Petition Circulating County For Dissolution Of Hospital

A petition requesting an election for dissolution of the Knox County Hospital District is circulating in Knox County. It reads as follows:

We, the undersigned, are regis-

tered voters residing in the Knox County Hospital District. Pursuant to Section 286.102 of the Texas Health and Safety Code, we petition the Board of Directors of the Knox County Hospital District to

order an election on the question of dissolving the Knox County Hospital District and disposing of the district's assets and obligations. The number of persons signing this petition is equal to at least 15 percent of the registered voters in the Knox County Hospital District.

Everyone should keep in mind the trickle-down effect it would have on the county if the Knox County Hospital closed. The hospital has a large staff who would be out of a work. Some would have to move elsewhere to find other jobs. Pharmacies would be hurt. Nursing homes would more than likely have to close. Older residents need to be near a hospital for medical care. We would be left with a large, empty building, to be used for who knows what, that would still have to be kept up to pass safety codes for vacated buildings.

It is some comfort knowing in a matter of minutes we can be at a hospital for emergency treatment. Even if the doctors are not immediately available, the hospital is staffed with well trained nurses who can help you before being transferred to a larger hospital.

The taxes we pay for the Knox County Hospital are steep. It's up to you to weigh the pros and cons.

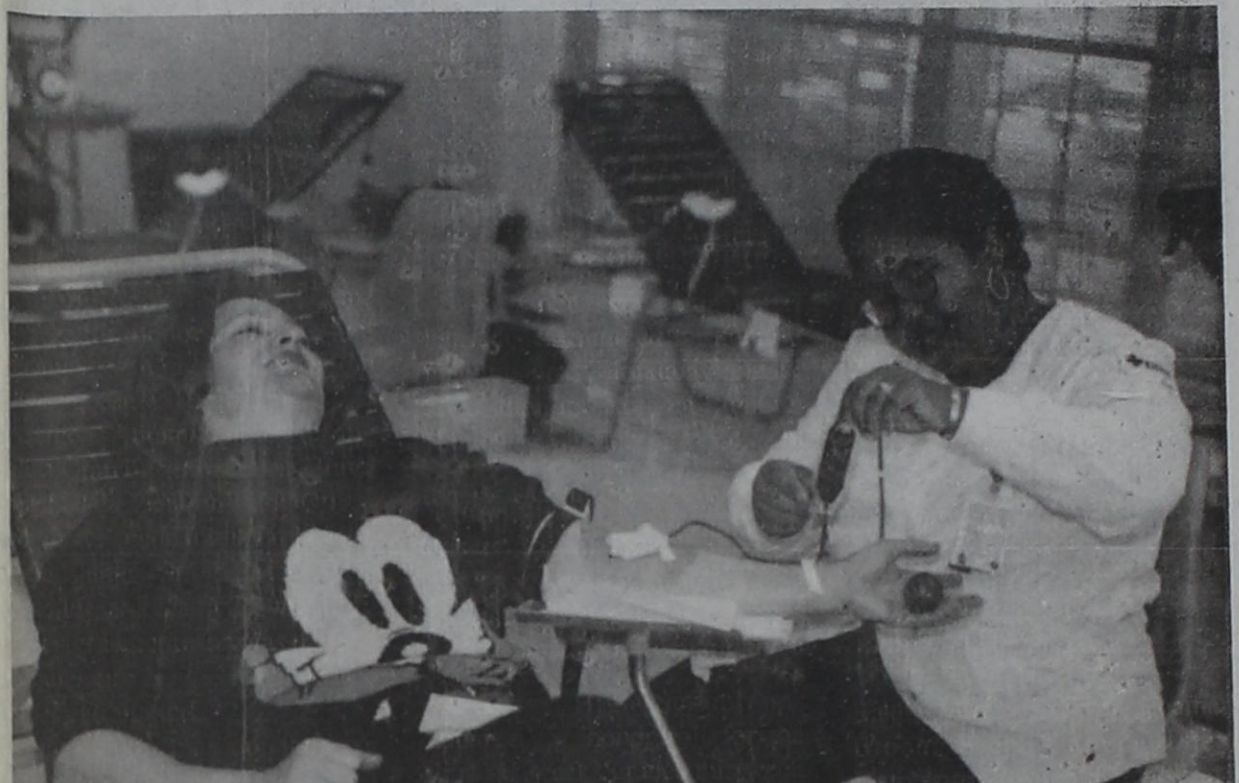

Farm and Ranch Report by Donnie Peters

Pets Should Be Protected During Cold Weather

Now that winter is here, special care, such as shelter and adequate nutrition, should be given to protect family pets from wintertime hazards during the cold months.

Winter temperatures in Texas are not at such extremes that animals accustomed to staying outdoors will be hurt. If the pet can seek shelter that keeps out chilling winds and covers cold ground, it will be adequately protected. I have found that hay or old blankets added to the dog house provide more protection to pets during extreme cold temperatures.

Animals that are never outside or are very old or young should not be kept outdoors.

Healthy animals can tolerate cold weather. More food may be needed because the pets need more calories to produce body heat. The daily water supply also should be checked to make sure the water has not frozen or the pet may suffer. A little warm water is surely accepted by the pet.

Each pet also should have a check-up before cold weather sets in. Animals should be checked for internal parasites and blood parasites such as heartworms, and they should have all needed vaccinations.

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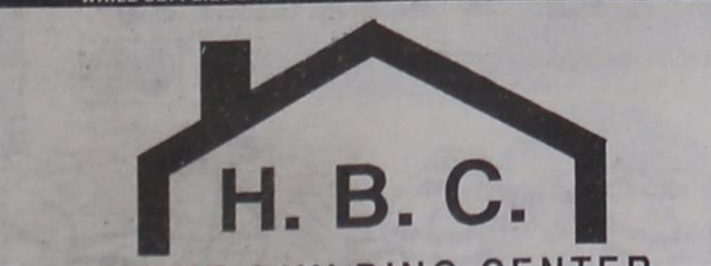

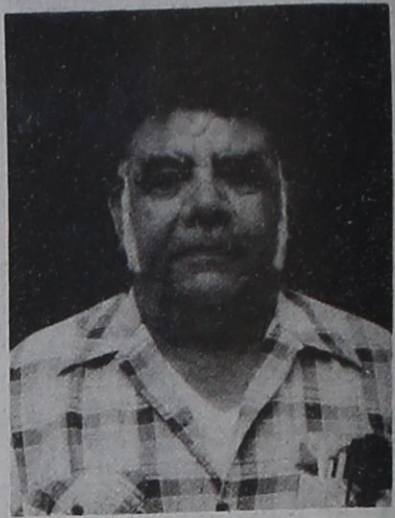

Before the day ended we were ready to go tired and exhausted, swimming like a pro. Many years later Uncle Joe and Aunti moved to Rhineland in the house left by the nuns. Raised rabbits and bees, roses, poppies and mums Aunti caring for flowers and berries of the land was painfully bitten by a rattler on her hand. Some years later she fell and broke her hip, this hospital stay, with pain, was her last trip. Uncle Joe now his own boss, cook & maid when he can't find it, knows tis where he it laid. Nice Dorothy nearby checks on her Dad, Maryann comes and even brings him to Church - not bad Oh, yes, his baby, Lillian from Decatur comes on weekends, sometimes even cleans house and odds and ends. Ordered him a Knights of Columbus pin Dorothy and Ted brought him in. Now his children, Grands and Great Grands, are having a catered meal for all, how grand. Wishing Uncle Joe a beautiful and joyous day, filled with Love on his 100th Birthday.

Q: Is there really any change in a person who becomes a Christian?

A: Yes, those who truly dedicate their lives to Christ are changed. If they lived good moral lives before becoming children of God, the change might not be apparent. Cornelius is a good example of such a convert (Acts 10). He was a devout believer in God who practiced charity and prayed constantly to God even though he was a gentile soldier (verses 1-2). However, his goodness could not save him. He still needed Jesus. Therefore, Peter was sent to Cornelius to teach him the gospel and baptize him into Christ (verses 34-48).

On the other hand, Saul was a persecutor of Christians. When he became a Christian his conversion was so evident that even non-believers noticed (Acts 9:1-22).

The transition from a non-Christian to a Christian is mentioned several times in the Bible. Romans 6:1-13 talks about the fact that we have died to ourselves and have been resurrected (like Jesus) to a new life. Slavery to sin (with

ourselves as rulers) has been traded for freedom in Christ as we voluntarily serve Him.

Only a Christian can live by and in the Spirit which is a real change in conduct, attitude and will (Galatians 5:16; Ephesians 6:18; Colossians 1:8).

This does not mean that you will receive any special feeling or see any special light when you are saved. And you will continue to be tempted. However, you will have God's promise to hear your prayers and to assist you in overcoming problems and burdens (James 1:2-15; Hebrews 2:17-18; 1 Corinthians 10:13).

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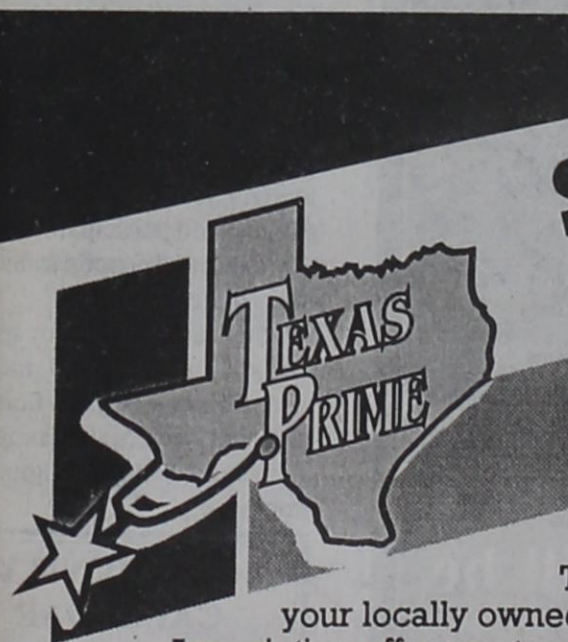

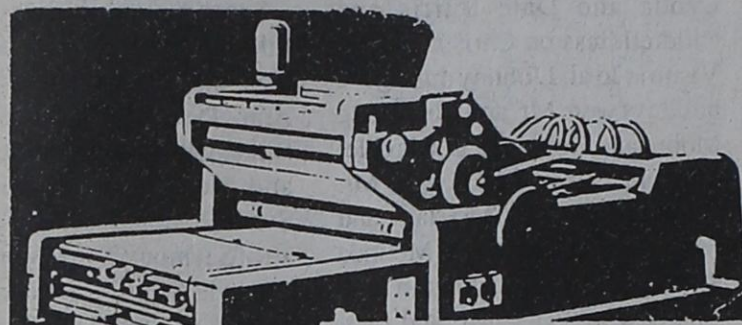

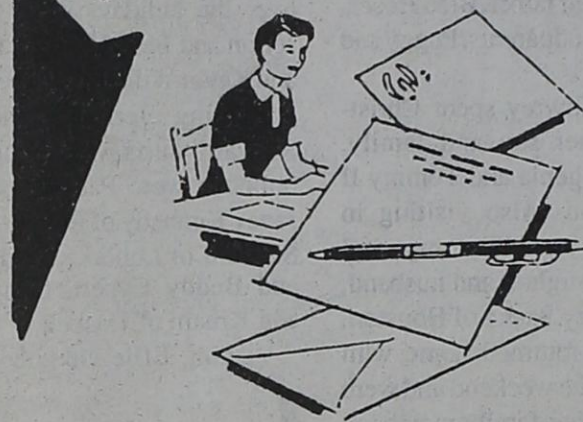
