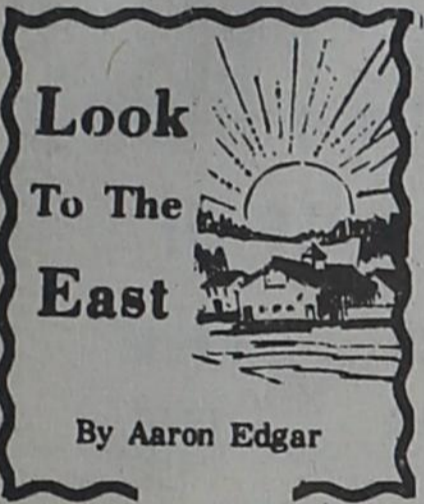

Local Fire Department Gets Check

The Munday Volunteer Fire Department received a check for \$75.00 recently from Texas Farm Bureau Insurance Companies as an expression of thanks for the Department's work on the property of Cecil Welch, Munday.

The Texas Farm Bureau Insurance Companies pay volunteer fire departments this amount when the department works at a fire in rural areas, involving property insured by them.

The Company believes volunteer fire departments have contributed to reduce the amount of loss involved by fire and more important, to prevent fires. It is their hope this money will help the Munday Volunteer Fire Department in their program.

Ten Units Of Housing Completed

Ten of the units in "Site A" of the Munday Housing Authority, which have been under repair for several weeks, were completed the latter part of last week. Tenants were being moved into the refinished apartment units the first of this week.

Work was progressing on replacing the old gas lines, and this was expected to be completed by Wednesday of this week.

As tenants are vacating the old units for the new ones, work will be started on repairing the remaining 10 units of Site A. This work involves the first construction of the Munday Housing Authority erected in the early 1950s.

McFaddin Ranch Goes On Market

According to word received here, the 48,600-acre McFaddin Ranch located in Knox and King counties has been placed on the market by James Dugger, receiver in bankruptcy for the Bobby Johnson case.

Before his disappearance, Johnson had cleared some 20,000 acres of the ranch, which he sowed in wheat. The ranch reportedly was advertised in the Wall Street Journal's real estate section.

The ad stated all bids on the ranch will be subject to approval of the federal bankruptcy judge in the case, and these bids will be considered in open court in Wichita Falls on Thursday, July 21.

4 Accidents Reported In Knox County

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated four accidents on rural highways in Knox County during the month of May, 1977 according to Sergeant Frank Jirick, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

The crashes resulted in no persons killed and one person injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for May, 1977 shows a total of 541 accidents resulting in 18 persons killed and 338 persons injured as compared to May, 1976, with 517 accidents resulting in 14 persons killed and 628 persons injured. This was 24 more accidents, four more killed, and 70 more injured in 1977 at the same period of time.

A semi-annual progress report of water study of the Seymour Aquifer—located in Knox, Baylor and Haskell Counties—was made at 10 a. m. Tuesday, June 14, in the local Chamber of Commerce office.

The study is now approximately 60 per cent complete. R. W. Harden and Associates of Austin, was awarded the contract for this study by the Texas Water Quality Board. It was funded in the amount of \$250,000 in March of 1975.

Since that time, a total of 1,120 water samples have been analyzed for mineral studies, which include salt brine, herbicide, pesticide and nitrates.

Water level recorders were installed at two locations, one near Rochester and one near Munday, and 450 water level measurements have been taken. According to Mr. Harden, 40,000 to 50,000 acre feet of water (the average used for irrigation for the past 10 years) can be used without depleting the basin. A recharge of this aquifer from normal rainfall is very rapid, making the aquifer unique in

June Sales Tax In County Is \$10,823.76

Bob Bullock, state comptroller, said Wednesday his office has mailed checks totalling \$39.3 million to 865 Texas cities for their June share of the one per cent sales tax.

The latest checks bring to \$167.1 million the amount rebated to the cities to date this year, a 15.1 per cent increase over the same period last year.

Knox County's share of the June tax amounted to \$10,823.76, according to figures released by Bullock. Broke down into towns, the figures show: Benjamin, \$508.53; Goree, \$595.73; Knox City, \$4,963.10; Munday, \$4,758.40.

Payments to Knox County to date in 1977 amounted to \$33,561.38, and the tax money was distributed as follows: Benjamin, \$915.14;

AUSTIN -- Having completed its third biennial study of the Texas Legislature, in its July issue, gives the inside story on Texas' Ten Best and Ten Worst legislators and selects other legislators fitting into "exceptional" categories, dauntless to dubious.

Appearing on the "Best list" are John Bryant (D-Dallas), Ronald Coleman (D-El Paso), Ray Farabee (D-Wichita Falls), Lance Lalor (D-Houston), Lynn Nabers (D-Brownwood), Jim Nugent (D-Kerrville), Wayne Peveto (D-Orange), A. R. "Babe" Schwartz (D-Galveston), Max Sherman (D-Amarillo), and John Wilson (D-La Grange).

Rated as "Worst legislators" are Tom Creighton (D-Mineral Wells), Bob David (R-Irving), Charles Evans (D-Hurst), DeWitt Hale (D-Corpus Christi), Glenn Kothmann (D-San Antonio), Tom Massey (D-San Angelo), Chris Miller (D-Fort Worth), Bill Presnal (D-Bryan), Joe Tom Robbins (R-Lubbock), and Clay Smothers (D-Dallas).

George T. "Mickey" Leland (D-Houston) is the recipient of a special "Bridge Over Troubled Waters Award." Three other specially created categories include legislators considered to be "Missing in Action," "Prisoners of War," and "Furniture."

Of Senator Farabee, the magazine had this to say: "All the cliches fit this rising Senate star; observers describe him as conscientious, hardworking, smart, fair, independent, someone who does his homework. These qualities apply to at least a score of legislators; yet there is something about this soft-spoken, scholarly looking senator that sets him apart—an air of inner strength, of incorruptibility, which suggest that a true legislative craftsman may be in the making."

Texas Monthly goes on to cite the many accomplishments of Senator Farabee, such as passing the "natural death with dignity" bill for terminally ill patients and carrying the worker's compensation bill that "required delicate handling" in both houses.

Hot, Dry Weather Continues

People, especially wheat and potato farmers, who were concerned about the continued wet weather as the harvest approached now have their concern turned into another direction.

As eagerly as they wanted the wet weather to end early in June, they are now concerned about the dry weather ending and moisture returning to the area.

The wheat harvest is over, and elevator operators were removing the grain which had been piled on the ground into storage or railway cars during the week-end.

Activity around the potato processing sheds in Munday during the weekend indicated that the spud harvest was still going strong.

Hot and dry weather has continued for some three weeks, now, and the need for moisture is quite evident on the farms, on home lawns and gardens of those in town. This is the period of year when dry weather almost always prevails, and folks begin to quote the old saying: "It nearly always rains around July 4th." A rain here then wouldn't hurt anything, however.

Goodson Sellers, U. S. weather observer, reported Monday that the thermometer ranged near 100 degrees all last week, reaching the century mark on two occasions and registering 99 on Sunday, June 19.

Carrying the experiment further, we picked up a late issue of Readers Digest and found coupons that offered such savings as:

40 cents on Sanka Coffee, 12 cents on bran flakes, 10 cents on bran chex, 25 cents on Spray'n Vac; 15 cents on Colgates, 30 cents on Demorex, 20 cents on any Desenex product and 10 cents on KenL Ration.

So a coupon is worth money these days, and that old "penny saved" stays right in the jeans. Reminds us of those trying days during the Great Depression, when small towns and communities took up the idea of paying off in scrip, rather than that scarce American money. The scrip was accepted at face value at participating stores, but it wasn't worth a hoot owl's hoot outside the community. Scrip served to keep the money, if any, in the community. But you couldn't pay house rent or make auto payments with the stuff; therefore, some money was necessary.

Likewise, you can't use these coupons for anything other than the designated items. But it's good business to save them!
