## Four Qualify For State Academic Meet

Four students from Munday High School have qualified for the University Interscholastic League Academic State Meet, May 2-4 at the University of Texas at Austin.

Beth McPherson, Chris Burnett, and Kacy Longan will advance to the state meet, while Ronnie Whitfield will attend as an alternate. The students placed within the top three individuals in their categories at the Region II competition last Saturday in Abilene to earn this honor. They competed against contestants from 79 other Class A schools at the regional meet.

Beth McPherson, daughter of Jim and Susan Edwards, placed first in Literary Criticism at the regional meet. Chris Burnett received second place in regional Poetry Interpretation. Her parents are Bobby and Judy

Kacy Longan, daughter of Bill and Karen Longan, placed third in Prose Interpretation. Receiving fourth place, or first alternate, in Editorial Writing, was Ronnie Whitfield, son of Rodney and Marilyn Bennett.

Students who participate at the State Meet represent the elite in their field and will qualify for Texas Interscholastic League Foundation scholar-

The girls were under the direction of Nahwana Donoho, while Becky Ratliff coached Ronnie.

Other Munday students participating at the regional academic meet were: Chris Key, Charlie Terrill and Dixie Reid, who won first place at District in the Current Events category (Dixie was named second highest individual at District, while Charlie was named third highest in their category); Andrea Longan, who placed second at District in Poetry; and Laura Burnett, who placed second at District in Prose.

## **D-FY-IT Program Planned** For Knox County Youth

D-FY-IT (Drug Free Youth In Texas), a unique drug and alcohol program geared to the youth of today, is coming to Knox County.

The D-FY-IT program, under the direction of James Victory, Munday Chief.of Police, will be implemented in county schools at the beginning of the fall school term. The Knox County Chapter will have three divisions: Munday/Goree, Knox City/O'Brien and Benjamin.

Each school will elect one student from each grade, 7-12, to serve on a Student Leadership Panel. This panel will decide the rules and reglations for their club, which puts the students in charge. Each division will have a program coordinator and each school will have an advisory board of adult members from various professions in the community. Teachers and law officers, as role models, are the only

adults allowed to become members. No one sets out to become an alcoholic or drug addict. This program promotes prevention, instead of prosecution. The key to behavior modification is through motivation. This program is unique in that it combines positive motivation with positive peer pressure to encourage students to become or remain drug-

In order to become a member, the student must voluntarily agree to a drug test and submit to a re-testing whenever their name is randomly

selected. Once they test "clean", each student will receive a T-shirt and I.D. card for members only. With the I.D. card, students receive rewards and discounts from various merchants. Merchants of the community who wish to be involved in the program will offer these members discounts on purchases such as clothing and food. As an extra incentive for those students who are "clean", one member each month will be randomly selected to receive a cash reward for being drug-free.

If a student ever tests positive for drugs, the membership card is collected and the student looses all





## Present Texas Revenue Budget Means Less Money For County

A budget we can live with...or can we? The House Appropriations Committee is trying to get the message to the people that the State has no money, no accounting tricks, as used in the 71st session, and no surplus to help bring the budget in line with needs of the State.

The "bare-bones budget" that was passed recently by the House Appropriations Committee has a devastating effect on counties in the 78th House District. The most harm will come to the already battered human services program and the public school finance program with court orders to equalize funding.

With this budget, the state would be deprived of \$4 billion in federal funds, which would translate into a shortfall of more than \$8 billion.

Commenting on the budget crisis, Rep. David Counts (D) Knox City, stated, "I would like to know how the people in the District feel about the level of services provided. How should we go about raising the money to provide the services at the present level plus projected needs, if wanted? I continue to hear the 'no-new taxes' slogan, however, taxes equate to services and this is the equation we must work to balance." "I need to hear from you."

The existing revenue budget would affect Knox County as follows:

**PUBLIC SCHOOLS** Goree ISD and Benjamin ISD would not lose any funds. However, the total proration (loss) for the Munday ISD would be \$3,230 in 1992 and \$3,192 in 1993, or \$8 per student each year. Knox City ISD would lose \$49,567, or \$113 per student in 1992, and \$143,579, or \$325 perstudent, in 1993. This is a countywide average of \$52,797, or \$53 per student, in 1992, and \$146,772, or \$145 per student, in 1993.

**HUMAN SERVICES** 

In long term care, the difference in the number of nursing home and private ICF-MR clients would be 15, with the difference in these payments being \$578,577. Five less people would be served by Community Care for Aged and Disabled.

The difference in payment for hospitals, physicians, laboratory, Xray and other services now offered by Medicaid would be \$645,466, while the dollar value difference of prescribed medicines would be \$84,942.

The number of people receiving In-home Protective Services for

Children would drop by three, and the number of Aid to Families With Dependent Children (AFDC) clients made ineligible would differ by seven. This amounts to an \$81,177 difference in AFDC payments.

PUBLIC HEALTH

One child would be dropped from the early childhood intervention program. The difference in state funds for the supplemental feeding program for women, infants and children program (WIC) would be \$1,563.

The figures stated for Human Serv-

ice and Public Health reflect a biennial impact (1992-93).

These losses bring the biennial difference for Knox County, due to the existing revenue budget, to \$1,592,857. A budget we can live with....or can we?



The Knox County Hospital District Board of Directors met in regular session on Thursday, March 21, in the conference room. The meeting was called to order at 7:10 p.m. by President W.R. Baker. Present were W.R. Baker, President; Greg Clonts; Benny Grill; Peggy McGaughey; John B. Martin; Stephen Kuehler; Glenda Moore and Ronnie Webb, Maintenance Engineer. Dolan Moore entered the meeting late. Absent were Don Bunton and Bernard Brown.

The minutes of the regular meeting held on February 21 were read. A motion was made by Greg Clonts, and seconded by Benny Grill, to approve the minutes as read. Motion carried unanimously.

Under old business, Stephen reported that uncollected Accounts Receivable were being aggressively pursued. He reported on the status of the accounts, and the ones which would be filed on in small claims

Mr. Martin presented the Administrator's Report. He presented a letter from First National Bank of Munday outlining the Depository Arrangement. Mr. Martin reported that the Depository Contract is to be renewed thirty days after the Hospital Board reorganizes. He reported that he and Stephen would be attending the THA Rural or Small Hospital Spring Forum in Dallas on April 11 and April 12.

Mr. Martin reported that Dr. Aung had signed the Physician Agreement and mailed it to the Hospital. He hopes to begin practice in Knox City by the first week in May. Mr. Martin also gave an update on the Hospital computer system which was installed. It was on-line as of February 1.

Floyd Brown of Garlington-Brown of Seymour entered the meeting and submitted a proposal to replace the heating and cooling system in the kitchen and dining room. He explained his proposals. The Board agreed that System 3 would meet the Hospital's requirements. A motion was made by Benny Grill, and seconded by Dolan Moore, to enter into an agreement with Garlington-Brown to install heating and cooling in the kitchen and dining room and install a make-up air system on the kitchen exhaust system as detailed in the submitted proposal of System 3. Motion carried unanimously.

Dr. Pennington addressed the Board, updating them on her medical practice. No action was taken.

Mr. Martin reported on the Clinic

Management. No action was taken

Mr. Martin gave the QA Report and the Medical Staff Report, No. action was taken.

W.R. Baker reported on a new lawnmower purchased for the Hospi-

The Fishing Doc

A: The Texas Parks and Wildlife

Dept. has set out the regulations

concerning these two types of records

in this state. Often "lake records" are

kept informally but not recorded. To

legally record a fish you must weigh

it on scales certified by the Federal

Government (Agriculture Dept.).

Then the appropriate forms must be

filled out. The fish had to have been

caught legally and by state guide-

lines. For instance, if you take a game

fish other than catfish off a trotline or

out of a trap then this isn't eligible

because it is illegal. Game fish caught

on pole or rod and reel must have

been taken with only two hooks (or

devices in the case of lures). I used to

use 3 jigs when fishing for crappie.

While this isn't illegal, it does not meet the state standards and would

have made any fish I caught unac-

ceptable.

MILLER CREEK RESERVOIR Level & condition: full & clear Temperature: 63° F

Black Bass: Good to 7 lbs. on rattle lures, spinners and jigs. Favorite colors include blood, sand, black, yellow and blue. Hitting all depts. Striper: Good to 15 lbs. Best on

deep-running trolling lures near dam areas. White Bass: Fair. Mostly small in

creeks but several good keepers caught in deep water on live minnows or jigs.

Crappie: Fairly good. Best in quiet, green-brushed areas. Some limits reported but mostly small. Best on slow moving jigs and minnows.

Two heart monitors, two defibrillators, a suction machine and a back board capable of holding 400 lbs. were added to the life-saving equipment used by the emergency medical technicians.

## Munday EMS Offers Life-Saving Services

With the nearest trauma-equipped hospital being at least 75 miles from Munday, we are fortunate indeed to be blessed with emergency technicians trained in advanced life sup-

The old days of simply loading a patient in the ambulance, rushing to a hospital, and hoping that there is enough time, are over. Munday's Emergency Medical Service is now able to offer more than that. These qualified technicians can do everything a hospital emergency room crew can do, with the exception of x-rays and some lab tests. This provides the patient with immediate life-saving care and increases the chances of

Ambulance director, Aaron Klause, stated that the Munday EMS has answered approximately 100 calls since January 1. Of these, 75% were estimated to be emergency calls. Klause, a trained paramedic, said that he and the trained volunteers are capable of handling all kinds of emergencies, from accidents to heart attacks.

The Munday EMS was recently able to purchase two heart monitors, two defibrillators, a portable suction machine and a backboard to aid in their life-support techniques. This equipment, valued at close to \$13,000, was made possible by memorial donations from the public.

The EMT's are looking forward to the addition of the 911 emergency system next January. This system, along with the new equipment, will allow them to better serve the com-

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



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#### FRAUD AND HOME WATER TREATMENT

Consumers should beware of salespersons using free in-home tests to sell water treatment devices.

The in-home test will show minerals in your drinking water, and perhaps the acidity/alkalinity level. The testing procedures use a chemical that combines with dissolved minerals, such as calcium and magnesium, and causes them to settle to the bottom of the bottle. Keep in mind that all water, except distilled water, contains some minerals.

In general, the presence of minerals is not a health threat. In fact, many of the minerals are beneficial to the body. However, some do cause water hardness and an undesirable taste.

Another demonstration is done with a face cloth that has been previously washed. The demonstrator puts the cloth and a water softening agent into a jar of tap water and shakes it vigorously. Suds will occur in the bottle, but this is normal because some detergent residue remains in all washed articles.

These free in-home "water quality tests" are merely sales ploys designed to sell you a water treatment system. Often the "test report" on your tap water is given in a way that implies that your water contains a lot of minerals that are not good for your family's health.

People who do the home testing usually require that both spouses of a married couple be present for the demonstration. This prevents one spouse from using a delaying tactic by insisting on talking to the other spouse before making a decision to buy a water treatment system.

#### BUTTERMILK

Buttermilk, despite what its name implies, is not high in butter or fat. In fact, only 20% of the calories in a 99 calorie cup come from fat, which makes it even a little lower in fat and calories than one percent fat milk. If a recipe calls for buttermilk and you do not have any on hand, you can make it yourself. Add two tablespoons



membership privileges for a determined amount of time set by the leadership panel. Once the student can re-test "clean", he/she receives their card back and all membership privileges are re-stored.

The D-FY-IT program was started in Smith County, Texas, in 1987. Whitehouse HIgh School, a 4-A school with 769 students, has had monumental success, with participation in the 90% range. Tyler schools started their program with 36-37% participation on the first day. Two days later, a second test was offered and participation increased to 40-50%. As of April of this year, Tyler has 92% of their student body involved in D-FY-IT and Drug-free. Overton schools, with 203 students enrolled, has 100% participation in this program.

Discipline problems in the schools have taken a dramatic decrease and juvenile crime has dropped drastically where this program has been implemented. In Whitehouse, for example, the juvenile crime rate dropped 71% with the program.

The D-FY-IT Program is run through community support by fundraisers and individual and business donations. All T-shirts, testing and I.D. cards are distributed to the students at no cost.



She was member of the Baptist Church and was an alteration lady for several stores in Denton.



#### **HONEYDEW IN SPRING -SOMEWHAT SURPRISING**

Homeowners may be surprised to find honeydew from landscape trees such as live oak trees. Upon close inspection in looking for aphids, few or none wil be found. This problem was found by W.R. Moore in Mun-

The problem is scale insects are heavily infesting live oaks. The scale insects produce honeydew, and under very heavily infested trees, the honey dew produced by these scale insects can be seen drifting down onto the ground. The honeydew is sticky and will adhere to anything onto which it drifts.

The scale insects grow rapidly in the spring and early sumer and at this time cause the greatest damage. Eggs are deposited under the female scale. After hatching, the young, which are called crawlers, emerge from beneath the female shell and migrate to infest the newly developed plant tissue.

Lecanium scale populations increase and decline rather abruptly. Their decline is apparently due to a great many parasites and predators


which attack this scale. Weather conditions which limit the development of the predators and parasites, but do not adversely affect the scale, may account for the development of large scale populations.

The scale, which resembles little turtles lined up along the twigs, can be controlled by spraying two to four times at seven to ten day intervals. Insecticides that might be used are malathion, diazinon, dimethoate, or acephate. Summer oils alone or in combination with these insecticides might be used. Treatment should be made when temperatures are below 90°F. for 24 to 48 hours. When using any of these materials, read and follow carefully the instructions on the

#### At Your Service

Q: Is it true that Moslems believe in the Bible? What is their faith?

A: The Moslem religion is one of the several post-Christian faiths that borrowed freely from God's word. Others include the Gnostics, (condemned in 1 John and other New Testament books), the Nicolatians (condemned in Revelation 2), the Antinomianists (condemned in Romans 6:1), Rigid Ebionites (condemned by Galatians 5), Manichaeists (similar to the Gnostics), etc. Each of these religions adopted some Christian beliefs and even some of the Old and New Testament books but each had an over-riding non-Christian doctrine. Add to this list the Celsusians and Neoplatonists we have quite a collection of pre-sixth century faiths coming from Europe, Asia and the Middle East.

Mohammed was born in Arabia in about 570 A.D. He taught that he was the successor to Abraham, Moses and Christ. Of course, he also taught that he was greater than any of these prophets. He sought to unite Christianity, Judaism and Middle East heathenism into one religion (a sort of early day ecumenicalist).

His book is called the Koran and is a little smaller than the New Testament. The Koran relates many stories from the Old Testament. It does teach the following truths: idolatry is wrong,

all people of all nations will participate in a judgement, Christ was born of a virgin and was a miracle-worker. However, it denies the Christ-hood of Jesus. It also teaches that heaven is a large harem filled with beautiful women. The Koran teaches fatalism which results in a fanatical, intolerant militarism which spreads its religion by the sword and not love as Christ taught. True followers of this religion are extremely dedicated to God (as they perceive him) but many only give "lip service" to their belief (just like many in our faith).



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#### CITY OF MUNDAY ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE BURNING OF TRASH & WASTE

An ordinance regulating the burning of trash and waste materials within the corporate limits of the city of Munday, Texas; prohibiting the burning of trash or waste within the city limits of said city; prescribing conditions under which trash and waste may be burned within said city; and providing penalties for violations.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Munday, Texas:

Section 1. It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to burn any trash, waste or rubbish within the city of Munday, Texas, or to start or maintain fires within such city of Munday, Texas, as are set out and defined by ordinances now in force or may hereinafter be enlarged or changed by an ordinance which may hereinafter be enacted. It is not intended hereby to prohibit the burning of trash or rubbish or waste in any stove or furnace within any building provided with proper flues or chimneys; but all fires are prohibited within said city, save and except, in stoves or furnaces within buildings, and burning of grass under the supervision of the Munday Fire Department.

Section 2. It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to burn any trash, waste or rubbish within the corporate limits of the city of Munday, Texas in any street, alley, or on any premises adjoining any street, alley, vacant lot or parcel of land. It being intended hereby to prohibit the starting or maintaining of any fires in the city of Munday, Texas, other than in stoves or furnaces within buildings.

Section 3. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$50.00 nor more than \$200.00.
