Block scheduling will allow longer class time

two meetings with the public, May need. 2 and 5, to discuss the proposed block scheduling plan for the 1994- the opportunity to discuss next 95 school year.

Association (TEA) forcing changes, Munday ISD had to look at concerns about this idea, contact other scheduling alternatives to assure that a student could take all the classes they both needed and wanted to graduate.

A Block Schedule means simply that students will take three subjects one day and three different subjects the next day if they have band and athletics, and five subjects per day if they do not, switching on alternate days.

All classes will be extended to 85 minutes except band and athletics. They will only last sixty minutes, with twenty-five minutes for study skills class, and will be held every day.

This change would give flexibility to the students. They would have the opportunity to take any class and still participate in extra curricular activities.

It would also improve instruction. The teacher will have a longer period to instruct the class and can use different approaches. Students need to get the best out of every subject that they can. This is great for the classes that use lots of hands-on instruction such as science, biology, ag, etc.

TEA recommends that students have 24 credits to graduate, one more than Munday students are required today. "We need to start moving in that direction now so we will be prepared when more credits are required," Mr. Hall

Smith, Tidwell, Cottingham win seats on school board

There was a good turnout for Saturday's city election. The cool weather did not seem to stop those who wanted to cast their vote.

In the race for school trustee, voters chose Larry Smith, Joe Tidwell and Jim Cottingham to fill three vacancies. Smith received 196 votes, Tidwell 177, and Cottingham 158. Their seven challengers were: Larry Welch with 86 votes, Judy Lowe 106, John Lee Nelson 44, Brenda Brown 72, Jamie Welborn 83, Tammy Klutts 26, and Glenn Herring 62.

Incumbent Richard Albus was re-elected to serve another two year term as Munday Mayor. He received 151 write-in votes. His opponents were Larry Fitzgerald, who received 91 votes, and Kim Brockett, 55 votes.

Incumbent Winters Matthews will resume her seat on the Munday City Council for another two-

year term. She received 226 votes. Danny Owens received 210 votes, and will fill the other at-large seat. They were uncontested in this race.

Incumbents Peggy McGaughey and Don Bunton ran uncontested for two at-large seats on the Knox County Hospital Board. Locally McGaughey received 252 votes and Bunton received 291.





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

One question that many producers have, whether it be wheat, grain sorghum, cotton, etc., is which variety is best for top production. Anyone interested in secing the results of last year's cotton variety trials may receive this information upon request.

The top five irrigated cotton varieties in Knox County in 1993 included - Paymaster HS26, LA887, Chembred CB830, Chembred CB333, and Paymaster HS200. Data is also available from Baylor, Foard, Haskell, Stonewall and Throckmorton Counties. A five year average can also be calculated for anyone interested.

Every cotton producer knows these plots. Anyone interested in that chemicals like insecticides and herbicides take the cost of production through the roof. Producers often have concerns about what to do with these empty containers. The Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC), along with the Texas Department of Agriculture and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service conduct a pesticide container collection in many locations throughout Texas.

1994 dates include August 17 in Munday and August 18 in Anson. These collection sites will accept plastic and metal pesticide containers as well as used tires (25 inch rim or less), lead acid batteries, used motor oil and oil filters. Locations for these two collections will be Farmers Grain Co-

The pesticide containers must TNRCC will be inspecting all containers. Containers not passing inspection will be sent back with the producer.

MEDICARE COVERS HOME HEALTH CARE

ome Health Care is a covered service available to Medicare beneficiaries that often allows a comfortable and welcome alternative to treatment in a hospital or nursing home. Medicare pays for a comprehensive range of health services at home if the patient is eligible for care.

In order for care to be covered, the patient:

- Must be homebound
- Must require either nursing, physical therapy, or speech
- Must need part-time and intermittent care rather than continuous or custodial services Must be under the care of a physician
- Must have the care certified by the physician as being
- medically necessary

Once those conditions are met, the patient may also receive social services, home health aide services, occupational therapy, and needed medical supplies. A home health agency certified to provide Medicare home health services will be able to determine whether the home health services requested by a physician are covered by the program and must inform the patient of this determination prior to beginning care.

In the event that Medicare does not agree to pay for care, the agency is not allowed to bill the patient if the care has been represented as covered.

Home health care has been a covered benefit under Medicare since the beginning of the program in 1965. It has steadily increased in popularity as both physicians and patients have come to recognize the commonsense benefits of home treatment. Patients tend to recover more quickly and are less prone to complications when they receive care at home and, since home care currently has no deductions or copayments, the patients

usually have no out-of-pocket expenses for covered care. To request more information about the home health service benefit available under Medicare, call Outreach Health Services at the number below.



Water is second only to oxygen as life's most essential element. We need six to eight glasses of water daily to help ensure good

Water must be replaced frequently because we lose about two and a half quarts daily. In fact, it is necessary for almost every process of the human body. For example, water aids in digestion and circulation, and it helps maintain normal body temperature and healthy skin.

Your body's need for water inwith physical activity. In these situations, it is a good idea to drink 30 minutes. Also, be sure to drink when you feel thirsty. Thirst is a ter. clue that your body needs more

Food also provides water. Most moved. fruits and vegetables are more than 80 percent water. And water cent of meats and poultry.
