Local ranchers lend hand to West Texas Rehab

Three Knox County gentlemen are lending a hand to disabled children and adults by serving as Knox County Chairmen for the West Texas Rehabilitation Center's 1998 Cattlemen's Round-Up. Larry Thompson, Gary Wilde and David Albus have agreed to help the program through which concerned persons donate cattle, sheep, goats, horses, cash, or handmade items to be sold at special auctions during September and October. (Even an occasional pen of ducks, chickens, or geese makes its way into the auction ring.)

Proceeds from these sales help West Texas Rehabilitation Center provide outpatient services to more than 17,000 disabled children and adults each year. Last year 23 persons from Knox County were served at the Rehab Center and 25 were seen in the first seven months of 1998.

The first Round-Up event was held in San Angelo on September 17 with sales scheduled to follow on September 29 beginning at 1:00 at the Abilene Livestock Auction; Coleman on October 7; Stephenville, October 14; Eastland, October 20; and Junction on October 26.

Federal Land Bank Association and Texas Production Credit and Rolling Plains Production Credit

Associations are \$10,000 underwriters for the Round-Up, and Wrangler has added a \$5,000 contribution to the effort.

Joining the volunteers from Knox County are approximately 150 Cattlemen's Round-Up volunteers, including Big Country Chairman Mike Alexander of Abilene, Concho Valley Chairman Carter Behrens of San Angelo, and Honorary National Chairman Rex Allen. They are assisting this 39th annual Round-Up by promoting sales and asking their neighbors to join them in donating to this year's drive.

Although the focus of the sales occurs in September and October, Cattlemen's Round-Up is a year-round program. Most auction barns are willing to cut a check to the Rehab Center anytime an animal is sold.

Persons wanting to donate livestock or those needing to arrange for hauling of animals may contact the Rehab Center, (951) 793-3509 or 793-3512. Larry Thompson, who can be reached at 422-4938 and David Albus, 658-3926, have both volunteered their livestock pens for holding areas

Moguls shocked by Quannah in non-district competition

Munday prepares to get back on winning track against Hawley

The Munday Moguls were soundly defeated by a surprisingly fast and talented Quannah Indian Football team this past Friday night in Quannah by a score of 44 to 12.

Munday was held to only 6 total yards offense and no first downs in the entire first half of play as the Moguls were unable to move the ball against the well prepared and tenacious Indian defense.

The Moguls managed a third quarter score as Brandon Sosa hit Eric Beaty in the end zone for an eight yard touchdown pass, and Wesley Spells gathered in another Sosa pass in the fourth quarter of play and raced for 57 yards to pay dirt to finish the scoring for the Munday Moguls.

According to Munday Head Coach Steve Gunter,

"We missed some early scoring opportunities by not getting the ball to a wide open receiver, and not being able to run the ball, by

missing some blocking assignments, and that caused us to get our heads down in the first half...and not doing well on offense will influence your defensive game too." Coach Gunter also said that the Indians gave them some totally new looks that they had not seen before on any scouting reports, and that defensively our line backers were having some trouble at first with the adjustments.

Coach Gunter's Comments: "I felt like we were not emotionally or mentally ready to play last Friday night. I thought we missed a couple of good opportunities offensively early in the game that might have got us going. We didn't execute anything offensively the first half, defensively, we gave up too many big plays mainly because of poor tackling. I thought we had some chances early in the game to make some big plays, but we didn't tackle. To

Quannah's credit they did a great job controlling the line of scrimmage on both sides of the ball. I think our team realizes we all could have been better prepared. I definitely think we will bounce back with a great effort this week against Hawley. Hawley is a young team that has shown a lot of improvement since their first two outings. We will be facing an offense similar to Quannah's offense and we must do a better job defensively if we are going to win this Friday. Look for Hawley to make the most of their big tight end #40 and we expect to see a great effort from the Hawley quarter back #20."

The Moguls played the Quannah game minus their leading rusher Brian Urbanczyk who was out with bursitis in his knee. Brian is expected to see action this Friday night with the the kickoff in Hawley at 8:00 pm.

Bell, Bobby Dee

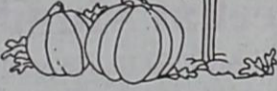

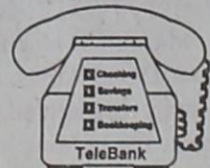
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O'Brien prepares for big Homecoming weekend

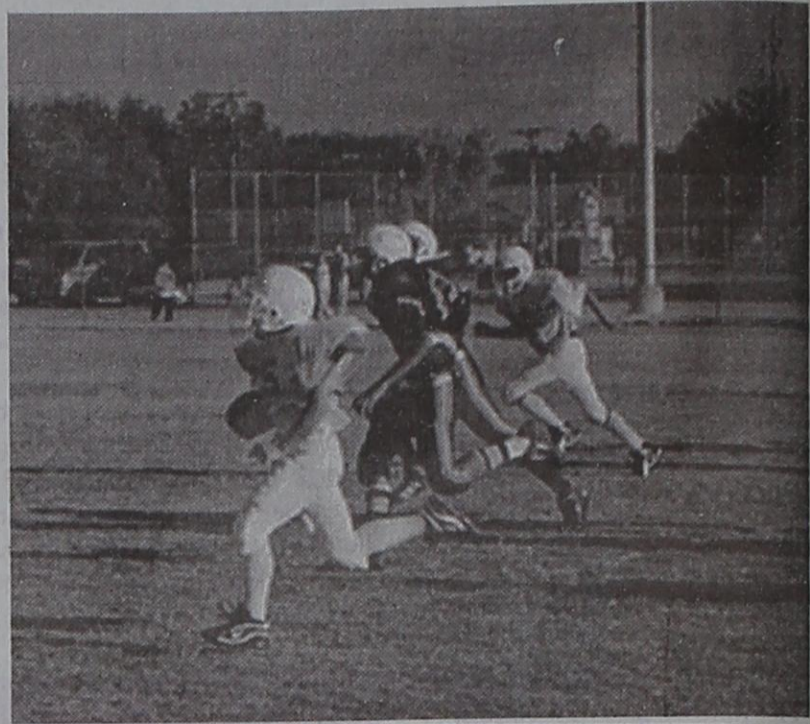
Paymaster reports on first cotton ginned

The cotton belonged to Bobby Raynes. It was dryland cotton from seven acres and had been defoliated the week before with 1/3 pint of Cyclone.

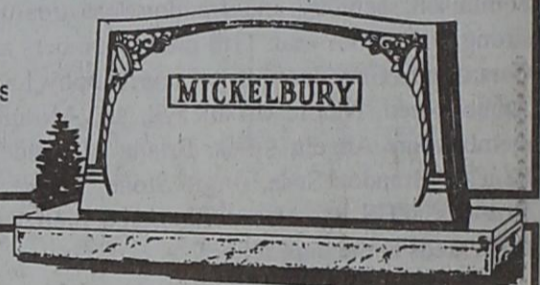

"Well, I'll come, but I don't think it's gonna do no good as long as the wind is out of the southwest," he said.

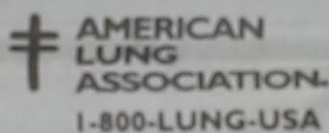

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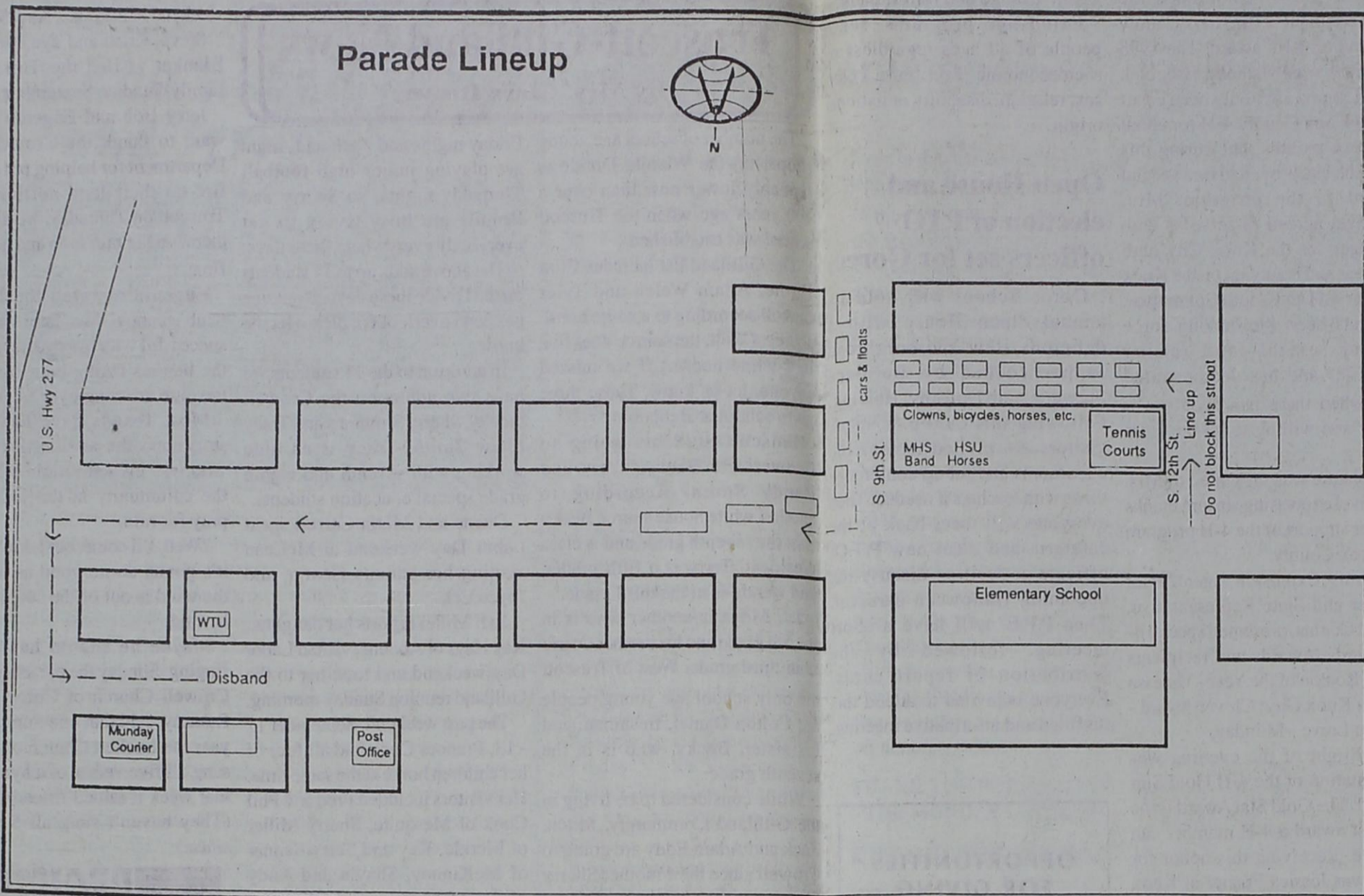
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Cross Country in full stride

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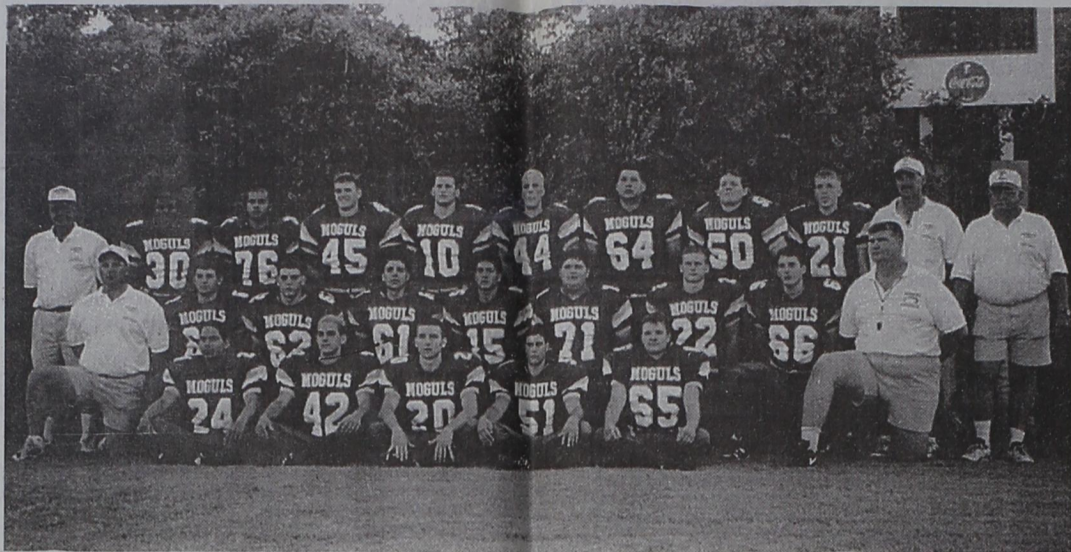
