Look To The East

Looks like we're in for a personal crop failure!

On all our garden acreage, that is - a total of 12 feet by 28 feet, approximately.

This is coming about at a time, too, when people are encouraged to grow home vegetables, cut down on the grocery bill, help curb inflation, eat better for less, get needed exercise, save gasoline by hoeing instead of driving, and whip the energy crisis in general.

Our problem was the weather!

Here, in all our gardening activities, we've been plumb religious in placing the seeds in the ground on Good Friday. This is the time we've been encouraged to believe is the best for growing anything - and that you're running into big trouble if you fail to plant at this time.

This we have done in the past, with very few exceptions. We've never bothered much about planting by the moon - but Good Friday is always to be reckoned with. As the day drew closer, we went about finding and sorting our favorite seeds saved over from last year - such as B. E. peas, pinto beans, okra, etc., and prepared them for planting. We had tilled the soil beforehand, borrowing a rotary tiller from Sappy Bowley that almost whipped us to death, and had the dirt in a receptive mood.

We selected soaking utensils, strong in the belief that an overnight soaking was good for the seeds and causes them to germinate and come up quicker regardless of weather conditions. Then early Good Friday morning, 'way before the break of day, it came a rain. Our gauge measured a half-inch; however, Goodson Sellers gave the official at .41.

We examined our garden spot after breakfast that morning and decided it would be plumb foolish to try to "mud" the seeds in the soil. Then came the disastrous freeze which caused seeds to freeze in the soaking utensils.

So our prime planting time has passed, and not a seed in the soil. Our next best bet is to rely on a report of our neighbor, who took a look-see at the farmers almanac and said around April 7 is a good time.

We're going to lay all the mess on the groundhog, and February.

February had just barely arrived when the groundhog stuck his nose into matters - and goosed. He said by actions rather than words that spring was here, then hid himself back into winter quarters to laugh at us human mortals.

There followed in February warm balmy days, when the next one would be a bone-chiller, and it had us all in "a tizzy" for days upon days. Congress and February caused Washington's birthday to come five days ahead of time; too, they both combined to cause a return of the upsetting day-light saving time.

February made its exit after being around only 28 days - and about a month later, we took a good look at our Timex and discovered

## Area City, School Elections Saturday

Elections to be held over the county Saturday for both city and school officials are causing more than the usual interest in city and school affairs this year.

Very little opposition is shown in any of the elections, so far as opposing candidates are concerned. However, it is expected that less apathy will be shown and that more electors will go to the polls next Saturday.

The elections locally will be held at the city hall.

For the city of Munday, three aldermen will be elected. The terms of James Carden, Bob Therwanger and Dr. H. Wayne Walker expire, and only Carden filed for re-election. Others filing for places on the ballot were Don Bunton, Hub Ford and M. M. Booe, giving the voters four persons to pick three officials from.

Carry-over members of the City Council are Mayor J. E. Reeves, Clint J.

Norman and Joe Tidwell.

In the school board election, voters will again have a pick of two out of three. Filing for places on the ballot were Richie Smith, Rev. Bartholomew Landwermeyer and Rickie Herring, with two places to be filled.

Sandra Blacklock West is seeking a position on the board as a write-in candidate, it was stated Monday.

Floyd Reed and Kenneth Baker, whose terms expire, did not file for re-election. Holdover members of the school board are James Smith, Dr. W. H. Stewart, James Amerson, A. L. Awalt and Daniel Ramirez.

County Judge Sam E. Clonts has announced that two persons will be elected to the Board of Trustees for Knox County; one person from Commissioners Precincts One and Three. Voting will be held at Goree, Munday, Knox City, Benjamin and Gilliland.

The City of Goree will

name a mayor and three aldermen in Saturday's election. Filing for re-election were Mayor Walter Coffman and Aldermen Barton Carl, Jerry Underwood and Bill Putman. No other names will appear on the ballot.

It appears that more interest will be shown in the Goree school trustee election, however, where four persons have filed for the two vacancies on the school board. They are: Charles Grisham, C. O. Yates, Tommy Decker and Joe Hunt.

Terms of Taylor Allen and Parnell Skelton expire, and they did not seek re-election.

In the Benjamin school, four candidates are vying for three places on the board. Katrine Hudson and Sammie Pierce, whose terms expire, are up for re-election, and others on the ballot are LyMoin Patterson and Fred Carver.

Charles Griffith, the third member of the board, resigned some months ago when his wife became a member of the teaching staff in the school.

Buddy Tolson, city secretary at Benjamin, stated that retiring members of the city council are Vernon D. McCaules, mayor, and Aldermen Lee Snailum and Claude Stockton. Mr. McCaules has filed for re-election, and others on the ballot are Preston Lindsey and Michael Driver.

Holdover members of the Benjamin city council are Carl Benson, Oscar Gideon and Homer Ralston.

All elections at Benjamin will be held in the assembly room of the county courthouse, it was stated.

## Freeze Nips Fruit

Although no authoritative report has been received in the Courier office, it appears from a general consensus that the hard freeze during last weekend has spelled "nil" to prospects for a bountiful fruit crop in the Munday area.

The area had four days of freezing temperatures: 32 degrees on Friday, 26 on Saturday, 23 on Sunday and 25 on Monday, according to the records of Goodson Sellers, local U. S. weather observer.

Sunday morning's low was possibly the clincher!

Some expressed hope that the wet weather was a saving factor; another idea was the freeze coming "in the dark of the moon" would not be so disastrous, but fear of a lost fruit crop is expressed by many.

Lee Roy Leflar, who with his brother, Welton, operate the largest fruit acreage locally stated Monday that this year's crop was "probably gone." He had not checked the trees at this time, however.

Some continue to hope that the freeze did not wreck total destruction and that some fruit would yet be grown.

## Truscott Girl Receives Betty Crocker Award

Jacquelyn Lee Brown, 17-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jack W. Brown, rural Truscott, is Texas' Betty Crocker Family Leader of Tomorrow for 1975. Her award is announced by General Mills, sponsor of the annual educational-scholarship program.

Jacquelyn won the title and \$1,500 scholarship by competing with 22,491 seniors in 880 Texas high schools on a written knowledge and attitude test administered nationally last December. She is also eligible to win a \$5,000

scholarship in the spring national competition.

State runner-up and winner of a \$500 scholarship is Becky Lynn Mathre, 18-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Paul G. Mathre, 11523 Sayanora, San Antonio.

As state winner, Jacquelyn has also won for her school, Crowell High School, a 20-volume reference work, "The Annals of America," from Encyclopaedia Educational Corporation.

An honor student and senior class president, Jacquelyn will be the valedictorian or salutatorian of her graduating class. A National Merit commended student and saxophone player in the school band, she is also editor of the school paper, a student council member and a 4-H junior leader. Jacquelyn will attend Lubbock Christian College with a home economics major.

State-level judging in the Betty Crocker Search for Leadership in Family Living centered on performance in a written knowledge and attitude examination administered throughout the country on December 3.

From April 20-25, the 51 Family Leaders of Tomorrow - representing the 50 states and the District of Columbia - will, with their faculty advisors, be guests of General Mills on an educational tour of Washington, D. C., and Williamsburg, VA.

Highlighting the tour will be the announcement of the 1975 Betty Crocker All-American Family Leader of Tomorrow and three national runners-up. Chosen on a basis of personal observation and interviews during

the tour, plus state-level judging results, national winners' scholarships will be increased to \$5,000, \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000.

All judging and selection of winners in the Search program is conducted by Science Research Associates, Chicago.

Kevin Hostor of Seymour wasn't far behind the winners with 399 points in individual ratings. Randall Kinnibrough, also of Seymour FFA, was third in grass judging with 396 points.

Danny Brown, with the Munday FFA team, accumulated a total of 390 points to be high for his team. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Gene Brown.

Other members of the Munday team are: Tony Urbanczyk, son of Mr. and Mrs. Buddy Urbanczyk; Jerry Penartz, son of Mr. and Mrs. Julius Penartz, and Carey Shawver, son of Mr. and Mrs. Tony Shawver.

Seymour took second place honors in grass judging, while the Munday

He opened his own tailor shop in Haskell in 1944, and Hunter's Men's Wear a short time later. He operated the men's store until his retirement in 1971.

He was a veteran of World War II and is a former member of the Haskell City Council and the Industrial Commission. He was president of the Haskell County Sheriff's Posse, a riding club, for many years and was active in other civic affairs.

He married the former Margaret Tryheart March 6, 1944, in Fort Smith, Ark. He was a longtime member of the Methodist Church.

Funeral services were held at 3:30 p.m. Sunday

from the First United Methodist Church in Haskell with the pastor, Rev. Robert Brown Sr. officiating. Burial was in Willow Cemetery in Haskell under direction of Holden-McCauley Funeral Home.

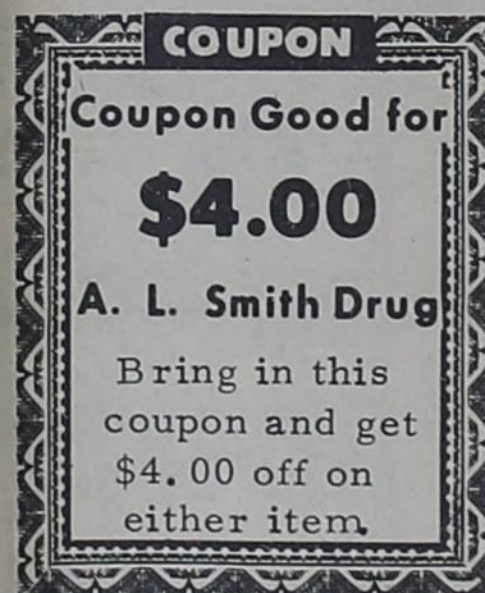
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## Julie Pechacek, Mickey Stoddard Are Wed in Afternoon Ceremony

### DIFFERENCE IN WATER-BATH AND PRESSURE PROCESSING IN HOME CANNING

Have you wondered about the difference in water-bath and pressure cooker processing of foods in home canning?

The water-bath method is used for processing fruits, rhubarb, and tomatoes and is done using a pan with a lid and rack. The rack is used to hold the jars off the bottom of the cooker. The pan is large enough to cover the jars with one or two inches of water, so that the jars are surrounded with boiling water. The lid is used to help retain the heat. The acid in some fruits and vegetables helps prevent the growth of some bacteria which is the reason the water-bath process can be used.

However, the low acid fruits and vegetables must be canned using the pressure cooker. The spores ("seeds") of some bacteria are highly resistant to heat, which makes it necessary for them to be destroyed by high heat. This is accomplished with the pressure cooker.

What are foods processed by these methods? The water-bath is used for such foods as peaches, plums and tomatoes. The pressure cooker is used for such foods as beets, peas, corn, beans, greens and okra.

To be ready for the canning season, insure that the rubber gasket on the canner is clean and grease-free. If it's stretched or broken, a new rubber gasket can be ordered from the manufacturer of the pressure canner.

**FREEZE DAMAGE**  
Freezing temperatures the mornings of March 29-30 likely killed a large percent of the young peaches in the area. Although it takes a few days to tell if some young fruit survived the Sunday morning, March 30 freeze and frost lasted several hours and it will surprise me if many survive.

Large wheat is showing some leaf freeze burn, but I have hopes no serious damage was done. White capping which is undeveloped heads dying soon after heading is often caused by earlier freeze damage.

**VEGETABLES IN FLOWER BEDS**  
With the increase of interest in home vegetable gardening, home owners may want to consider planting a few vegetables in their flower beds this spring.

With sufficient garden space a limiting factor with many homeowners, numerous vegetables do well when planted in flower beds around the home.

Leaf lettuce makes an ideal border plant and will grow in many areas around the home that receive only partial shade. Most varieties will be ready for harvesting 45 to 60 days after planting.

The red-leaved variety Ruby not only adds color to the flower bed but also provides food for the table. Parsley is another vegetable crop that makes an ideal border planting and can be harvested almost the year round when grown in an area receiving partial light.

Tomatoes, eggplants and peppers should be located in a bed that receives at least four to six hours of good sunlight each day. Most fruiting crops require a considerable amount of sunlight for good growth and should be planted on the south side of the home to receive as much light as possible. Morning sunlight is often more desirable than mid-afternoon light, especially during the hotter months of the year.

Growing vegetables in flower beds requires a little extra care over that given most flowering plants. ## Knox Veterans Entering Last Year Of Educational Assistance

A large number of veterans will soon be entering the last year in which they can obtain educational assistance under the training programs which are operated by the Veterans Administration. According to Allen Lowrey, Veterans Service Officer for Knox County, the educational assistance entitlement for many veterans is due to expire on May 31, 1976.

The current GI Bill provides educational assistance benefits for persons who served in the Armed Forces of the United States, was discharged or released after January 31, 1955, and who has not used their entitlement. Each eligible veteran is entitled to one month of training time for each month or part of a month he or she was on active military duty after January 31, 1955. The maximum entitlement for any one person is 36 months of actual training time, and the maximum is available for anyone who served 18 months or more continuous honorable service.

If a veteran was released from service prior to June 1, 1966, his training deadline date under the GI Bill is May 31, 1976. If he was released from service at any time after June 1, 1966, his ten years run from his date of release. Persons who were released at any time between January 31, 1955 and June 1, 1966, have slightly more than one year to use or to complete their education. Regardless of whether they have used all of their eligibility, the VA financial assistance will be terminated on May 31, 1976, with no extensions available beyond that date.

Any veteran who is eligible and who desires educational benefits under the GI Bill should make plans now to enroll as soon as possible.

Washington, D. C. - A number of us in the U. S. House of Representatives recently introduced a welfare reform act that will save the taxpayers at least \$1.5 billion. The legislation has more than 50 sponsors.

At a news conference held in the Capitol at the time the legislation was introduced, it was pointed out that, "It is time that we limited public welfare to its original purpose - helping those who are really incapable of helping themselves. We do not believe that able-bodied citizens should be permitted to enjoy a relaxed lifestyle at the taxpayers' expense."

Every welfare reform proposal offered in recent years has promised nothing except an expansion of welfare at a cost of many billions of dollars. This is a reform proposal that is uniquely concerned with helping those who, for reasons beyond their control, can not help themselves, while at the same time saving tax dollars.

Similar successful reforms in several major states prove that we can save enough money through this Welfare Reform Act to increase benefits to those who truly need them, while at the same time saving the taxpayers hundreds of millions of dollars.

Both political parties should work together to restore fiscal sanity to this country and this legislation is a step in the right direction. No program of government should escape pruning as we try to escape the growth of the inflationary budget deficit that could exceed \$80 billion in the next fiscal year.

The main purposes of the act are: To provide assistance only to those entitled by need to receive it; to provide sufficient aid to the truly needy; to operate the system within the limits of public resources; to prevent fraudulent abuse of the system; and to provide incentives for recipients to find employment and leave the system.

The principal focus of the Welfare Reform Act is upon the program of Aid to Families with Dependent Children, the category of welfare which has been the most costly and subject to greatest abuse. The AFDC caseload which doubled in the decade ending in 1965 had doubled again by 1970.

Too many in the welfare bureaucracy and among

legislators at all levels forget that the goal of a successful welfare program ought to be getting people off welfare and into productive employment again. Through this bill, we propose to give meaning to that goal. The thrust of the legislation is to rid the welfare rolls of "Professional recipients," not to penalize those with genuine needs for help. Welfare reforms are long overdue. Since the cost of these programs has doubled in just five years, it is time to call a halt to burdening the productive men and women of this country with those who do not want to work.

Many federal social programs need corrective legislation to insure that aid is channeled exclusively to the legitimately needy.

This act will complement similar actions which have been taken in a number of states since 1971. By tightening eligibility and cracking down on fraud, several of them have managed to improve assistance to citizens in critical need.

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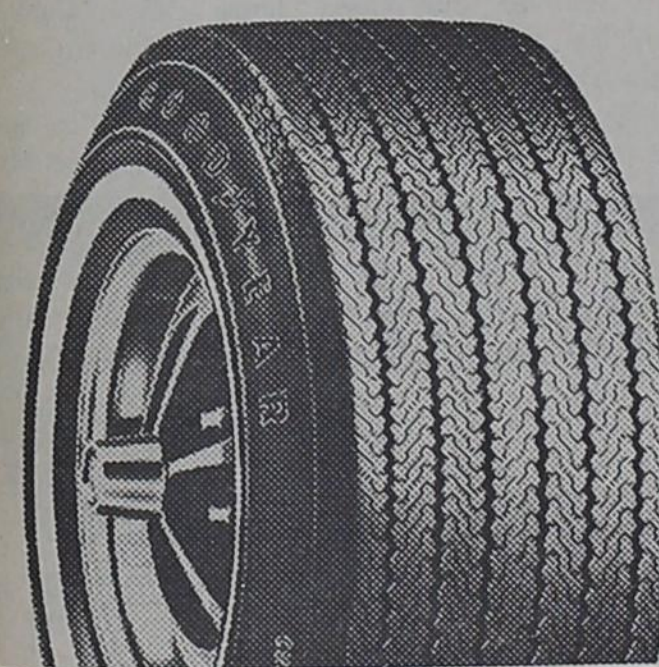

### Monthly Rebates Of City Sales Tax To Start April 15

Austin - Comptroller Bob Bullock announced Friday that monthly rebates of city sales taxes will start April 15.

"Nothing stands in our way now but the U. S. Postal service," Bullock said.

This first-ever monthly payment will replace the old quarterly payment system with its 90-day lag time which had been in effect since the city sales tax was passed in 1967.

Bullock said that junking the quarterly system "means we've quit burying the cities' money in the backyard in fruit jars for three months at a time."

"Now it will be interesting to see what the cities do with it," Bullock said. "Like Franklin said, a dollar invested is a dollar earned -- or at least seven per cent."

Payments to 800 towns and cities which have the one per cent tax total more than \$200 million a year.

The April 15 payments will cover taxes collected by the Comptroller between Feb. 17, the cutoff date for the last payment, and April 4. Future monthly payments will be made at mid-month, Bullock said.

Bullock said that cities can expect every third month's check to be larger than the other two, reflecting the peak of quarterly tax payments sent in by merchants.

"When you're talking about money, haste ends waste," Bullock observed.

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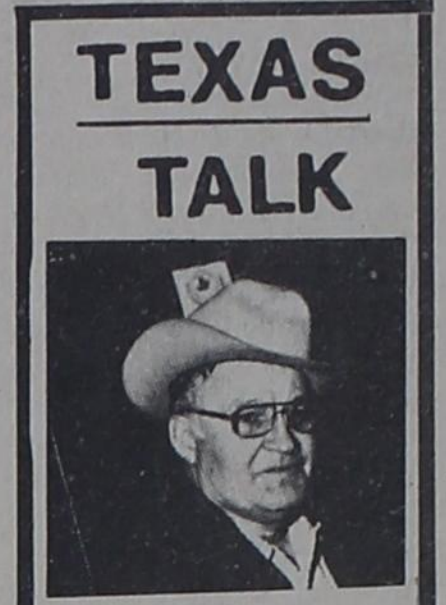

**TEXAS TALK**

Q: As far as feed and feed grains are concerned, what are the differences between concentrates and roughages?  
A: Fiber content and the amount of nutrient which is digestible by the animal are the basic criteria for separating these classes. Concentrates - are feeds generally high in nutrients and low in fiber content. Virtually all grains are in this class, as well as several by-products including linseed meal, cottonseed meal, hominy feed and wheat bran. Many of the concentrates have a high protein content, although this is not a prerequisite of the class. Roughages -- are high in fiber and low in nutrients. Feeds other than the grains are generally classified as roughage. These include: straw, silage, hay and a variety of coarse by-products of the plants utilized in feed grain production.
