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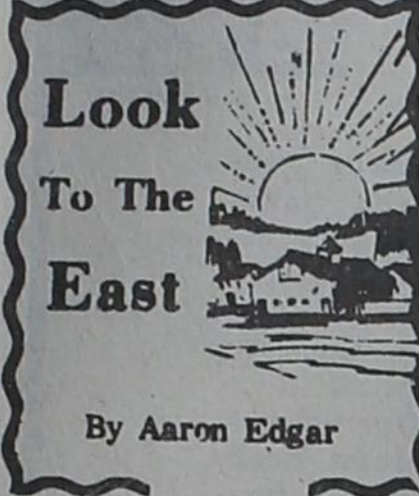

Cotton Classing Has Begun

Cotton harvesting activities have been heavy between rains, especially in the Munday area, according to B. B. Manly, Jr. of the USDA Cotton Classing Office in Abilene.

On Tuesday, October 26, Mr. Sidney Ferrell opened the sub-office at Munday. Last season the office opened October 28.

Prices being offered for cotton are very good this year, and range from around 60 cents up to 68 cents per pound. Some acreages are being contracted at 33 to 35 cents per pound above the Government loan rate, which would mean from 64 to 67 cents per pound for the most predominant qualities processed this week.

Around 2,000 samples were processed from the Munday area this week, bringing the season total to 2,400.

Predominant grades were: 41 with 40 percent; grade 51 with 16 percent; and grade 42 with 24 percent. Nine percent was reduced in grade because of bark. The predominant staple was 30 with 49 percent. Other staples were 31 with 34 percent and 32 with 13 percent.

Mike readings were 89 percent in the premium 3.5-4.9 category with 4 percent falling below 3.5 and 7 percent above 4.9.

Mr. Ferrell will be in his sixth season as Officer-In-Charge of the Munday Office.

You Must Vote In The

General Election On Tuesday!

The presidential debates are over, and now local people, and those over the entire nation, must address themselves to the task of voting in the general election on Tuesday, November 2.

All voting boxes in Knox County will be opened so people may vote in their respective voting precincts.

Zena Waldron, county and district clerk, reported that by noon Monday a total of 20 persons had cast absentee ballots in her office. In addition, she had mailed out a total of 39 absentee ballots.

Other than the presidential candidates and their runningmates, there is little of interest for the voters.

Of interest to many voters is the fact that Don Yarbrough, Democratic

nominee for Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, Place 2, is facing numerous charges of "professional misconduct" and a recent suit filed by the State Bar of Texas for his disbarment.

Yarbrough has no Republican opponent on the ballot, but he is being challenged by two write-in candidates. They are: State District Court Judge Sam Houston of Denton and Tom Lorraine, a

Houston attorney.

The ballot contains columns for six party voting, plus one column for write-in votes. The parties are: Democratic, Republican, Raza Unida, American, Socialist Workers, and Independent. Eugene J. McCarthy is listed as candidate for president on the Independent ticket.

Candidates for president and vice president are: Democratic, Jimmy Carter and Walter Mondale; Republican, Gerald R. Ford and Robert Dole; American, Thomas J. Anderson and Rufus Shackelford; Socialist Workers, Peter Camejo and Willie Mae Reid, and Independent, Eugene McCarthy. U. S. Senator Lloyd Bentsen, a Democrat, is being opposed by Alan Steelman, Republican; Marjorie P. Gallion, American Party, and Pedro Vasquez, Socialist Workers.

Omar Burleson is unopposed in his bid for reelection as U. S. Representative of the 17th district.

Jon Newton, Democratic nominee for Railroad Commissioner, is opposed by Walter Wendlandt, Republican; Fred Rodriguez Garza, Raza Unita Party, and Pat O'Reilly, Socialist Workers.

Others appearing on the Democratic party ballot are: Jack Pope, associate Justice, Supreme Court, place 1; James G. Denton, associate justice, place 3; John F. Onion Jr., Court of Criminal Appeals; Truman Roberts, court of criminal appeals; W. T. Phillips, court of criminal appeals, unexpired term; W. S. (Bill) Healy, State Representative, 101st District; Austin McCloud, chief justice, Court of Civil Appeals, 11th District; R. J. (Judson) Balch, district judge, 50th Judicial District; W. H. Healy, 50th District Attorney; Bobby D. Burnett, County attorney; H. C. Stone, sheriff; John A. Smith, county tax assessor-collector; Philip Homer, commissioner, Prec. three, and Joe Lane, constable, Prec. three.

Ballots for other precincts list their respective candidates.

At the bottom of the ballot are two constitutional amendments to be voted on, dealing with water resources, development and quality of water.

Moguls Upset Applecourt For Haskell Indians By 21 to 6

The Munday Moguls, playing what was termed their best game of several seasons, clearly upset the Applecourt for Haskell's Indians last Friday by a 21 to 6 score over the visitors to Scruggs Field. The victory spelled a big halt in Haskell's drive for the District 7-A title.

It was "banner night" for the 1976 edition of Munday's Moguls, since this was stated to be the first victory over the Indians in 21 years!

A fumble at the Munday 21 set Haskell up in the first period as Quarterback Gary McAdams romped off all the 21 yards in one play, but the PAT try failed. Haskell had, however, gained a 6-0 lead over Coach Jim Pope's charges.

But it was short lived.

Robby Thompson returned a Haskell kickoff to the Indian 18-yard line in the second period, and four plays, plus two penalties figured in Munday's score. Robert Spells, fullback, pushed the ball in from the one, and David Kuehler put the Moguls ahead by one point.

The locals added another TD in the second period as insurance against the marauding Indians. Andy Haynie, quarterback, tossed a 12-yard scoring pass to Mike Urbanczyk for the second counter, and Kuehler again added the extra point.

Haskell threatened like all getout in the fourth period, trying to even the score, but the Indians fumbled on the Mogul 4-yard line. Here's when "Robert Spells and Co." went into action when Spells took a long distance gallop for 96 wonderful yards to ice the game away, 21 to 6.

Munday is now 4-1-2 for the year and 2-1-1 in district play. Haskell is 5-2 and 3-1 for the district, since the Moguls toppled them off their top perch.

Statistics were about even. Haskell gained 13 first downs to the Moguls 12, made 217 yards rushing to the locals' 230, added 67 yards by the air route to 34 for Munday, completing five of 21 attempts to Munday's four out of 11. The Moguls intercepted three Indian

passes. The visitors punted six times for a 30-yard average; the Moguls booted five for 46 yards. Penalties were 5 for 29 yards for Haskell and 5 for 50 yards for Munday. Haskell lost two fumbles, while the Moguls gave up four.

COACH POPE SAYS:

I was very proud of our team against Haskell. Coaches Rodgers and Holderman are to be complimented for their defensive preparation, and Coaches Stapp and Diggs had the Indians charted very well.

Haskell ran a multiple and well balanced offense and could have broken the game wide open at any time. They

Discipline--A Family Affair

Discipline is a family affair involving both parents and children, Mrs. Ilene Miller, a family life education specialist, says.

Through personal example, repeated explanations and daily guidance, mothers and fathers help their children learn how to behave in different situations, she noted.

This specialist is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

"Primary responsibility for making judgements about their children's behavior rests with parents until the children are mature enough to make their own decisions. But a child will be slow to act responsibly, if he does not have opportunities to learn what is expected of him."

Young children must be told, guided, shown how and often told again before they learn what parents expect. Children need lots of positive direction; they need to know what they can do rather than what not to do. Positive directions help them learn how to act in different situations, she said.

"Guidelines and limits which help young children maintain self-control are also a must. For example, toddlers and pre-schoolers need firm guidance because they lack the maturity and experience to know how to behave in many situations. In contrast, older children in the family may be ready for more freedom and responsibility.

"Parents should set and enforce a few reasonable rules which consider the needs and abilities of each individual child. In setting limits, decide what rules are necessary for the well-being of the child and others and for the protection of property. Do not hesitate to change the rules once the child outgrows the need for such limits," she advised.

Young children need to know the possible consequences of their actions, and why some rules are necessary. Parents help their children make wise responsible decisions by talking about what could happen if the child does not-or does-behave in a specific way. Parents should also be consistent and enforce the family rules so the child will

know what to expect in different situations.

Also, it is important to remember that children learn by example. The way a parent or older brother of sister behaves often makes more of an impression on a youngster than anything they might say to the child, the specialist reminded.

Can colds be avoided? Colds increase when the winter heating season begins, because the dry air in heated rooms parches the nose and throat membranes, which are then more susceptible to virus infection. Dry mucous membranes cannot clean themselves by action of their cilia (hairlike structures) that move mucous upward out of the respiratory system, clearing away germs and viruses. If homes, schools, and places of work can be humidified to about 40% it should help to reduce the common cold infection.



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Can we afford four more years without effective leadership?
