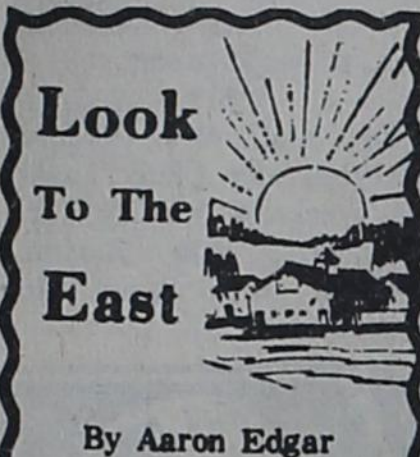

It's called the "Cyclethon". Instead of walking to raise funds, participants will ride.

This interesting activity will be held in Knox County on Saturday, May 17, and will involve riders from both Munday and Knox City. Anyone in the county may register to ride from either place.

Registration will be on Saturday, May 17, at 8 a.m. at a point on the city hall lawn in Munday, according to Kenneth Roberts of Benjamin, chairman for the fund drive. The ride will begin around 8:30.

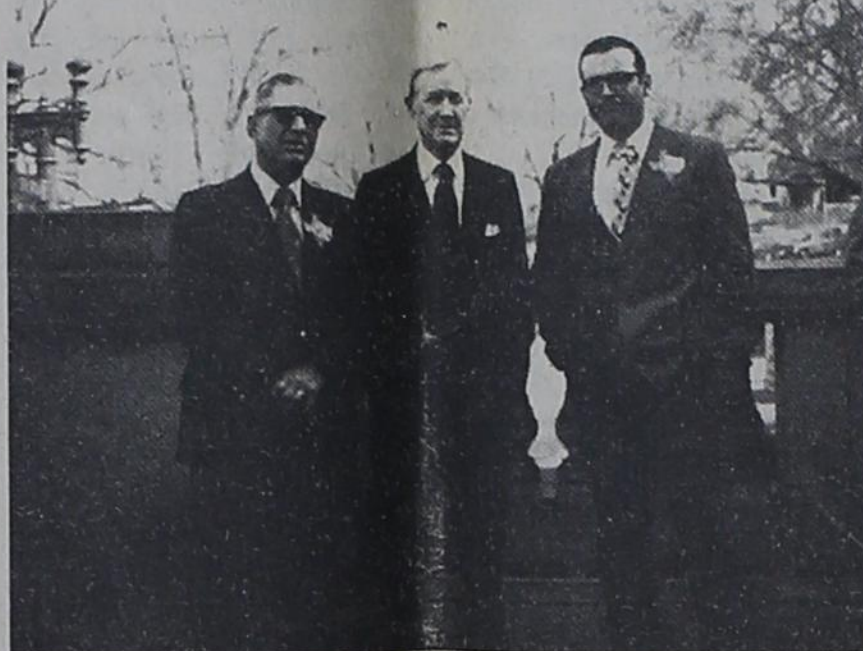
Munday riders will "bike" to Knox City and back. Those in Knox City will ride to Munday and back.

The cyclethon is open to everyone-boys, girls, men and women of all ages. The idea is not how fast you make the trip, but how many sponsors you secure. Each person will secure as many sponsors as possible.

The sponsor agrees to pay a stipulated amount to the rider. If you agree on 10 cents per mile, for instance, your rider will make the round trip of 24 miles and then collect \$2.40 from you. It's as simple as that!

The winning rider will receive a 10-speed bike for first prize. Second prize will be a 3-speed bike. Various other prizes will be offered with participants drawing for these.

## Hail Damage Extensive

Hail damage in a "quicker" thundershower last Sunday afternoon wrought havoc to grain and small crops of farmers over a wide area southeast of Munday.

The hailstones doing the greatest damage were of hen egg size, it was reported, and the accompanying rain was light. "We received a half-inch of rain, and two inches of hail," one of the farmer-victims reported.

A wide swath was cut over prime farmlands southeast of Munday and northeast of Weinert. Some hail was also reported at Bomarton, while the storm also extended from the new Millers Creek Lake into Seymour.

E. D. "Toots" Earle stated early Monday that he was completely wiped out. Reported damage to other farms, estimated at 60 to 75 percent, included those of Lester Hutchinson, Clyde Patton, J. D. Hicks, Elmer Adams, Tommy West, Ronnie Stewart and on the Hobert Farm and Moore

Farm.

Grain elevator operators in Munday and Weinert, who were making preparations for the 1975 wheat and oat harvest, were making surveys of area farmlands Monday and were reporting a bleak picture everywhere. R. W. (Bob) Raynes of Weinert made an inspection

tour of area farms last Monday and reported the hail spotted. Some farms suffered 60 to 75 per cent loss, while others had 15 to 20 per cent and 20 to 25 per cent damage. "It's not a pretty picture," he said, "as between 2,500 and 3,000 acres of fine looking crops were really hurt."

## Gillespie Baptist Church To Hold Homecoming Celebration On Sunday

People will be assembling from "the four corners" next Sunday, May 4, when the 79th anniversary of the founding of Gillespie Baptist Church will be celebrated together with a homecoming of former members of the church.

It will be a day of dedication, celebration, reminiscing over old

times, and planning for the future of a church that has served the religious needs of many people throughout the years.

"We are expecting between 300 and 400 people to assemble for the church services and homecoming program," Rev. Ray Milhoan, pastor, said Tuesday. "We cordially invite all interested persons to join us in this celebration."

The Gillespie Church was founded sometime in 1896, the exact date not being known, because church records were destroyed in a fire that destroyed the home of E. S. Harrison, church clerk, in 1909. The church was dedicated to the service of God in 1905.

Changes have been made, with services now being held in the third building for the congregation. The present edifice was dedicated on March 29, 1953. Since then a new educational building has been constructed, and this will be dedicated on May 18, 1975.

It was recalled that Mrs.

Hoyt Gray is the oldest living member of the church. She joined by baptism in 1904.

A total of forty-four pastors have served the Gillespie Baptist Church since its foundation. Some were there for only a short time, pastoring the church while still students in universities, while others served for longer periods. Some went on into mission work and greater fields of service.

Rev. Ray Milhoan has been the pastor since February 23, 1973. In addition to his church duties, he is a licensed pilot and flying instructor, teaching both ground schools and

## Mother Receives Call From 'Missing' Son!

"Thank God! My prayers have been answered!"

This expression of thanksgiving came from a distraught Munday mother on Tuesday evening, April 22, 1975, after receiving a telephone call from her son.

A son calling his mother long distance is nothing unusual, but circumstances leading up to this call had injected anxiety, fear, doubt, and hope against hope that she would some day see her son alive.

The mother is Mrs. E. J. Smith of Munday, whose son, John Honeycutt, bade her goodbye almost a year

ago, stating he was going to Lubbock for a few days vacation before beginning of the 1974 wheat harvest that would keep him busy at his service station in Munday.

A friend took him to Seymour, where he was supposed to catch a bus for Lubbock-and that's the last time he was seen or heard from by anyone in Munday until just a few days ago.

Mrs. Smith waited anxiously, dispiringly for her son's return-or for some word from him. She knew not what to do where to turn, or anything, except pray.

Finally, the Knox County sheriff's department entered the scene, and Sheriff H. C. Stone worked on lead after lead for a number of months. He followed leads over a greater part of the nation. "I'd be afraid to venture a guess as to how many telephone calls I have received or made, or how many miles I have travelled in following these leads," he said last Friday.

Each lead led to "dead end street," and resulted in a report to the anxious mother--no success!

But finally, a lead paid off! Saturday night, April 19, Sheriff Stone was out with two other officers of this area, making plans to take a prisoner to Huntsville, then the officers were to attend a law enforcement school at Sam Houston State College. He received a telephone call, but could not be contacted.

The call was then transferred to Deputy Pete Hatfield in Munday, and Sheriff Stone was notified at about 11 p.m. Saturday night, and given the message: The missing man had been seen in Houston.

Honeycutt had been recognized by Mr. and Mrs. Charles Sargent of Freer, former Munday residents. Mrs. Sargent made the phone call.

Stone went on to Houston from Huntsville, arriving there about 5 p.m. Tuesday, April 22. He solicited help of Houston officers, and they located the missing man as he was working in a domino parlor adjacent to a hotel where he was staying part-time.

In the conversation that followed, Honeycutt declined to return to Munday with Sheriff Stone, but he agreed to accompany him to the police station and have his photograph made to show to his mother to really convince her he was still alive.

Stone reached Mrs. Smith by telephone at the time, then handed the telephone to Honeycutt, who said: "Hello, Mother, this is John, and I'm fine," and he

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## Marijuana Found On South Wichita River

Acting on an alert given by Colorado City law enforcement officers, the Knox County sheriff's department found five "bricks" each containing 2 1/4 pounds of marijuana, valued at between \$3,000 and \$4,000 last Monday night. The find was near the bridge of the South Wichita River on Highway 284 some five miles north of Benjamin.

Colorado City officials had been alerted that a plane carrying the marijuana was nearing their vicinity. When

the suspected plane landed at the Colorado City airport, a "road block" was set up. As the plane took off hurriedly, it barely missed the cars blocking the runway, severing their antennas.

Officials at Colorado City alerted officers along the supposed route of the plane. Destination of the flight was not known.

This was on Sunday night, April 20, and "the drop" was found by Knox officials on Monday night along the highway right-of-way. It was supposed that those in the plane were dropping the illicit "drugs" near easily identified landmarks so it could be picked up later.

Officials estimated that at least 750 pounds of marijuana was being carried in the plane.

Sheriff H. C. Stone and Ray Milhoan, pilot, searched an area by plane from Knox City to approximately 15 miles north of Benjamin last Friday afternoon, but found no additional drops.

Stone said local drug connections are very widespread ranging to Dallas, Fort Worth, Houston and even into the Big Bend country.

Following the conversation, Stone realized his job had been done. He shook hands with Honeycutt, bade him goodbye, and returned to Munday.

The drama has almost ended. Happiness abounds in the E. J. Smith home—but a happier moment will be when a loving mother holds her son in her arms after eleven long months—and after he had been given up for dead.

**Water Study Funds Approved**

The Texas Water Quality Board announced last week approval of a 40-month study aimed at discovering the causes and cure of pollution of ground water in the Knox-Haskell County area. The study has been funded in the amount of \$237,000.

The board also approved hiring of Rollin W. Harden of Austin, a private ground water consultant, to carry out the investigations. The \$215,000 contract price for work is subject to increases due to inflation.

The State Department of Health is to receive \$22,000 for laboratory analysis of water from the area. Harden previously served with the Texas Board of Water Engineers, predecessor of the Water Development Board, and as a consultant to

William Guyton and Associates of Austin.

The study is to deal primarily with the Seymour aquifer.

WQB executive director Hugh Yantis said a study of the aquifer by Texas A&M University was not satisfactory to the residents who had requested the new study.

Yantis added that he does not want the study to become the basis for any private legal actions—saying he feels it should be "engineeringly sound" but "not legally sound."

Harden said area residents feel they have an inexhaustible supply of water for irrigation, so long as it is not damaged by pollution. The study is intended to find the sources of pollution—including chlorides, nitrates and sulphates—and to recommend ways of ending the pollution, Harden said.

The WQB staff report says the WQB had hoped to use the Texas Agricultural experiment station at Munday for some of the work, but that rates proposed by the station were much higher than those of the Department of Health for analysis work.

Part of the work is to be performed by the Water Development Board, including such items as installation of water level records, and computer analysis, "at no charge," the report states.

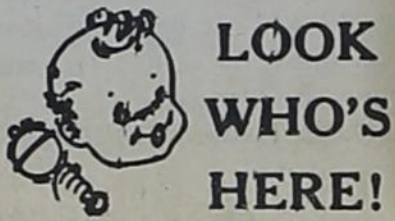
Yantis said the reasoning was that the WQB has an interest in developing some of the information on the aquifer.

**Voters Split On Amendments**

Voters of Knox County split on the two amendments—approving one and rejecting the other—in the special election on Tuesday, April 22.

They rejected the proposed legislative pay raise by a vote of 250 to 239, and approved the state employees and teacher retirement by 292 to 205 votes. A total of 497 votes were cast in the county.

State-wide, the voters approved both amendments, however the one on retirement was voted in by a much wider margin.

## TEXAS TALK

Demand for quality cotton continues to increase. Not only is the use of natural fiber rebounding, but the by-product market is also expanding. Since average cottonseed meal is at least 41 percent protein, it is becoming increasingly important as a primary feed for cattle, sheep and horses.

Expeller, Hydraulic and Solvent are processes used to produce meal or cake from raw cotton seed. Expeller and Hydraulic processes leave about 5 percent fat content in processed meal while the Solvent process leaves less than 1-1/2 percent.

Research now underway may result in an economically feasible method of limiting Gossypol (a cottonseed toxin) content to low enough levels to make cottonseed meal a primary protein supplement for swine and poultry. Success could significantly increase this by-product demand.

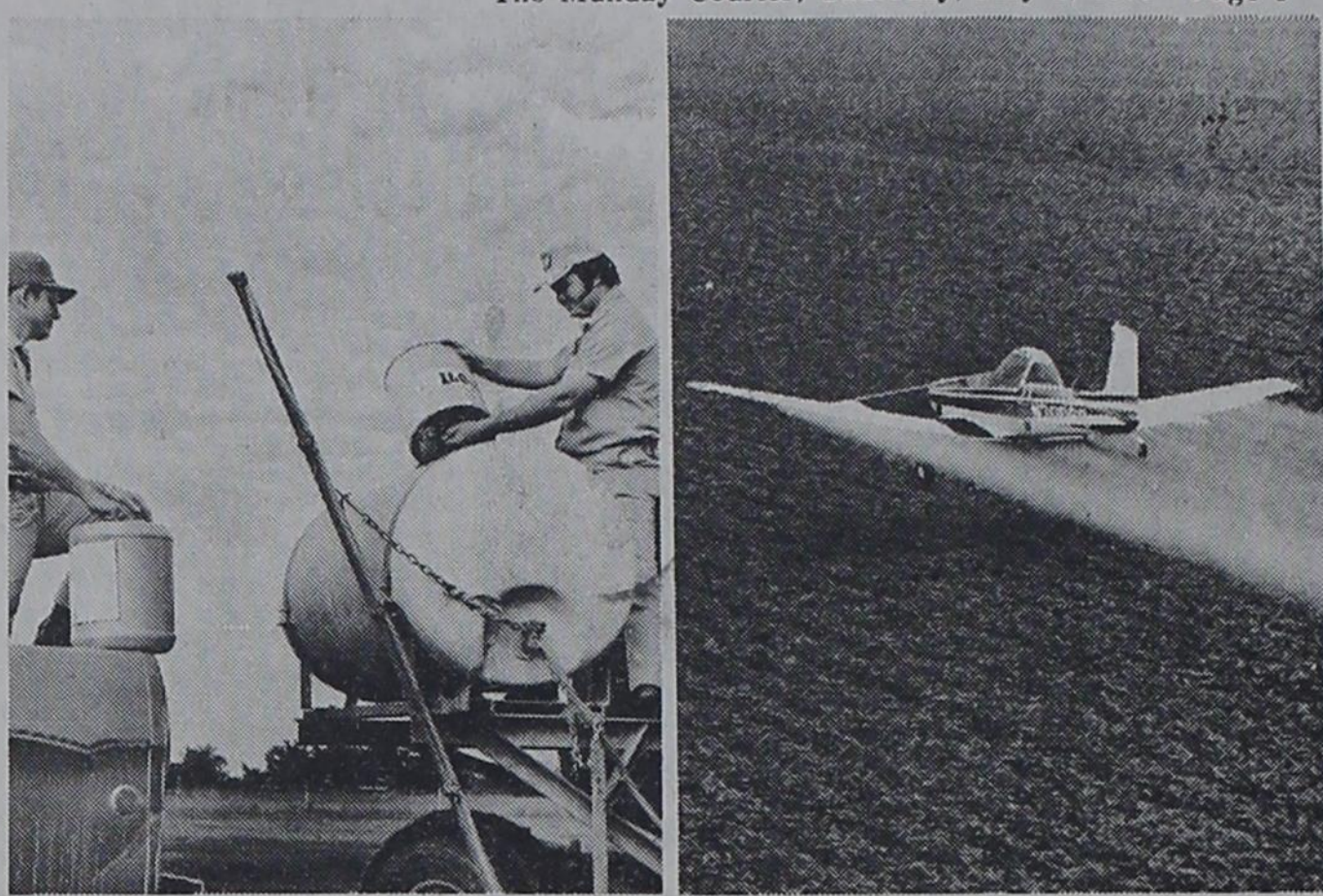
Announcement was made of a parade to be held June 7th.

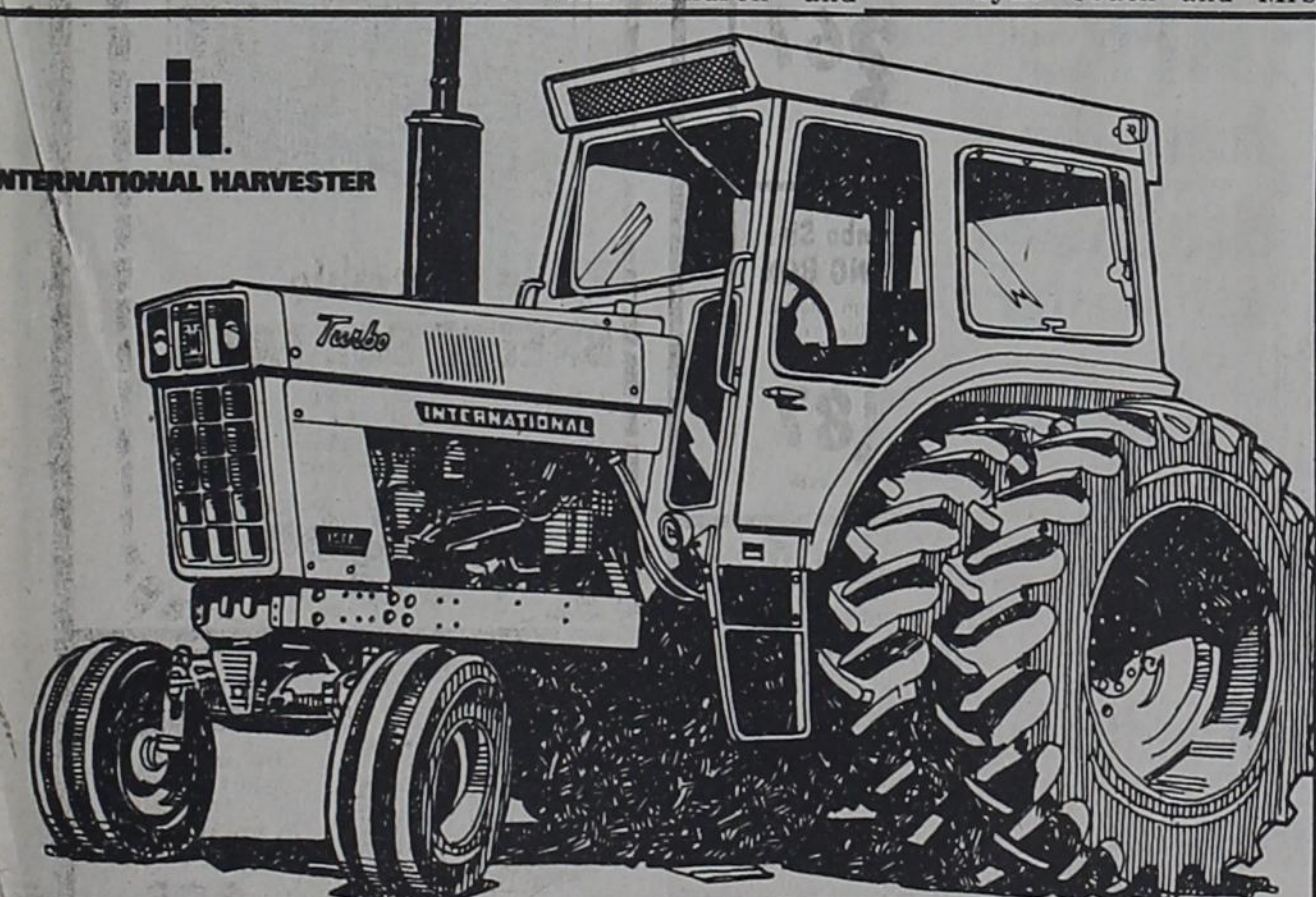
