## Block scheduling will allow longer class time

Phil Hall, Munday high school and junior high principal, has held two meetings with the public, May 2 and 5, to discuss the proposed block scheduling plan for the 1994-95 school year.

With the State Texas Education Association (TEA) forcing changes, Munday ISD had to look at other scheduling alternatives to assure that a student could take all the classes they both needed and wanted to graduate.

A Block Schedule means simply that students will take three subjects one day and three different subjects the next day if they have band and athletics, and five subjects per day if they do not, switching on alternate days.

All classes will be extended to 85 minutes except band and athletics. They will only last sixty minutes, with twenty-five minutes for study skills class, and will be held every day.

This change would give flexibility to the students. They would have the opportunity to take any class and still participate in extra curricular activities.

It would also improve instruction. The teacher will have a longer period to instruct the class and can use different approaches. Students need to get the best out of every subject that they can. This is great for the classes that use lots of hands-on instruction such as science, biology, ag, etc.

TEA recommends that students have 24 credits to graduate, one more than Munday students are required today. "We need to start moving in that direction now so we will be prepared when more credits are required," Mr. Hall

explained. This block scheduling will help achieve the changes we need.

This week the students will have the opportunity to discuss next year's class schedules and learn more about the block scheduling.

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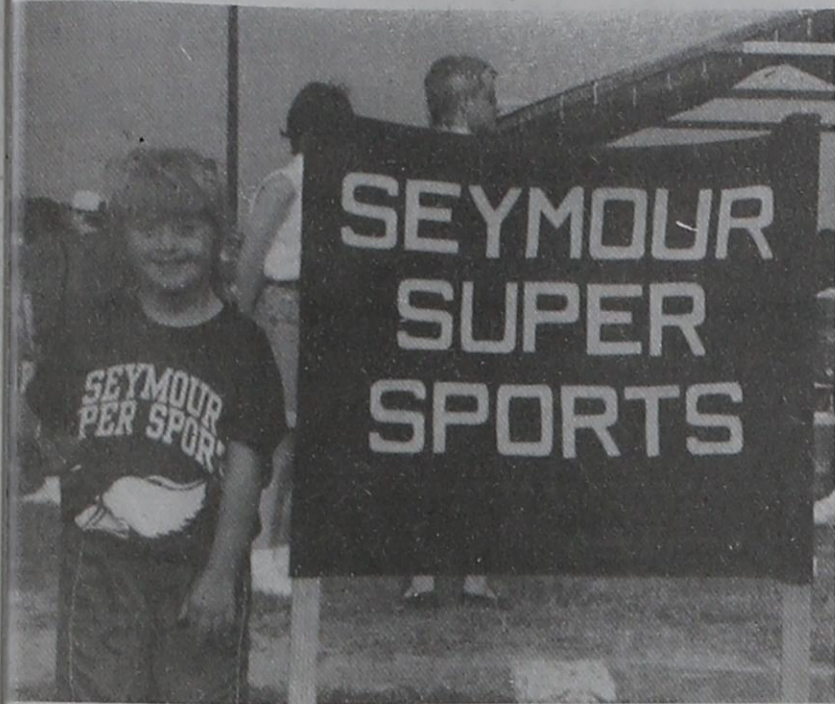

### "On A Wizer Note"

The Knox County Uniform Cotton Planting Date - May 16 - is just around the corner. With the recent rainfall, many fields will have fair to moderate moisture for planting.

One question that many producers have, whether it be wheat, grain sorghum, cotton, etc., is which variety is best for top production. Anyone interested in seeing the results of last year's cotton variety trials may receive this information upon request.

The top five irrigated cotton varieties in Knox County in 1993 included - Paymaster HS26, LA887, Chembred CB830, Chembred CB333, and Paymaster HS200. Data is also available from Baylor, Foard, Haskell, Stonewall and Throckmorton Counties. A five year average can also be calculated for anyone interested.

Every cotton producer knows that chemicals like insecticides and herbicides take the cost of production through the roof. Producers often have concerns about what to do with these empty containers. The Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC), along with the Texas Department of Agriculture and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service conduct a pesticide container collection in many locations throughout Texas.

1994 dates include August 17 in Munday and August 18 in Anson. These collection sites will accept plastic and metal pesticide containers as well as used tires (25 inch rim or less), lead acid batteries, used motor oil and oil filters. Locations for these two collections will be Farmers Grain Co-Op in Munday and Anson Farmers Co-Op in Anson.

The pesticide containers must be thoroughly rinsed - either triple rinsed or high pressure rinsed. TNRCC will be inspecting all containers. Containers not passing inspection will be sent back with the producer.

There are many other summer activities planned that may be of interest. The District 3 4-H Horse Show will be held June 17-18 in Vernon. All 4-H youth interested in attending must complete the

proper entry forms and return them to the Knox County Extension office at P.O. Box 167, Benjamin, TX 79505.

Other 4-H activities include: Teen Leader Lab, ages 13-18, June 22-24; Prime Time, four dates in July, Ages 9-13; and SpecTra, July 31-Aug. 5, ages 13-18. Please notify Jane Rowan in the Knox County Extension office if interested in any of these activities.

Other plans for this summer include implementing four demonstration plots in cotton and peanut production. These include an irrigated and dryland cotton variety plots as well as nutsedge control in peanuts and morning glory control in cotton. These demonstrations will be conducted so that producers can see the different results.

I will spend many hours on Wednesday afternoons visiting these plots. Anyone interested in looking at them with me are welcome. When not visiting these plots, I will spend Wednesdays at the Vegetable Research Station in Munday. This will be an excellent time to visit with anyone who has questions.

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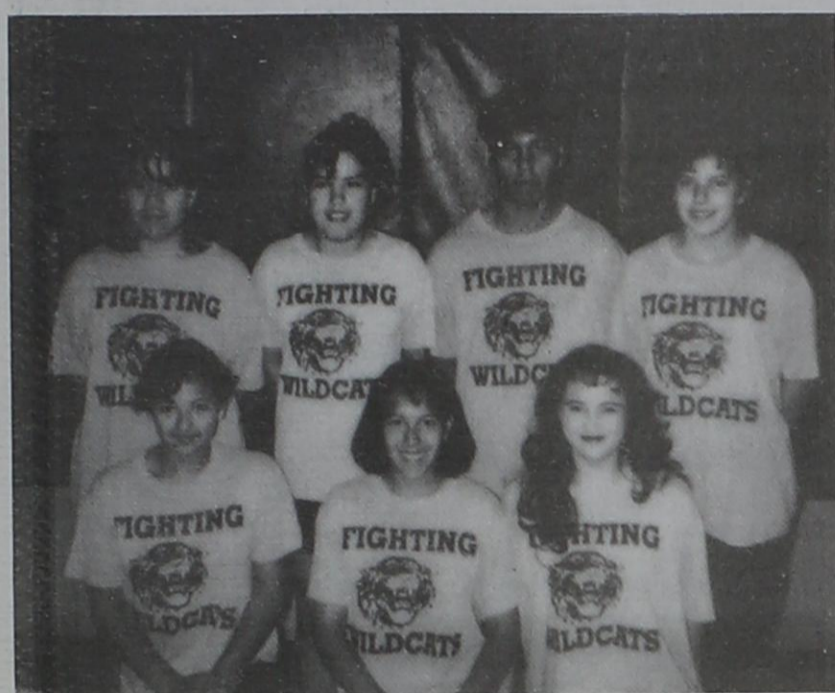

## Property owners to receive 1994 Tax Value Notices

Texas property owners have the right to information about changes in their property's value. On approximately May 15, the Knox County Appraisal District will mail property owners notices showing their 1994 value.

Stanton Brown, chief appraiser of the district, reminds property owners that the notice of appraised value is not a tax bill. "Please do not pay -- this notice is not a tax bill," Brown said.

Brown emphasized the importance of the notice and the key information that it contains. "A property owner has the right to appeal to the Knox County Appraisal Review Board on any disagreement with the property's value, exemptions, ownership and

other areas," he said.

The appraisal review board, more commonly called the "ARB", is an independent panel of citizens responsible for hearing and settling protests from property owners who disagree with some action by the appraisal district.

What should a property owner look for on the notice? "Look at the proposed value for 1994," Brown said. "The notice shows the land's value and any improvement value for the property for the current year." An improvement is a building, structure, fence or any other type of fixture to the land.

The appraisal notice also includes current year information on exemptions granted on the property. It provides last year's value, too.

more than \$1,000, also will include "estimated" taxes. These "estimated" taxes are based on the new value and estimated tax rates if the taxing units set tax rates for the same amount of operating dollars as last year. Generally, taxing units set final 1994 tax rates in August and September.

Brown asks property owners to look carefully at the legal description and mailing address to be sure that there are no mistakes. "If the notice contains an old address, please let the appraisal district know. The post office forwards mail to a new address for

a short time only, and tax bills do not go out until October," Brown added.

A property owner can be liable for additional penalties and interest on a tax bill that is not paid on time. A property owner is responsible for informing the appraisal district of the correct mailing address.

Brown added, "If you did not get a notice and want 1994 information about your property, please call the appraisal district at (817) 454-3891. The general deadline for protesting to the ARB is May 31 for this year."

Q: 1 Corinthians 9:5 mentions "brothers of the Lord". I thought that Jesus was Mary's only child.

A: The concept that Mary had only one child is not found in the Bible. Specially, Jesus had at least four brothers and an unknown number of sisters. Matthew 13:55-56 names four brother of Jesus (James, Joseph, Simon and Judas). This passage also mentions that Jesus had some sisters, as well.

Some have taught that Mary remained a virgin for the rest of her life. This isn't what the Bible says. The scriptures tell us that Joseph did not have relations with his wife until after the birth of Jesus (Matthew 1:24-25). After-

## DID YOU KNOW?

### MEDICARE COVERS HOME HEALTH CARE

Home Health Care is a covered service available to Medicare beneficiaries that often allows a comfortable and welcome alternative to treatment in a hospital or nursing home. Medicare pays for a comprehensive range of health services at home if the patient is eligible for care.

In order for care to be covered, the patient:

- Must be homebound
- Must require either nursing, physical therapy, or speech therapy
- Must need part-time and intermittent care rather than continuous or custodial services
- Must be under the care of a physician
- Must have the care certified by the physician as being medically necessary

Once those conditions are met, the patient may also receive social services, home health aide services, occupational therapy, and needed medical supplies. A home health agency certified to provide Medicare home health services will be able to determine whether the home health services requested by a physician are covered by the program and must inform the patient of this determination prior to beginning care.

In the event that Medicare does not agree to pay for care, the agency is not allowed to bill the patient if the care has been represented as covered.

Home health care has been a covered benefit under Medicare since the beginning of the program in 1965. It has steadily increased in popularity as both physicians and patients have come to recognize the commonsense benefits of home treatment. Patients tend to recover more quickly and are less prone to complications when they receive care at home and, since home care currently has no deductions or copayments, the patients usually have no out-of-pocket expenses for covered care.

## Goree Pre-K students may register next Tuesday afternoon

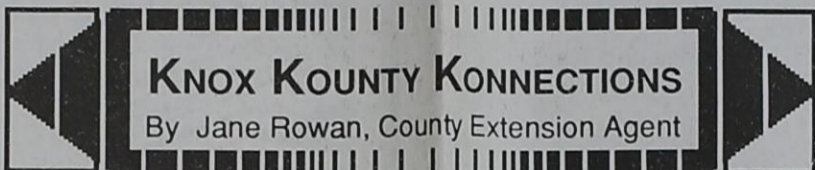

Water is second only to oxygen as life's most essential element. We need six to eight glasses of water daily to help ensure good health.

Water must be replaced frequently because we lose about two and a half quarts daily. In fact, it is necessary for almost every process of the human body. For example, water aids in digestion and circulation, and it helps maintain normal body temperature and healthy skin.

Your body's need for water increases in hot and dry climates and with physical activity. In these situations, it is a good idea to drink a few ounces of water every 15 to 30 minutes. Also, be sure to drink when you feel thirsty. Thirst is a clue that your body needs more fluid.

Food also provides water. Most fruits and vegetables are more than 80 percent water. And water makes up between 60 and 70 percent of meats and poultry.

Beverages that contain caffeine or alcohol are not considered good sources of water because they act as diuretics and speed the loss of fluid. If you do consume them, we recommend also drinking an equal amount of water.

Drinking plain water is the best way to keep your body hydrated. The following beverages are other good sources of water:

- \* Seltzer, unsweetened
- \* Club soda
- \* 100 percent fruit juice
- \* Low-sodium vegetable juice
- \* Artificially sweetened, decaffeinated soft drinks

Remember, water is an essential nutrient - just like vitamins and minerals. In fact, water is the most important nutrient of all. A healthy adult can survive without food for weeks, but just a few days without water.

### Water Tips

Here are some terms you may see in your supermarket's bottled water section:

- \* Drinking water is usually non-carbonated. It may be distilled with minerals added back for taste or simply may be bottled tap water.
- \* Distilled, or purified water is tap water with the minerals removed.
- \* Spring water is bottled at or near the spring where it originates and retains most, if not all, of its natural mineral content.
- \* Sparkling water is carbonated by an outside source.
- \* Naturally sparkling water has enough natural carbon dioxide to make it bubbly. This natural carbon dioxide may be removed at the spring and added back during bottling.
- \* Mineral water contains dissolved minerals. This actually describes all waters except those with minerals removed.

## Early childhood screening offered by Consortium

The Haskell-Knox Consortium will be offering Early Childhood Screening. Eligibility is determined through the results of screening tests and comprehensive assessment of the child's strengths and weaknesses according to criteria established by the Texas Education Agency.

Children who will be three years of age by September 1, 1994, as well as children ages four and five may qualify for the Early Childhood Special Education program on the basis of one or more of the following conditions:

- \* Speech or language disability;
- \* Mental Retardation; Orthopedic Handicapped; Other Health Impaired; Hearing Impairment; Visual Impairment; Deaf/Blind;
- \* Learning Disability; Emotional Disability; Autistic

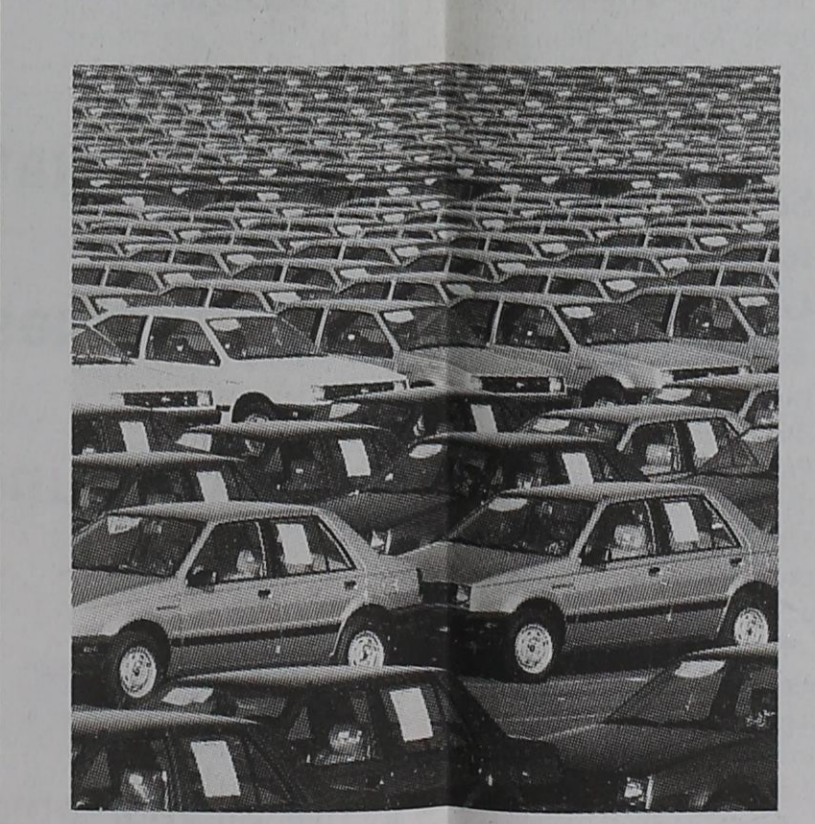

## Rural homes and roads receive 9-1-1 addressing

Knox County went "live" with 9-1-1 Emergency System on November 9, 1991 with ANI (Automatic Number Identifier) with a deadline to upgrade to ALI (Automatic Locator Identifier) by early 1995.

What all these technical terms mean is that now when you call 9-1-1, a calltaker will see a telephone number where the call is coming from. If you are unable to speak the calltaker must trace the call, losing valuable minutes before emergency help can be dispatched. With the automatic locator, an address will come up along with the telephone number.

comes the necessity of rural addressing along with incorporated cities addressing, because it is not possible to send emergency services to a box or route numbers. There must be a physical address.

At this time numbering of all rural county roads is complete and numbering of rural residences has begun. Most of you have probably already been contacted by a 9-1-1 representative and issued a card with a new 4 or 5 digit address number along with a county road number. It is very important to return these cards (retaining the yellow copy for your use) to the 9-1-1 office. This information will go to the telephone company for use with the ALI system, and also be used by the 9-1-1 calltaker for emergency services. The information will also go to the post office for possible later use in rural mail delivery.

These new addresses will not change the service you already receive, be it from Knox County 9-1-1, Haskell County 9-1-1, or Baylor County 9-1-1. It will only speed up the service by making it easier to locate you if you have an emergency.

Knox County 9-1-1 will be installing all new ALI equipment in May in preparation for the changeover of an address enhanced system.

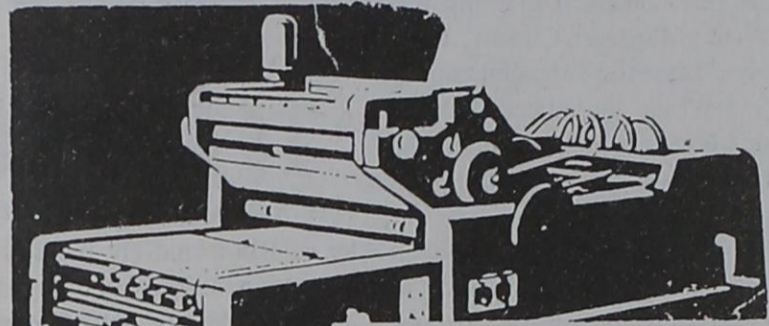

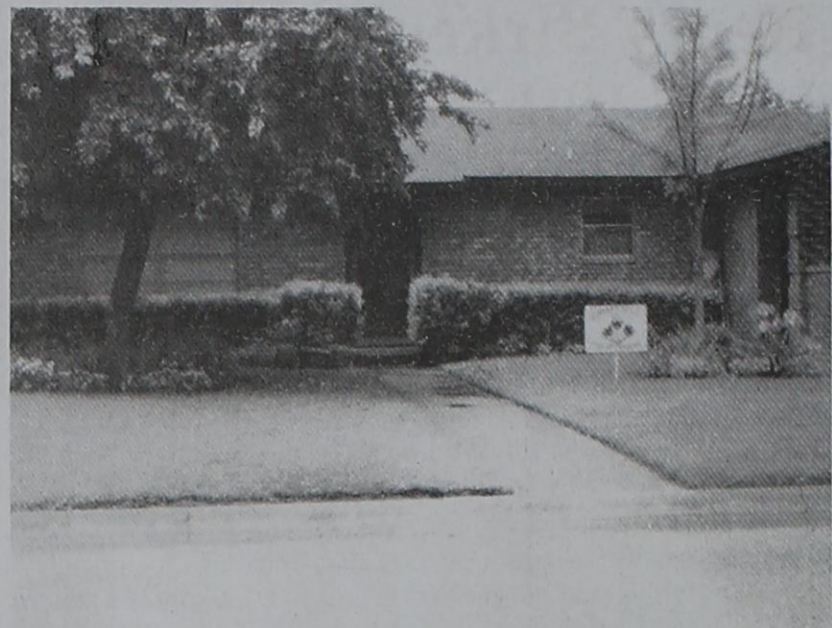

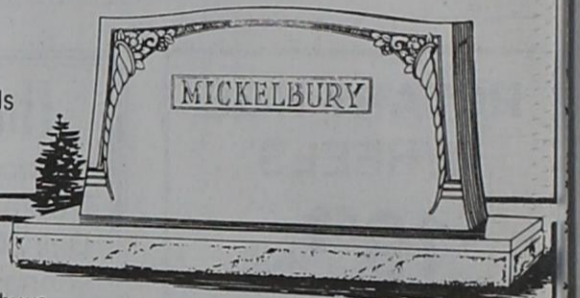
