## May Billing To Reflect WTU's Summer Rates

Ior the werwinter rate differerenwas proposed by the Public Uuility Commission of Texas staff during
fall.
Beginning with May billings, resi-
dential and commercial customers will be charged $3 / 4$-cent more per
kilowatt-hour. Residential base rates rise from 3.22 cents to 3.97
cents per KWh, while commercial base rates rise from 3.43 cents to 4.18 cents per KWh.

Coincidentially, there will be a fuel factor adjustment raising the cost of fuel from 3.14 cents per
KWh to 3.5949 cents. This means KWh to 3.5949 cents. This means
that residential rates, including fuel costs, will go from 6.36 cents per
KWh to 7.5649 cents, and commercial rates, including fuel costs, will go
from 6.5 cents to KWh. The new base rates and fuel cost
factor will be effective for bills rendered during the month of May. The summer rates continue through
October.
The price of electricity to resi-
dential and commercial customers of West Texas Utilities Co. will increase slightly this month as the company's summer rates go into ef-

The seasonal rate differential has many years. The main companies for the cost of service is higher during the peak usage season, or summer months. Also, higher rates serve as an incentive for customers to conserve and trim the peak demand.

shown that soil temperature at 12 to 18 inches of depth should be 75 degrees $F$. or above for good contro of mesquite.
Soils on upland range sites and soils with a higher sand content
usually warm up faster than bot usually warm up faster than bot-
tomland and clay soils. Thus ranchers need to pay attention to particular sites when planning a mes-
quite control program, suggests the quite control program, suggests the
specialist.
If rains during the spraying If rains during the spraying
period start new leaf growth on mesquite plants, leaves should be allowed to mature before spraying.
If foliage is damaged by insects, disease or hail, do not spray until new foliage has developed and matured, advises Welch.
Four herbicides are registered and effective for mesquite control on rangeland, says the specialist. These 5-T; picloram (Grazon PC); and dicamba (Banvel).
Triclopyr, dicamba and $2,4,5-\mathrm{T}$ may be used alone to control
mesquite. However, control may be mesquite. However, control may be
increased with one-to-one mixtures of the following: $2,4,5-\mathrm{T}$ and picloram, triclopyr and picloram, or dicamba and picloram. A one-toone mix of $2,4,5-\mathrm{T}$ and dicamba

County Receives Share Of Mixed Drink Tax Rebate
State Comptroller Bob Bullock has sent checks totaling $\$ 11.7$
million to 220 counties and 424 cities as their share of the state's 12 percent mixed drink tax collected during the first quarter of 1985 . the mixed drink tax rebate. The remittance was derived from a quarterly revenue of $\$ 1,156.29$. The Texas Legislature raised the tax from 10 to 12 percent effective
October 2, 1984, during a special October 2, 1984, during a specia
session last summer. Bullock said the
$\$ 48.7$ million in mixed drink taxes for the first quarter at the increased rate, compared with $\$ 39.1$ million collected during the first quarter of 1984 at the old 10 percent rate.
Texas cities and counties receiver share of the tax collected on mixed drinks sold within their boundaries under the law that legalized the sale f mixed drinks in the state.
Of the total $\$ 48.7$ million in state collections, counties received $\$ 6$ the first quarter in 1984. Cities received $\$ 5.6$ million, up from the $\$ 5.4$ million collected during the same period last year. The state's
general revenue fund received the balance.
Bullock said $\$ 37$ million was deposited in the state's general evenue fund from first quarter million collected at the the $\$ 27.8$ rate for the same period in 1984 .
