Many song and sonnets have been written about mothers. Some of them cause us to smile, some bring a sentimental tear to our eye, and others are so syrupy as to cause nausea.  
Webster defines a mother as "the female parent of a plant or an animal; that which gives birth to something or nurtures in the manner of one who gives birth." Cold, impersonal facts. No sentimentality or warmth. A dictionary deals with generalizations. Sentimentality belongs to the individual. At least Webster recognizes that being another is not necessarily biological state.  
There's something special about watching a roomful of first graders as they work on Mother's Day cards. They cut hearts and flowers, fold construction paper carefully in their labor of love. Some draw flowers and bees, others draw rocket ships, but the message is always the same, "I love you, Mom." Sometimes it is printed in a neat little hand. Sometimes it is scrawled across the front of a card with a crayon, but no less sincere - no less loving.

I sometimes wonder when I watch these children - babies really - work so diligently on the cards for the special people in their lives, how many of their mothers will look at their cards and toss them away, and how many will keep them in a special place. Some of the mothers are very young. They can't know now how much those little cards will mean twenty years from now when they run across it in the box with his baby book and first shoes.  
I remember having so many doubts and fears when I was waiting to become a mother for the first time. I was so young, and as my mother helped me embroider bluebirds and rabbits in blankets and pillowcases, I would voice my fears.  
"I'm afraid I won't know how to take care of a baby, Mother. I'm afraid I won't know when it's sick or why it's crying."  
"You'll know," my mother answered. "When it gets here, you'll know."  
Then, the long-awaited day arrived and I heard the first infant cries of my child.

"It's a girl," Dr. Markward said, and I searched Tommy's eyes over the surgical mask he wore. Was she all right? Was everything there? I saw him smile through his tears of relief. She was all right.  
Later, as we looked her over in my hospital room, we were both amazed at how tiny she was.  
"She looks just like you," Tommy said. And I could see that she did as I held her as closely as I dared.  
"I'm never ever going to let anything hurt this baby," I said, fiercely. I suppose every new mother feels the same way. We do the best we can to protect our children from illnesses and accidents, but eventually they have to live in the real world. We can't do anything about the things, or the people, who hurt them. We'd like to protect them forever, to always keep them from being sad or worried or hurt, but life's not like that. A friend of mine once said, "The measure of success as a mother depends on whether or not your child can be self-sufficient as an adult." Sober or later we have to cut the apron strings, and cutting apron strings is hard.  
Our first memories are of a world entered around our mothers. Nell, Jayle, and I are especially blessed because our mother's world centered around us, too... and it still does.  
I sincerely hope I can someday measure up to my mother. I hope I have inherited her strength and her determination - her "I can do it" attitude. She has a certain knack for

## THIS WEEKEND IN AUSTIN Mogulettes Try For Third State Track Championship

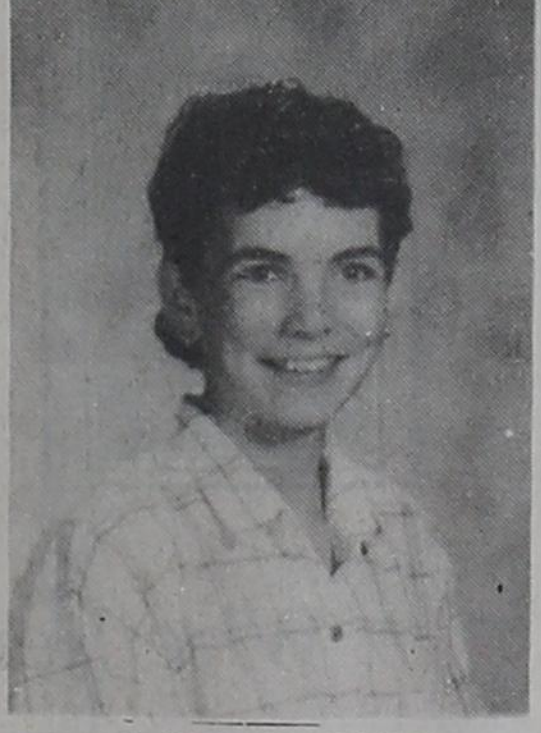
The Mogulettes will try to make it three-in-a-row this weekend as they travel to Austin to defend their 1989 title at this year's State UIL Track and Field Meet set at Memorial Stadium on the University of Texas campus.  
Seven individuals and all five relay teams will be competing in the contest.  
Mindy Myers will defend state titles in the 800 meter run and the high jump and will be running anchor on the 1600 meter relay and compete in the 1600 meter run. Kathy Wilde, the 1988 gold medalist in the 100 meter hurdles, will try to regain that title from last year's state winner, Rachael Honea of Irion County and will anchor both the 400 and 800 meter relays. Also looking for a second gold medal at state will be the girls' 400 meter relay, 800 meter relay and 1600 meter relay teams. Angie Offutt,

April Offutt and Alicia Cook make up the balance of the relay teams.  
Isias Campos, Perry Collier and Terry Collier will each compete in the 400 meter and 1600 meter relays. Terry is also entered in two individual events and Isias and Perry will each compete in one individual contest. Brett Bruce and Bobby Dockins are entered in one individual event and Bobby will lead off the 400 meter relay. Tyler Thompson completes the 1600 meter relay team.  
First competition for Munday athletes will be at 1 p.m. Saturday in the high jump. Running events will begin at 5:45 Saturday afternoon.  
The local girls traveled to Abilene on Friday of last week for practice in the state qualifiers meet held at ACU.  
Kathy Wilde placed third in the 100 meter hurdles with a time of 15.2. Mindy took second place in the

800 meter run with a time of 2:24.16 and was sixth in the high jump with a leap of 5'2". The relay teams did not participate in the event.

## Albus Is New Mayor Matthews And Oustad Win City Council Seats

Richard Albus, who chose not to run for re-election to a seat on the city council, was elected by write-in vote to serve a two-year term as mayor during Saturday's city election. Albus has been serving as mayor pro-tem for the city since August, 1989.  
Voters chose Hank Matthews and George Oustad, also by write-in vote, to fill council seats previously held by Gene Brown, who declined to run for re-election, and Albus.

Floyd Reed Jr. and Maynard Moore were re-elected to positions on the Munday Independent School District Board of Trustees, receiving 131 and 126 votes. They ran unopposed.  
In the Knox County Hospital District Board election, Jerry Williams, incumbent director, received 105 votes locally and Don Bunton garnered 129. James Smith received one write-in vote for the position.

Albus received 96 of the 138 votes cast Saturday. Matthews garnered 112 and 120 voters cast ballots for Oustad.  
Also receiving write-in votes for the mayoral position were Larry Fitzgerald, Dr. Dale Selzer, Paula Schur, Randy Bob Cypert, Pat Smith, Tommie Harper, Hank Matthews, George Oustad, Tim Hendrix, Walter Hertel, Barry Ratliff, Gary Schur, Clint Norman, Gordon Smith, Ernesteen Michels, Coyt Smith and Gene Brown.

City Of Goree Elects New Councilman  
In Saturday's city election at Goree, newcomer Jimmy Harlan was elected to the Goree City Council along with incumbents Robert Coffman and Bobby Presnall.  
Presnall received 62 votes, followed by Coffman and Harlan who received 52 votes each. Other candidates were Missy Patterson who received 47 votes and incumbent Barton Carl with 38 votes.

Other names written in for council places were Phillis Urbanczyk, Don Bunton, Gene Brown, Walter Hertel, Garon Tidwell, Paula Schur, Betty Hamilton, M.M. Booc, Jimmy Urbanczyk, Gary Crawford, Johnny Melton, Dale Selzer and Richard Albus.

Incumbents on the Goree ISD Board of Trustees, Dolan Moore and LeRoy Russell were re-elected with 82 and 66 votes respectively. Other candidates, Ignacio Mateos and Mary Jane Nava, received 8 and 19 votes, respectively.

## Munday Band Earns Sweepstakes Honors

The Munday High School Purple Cloud Band was in Vernon last Tuesday for the UIL Region II north zone Concert and Sightreading Contest, and for the second consecutive year earned unanimous Sweepstakes honors for excellence in marching, concert and sightreading contests. It is the fifth consecutive year for the band to receive the Sweepstakes honor.  
Band receiving sweepstakes distinction are awarded first division ratings in marching, concert and sightreading competition. Three judges rate bands in each contest, and at least two of them must consider a group first division for it to receive an overall I rating. Munday received three straight I's in all three contests.  
Director Rodney Bennett was understandably proud of his band.

"I can honestly say that of the five sweepstakes bands I have had, this was the finest single performance a band has ever played," he commented.  
Bennett added, "It should be noted that this year's senior band members have never been participants in anything less than a sweepstakes program."  
Only one other Class A band in the district, Paducah High School, received sweepstakes honors. There

were no sweepstakes bands in the south zone.  
Ratings from other Class A bands in the north zone included: Crowell, IV concert, IV sightreading; Knox City, II concert; II sightreading; Windthorst, II concert; II sightreading; Throckmorton, II concert, II sightreading; Muenster, III concert, III sightreading; Petrolia, I concert, II sightreading; and Paducah, I concert, I sightreading.

facing any kind of adversity head-on with a toughness that would make a 200 pound man proud of himself.

I remember one occasion in my life when I was faced with what seemed to be an insurmountable problem. My life had changed in an instant from a happy, secure one to a life full of doubts and fears. Tommy was fighting his way back from a near fatal accident and I was suddenly faced with situations that I had never dreamed I'd have to face.

One day, in the midst of my despair, I had run to the south end of the house to vent my frustrations. My mother had followed me there and I cried out to her, "I can't handle this anymore. You know I've tried, but I just can't do it!"

She looked at me sternly and her voice was firm. "You've got to do it. There's nobody else and you don't have a choice."

And there it was. A spade was a spade. She was doing everything she could to help me pull Tommy through the agonizing weeks of his re-entry into the world, but she was not about to put up with any whining or selfpity from me.

My mother's philosophy is simple. If you're family, you're family and you stick together. She may tell us fifteen things we're doing wrong but she's not about to listen to anybody else criticize us. She may not always agree with the actions of her children or her grandchildren, but she loves us and she's going to defend us. Family problems belong within the family, she tells us, and if we don't support each other - who'll support us?

Mothers come in all kinds of packages. There are mothers who are soft-spoken and loving - patient and kind. There are mothers who love their children, but showing it sort of gets lost in all the work involved in being a mother. There are mothers who never recognize a single fault in one of their children and blame all their mistakes on somebody else. There are mothers who are very generous with toys and clothes - cars and money - everything but their time and their attention. Then, unfortunately, there are those women who are mothers in the biological sense only. It is their children who are neglected and abused. Those mothers seem to be devoid of anything that remotely resembles the natural maternal instinct to protect their young.

On Sunday, we will again honor our mothers on Mother's Day. Some of us will carefully choose a card or a gift. Some of us will thrust some little remembrance toward our mothers with, "Here. I didn't have time to wrap this, but happy Mother's Day anyway." Some of us will call our mothers on their special day, and some of us can do no more than to honor our mother's memory with a bouquet of flowers in a windswept cemetery - to look at her name etched in stone with the knowledge that we will see her again someday in a happier place.

But, the saddest thing of all are those mothers who will wait all day for the call that never comes. The saddest thing of all is the mother who watches the door in vain for the faces she loves most in all the world. Mothers are such special people. It takes so little to make them happy. They don't care about expensive gifts. One of my most prized possessions is a plaque Christy gave me that reads, "A mother is someone you never outgrow your need for". All a mother wants is to be remembered on her special day.

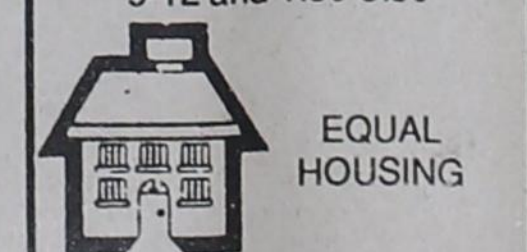
If we're one of the lucky ones who can still visit our mothers on Sunday, I hope we will. Let's make Mother's Day special.

**Proposed '90-'91 City Budget Cuts Firemen's Relief Fund**

The City Council of the City of Munday met in special session at 7 p.m. April 16, at City Hall.

Members present included Mayor pro-tem Richard Albus and aldermen Jessie Tucker and David Booe. Gene Brown and Jessie Andrade were absent.

Mayor pro-tem Albus called the meeting to order.

The purpose of the meeting was to conduct Public Hearing #2 regarding the annexation proposal of Ralph Cyfert and Frances J. Cyfert to wit: Being .0337 acres of land situated in Section 35, Blk. 2, D&WRR Co. Survey, Knox County, Texas. Mayor pro-tem Albus declared that Public Hearing #2 was in progress. Anyone wishing to comment, if present, will be heard at anytime until the meeting ends.

After forty-five minutes passed, Mayor pro-tem Albus called for any final comments regarding Public Hearing #2. Notice of this public hearing has been published in the Munday Courier and posted at City Hall on both the bulletin board and the front outside window. Citizen input was requested, however no one came to this meeting to make a request.

Tucker moved the meeting adjourn. Booe seconded. Meeting adjourned.

The City Council of the City of Munday again met in special session at 7 p.m. April 30 at City Hall.

Members present were Mayor pro-tem Richard Albus and aldermen Jessie Tucker and David Booe. Gene Brown and Jessie Andrade were absent.

Mayor pro-tem Albus called the meeting to order. The purpose of the meeting is to hold a public hearing on the 1990-91 City Budget proposal.

At this point, the Public Hearing did commence. No one, other than the Mayor pro-tem, the City Council, the City Administrator and the Assistant City Administrator was present. Notice of the budget hearing was given in the Munday Courier and on the City Hall bulletin board and front outside window.

The City Council examined the budget as prepared by the Assistant City Administrator. It is proposed that one item, \$1,000 for Firemen's Relief and Retirement, will be deleted from the 90-91 budget. The state has stopped contributing to this fund and the City can no longer maintain this expense on its own. The budget shows a net increase of \$3,481.00 for the 1990-91 fiscal year.

Final budget hearing will be at Munday City Hall on May 8, 1990, in regular city council session.

Tucker moved meeting adjourn. Booe seconded. All in favor. Meeting adjourned.

A mother can be almost any size or any age, but she won't admit to anything over thirty.

A mother has soft hands and smells good.

A mother likes new dresses, music, a clean house, her children's kisses, an automatic washer and Daddy.

A mother doesn't like having her children sick, muddy feet, temper tantrums, loud noises or bad report cards.

A mother can read a thermometer much to the amazement of Daddy and, like magic, can kiss a hurt away.

A mother can bake good cakes and pies but likes to see her children eat vegetables.

A mother can stuff a fat baby into a snowsuit in seconds and can kiss a little face and make them smile.

**Miller Creek Reservoir**  
**Condition:** Murkey due to water intake

**Temperature** (at surface): 67° F  
**Level:** Full but roads are in great shape

**Black Bass:** Excellent to 11 lbs. Taking chrome and gold lures. Some reported on large minnows.

**Hybrid Striper:** Excellent to 19 lbs. Taking large minnows, chrome trolling lures and rattle lures of various colors. (Minimum length limit is 18")

**White (Sand) Bass:** Excellent to 2 1/2 lbs. Sandies are taking minnows, jigs and very small rattle lures. (A sand bass is defined by the Texas Parks and Wildlife as the white bass with continuous lines on its sides. If the lines are "broken", it's a hybrid striper. Minimum length limit is 10" for sandies.)

**Crappie:** Good. One fellow stopped by the house with a limit of crappie all over 1 1/2 pounds caught on small jigs. Best at Antelope Slew (near dam). Mostly very small in west creek/bridge area. Recommend dam area.

**Catfish:** Excellent to 55 lbs. off trotlines. Best bait for trotlines - large minnows, goldfish and shad. Best pole bait - Tan Bait, minnows, worms.

**Carp:** Excellent to 22 lbs. on Tan Bait, minnows and worms.

**Fishing Tip**

Q: What local bait houses are available? Would you review them?

A: There are now several local baithouses available for Knox County residents as well as visitors. In Munday, there are three. The oldest is

Seele's next to the railroad tracks on the Throckmorton highway. Recently, this bait house has been staying open late on weekends. They usually carry only one size of minnows and very few supplies. Their minnows are hardy and usually survive the drive. In the past, they have not been known to keep their posted hours, though, opening late and closing early. Otherwise a good little store.

A couple of weeks ago M & M opened behind the Exxon station in Munday. They carry only one size minnow but carry a variety of catfish baits including Tan Bait, stink bait, and crayfish ("crawdads"). They have a few supplies (sinkers, floats, etc.). They have the best price per dozen minnows.

The most recent to re-open is Anglers Choice (under new ownership) next to the Allsups in Munday. They carry one size minnow and some tackle. They will be staying open 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

In Goree, "The Bait House" opened in late February. Since the alternate route to Miller Creek through Goree is the same distance as the Throckmorton highway, it really isn't out of the way. The Goree store is by far the best stocked store. It carries a wide variety of tackle including crappie jigs, bass lures (i.e. Rat L Traps), rods and reels, several sizes of minnows, goldfish, perch, and several sizes of worms and night crawlers. They carry a variety of catfish bait including Tan Bait, cheese-punch and stink baits.

**FEW COTTON BOLL WEEVILS FOUND IN APRIL**

As many cotton producers know, the dreaded boll weevil is certainly a determining factor to producing cotton.

In order to determine how the boll weevil is emerging from overwintering habitat, eight Hardee Company pheromone boll weevil traps have been placed throughout Knox County.

The traps, which were established on April 6, are run on a weekly basis and new pheromone is added.

The average number of weevils per trap is:

The highest number of boll weevils has been 113 weevils in a trap located in the Vera area with 58 weevils captured in the Hefner area

The monitoring of boll weevil emergence is important to know as weevils may survive 2-3 weeks after emergency without feeding. If cotton is squaring at 35-42 days after emergence as boll weevils emerge then damage may occur. Square must be 1/3 grown or 1/4 inch in diameter to support a weevil larva. With May 14 serving as the Knox County uniform cotton planting date, 1/3 grown square should be found on June 21-22.

At this time, fields should be scouted to determine if weevil damage is occurring at levels high enough for control.

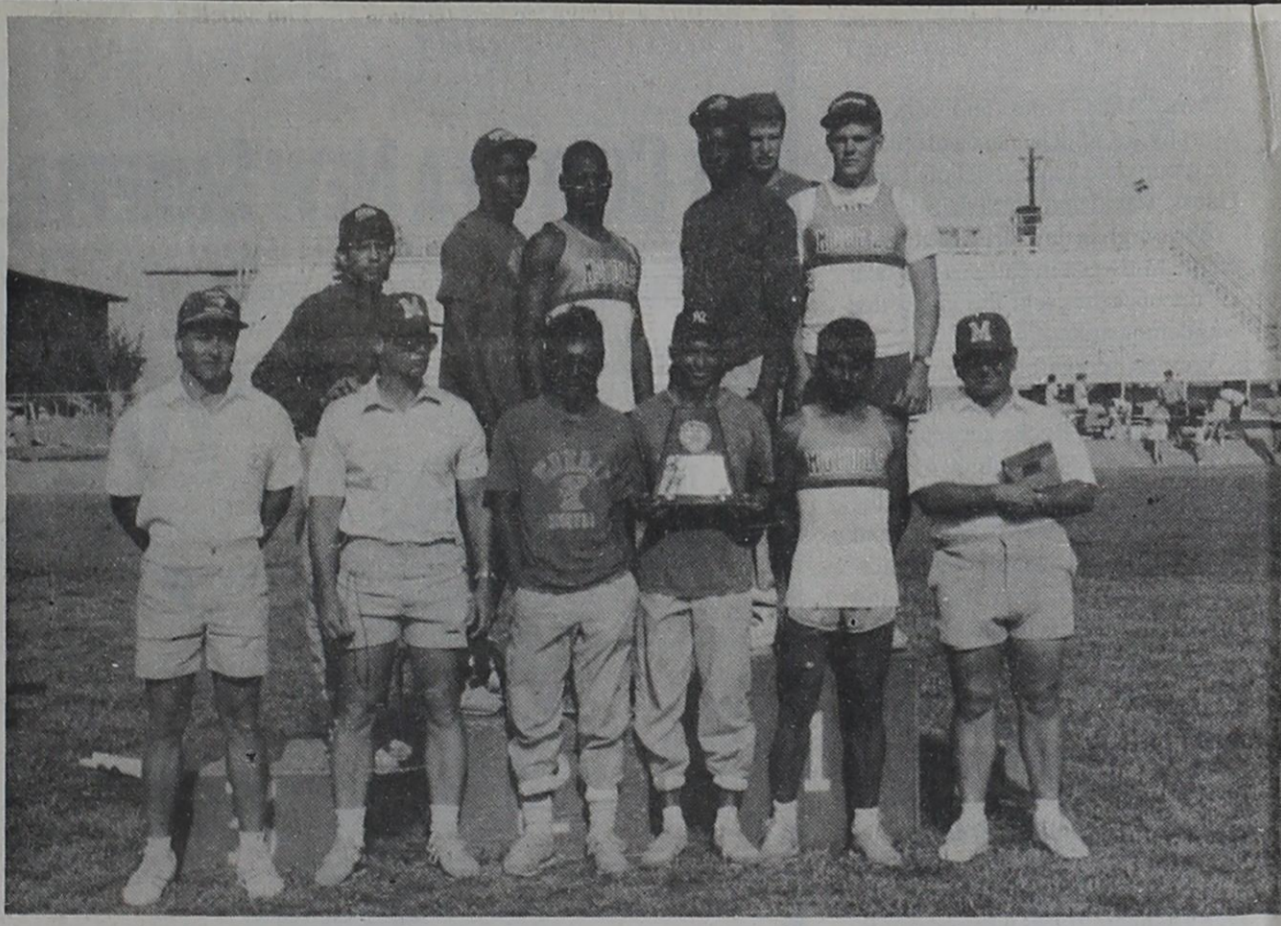

Gamma on May 11, 1929. "Dr. Blanton" was interviewed by Gerre Larned. The time was near the end of Dr. Blanton's life. She was the first woman in the south to run for and be elected to a major political office when she became Texas State Superintendent of Public Instruction. She had been advised by her brother, Congressman Thomas Blanton, not to run. The interview revealed that Dr. Blanton was truly a pioneer for women's rights. She demanded that women receive "equal pay for equal work." She was endorsed by Texas State Teachers Association, and her influence spread to other states as she served on various boards. She had the ability to tell a good story to get her point across. Her advice to teachers was "know what you are doing" and "plan ahead." She was a radical for her time but feminine enough never to tell her age. Dorothy Myers, scholarship chairman, announced that scholarships for 1990 had been awarded to Alice Jones, Maribeth Williams, and Phyllis Letz and that an Alpha Sate Scholarship had been awarded to Alice Jones, a first for a Beta Chi member. Members were encouraged to attend the 61st Alpha State Convention at the Lubbock Convention Center June 14-16.
