Look To The East

Being able to shut out undesirable noises is an admirable trait.

We've had people tell us they can concentrate on two different things at one time—that is read a book or newspaper and listen to the radio, and keep track of both activities without difficulty.

This is a more admirable trait, and this we can not do.

We often look at a newspaper and have some pretense of watching something taking place on the "idiot tube". Much of the time we are concentrating on just one; or, maybe, neither.

If noise of the TV strikes a responsive chord, we must, of necessity, divert our attention from the newspaper to the television to get the full impact. Our feeble mind will not be directed to both.

If another thought pushes into our one-track mind, we quite often fail at reading the newspaper item and watching the airwaves program.

We have a habit, perhaps good, perhaps bad, of listening to the radio while enjoying our morning breakfast. Our first act upon arising is to turn on the radio to get the news and weather, then we keep it on, more than anything else, because it breaks the unbearable silence.

Quite often at the breakfast table, the Mrs. will ask: "What was that about the weather?", to which we reply: "I don't know." She rejoins with, "Well, you were listening to it!"

That's what we mean by shutting out noises. Another thought just forced its way ahead of the weather news. Sometimes it upsets us for this to happen. We were waiting for the weather, too!

We had to train ourself early in our newspapering to shut out noises. We were assigned to the front desk on The Collingsworth Standard at Wellington. The office was right next door to a jewelry store, where a young, musically-inclined boy often had to hold down the fort while his dad vacated the place for a spell.

He installed a loud speaker on the front awning and rigged up for playing all of the popular (and unpopular) tunes of the day. The louder the music, the better he liked it.

Our old typewriter would refuse to go, at times, because of the loud music coming through the doorway. This was before air-conditioning was even practiced, and it was necessary to let a little fresh air come in through the open doorway.

As time went on, we became adjusted to the situation and could type up a sort of masterpiece story without being conscious of the musical notes that permeated the air from next door.

This proved to be pretty good training for us, even after coming to Munday.

In the late thirties and early forties, it was quite popular to have a loud speaker blasting forth in Munday, especially on Saturdays, in the belief that

Judging the show was Tom Gibbs of Wichita Falls, with the following results being announced:

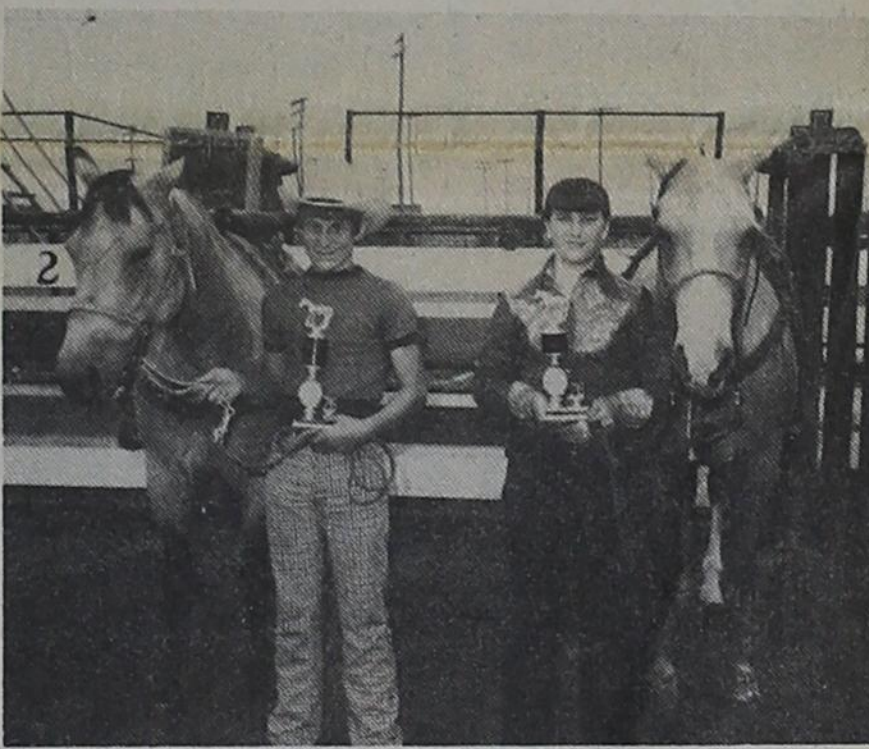

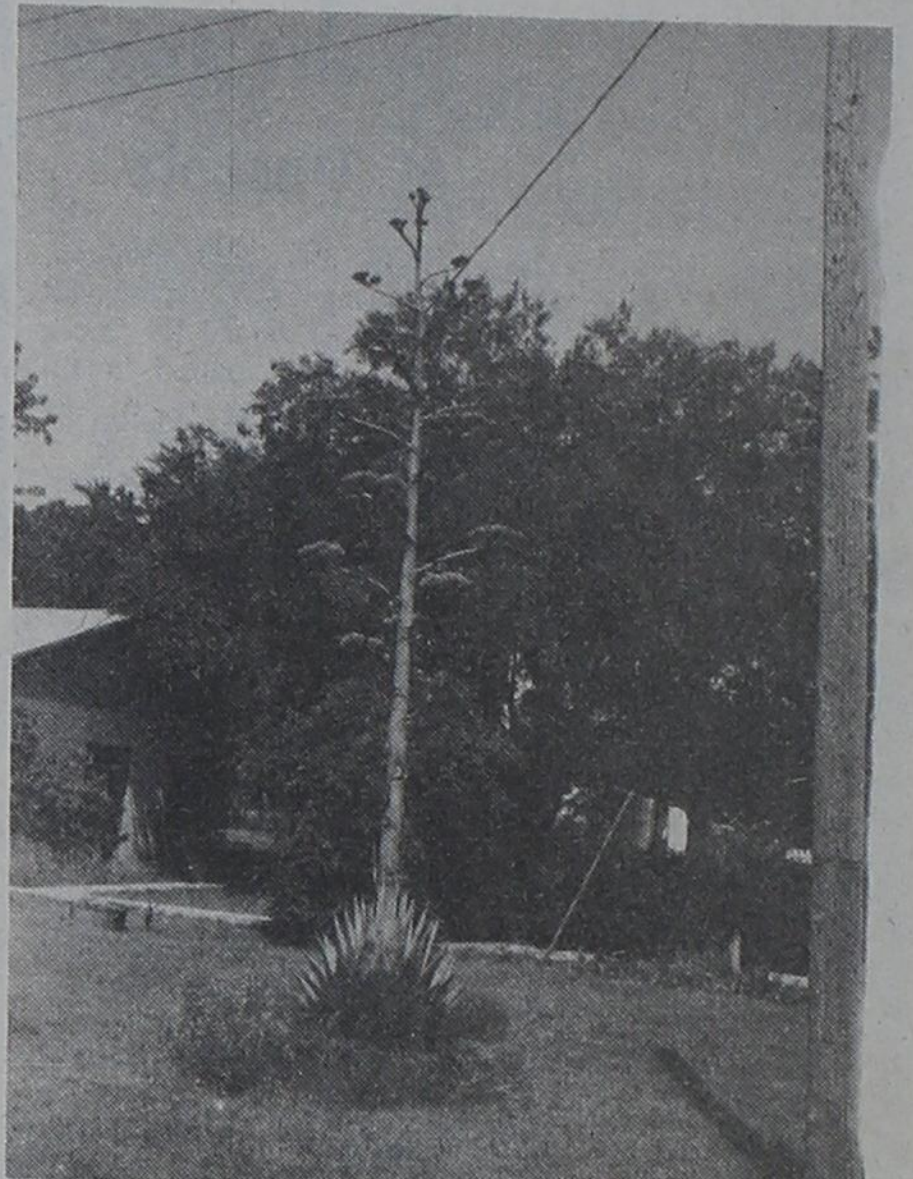
PLAYDAY SLATED AT BENJAMIN

Johnston Wins In Precinct Runoff

Billy Gene Johnston, one of the runoff candidates for the office of Commissioner of Precinct One of Knox County, was winner in last Saturday's runoff election by a margin of only 46 votes. Johnston received a total of 290 votes in the election, while Buddy Angle, former mayor of Knox City, had a total of 244 votes in the close election.

It was ironic that the precinct contest contained the only interest in this runoff election. With a total of 635 votes being cast county-wide, the two candidates for commissioner received a total of 534 votes.

Voting was extremely light in Munday; however, all three of the voting boxes were open.

In the race for railroad

commissioner, Jon Newton was the winner, receiving 454 votes to the 181 for Jerry Sadler in Knox County.

In the race for judge, court of criminal appeals, W. T. Phillips garnered the most Knox County votes, 307 to 269 for Carl Dally.

Voting was light all over the state.

The award will be presented at 3:30 p. m. Friday in the Truscott post office by Elmer Reed, Lubbock postmaster.

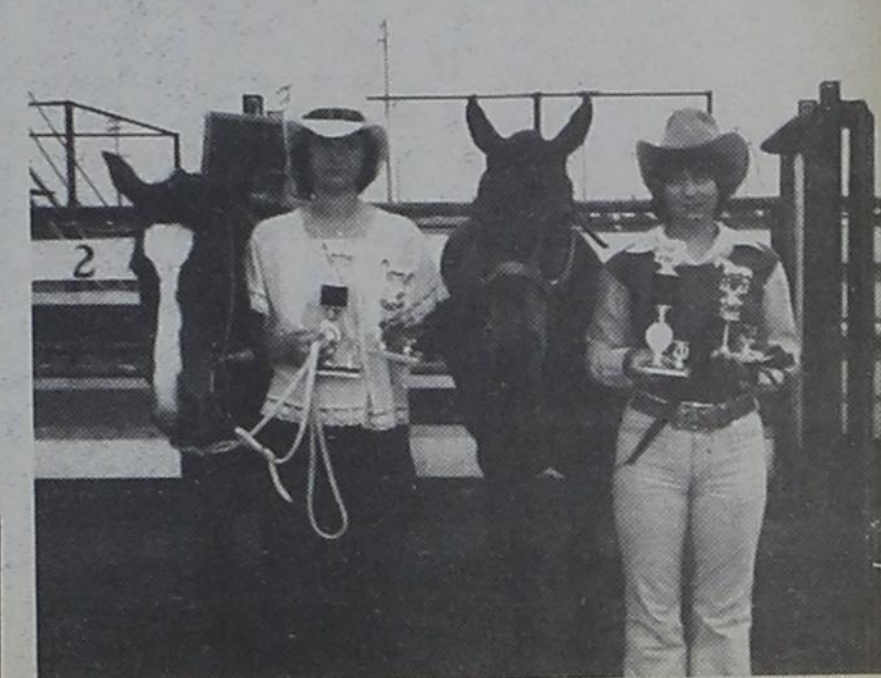

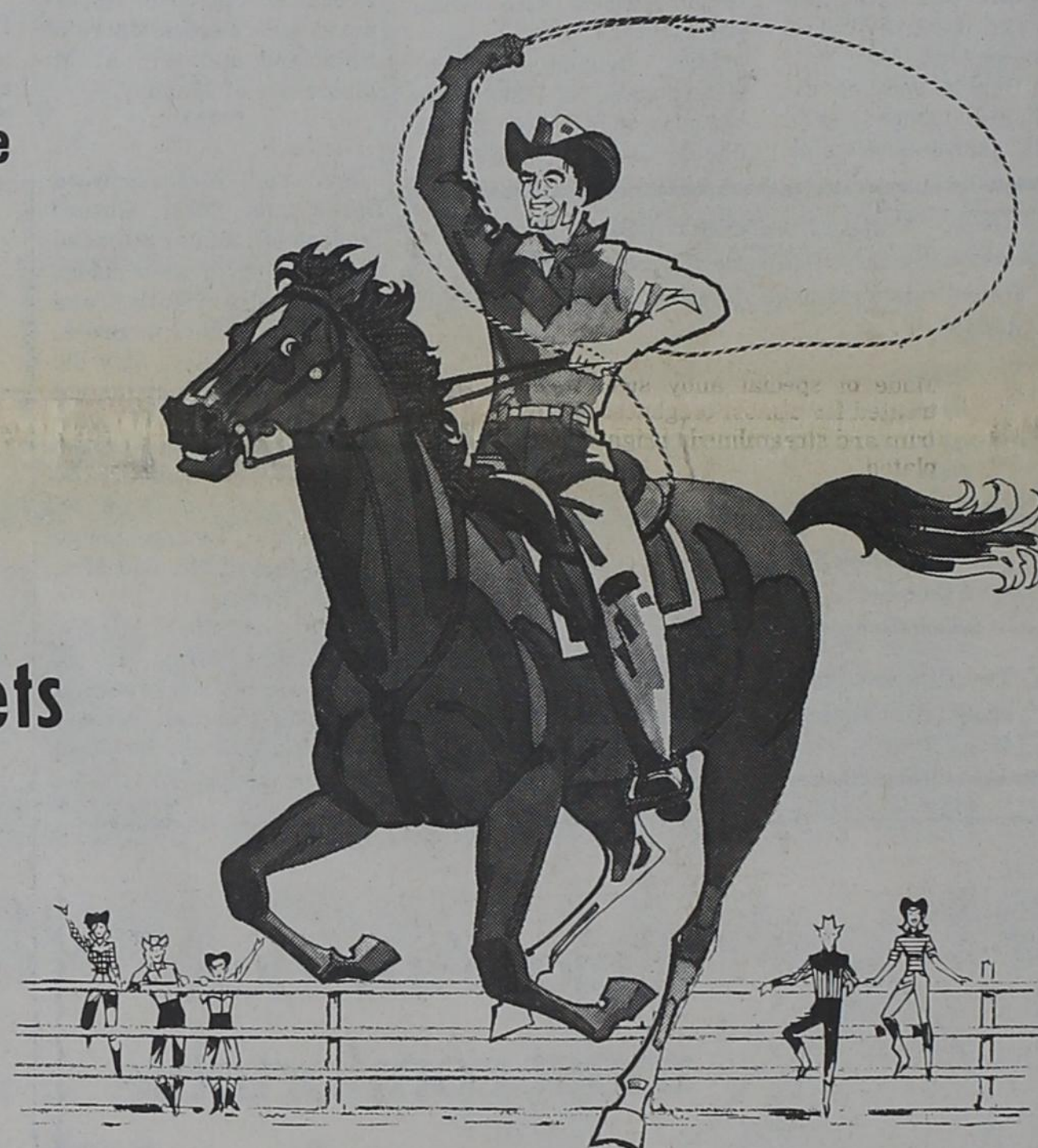

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you and the LAW

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Q: I've been living with a man for three years. We have one child. He has two children living with us. If he should die without leaving a will, would I have to go to court to claim his Social Security, and the house we are buying?

A: Any claim by a common law widow concerning Social Security benefits would depend on whether she could prove to the Social Security Administration that the common law marriage met the law's requirements. The rights of two people buying a house depend on many factors, including whether there is a valid common law marriage or whether the property was bought by them jointly as tenants-in-common. If the home is the family homestead, and if the common law marriage is valid, the widow has a community 1/2 interest in the property and the right to remain in the house for her lifetime, so long as the mortgage or other debt on the property is paid. If there was no valid common law marriage and the property was purchased by them jointly, she would own 1/2 as a tenant-in-common.

Q: Before my husband and I recently separated, he asked me to sign a blank income tax return; I refused. I told him I would sign a completed form, but the deadline has passed and I haven't received it. Could he have filed the return without my signature?

A: The Internal Revenue

Service cannot process a joint tax return with only one signature. You should contact IRS to learn whether a joint return has been filed in your name. If it has been filed, IRS will explain how to correct the situation. If no return has been filed, you should file a return to avoid penalties for failure to file.

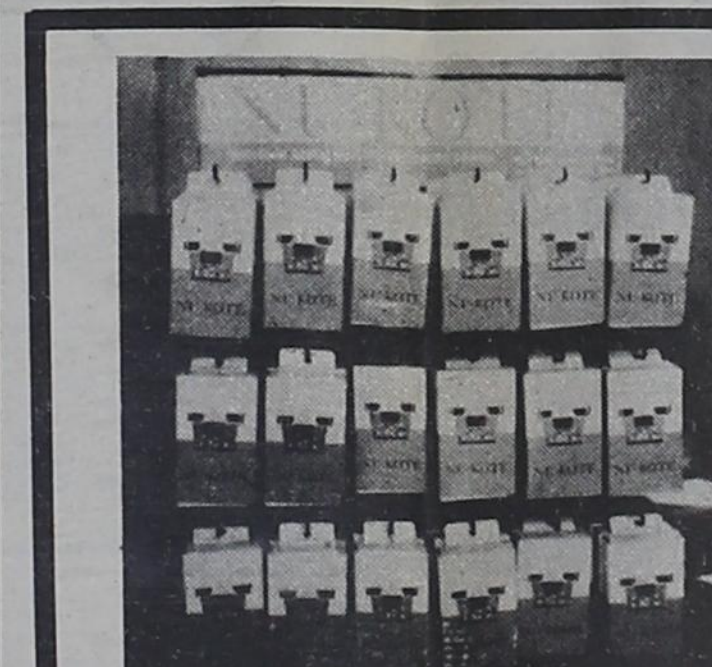
Q: My mortgage company recently increased my monthly house payment \$8 per month. The company said the increase was for "future insurance needs." However, I am purchasing the homeowners insurance policy myself — it is not being purchased by the mortgage company. Is there any way I can prevent this increase?

A: Mortgage companies are not regulated by any state or federal agency, as to their use of escrow funds. Therefore, there is no administrative procedure available to challenge a mortgage company's increase in your monthly payment.

Q: While my son is away from home without permission, am I legally responsible for any damage he causes?

A: Parents are responsible for the malicious and willful destruction of the property of others by their child until that child is 18 years old. The amount of responsibility is limited to \$5,000 for each act of willful destruction.

State Earnings Soar in April

Comptroller Bob Bullock said Thursday that the state earned \$602.7 million in revenues during April, the eighth month of fiscal year 1976, while spending \$492 million.

The April totals brought total revenues during the fiscal year to date to \$4.1 billion, the Comptroller said in his monthly financial statement, while year-to-date expenditures climbed to \$4.4 billion.

Bullock noted that his new system of depositing tax receipts directly to the Treasury resulted in a net increase of \$57.4 million in the state's cash position at the end of April.

Revenues during fiscal year 1976 are running 17 percent ahead of fiscal year 1975, said the Comptroller, while expenditures are about 22 percent higher than fiscal year 1975 expenditures.

He said the motor vehicle sales tax is yielding 25 percent more revenue than during the same period a year ago, while the sales tax is yielding 14 percent more.

TEXAS TALK
By Tommie Harper
Nosema Locustae is not an Italian film star. It is the proper and scientific term for a parasite which causes a fatal disease ... one that's good news. Good because the only victim is one of agriculture's top enemies, the Grasshopper. Under way right now, the testing of the effectiveness of the parasite is the largest of its kind in history. Nearly 100 thousand acres of crops are involved and results will be reported over a three year period. Basically, the idea of the program is to have grasshoppers eat wheat bran which has been treated with Nosema Locustae and sprayed over infested crops. Once ingested by the hopper the parasites multiply and eventually kill the grasshopper. Scientists are enthusiastic because it could mean effective control without the use of expensive pathogens. Initial testing indicated as many as 90 percent of the grasshoppers coming in contact with the parasite were eliminated.

Little River Academy Is Top Community

Little River Academy in Bell County has been named the state's top rural community in competition in the Texas Community Improvement Program.

The announcement came from Garland Marshall, community improvement specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, after a team of judges completed their visit of the four communities that were named finalists two weeks ago.

The Austwell Community in Refugio County came in second in the state judging while Callisburg in Cooke County placed third and Guase in Milam County came in fourth.

The state judging team consisted of Extension Service specialists Dr. Ernest Davis, Charles E. Lawrence and Miss Marilyn Haggard.

"This year's competition in the state finals was the best I have seen in my six years as a judge," said

Lawrence, speaking on behalf of the entire judging team. "Overall, these four communities offered the closest competition I can recall.

"I was particularly impressed with the total program that each of these four communities have in operation," Lawrence continued. "Each showed total involvement of all the people—the young and old alike. This blending of all the people and their working together is a great thing to witness."

The Texas Community Improvement Program is sponsored by the investor-owned electric utility companies in the state and is administered by the Extension Service. Cash awards are provided to the top communities at the district, regional and state levels. The state finalists also receive silver trays.

The TCIP is designed to give a helping hand to rural communities with a population of 1,000 people or less by assisting them in organizing the community leadership and in utilizing community resources more effectively and efficiently. This year's program involved 217 communities representing 83 counties.

A Weekly Report Of Agri-Business News

First Bale Time Nearing... Wheat Harvest Moving Along... Almost 100 Per Cent Gain.

In between streaks of bad weather, Texas cotton producers are finishing the planting of the 1976 crop. Cool, rainy weather has delayed growth as well as planting, but the crop is now more than three-fourths seeded throughout the state.

Meanwhile, it won't be long until the first bale of 1976 cotton is ginned; that usually happens in the Rio Grande Valley shortly after the middle of June. The outlook for cotton usage this year continues to be bright. Domestic use of cotton is up and is expected to remain good through this marketing season.

The final figures for the 1975 cotton crop in Texas showed it to be the smallest crop since 1946. Harvested acres last year slipped 11 per cent making it the smallest harvested crop in the state since 1967. The crop last year totaled 2,382,000 bales. This enabled Texas to regain its position as the top cotton producing state in the nation.

WHILE COTTON HARVEST is nearing, wheat harvest in the Central part of the state is rapidly gaining momentum, but rain has also delayed harvest of this crop. If weather will cooperate, harvest of wheat on the Low and High Plains will be underway.

The wheat based on May 1 conditions will total 70,200,000 bushels in Texas this season. This will be a decline of 46 per cent from a year ago. This year's yield is expected to average only 18 bushels per acre, down more than 20 per cent from last year. Harvested acres are expected to be down about a third from 1975, reports the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Even though the crop in Texas will be cut in half, there still will be plenty of wheat produced throughout the nation. A crop of around two billion bushels is forecast, including winter and spring wheat.

The nation's needs for wheat will amount to about 700 million bushels. This will leave above 1.3 million bushels available to meet export needs.

TEXAS DRYLOT SHEEP FEEDERS with a capacity of 2,000 head or more had 57,000 sheep and lambs on feed for slaughter as of May 1. This is 90 per cent above the same month a year ago, but 12 per cent below April of this year.

Current intentions to market are 21,000 during June and 7,000 during July.

SORGHUM PLANTING throughout the state is nearing the completion mark, and harvest of that crop is expected to begin within the next several days.

Corn planting is virtually complete throughout the state. Renewed interest in corn production in parts of the state is being reported, particularly on the High Plains.

Soil Survey Can Help The Homebuilder

A house or a lot on which you plan to build is a big investment. Many people cannot afford to make mistakes. Unsuspected soil hazards can cause serious damage and lead to major expenses. The Soil Conservation Service can help you answer the many questions about your home-site before you build or buy.

Many areas now used for housing were used for farming or pastureland just a few years ago. Many people do not realize that even a small creek or stream can become a raging, destructive river, following a long period of heavy rain. About five percent of the land in the U. S. is on flood plains and a lot of this land is level and seemingly desirable for homebuilding. A prospective homebuyer should always determine whether or not flooding is a hazard. Soil surveys show the extent of flooding in a given area and indicates the hazards of building in the area.

A high water table is also a great problem in many areas. A water table may be at a safe level most of the year, but rise during the wet season. If the water table rises close to the surface, basements may be flooded, septic tank absorption fields

may fail, and plants may be damaged or killed. A soil survey will be able to help the homebuyer locate the high water tables.

If your house is built on certain kinds of clayey soils, the foundation may shift or settle unevenly, and walls, plaster, and foundations may crack severely. Some clayey soils expand as they absorb water, and shrink as they dry. This shrinking and swelling can move a house several inches up and down. Unless the Foundation is designed for such stress, it is

likely to crack. If the house itself remains in place, the soil may settle away from the foundation. Soil surveys tell whether the soil is organic or mineral, and also gives the amount of sand, silt, and clay in each mineral soil and rates the shrinking and swelling potential of the soil.

The average homebuyer doesn't need to know about all the soils, just about the ones his house is on. Many of the soil hazards can be overcome by special structural design or in-

foundation designed to withstand such stress.
