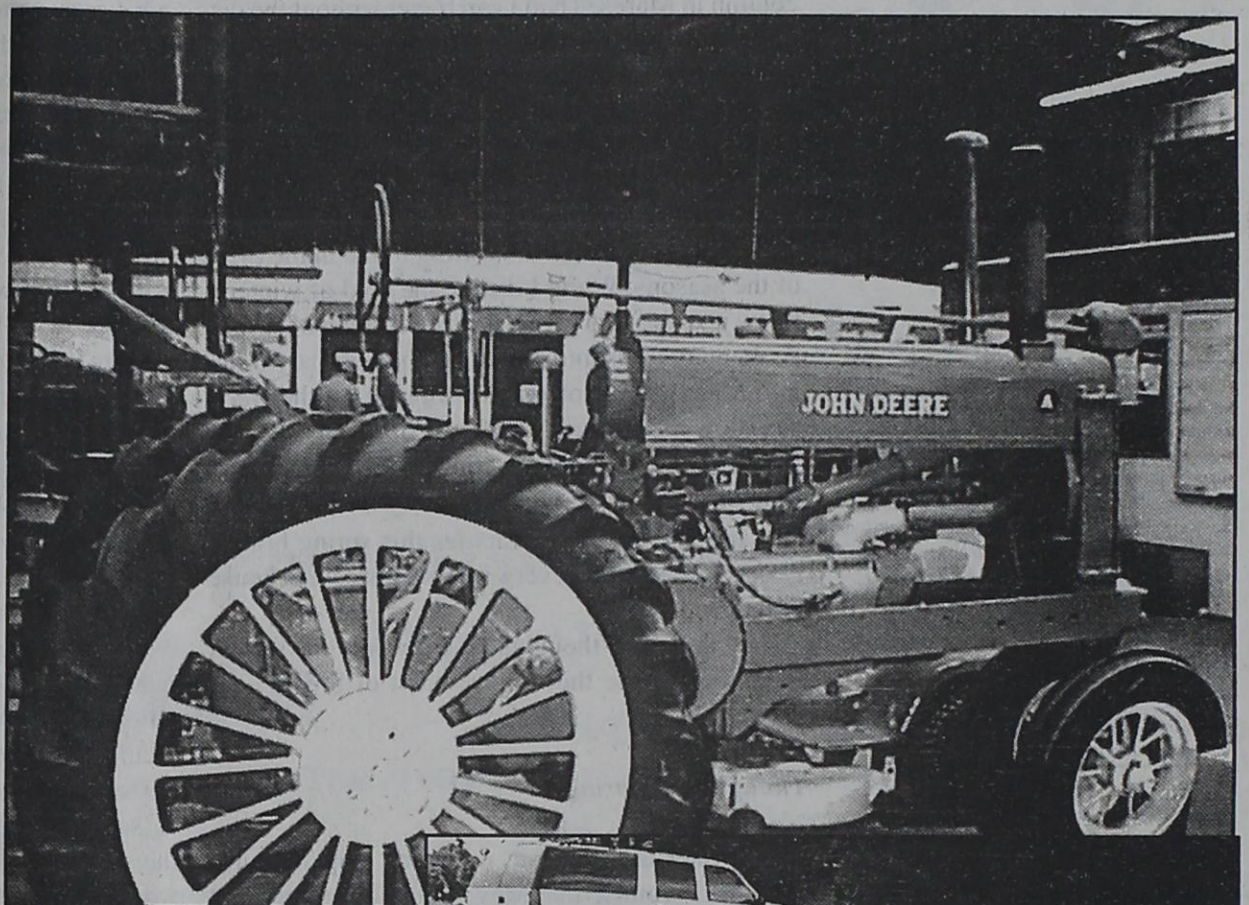
Enjoy a laugh and have fun with the tricycle races featuring dads and their kids. Sign up and make some memories with your children!

The process will involve over one hundred fire plugs in the community on Friday and completion will take most of the day.

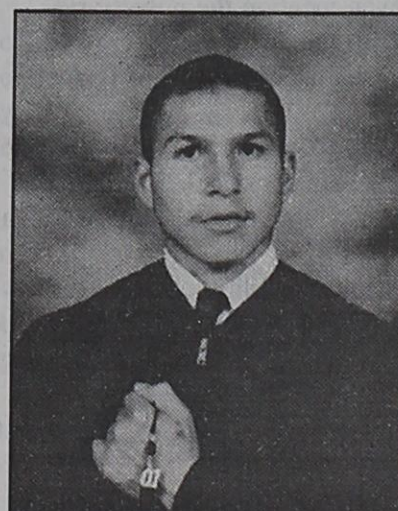
Community wide garage sale day set for June 2nd

Senator says state's tax system 'starving the Texas dream'

AUSTIN - When a lawmaker makes a speech in his home district, he usually paints pretty word pictures.

But when El Paso Sen. Eliot Shapleigh spoke to the Texas Associated Press Managing Editor's Association in his hometown recently, he focused on the reality of the situation along the Texas border. The picture is far from pretty.

He said Texas' 22 border counties, from El Paso to Cameron, amount to a third-world country. Combined per capita income in those counties, he said, is 33 percent lower than cash poor Mississippi's.

Problems along the border range from low college graduation rates to lack of transportation infrastructure. He didn't even mention the poverty-ridden colonias scattered up and down the river.

The solution, he said, is a major revision of Texas' tax system.

While careful not to directly advocate a state income tax, the Democratic senator said the state must study ways to better provide for the needs of its citizens.

"The plain fact," he told the editors, "is our tax system is frugally and efficiently starving the Texas dream."

Fond memories

Most of us never forget that first kiss or the first car.

To drive that first car, however, you need a driver's license. Having a driver's license even plays a role in many a first kiss.

For years, when you turned 16, if you had taken a driver's education course and a certified behind-the-wheel course and could pass the test, you got a driver's license.

For teenagers these days, it's not that simple. And from their point of view, it may get worse.

From the perspective of safety-minded adults, a graduated licensing bill approved by the House is

good news.

Newly licensed 16 or 17-year-olds would not be able to drive after 11 p.m. or before 5 a.m. without an adult in the car. The only exceptions are going to or from school or a medical emergency. That, of course, will play havoc with teenage romance.

But it also should impact teenage drinking and driving and the late-night cruising that often is a destination to trouble.

Though only 5.5 percent of Texas' licensed drivers are teenagers, their age group accounts for nearly 20 percent of the traffic fatalities logged each year in the state.

The sober truth is that the crash rate for 16-year-old drivers is 1.5 times higher than it is for 17-year-olds and three times higher than it is for 18 and 19-year-olds, still hardly the most safety minded members of society.

Forty-three other states have some form of graduated licensing law on the books. All have enjoyed reductions in teenage traffic fatalities involving 16-year-olds. Michigan, for instance, saw a 35 percent decline in traffic deaths from that vulnerable age group.

The version passed recently in the House is even stronger than the Senate version. Similar bills have come up before, but never gotten this far down the legislative road.

Gambling bill headed off at the pass

A bill that would legalize gambling on three Indian reservations in Texas passed the House, as reported last week, but it looks like it's still not going to get off the reservation.

Lt. Gov. Bill Ratliff has said the bill will not be debated in the Senate.

"I am adamantly opposed to casino gambling anywhere in the state of Texas," Ratliff said earlier this month.

Texas economy slowing as Rylander forecast; Revenue update not expected until May 21st

Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander released updated economic indicators that show Texas' economic furnace has cooled considerably since the Biennial Revenue Estimate was released in January.

"When I released the Biennial Revenue Estimate in January, I said that Texas' economic furnace was cooling," Rylander said. "I have frequently been asked about possible revisions to the revenue estimate in the past few weeks.

I have been consistent in saying that at present, I can make no revision - the estimates are performing according to my January predictions. However, more information will be available later this month that could allow some adjustment - lowering or raising," Rylander said.

The Comptroller's office received a complete accounting for April sales tax collections on May 1, including first calendar quarter sales tax revenue.

"My revenue estimators have reviewed the sales tax data, looking at the trends and assessing where we stand," Rylander said. "We are right on estimate, no better.

On May 15, franchise tax payments are due, and that will tell us much about the performance of the Texas corporate sector - and hence the economy. By the 21st of May, I will have enough information to lower, raise or leave the revenue estimate the same.

Perhaps most relevant to today's discussion, state revenue growth has slowed dramatically," Rylander said. "In January, fiscal 2001 year-to-date sales tax collections were increasing by nearly 7 percent, or about the same rate as in fiscal 2000. Today, September through April sales tax collections growth is down to 5.6 percent."

In addition to franchise tax and sales tax revenue, the outcome of two pieces of legislation could potentially affect the Comptroller's revenue estimate.

Failure to pass S.B. 1689, which would clarify state law pertaining to franchise taxation and the business loss carry-forward, could result in a \$300 million loss in revenue during the 2002-03 biennium.

Likewise, failure to pass H.B. 3382, which would address a provision in the tax code pertaining to the excise tax on "other tobacco products," could cost the state \$18 million over the biennium.

The Legislature already has dipped into the \$2.9 billion Rylander estimated would be in the sales tax and the motor vehicle sales tax. Furthermore, consumer confidence is down dramatically and statewide employment growth has slowed from 3.25 percent in January to 2.75 percent today.

"As I have said repeatedly, there will be no Christmas in May, and I'm not going to overshoot the runway," Rylander said. "The factors that led to a revised revenue estimate of \$907 million in 1999 are just not there now."

Today, there is \$193.4 million in the Rainy Day Fund - only enough to run Texas government for about 23 hours. Texas ranks dead last among the 42 states that have a balance in their Rainy Day Funds.

If the Rainy Day Fund is left alone, Rylander estimated its balance would exceed \$1 billion by November 2003.

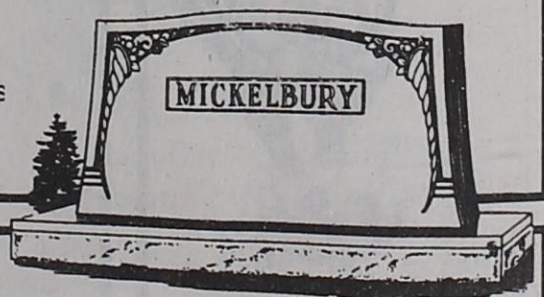

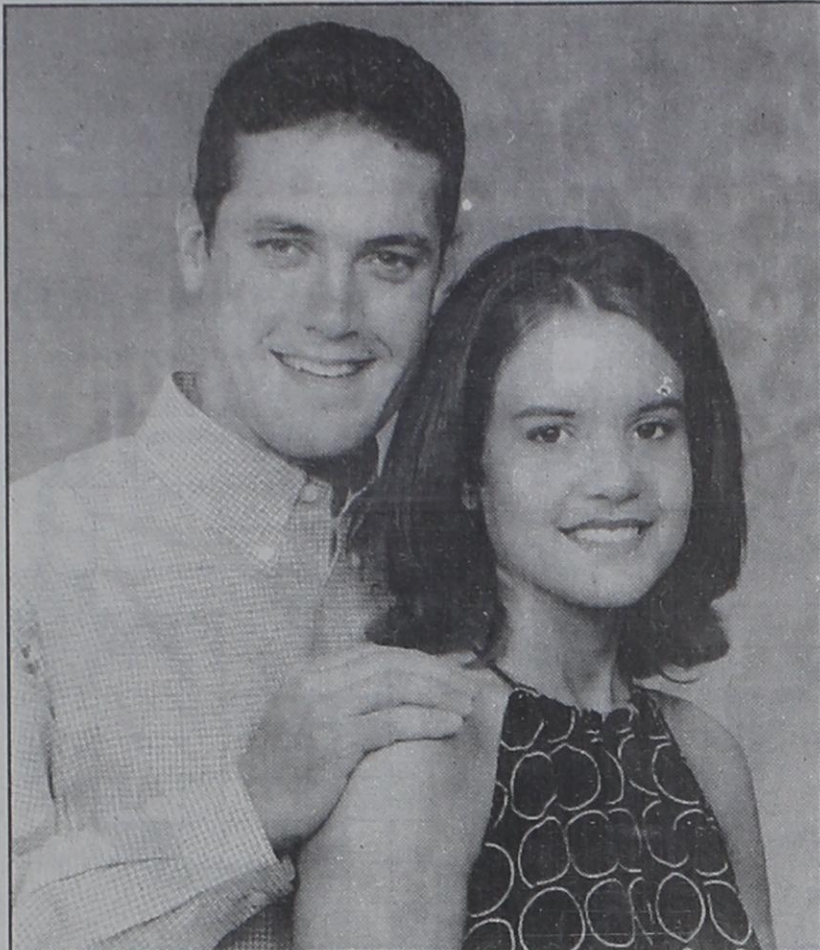

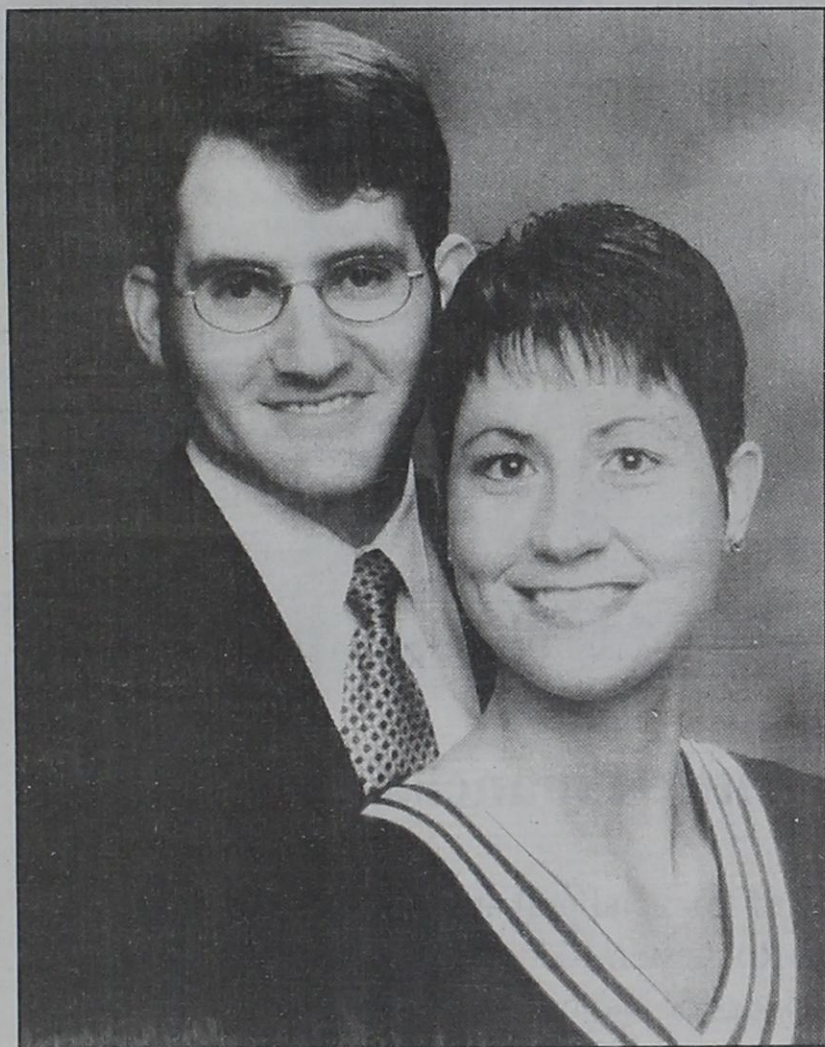

Drought conditions persist, groundwater levels still down

The Haskell-Knox Under-ground Water Conservation District has completed its annual survey of water levels in observation wells in Baylor, Haskell and Knox Counties. This survey along with data obtained from the Texas Water Development Board gives an indication of the status of the Seymour Aquifer in the three counties.

As a matter of public education, the well levels relative to this time last year are: Baylor County -1.61 feet; Haskell County -1.47 feet except for an area 2.25 miles south-east of O'Brien where the water level is still down ten feet from April, 2000; and Knox County -0.3 feet.

This information is furnished to the citizens of Baylor, Haskell and Knox Counties to help in planning water conservation practices during the coming spring and summer months. The record rainfall that we have experienced during the winter months has helped to alleviate some of the effects of the drought. This water level information indicates that the drought is far from over. As this is written, April rainfall will end up with a deficit of over 1.5 inches.

Another drought indicator is the

level of water in Miller Creek Reservoir. The lake is at 47.5% of capacity and 9 feet below the spillway level.

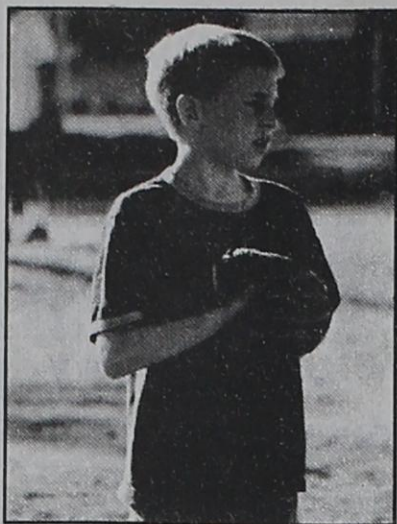

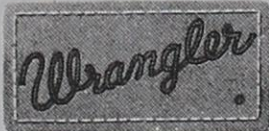

In a bowl, combine the first five ingredients. Remove 1/2 cup of the liquid for basting; cover and refrigerate. Pour remaining marinade into a large resealable plastic bag. Add salmon; seal bag and turn to coat. Refrigerate 1-3 hours.

Drain and discard marinade. Broil 4 inches from heat for 5 minutes. Baste with reserved marinade. Broil 10 minutes longer or until fish flakes easily with a fork, basting frequently.

Yield: 4 servings.

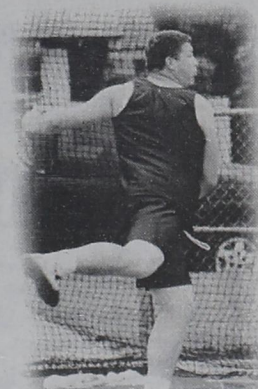
