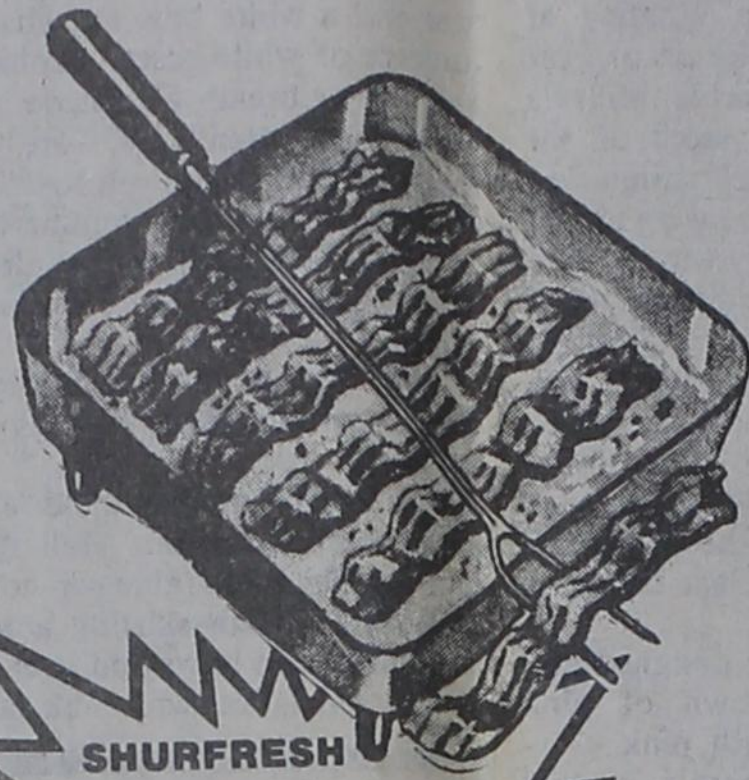
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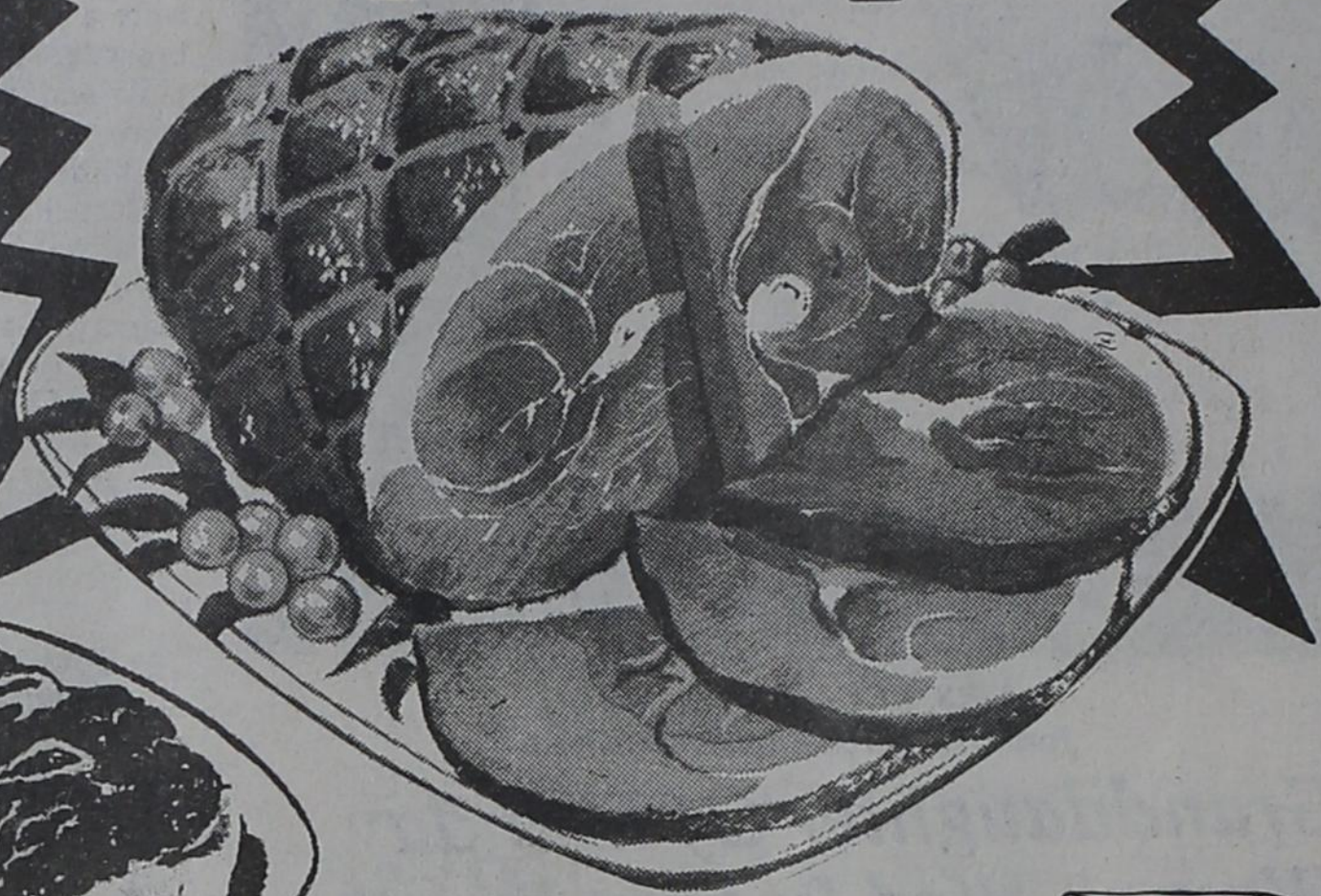
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Mogul Chosen For Coaches All-Star Team

NATIVE GRASS VARIETY DEMONSTRATION PLANTED

A native grass variety demonstration was established April 16 on the grounds of the Knox County Courthouse in Benjamin. The demonstration was made possible through the cooperative effort of the County Judge, David Perdue, Knox County Commissioners Court and Wichita-Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District.

The demonstration contains ten varieties of native grasses selected by Jerry Pearce, District Conservationist. The grasses were selected based on adaptability and use in the county.

The 3'x6' plots are located on the south side of the courthouse between the two walk ways. White flags presently mark the site.

The stem bed was prepared by tilling the soil approximately three inches deep. Two weeks prior to tilling, the site was sprayed with Roundup R to remove the bermuda grass.

The seed was put out by hand broadcast to insure a good stand. After seeding was completed the site

was lightly watered.

At this time the grasses are starting to come up. It will take three to four weeks before each variety is well established.
