Exit Tests
scheduled

The summer administration of the exit level TAAS and TEAMS tests will be conducted at 8:30 a.m. in the high school libraries of the Benjamin, Goree, and Munday high schools on the following dates:

July 15 - Writing (TAAS only)

July 16 - Mathematics

July 17 - Reading

Students who were in the tenth, eleventh, or twelfth grades in the spring of 1997 are eligible to take any section of the exit level test that they have not yet mastered. In addition, individuals who are out of school may test at the summer administration.

Out-of-town examinees and enrolled students who wish to test at a site other than their home district must register. Students who were enrolled in grade twelve in the spring of 1997 are considered enrolled students, not out-of-school examinees.

All TEAMS examinees, whether enrolled or out of school, must register. Examinees may pick up a registration packet at the high school principal's office at Benjamin, Goree, or Munday High School.

The test registration form must be completed and returned in the pre-addressed envelope and must be received in Iowa City, Iowa, no later than 5:00 p.m., June 13, 1997.

Senate passes new Bill Weevil Program

AUSTIN - Senator Tom Haywood, today voted in favor of a measure that would reinstate the controversial Boll Weevil Eradication Program. By a vote of 30 - 0, the Texas Senate passed the bill in hopes that this new and improved version will pass constitutional muster. The original Boll Weevil Eradication Program was ruled unconstitutional by the Texas Supreme Court last month.

"I believe that we have structured this bill in such a way that will gain court approval. With cotton planting season upon us, it is imperative that we get this done as soon as possible," Haywood said. "Senator Duncan deserves much of the credit for tackling this

problem from the beginning and focusing our attention on fixing it quickly."

The Bill Weevil Eradication Bill will place ultimate authority with the Commissioner of Agriculture, instead of a private entity, in order to comply with the Supreme Court ruling. Another new provision of the program is the establishment of an advisory committee to be organized in each zone and will consist of one producer from each county in that zone. This committee will advise the Agriculture Commissioner on decisions to be made concerning each zone.

"The creation of the Zone Advisory Committees will give each county real representation and a

voice in the decision making process," Haywood said. "I know the producers in the western six counties of the proposed Northern Rolling Plains Zone have real concerns about the program, while those in the eastern six counties are in favor of the program. Through the Advisory Committee, they can recommend to the Agriculture Commissioner the Northern Rolling Plains Zone be split, if that is what they decide."

Another new provision is the ability of counties to move from one zone to another with approval of a producer referendum in the individual county. The Agriculture Commissioner has the authority to

New area codes for 817 area begins May 25, 1997

GTE reminds customers the new area codes for much of the present 817 area code become effective May 25, 1997.

The Fort Worth metropolitan area will retain the 817 area code. The northern portion of the present 817 area will be in the new 940 area code. This includes most of Denton, Wise and Palo Pinto counties, and the counties north of these areas that are presently in the 817 area, and small parts of Parker and Stephens counties.

The southern portion of the present 817 area, including the extreme southern part of Palo Pinto County, most of Stephens County, and the southern portion of Hood County will be in the new 254 area code.

The new 940 and 254 area codes

will go in service May 25, 1997. A three month permissive dialing period will allow customers to receive calls dialed to their former area code callers of the change to allow time to have any telephone equipment that stores or analyzes telephone numbers to be reprogrammed, and to change letterheads, advertisements and other printed materials.

Beginning August 24, 1997, the new area code must be dialed for the call to complete to the party being called. Callers dialing the incorrect area code between August 24 and September 21 will receive a recording telling them the area code has changed or they cannot complete the call as dialed, or in some cases, they may reach another party who has been assigned

the number in the 817 area. GTE service areas remaining in the 817 area code are Azle, Grapevine, Keller, Reno and Springtown.

GTE locations going to the 940 area code are Argyle, Aspermont, Bartonville, Benjamin, Denton, Haskell, Holliday, Justin, Kamay, Knox City, Megargel, Munday, Pilot Point, Rochester, Rule, Seymour, Throckmorton, Tioga and Weinert.

GTE customers changing to the new 254 area code are located in Burlington, Bynum, Chilton, Crawford, Cross Plains, Dawson, Glen Rose, Hubbard, Irene, Lott, Malone, May, Morgan, Mount Calm, Riesel, Rising Star, Rogers, Rosebud, Walnut Springs and Whitney.

City Council meets
in regular session

The City Council of the City of Munday met April 8, 1997 at the Munday City Hall.

Members present: Mayor Gary Tidwell and Council members Jessie Andrade, Bob Bowen, Danny Owens and Jay White.

Mayor Tidwell called the meeting to order at 7:02 p.m. and ordered the reading of the previous minutes. The minutes of the March 11, 1997 Special Session were approved as read on a Bowen motion, Owens second, with all for.

Chris Moore gave an informative briefing to the Council on various investment options available to the City that are within the constraints of the Public Funds Investment Act. The information will be used to finalize the City's written policy concerning authorized investments.

Mayor Tidwell then ordered the City's May 3, 1997 election cancelled. Only three candidates filed for the three open seats. The three candidates will be sworn into office at the Regular May meeting.

A Municipal Maintenance Agreement with TxDOT which designates each organizations re-

sponsibilities was approved on an Andrade motion, Bowen second, with all for.

A discussion followed concerning a possible annual festival that could be established in Munday. All talks are in the preliminary stages in planning for a possible project in 1998. Hopefully a joint effort headed by the Development Corporation of Munday, Inc., the Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, and the City can be put together. More information will become available as planning and meetings progress.

The monthly financial report was heard. No voting action required.

The status of the new wastewater treatment plant was briefed. The dirt work at the new site is approximately ninety percent complete. The pipeline and lift station improvements could possibly be completed by the end of April. No major maintenance problems currently exist on any other equipment or facilities. It was noted that the sealcoat and paving project should commence on or about

The new area codes will not change 9-1-1 service, directory assistance, when long-distance charges apply or local service rates. However, callers will need to dial the area code plus the seven-digit telephone number when placing local calls between area codes, such as dialing toll-free using extended area service or expanded local calling services.

GTE does not anticipate any problems with the change of codes, but said GTE residential or one and two-line business, customers having any problems should contact GTE 1-800-483-1000. Businesses with three or more lines should contact 1-800-483-2000.

The need for new area codes indicates the continued dynamic

economic growth of Texas, as well as growth in telephone services such as wireless, pagers, fax machines and computer lines. The Dallas area opened a new 972 area code to suburban Dallas cities in September 1996, and a new 281 area code began serving the suburban Houston area in November 1996.

In addition to the new codes for 817 customers, two new codes will be added in the 210 area code July 7, 1997. The San Antonio metro area will retain the 210 area code. The northern section of the present 210 area code will change to a 830 area code while those in the southern part of existing 210 area will change to a 956 area code.

Fungicide okayed for control of ergot in Texas grain sorghum

The Texas Department of Agriculture, acting on a request from the Texas Grain Sorghum Association, has issued a crisis exemption for use of propiconazole on grain sorghum to control ergot. The product, Tilt fungicide, can effectively control the new disease and can now be used in all sorghum-producing counties in Texas.

The disease, sorghum ergot or *Claviceps africana*, is a fungal infection of sorghum. The disease, which has been prevalent in Africa and Asia for decades, finally made its way to Texas this year. The U.S. sorghum industry has been closely tracking the disease since its spread to the Western Hemisphere two years ago. Scientists have documented its northward movement and predicted the movement of this disease into Texas.

"When the disease was found in South Texas, the Texas Grain Sorghum Association and the National Grain Sorghum Producers were ready to go with a request for an exemption so that Tilt could be used to control the disease," said Travis Taylor, executive director of the association. "We asked the Texas Department of Agriculture to issue the exemption and they worked very quickly to get it through."

"We really appreciate the way TDA handled our request, because

now the product can be used immediately to treat infected commercial seed production in the Rio Grande Valley and South Texas," he said. "Being able to treat sorghum produced for hybrid seed so quickly ensures a safe, clean supply of seed for next year."

"We know that every other major sorghum-producing country in the world has the disease and that Asia and Africa have had the disease for a long time," Taylor said. "Because of the experience of other countries, we are confident that it will not be a significant problem for farmers in Texas."

Taylor said that the risk of getting ergot in sorghum produced for grain - which accounts for almost all sorghum produced in Texas - is extremely low. That's because these sorghums are self-fertilizing and are not likely to be affected by ergot. When fertilization occurs in a rapid fashion, as it does in commercial hybrids, it prevents infection, even when disease spores are present. He pointed out that sterile forage sorghums are highly susceptible to the disease, but only when they are allowed to head. However, producers must be sure that they manage their forage correctly to lower the risk of infection.

TDA has also submitted a request to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency for a specific exemption for the product. This will allow the crisis exemption to remain in effect until EPA makes a decision on the specific exemption application.

"Some restrictions apply to the use of this product and we encourage producers to carefully follow the rules provided by TDA," Taylor said.

"On A Wizer Note"

This has been a year to remember. January, February, and March went by without notice -- but that is only because as a County Extension Agent, I spend those months working with 4-H Stock show projects. However, April opened our eyes.

The freeze, around the 10th and 11th, really woke us up and let us know how much control Mother Nature really has. This freeze has been followed by relatively cool, wet weather -- perfect for wheat production if it has not been killed by a late freeze.

But wheat fields are not the only places that damage has been found. Freeze damage has been noticed in lawns, gardens and trees as well as wheat. It has also been a good spring for disease.

Lawns and trees have been getting hit by all types of diseases. Fungal diseases have been the most prevalent. However, there have been a few gardens his by viral diseases.

Viral diseases are irreversible. Once you begin seeing signs of a viral disease in your garden, it is best to destroy all diseased plants and apply an insecticide.

Why an insecticide? Doesn't that kill bugs? What does it have to do with viral disease?

Yes, an insecticide is a chemical that kills or controls an insect pest. The reason it is an important part in viral disease control is because viral diseases are transferred from one plant to another by insects with biting, chewing or sucking mouth part. This is very similar to Malaria being transferred by mosquitoes.

Most cotton farmers can tell you how thrips are a very big nuisance to a young cotton field. Thrips

thrive very well in wheat. When the wheat begins to dry, the thrips look for a new host. This happens to be the same time that cotton is being planted.

Recently, some gardens have been showing signs of thrip damage and viral diseases. Thrips may be a big pest to gardens from now until the cotton begins to grow. That is because of all the wheat fields that have been mowed for hay or are no longer green due to the April freeze. These two instances have caused a massive movement of thrips.

So how can a person tell if they have a viral disease or a fungal disease? Fungal diseases will usually cause circular color patterns. Viral diseases will have a mosaic color pattern. Occasionally a viral disease may have some spots. However, this is from the feeding

Cooperatives find proposed Deregulation Bill may not be in best interest of consumers

Texas' electric cooperatives contend that a proposal to deregulate the electric utility industry by 2001 may not be in the best interest of electric cooperative consumers.

The co-ops are concerned that several key elements of the draft bill are not fully understood and they say that more time is needed to review them, according to Mike Williams, president of Texas Electric Cooperatives, the statewide association that represents the 75 distribution cooperatives and 11 generation and transmission cooperatives.

"Dramatic changes are being proposed that will impact how the electric industry in Texas operates. We believe that this proposal needs more time to be fully understood

activity of the insects. Another big problem that I have noticed here in Knox County is nutrient deficiency. Many of our lawns show a yellowing from iron or zinc deficiency. This can be compensated by adding a fertilizer with 2 or 3% iron and zinc. However, those fertilizers often have phosphorous and potassium in them. This may or may not be good.

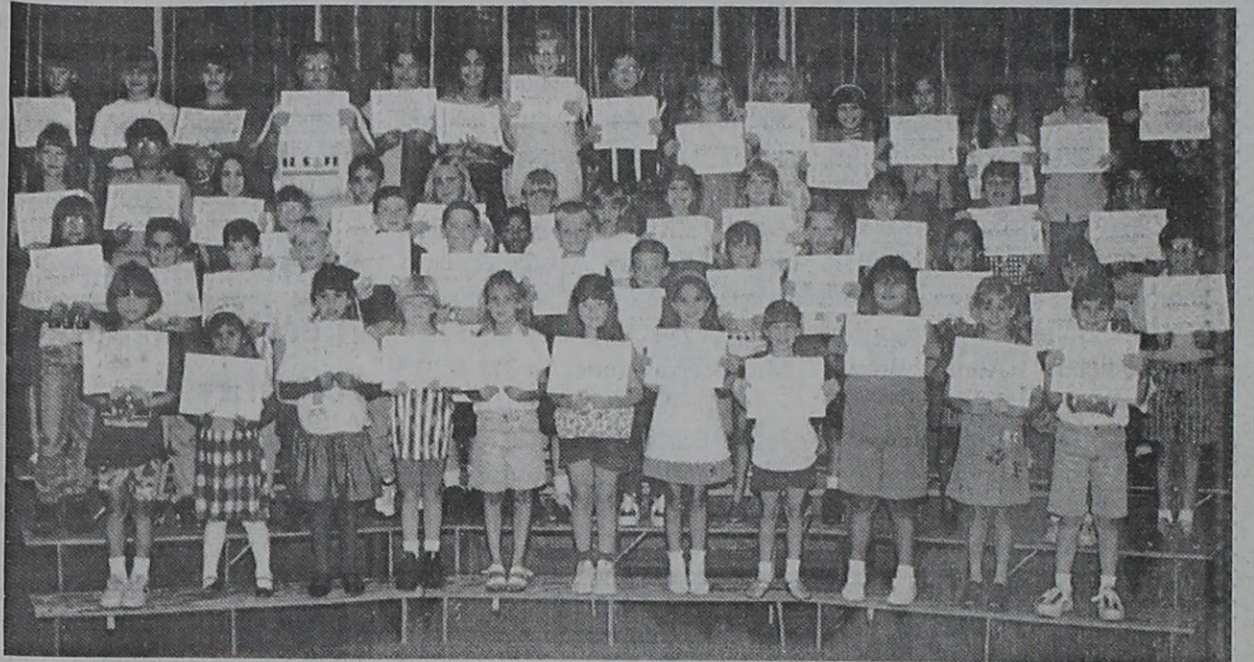
Most Texas soils require nitrogen. However, one application a year is not good enough. Nitrogen needs to be applied a little bit at a time throughout the growing season. On the other hand, only half the soils in Texas needs more phosphorous and only a few places require additional potassium. That is why soil sampling is so important. A soil sample kit may be obtained through any county Extension office.

and to allow for thoughtful examination by legislators and the public to assure that these suggested changes are indeed in the public interest," said Williams. "Unfortunately, this proposal does not necessarily assure lower electric rates or reliable service for our co-op members."

Electric co-ops serve approximately 3 million consumers in 244 Texas's 254 counties, primarily in rural and suburban areas.

It is not clear that deregulation of other industries has benefited rural Texans, Williams noted. "However, we continue to support any industry restructuring that benefits all customers of electric cooperatives in Texas."

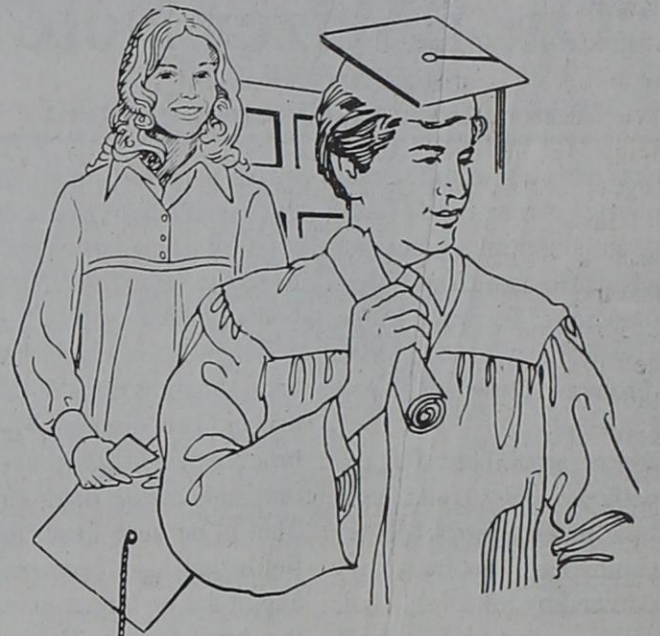

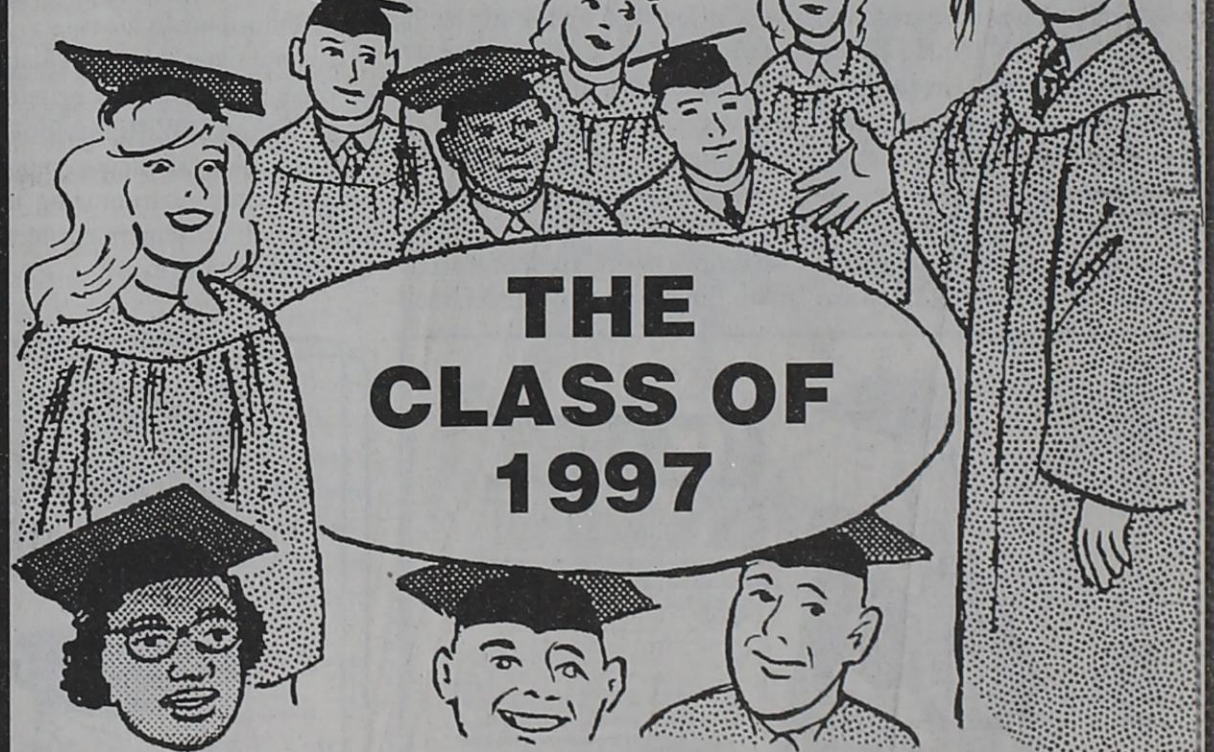

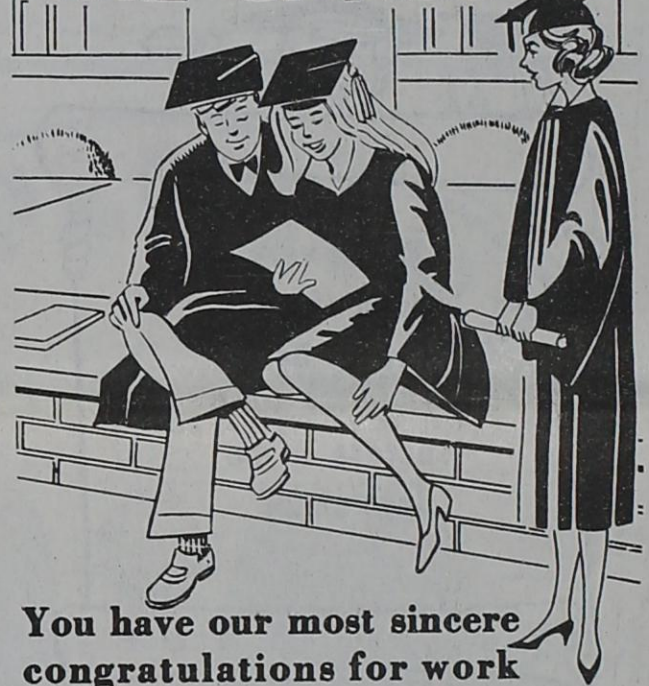

Trooper's warn of driving hazards during Memorial Day and summer

As Memorial Day approaches, motorists are planning for summer vacations, and once again will face the hazard of traffic deaths and injuries on our state highways.

Trooper Joe Clement, Safety Education Officer for the Texas Department of Public Safety, said "Summertime will mean an increase in the volume of traffic on our streets and highways. With more travellers sharing the road, the potential for traffic accidents also increase."

Year after year, statistics show alcohol and speed violations are the leading causes of fatal accidents in Texas. Trooper Clement states, "If you are travelling over the weekend, set reasonable limits and allow ample time for breaks. Many deaths and injuries might be prevented this weekend if more motorists would buckle up. Studies conducted indicate that the use of lap and shoulder belts reduce the risk of death and serious

injury.

Although avoiding traffic accidents should be the number one objective when taking to the road, there are other concerns that motorist must consider to experience a trouble free trip.

Trooper Clement suggests that a thorough inspection of your ve-

hicle may eliminate the possibility of a breakdown miles from nowhere. If you should have a breakdown, move your car off the pavement as reasonably far as possible to the side of the road. Be sure to turn on your emergency warning lights and keep an eye on traffic. If you need assistance, you may call 1-800-525-5555 and help will be dispatched to your location. This number is answered (24) hours a day, (7) days a week.



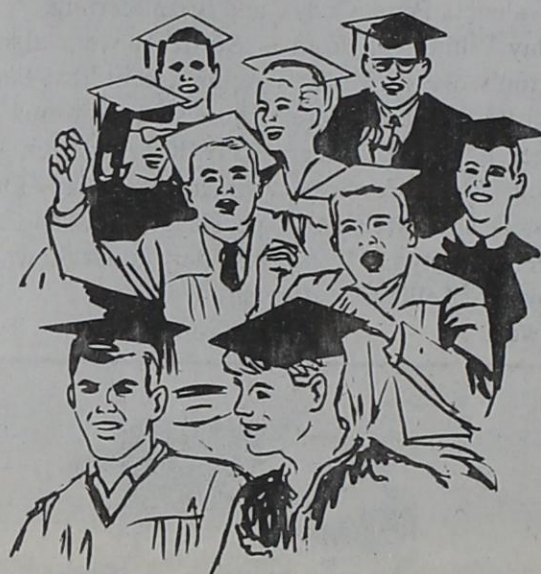

Town meetings on speed limits scheduled statewide

Citizens who want to comment on the speed limits in Texas are invited to a town meeting scheduled Tuesday, May 13, 1997, 6:00 p.m. at the Childress City Auditorium. The meeting is being held by the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) and the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS).

The meeting, one of 25 statewide is being held to get public comment on specific locations where problems may exist regarding speed limits and the procedures used to set speed limits.

In November 1995, Congress repealed the federal law which mandated a national maximum speed limit of 55 mph, except on rural Interstate quality highways. As a result, speed limits on Texas roads reverted to existing state law. Texas law requires the Texas Transportation Commission to set speed limits on roadways on the state highway system at 70 mph unless an engineering and traffic investigation determines that, for safety measures, the speed limit should be lower.

Beginning in late summer of 1995 and continuing through mid-June 1996, TxDOT conducted studies on the state highway system to identify those road segments that should be posted at speed limits below the maximum provided by state law. As a result of those studies, and action by the transportation commission, approximately 30,000 miles of the state highway system roadway mileage now has speed limits lower than 70 mph. The 70 mph maximum speed limit is now in effect on about 62 percent of the state system highway mileage.

The installation of new speed limit signs was phased in over a nine-month period from December 1995 through August 1996.

"Moving motorists safely along Texas highways is a job we take very seriously" said David Laney, Texas Transportation Commissioner. "We need to hear from the people who drive the roads, know where problems may exist, and have an opinion on whether the

posted speed is too slow or too fast, or just right."

The public input, along with detailed crash studies, will provide comprehensive information for decision makers to help enhance the safety of Texas highways, Laney said.

Parents - get ready early for the 1997 - 1998 school year

It seems like a long way off but really it's just right around the corner. For parents who want to plan ahead and prepare over the summer here are the lists of supplies needed for the elementary grades.

PRE-KINDERGARTEN: one small plastic school box, 4 boxes crayons (no jumbo), 4 small bottles of glue (1 1/4 ounces), 4 pencils, 1 box plastic silverware, 1 container of glitter (any color), 1 skein yarn (any color) 2 bottles acrylic paint (choose any two col-

ors - red, green, yellow, white, purple, pink, orange), 2 packages Pony beads, backpack. In addition to these A.M. girls need to bring one roll of paper towels, A.M. Boys need to supply one box, any size, baggies, P.M. girls should bring one box of 3 ounce Dixie cups, P.M. boys will need one package cotton balls, and all P.M. students will need to bring a nap towel or mat.

KINDERGARTEN: 1 box of 8 crayons (regular size), 2 #2 pencils, 1 green or pink school eraser, 1 bottle of liquid glue (Elmer's), 2 large glue sticks, 1 pocket folder (large slick folder is best), 1 scissors (Fiskar Brand) metal with plastic handle, 1 school box (cigar box size), 1 backpack, 1 box tissues, 1 set of washable colored markers, 1 bath towel for naptime, 1 prong water colors, 1 box Baggies-zippered (any size). All supplies need to be labeled with the student's name.

FIRST GRADE: 1 package (dozen) #2 pencils, 1 small package wide notebook paper, big eraser, Elmer's glue, solid glue stick (Not roll on), crayons (only 8 crayons), scissors, kleenex (medium size box), Zip-Loc bags - 1 box, school box, pocket folders (6), and all supplies need to be labeled with student's name.

GRADE TWO: 2-#2 pencils, 1 eraser, 1 small glue, 1 glue stick, 2 pocket folders, 1 box of 16 or 24 crayolas, 1 school box, 1 scissors, 1 box tissue, 2 notebook paper (wide-ruled), 1 ruler (standard

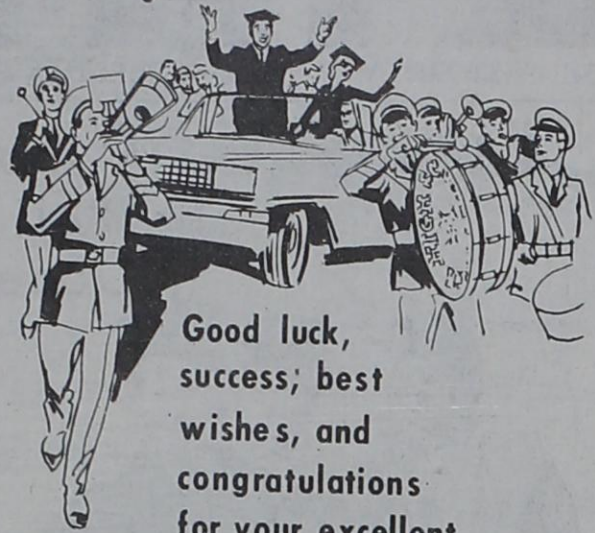
ruler with metric scale), and label all supplies with student's name.

GRADE THREE: 1 clipboard, notebook paper (wide-ruled), 2 #2 pencils, 1 eraser, 1 liquid glue (Elmer's), 1 box crayolas (16 or 24), 1 ruler (metric and standard), 1 box crayola markers (8 washable - not drawing markers), 1 red pen or pencil, 2 pocket folders, 1 small school box, 1 box tissues, 1 spiral notebook, highlighter and label all supplies with student's name.

GRADE FOUR: 1 large eraser, 1 package #2 pencils, 1 red ink pen or pencil, 1 package map pencils, 1 pointed scissors, 1 bottle glue, 1 box crayons, 1 ruler, 1 large 3-ring notebook (with metal rings), 1 school box for supplies, 1 box tissues (large), 2 package wide-ruled notebook paper, 3 pocket folders with fasteners, 1 spiral notebook - 100 pages or less, 1 package of dividers. Optional: highlighters, clipboard, markers. Please label supplies with student's name.

GRADE FIVE AND SIX: 1 large 3-ring notebook, 2 package dividers, 2 packages notebook paper (wide-ruled), 3 blue or black ink pens, 3 #2 pencils, 1 red ink pen, 1 eraser, 1 package map colors with sharpener, 4 spirals (70 count), 1 pair scissors, 1 bottle white glue or glue stick, 1 box tissues, 1 plastic supply bag, 1 folder with brads and pockets. Please label supplies with student's name.
