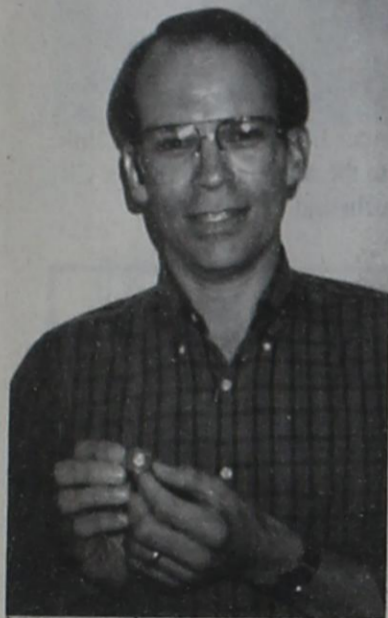

## Eagles Fly By Munday

The Munday Moguls may have been a little out-classed by the class 2A Holliday Eagles. The Eagles soared past the Moguls outscoring the home team 65 to 6. Munday hasn't been beat by that many points in a long time.

Friday night's game opened with Holliday receiving the kickoff and marching down to Munday's three yard line. Holliday's David Twilligear ran in the first of many Eagle touchdowns.

The Mogul's offense had an instant replay of last week's game against Haskell. On their first possession of the ball, the Moguls fumbled on the first play. Holliday recovered the ball on the Mogul 26. Six plays later quarterback Rob McIlhane connected with Chad Caussey for a nine yard touchdown pass and another Eagle touchdown.

Munday was forced to punt on their next possession. Holliday running back Jason Menasco marched passed the Mogul defense on first down from 34 yards out making the score 20 to 0. David Twilligear made the extra point.

The Moguls tried again to move the ball but were unsuccessful. With a penalty after Munday punted, the Eagles were put on their own 34. On second down Holliday fumbled the ball and Mogul Dustin Kiser recovered the ball in the air and ran the ball in for the only Mogul touchdown. The extra point by Vamberto Maia Filho was blocked by the Eagles. The score at the end of the first quarter was Holliday 21, Munday 6.

Holliday received the kickoff and began moving the ball from their own 13. The Eagles made their way down to the Mogul 13 and scored on a run by David Twilligear.

On their next possession the Moguls were forced to punt again. This time the snap was fumbled and Holliday got the ball on the Mogul nine yard line. Two plays later a pass to Cory McClendon and the extra point by Twilligear made the score 35 to 6.

The Moguls once again tried to move the ball but Holliday intercepted a pass by Jake Jordan. One play later Eagle running back Blake Belcher ran the ball in from 12 yards out to make the score 41 to 6. The extra point was unsuccessful.

Munday was unable to move the ball and was forced to punt. This time Holliday's Chad Caussey blocked the punt by Matt Angerer and recovered the ball on the Mogul 17. Five plays and a couple of penalties later Rusty Gann ran the ball in for another Eagle touchdown. At half time the score was Holliday 48, Munday 6.

The second half started out just as bad for the Moguls. After receiving the kickoff the Moguls had to punt three plays later. The snap went over the punter's head and Holliday got the ball on the Mogul 19 yard line. Holliday then scored after three plays on a 15 yard run by Jason Menasco. Twilligear kicked the extra point making the score 55 to 6.

On the Moguls' next possession Gene Shields ran a reverse for an 11 yard run. Ray Hernandez ran

the ball on the next two plays to get the Moguls close to another first down. Aaron Kiser and Jake Jordan tried on third and fourth downs to make the first but were unsuccessful. The Mogul defense held the Eagles to four downs. Holliday attempted a field goal but was unsuccessful.

The Moguls got the ball on their own 37 yard line. The Holliday defense forced the Moguls backwards and to another punt. The Munday defense was finally looking like it should as it held Holliday for a punt.

The Moguls started moving the ball from their own 21 yard line with a couple of passes from Ronnie Whitfield and one from running back Bronco Flye. Gene Shields caught one for 13 yards and Ray Hernandez another. On the pass to Hernandez the ball was brought back to the Mogul 38 because of a penalty. Two plays later Skyler Kowalick of Holliday intercepted another Munday pass to stop the Mogul drive.

The Moguls drove the Eagles up once again forcing the Eagles to try for a field goal which was blocked by Munday's Jay Nuckols. Two plays later the Moguls fumbled, and the ball was recovered by W. E. Parish of Holliday. The Eagles were unable to put the ball in the end zone so they tried another field goal. David Twilligear kicked the ball in to make the score 58 to 6.

Munday had another pass intercepted on their next possession by Robert Homer on the Mogul 29. The Eagles final touchdown was by David Twilligear from 16 yards out. Twilligear kicked the extra point making the score 65 to 6.

### COACH'S COMMENTS

We were totally defeated by a real good football team. They made us make mistakes. We contributed to nearly all of their scores.

In the second half some of the kids played harder. Ray Hernandez and Dustin Kiser played real tough football.

It will be hard to overcome the mental letdown after a game like this. We will try to put this behind us and prepare for the Throckmorton game.



## 911 Coming To Knox County

In the near future you will be able to dial 9-1-1 for 24-hour emergency service in Knox County. At this time, offices for 9-1-1 are being readied at the Knox County Hospital with equipment arriving daily and calltakers being trained to handle medical, fire and police emergencies.

Within the next few days, all post office boxholders within the county and parts of Haskell County will be receiving a questionnaire from 9-1-1 personnel asking for information about your family and household. These questionnaires are designed to aid the calltakers in helping you in case of an emergency at your residence or business.

Information requested includes any medi-

cal problems you or your family may have, fire and police information which includes number of family members, type of house or business structure, utilities, and directions to your residence. This information is vital in case it becomes necessary for emergency units to be dispatched to your location. All information will be kept confidential.

Local papers will keep you informed of progress and on-line dates for 9-1-1 calltaking.

Thank you for taking time to complete this questionnaire and helping to make your 9-1-1 service successful. By working together, our communities can be assured of receiving prompt emergency assistance when seconds count.

## FmHA County Offices Consolidate To Reduce Costs To Government

Bobby G. Cude, County Supervisor for Farmers Home Administration in Knox City, has notified the news office that, in accordance with recent directives and government-wide attempts to reduce costs, Farmers Home Administration has closed several county offices throughout the nation. In Texas' District III, the Wichita Falls County Office consolidated with the Vernon County Office, and the Foard County Office, which had been serviced from the Wilbarger County Office, consolidated with the Knox County

Office. This move increased the Knox/Foard County caseload by 92 borrower cases. All loanmaking and servicing will be done from the Knox County Office in Knox City.

Cude said that the Crowell Ag-Service Center is the location of the Foard County sub-office. The County Supervisor and Assistant County Supervisor will be in Crowell each Monday from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. for Foard County borrowers. Knox County borrowers should take note that the Supervisors will be unavailable to them on these days. The new phone number for the Foard County Office is (817) 684-1730.

Knox County borrowers will continue to see the County Supervisor and Assistant County Supervisor at the Knox City office on Wednesday of each week from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The supervisor stated further that FmHA employees in the Knox City office are making diligent efforts to keep the work on schedule with the increased workload and appreciate the patience of the borrowers and applicants of both counties.

The Fernandez family invites everyone to stop by and try their delicious Mexican food.

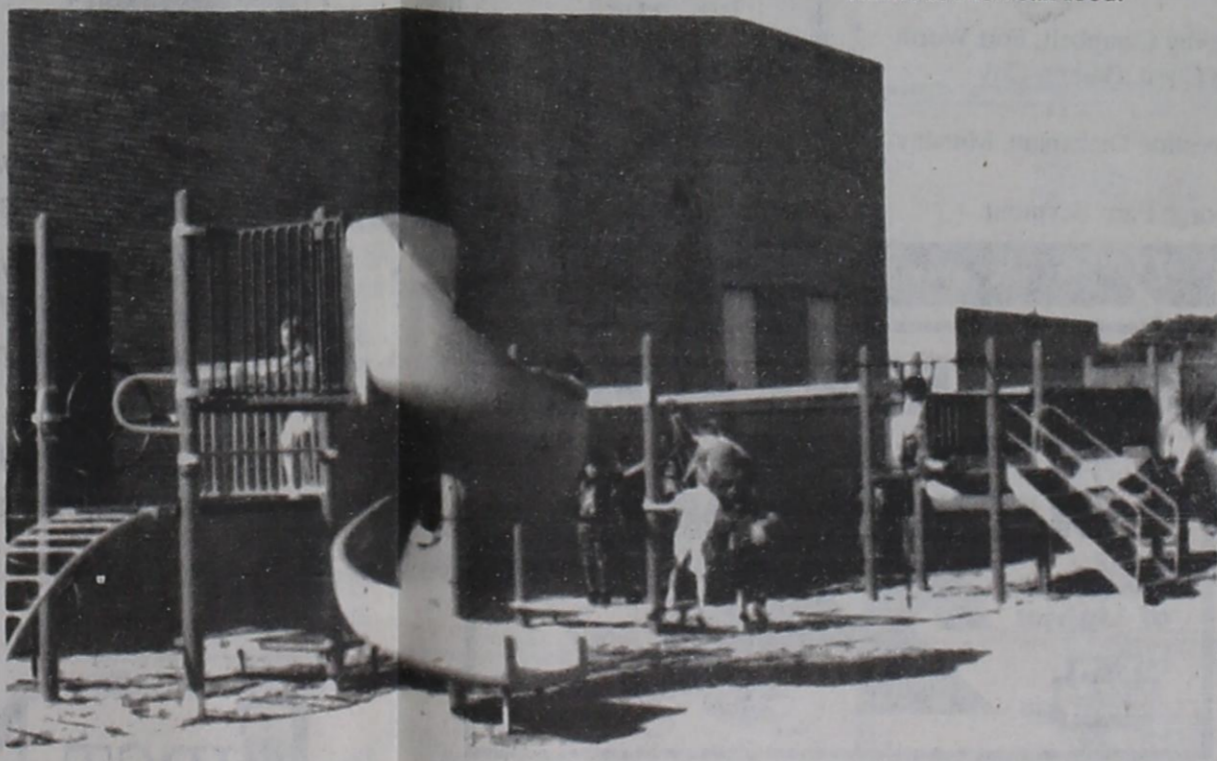
## Mogulettes Run At ACU Cross Country Meet

**Funeral Services Held Monday For Everett Thompson**

Everett Thompson, 80, a long-time Munday resident, died Saturday, September 5, 1992 in Wichita General Hospital.

Services were held at 3:00 p.m. Monday, September 7, at First Baptist Church with Dr. Pete Bradford and Rev. Mike Thompson, Everett's nephew of Cleburne, officiating. Burial was in Johnson Memorial Cemetery, just a few yards away from his family farm, under the direction of McCauley-Smith Funeral Home.

Mr. Thompson, a retired wholesale gas and oil dealer and farmer, was born April 19, 1912 in Haskell County to Clarence Milton and Eula Lee Thompson. They moved to Munday in January, 1929, and he attended Munday High School, graduating in 1932. Later he saw all of his children and grandchildren graduate from M.H.S. He attended Draughtons Business College in Wichita Falls.

He married Elizabeth Stewart, daughter of Tom C. and Grace Stewart of Haskell, on December 4, 1937 in Munday. Typical of their interest in sports, they attended a football game in Wichita Falls on their wedding day.

He became a member of Smith Chapel Baptist Church at age thirteen, and joined the First Baptist Church in Munday in January, 1929, being ordained as a deacon on February 26, 1961. He was a World War II veteran and a member of the Johnson Memorial Cemetery Board.

Survivors include his wife, Elizabeth; two daughters, Linda Beth Jackson and Nancy Gwyn Cypert; one son-in-law, Mickey Jackson, all of Munday; two sisters, Inez Ragsdale of Ft. Worth and Weona Nielsen of Rusk; one brother, Rev. Milton Thompson of Arlington; four grandchildren, Johnny Wayne Jackson of Munday, Everett Scott Jackson of Wichita Falls, Debbie Kay Holland of Lubbock, and Holly Lin Jackson of Abilene; and one great-granddaughter, Samantha Beth Jackson.

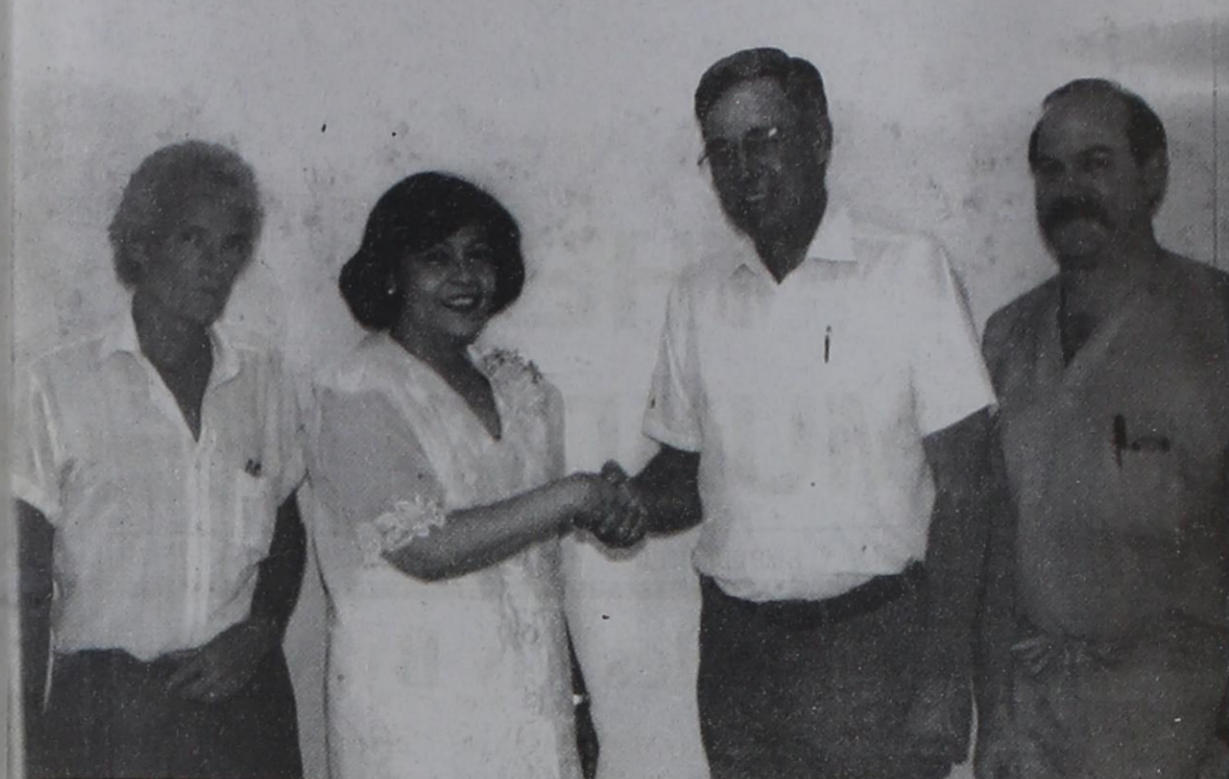

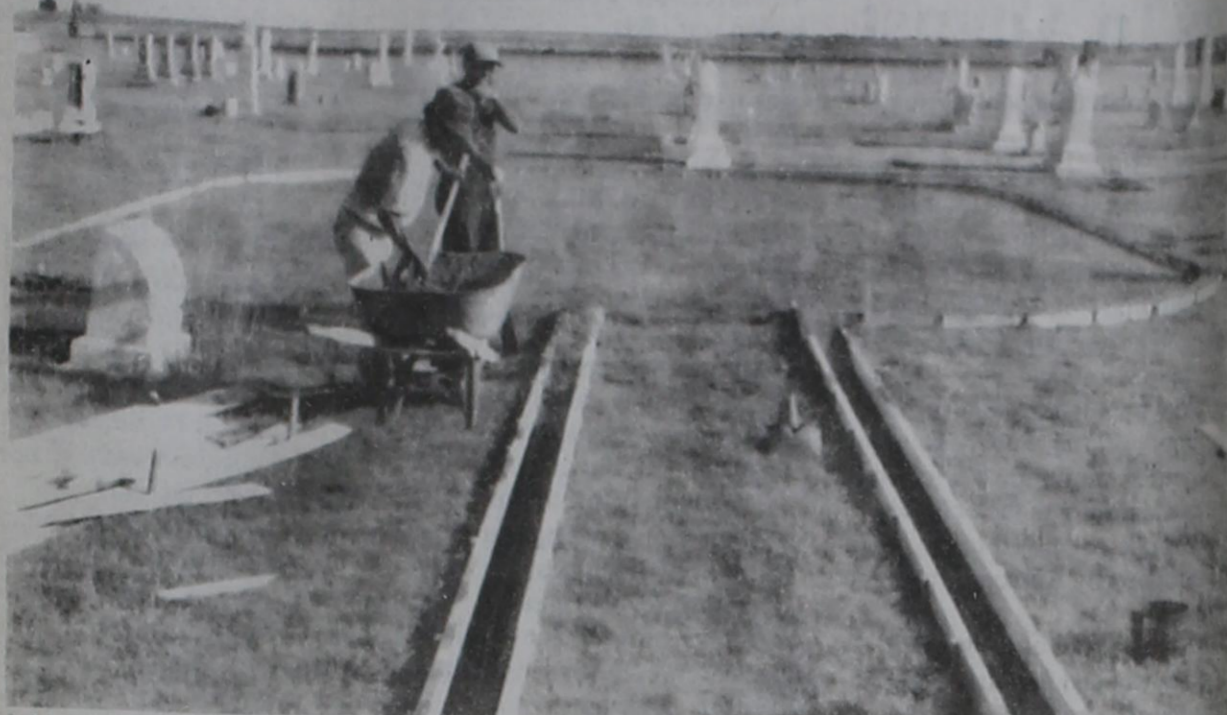

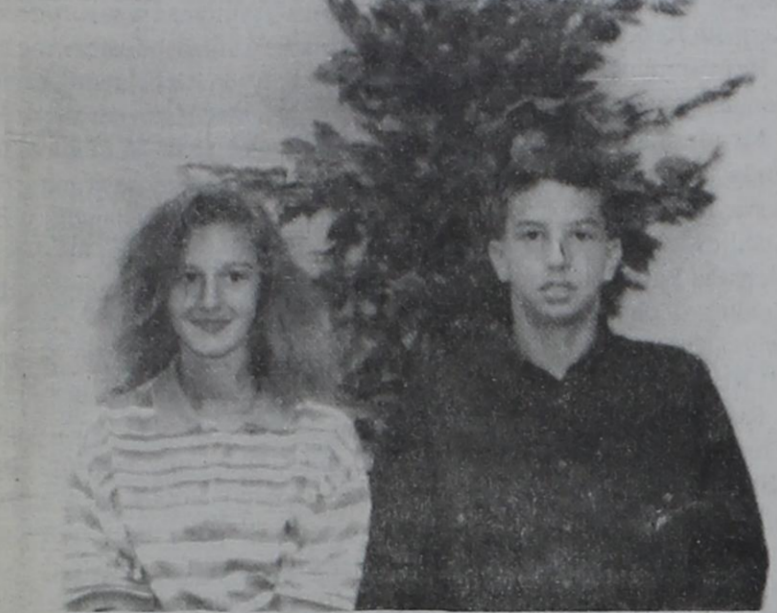

### AUGUST 11, 1992 REGULAR SESSION

Harmon Cable had requested changes to the Franchise Agreement passed and approved by the Council at the July 14 meeting. These changes were discussed by the Council. Motion by Oustad to grant these changes to the agreement was seconded by Tidwell with all for.

Employee reports were given to the Council. No action was required. Employees were discussed. Police officer Billy Scogins was considered for full employment status. Officer Scogins has successfully completed the standard six months probationary period. Also discussed at this time was the increased workload and responsibilities placed on Officer Scogins during the last six weeks. Matthews made the motion to grant him full employment status and to adjust his salary accordingly. In addition, in consideration for the extra workload and responsibilities that have been placed upon him, that he be appointed Chief of Police for the City of Munday and that the previous Chief of Police be relieved of those duties, to be repositioned as Clerk for the City of Munday with the appropriate salary adjustments included. This motion was seconded by Andrade with all members in favor.

The City Council discussed the vandalism at Lake Creek Golf Course and authorized the issuance of a reward leading to the arrest and conviction of the per-

son or persons responsible for this action.

### AT YOUR SERVICE

Q: What is the "gift of the Spirit" mentioned in Acts 2:38?

A: Acts 2:38 tells us that if we repent and are baptized for the forgiveness of our sins, then we will receive the "gift of the Holy Spirit."

When recording this event, Luke placed the term "Holy Spirit" in the genitive case. If the subjective genitive is accepted, then the verse means "some THING which the Holy Spirit gives. If the appositive genitive is the case, then the verse should be translated "the gift which is the Holy Spirit (Himself)."

The best translation is the latter. In Acts 10:45, Luke tells us that the Jews with Peter were surprised "that on the Gentiles also was poured out the gift of the Holy Spirit," and then in verse 47 Peter states that Cornelius (and relatives) had "received the Holy Spirit" and to the Jerusalem church, Peter reported "the Holy Spirit fell on them, just as He did upon us at the beginning" (Acts 11:15).

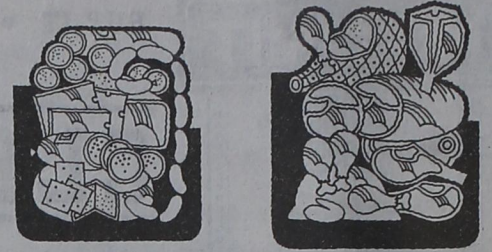




