to put highly erodible land into CRP to put highly erodible land into CRP for a 10 year period. bill that is aimed at the 1985 farm production on highly crodible land production on highly crodible land
and protecting that land from wind and water damage. And the program has been effective. Thus far, figures from the U.S. Department
of Agriculture show that CRP has or Agriculture show that CRP has
reduced soil erosion by 17 percent, redured soil crosion oy
more than 530,000 tons, since 1986. In Knox County, 58 contracts have been made, putting 8400 acres into the reserve program. Estimates were made that soil erosion has been
reduced 25 tons per acre since reduced
signing.
Some 45 million acres have been targeted for the program across the U.S. Currently, 56 percent of that goal has been contracted nationally. Texas farmers have enrolled 3.2
million acres.

Failure to do so will result in a loss of USDA farm program benefits on all cropland. And the approved plan must be implemented by January 1 1995, to retain government payments.

Child Safety Not Accidental; Result Of Parental Caution
Citing a national survey which shows parents underestimate the greatest everyday risks to thei ganizations has declared war on preventable childhood accidents.
"The leading causes of accidental death in children are passenger fatalities in car accidents, pedestrian and bicycle accidents, drownings and fires and burns," said Dr
Sarah L. Anderson, a family life specialist with the Texas A\&M University Agricultural Extension Service.
"Yet a 1986 national poll showed parents most feared drugs and kidnapping, while only $2 \%$ or less exbieycle accidents, burns and drowning," she said.

Many Times Burns Can Be Prevented
Burns have been with us since the discovery of fire and are one of the
most painful injuries we can most painful injuries we can face.
Despite recent techniques that have Despite recent techniques that have
greatly improved the treatment of seriously burned victims, the Texas Medical Association says prevention is still the best medicine.
Infants should be watched closely during their crawling stages. Tiny
children often pull themselves up wth table cloths and other items which may permit scalding liquids to fall on them. Inquisitive toddlers also should be
kept away from scalding liquids kept away from scalding liquids, hot
appliances and matches. The loose appliances and matches. The loose
end of an extension cord left plugged into a socket presents another kind of hazard. If the plug comes into contact with saliva in the
child's mouth, an arc will form child's mouth, an arc will form
causing an electrical burn to the causing an electrical bur
mouth. This can be fatal.
Young children should be permit-
ted to wear only fire retardant sleepted to wear only fire retardant sleep-
wear which meets the standards of the Consumer Products Safety Commission. All sleepwear up to
size 14 purchased in retail stores is size 14 purchased in retail stores is
fire retardant, but homemade sleepwear may be made from flammable fabrics.
Older children and adolescents
may develop a fascination may develop a fascination for fire.
It is the responsibility of a parent see that children who are known fin setters receive counseling.
Adults should not light fires with gasoline, white gas or kerosene.
Carburetors should Carburetors should not be started
by priming and firing. Flashback can cause a serious injury. Smoking in bed is particularly dangerous. Many other things can be done to prevent fires in your home. Smoke alarms should be in each hallway
and all family members should and all family members should
know exit routes. Keep a fire extinguisher in the kitchen, where many fires begin. Your water heater should be kept at about 120 degrees, -- hot enough for bathing but not hot enough to cause severe scalds.
