Local man honored by the **Texas Wheat Producers**



Prior to the Symposium, the Texas Wheat Producers Board (TWPB), along with the TWPA, held a reception to recognize key wheat producers and elevators for their support of the programs administered by the organizations.

C.L. Edwards of Panhandle, Texas, and W.R. Moore, Jr., shared the honor of being named recipients of the 2002 Wheat Man of the Year Award. Both of these individuals are actively representing wheat producers in their areas and currently serve on the state-wide Boards of the TWPB and TWPA. W.R. Moore, Jr., of Munday, a lifetime wheat producer in Throckmorton, Haskell, Knox, and Lamb Counties, set out to prove in the late 40,s, early 50,s that fertilizing non-irrigated wheat would pay off in West Central Texas areas. He did just that, and for over 50 years, he has farmed a combination of wheat and cotton, along with other row crops, and raised cattle in these areas. Though the settlement ended the immediate problem, in January legislators will begin considering various insurance reform measures.

New Attorney General takes oath ...

With John Cornyn leaving office early to be sworn in as Texas' newest U.S. senator, Greg Abbott took the oath of office as the state's 50th attorney general on Dec. 2.

"We have many challenges ahead of us and many responsibilities, but ultimately they can be reduced to one salient point: we have an obligation to serve the people of Texas," Abbot said.

Texas' other newly-elected officials will be sworn in next month.

Perry names HHS Commissioner...

Albert Hawkins, an aide to President George W. Bush, has been named by Gov. Perry as Health

and Human Services commissioner.

The commission, with 625 employees and an \$8 billion budget, oversees Texas' Medicaid Program and Children's Health Insurance Program.

Hawkins replaced Don Gilbert, who retired after 30 years of state service.

Merry trout fishing...

It may look and feel a lot like Christmas, but for Texans who like to fish no matter the weather, it's trout time.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has begun its annual release of rainbow trout into streams cold enough to keep the non-native species alive and well. Some 239,000 trout will be stocked at 97 locations across the state.

Help Aging Parents Cope with Health Insurance

If your parents are getting on in years, you may want to have some serious discussions with them on financial issues. Of course, you'll want to make sure their estate plans are in order - they've worked hard all their lives, and, if they're like most people, they are very concerned about leaving a legacy to their family. But you may not realize the importance of another key issue: health insurance. If you're not familiar with your parents' health insurance situation, you could eventually run into serious - and expensive - problems.

Your first step is to make sure you know your parents' medical histories. You also need to acquaint yourself with any prescriptions and overthe-counter medications they're taking. In a medical emergency, you would need this information - but you'll also need it to correctly complete medical claim forms. Also, ask your parents for names and phone numbers of their medical care providers.

Once you've got all this information, keep it in one place that's readily accessible. If you need to act quickly, you don't want to scramble around, looking for a dozen scraps of paper.

Getting your parent's medical histories and names of health care providers is obviously important. But it's just as important for you to know who's insuring your parents. You need to know where your parents keep their health insurance cards and bills. You also should have a basic understanding of Medicare, the national health insurance program for Americans age 65 and older. Keep in mind that Medicare pays for most doctors' bills and related services, but it doesn't cover prescription drugs. Consequently, your parents may need supplemental insurance policies.

In reviewing your parents' health insurance situation, you'll want to pay special attention to long-term care coverage. Why? Because longterm care costs may be the single largest threat to your parents' financial independence during their retirement years. Right now, the average cost of a year's stay in a nursing home is \$50,000 - and it's twice that amount in some cities. So, if your parents don't already have a long-term care policy, you may want to discuss it with them. If they do have a policy, ask to see it, so that you'll know exactly what types of services and facilities are covered. If your parents become incapacitated and are unable to choose a long-term care facility for themselves, you may have to do it. And if you don't choose the right type of place, their long-term care provider could decline coverage.

In fact, if you'd like to make sure you can step in at any time to deal with your parents' health-care issues, you may want to establish a "durable power of attorney." This document gives you the authority to make financial and legal decisions and transactions on your parents' behalf. You may also want to obtain a durable power of attorney for health care, otherwise known as a "health care proxy." A health care proxy, which only becomes effective when your parents are not competent to make their own health care decisions, gives you the power to access medical records and refuse or consent to medical treatment.

As you can see, many of these issues are quite sensitive - so you'll want to discuss them with your parents when they're physically healthy and emotionally stable. By acting early, you can head off health-care related financial problems at the best possible time - before they occur.


