## Planters Arrive For Downtown Area

The first project commemorating the 70th Anniversary of Munday and the Bicentennial year is well under way with the arrival of 30 concrete planters for the downtown area.

When the planters arrived, they were unloaded in designated areas located by a map made by the committee. Special thanks go to Police Chief Boyd Baker, Howard Cook, Rev. H. B. Graves Jr., Clint Norman, Charles Baker and Marty Navarette. The planters were unloaded in the given time limit and are now awaiting the next step—shrubs to be planted. Dr. Bill Kingston and his staff of Texas A&M Research Center will aid in recommending the type shrubs to be planted and supervise the planting.

The planters have been made possible through the efforts of the Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, their Beautification Committee, the City of Munday, civic organizations, local business firms and individuals. So far all expenses have been donated for the planters which indicates keen interest and civic pride among Munday residents.

In a couple of weeks the shrubs should change the looks of downtown Munday. The Chamber of Commerce hopes that every citizen will 'pitch in' to help the city look well kept.

## Moguls To Open Season With Seymour Panthers

Scrimmage sessions are over, and this week it's 'football for keeps' for the Munday Moguls.

It's kinda traditional that the Moguls open the season against their long-time foes, the Seymour Panthers, and the local team is following this tradition this year. They will journey to Seymour on Friday night for this annual battle, opening at 8 p.m.

This is, of course, a friendly non-conference battle—and years ago before the Panthers entered 2-A play, it was a sort of nip-and-tuck battle between the two teams.

Although entering the game as being outclassed, the Moguls have always given the Panthers a good battle, and this year they are expected to keep up the tradition.

Seymour has finished the past two seasons with a 5-4-1 season mark and finishing second best to Childress.

Nine lettermen are returning on the Panther team, including three offensive and four defensive regulars. The Panthers are

classified as "small and inexperienced".

Coach Irvine of Seymour has his team operating from the wishbone offense this year and they do a good job running the option. Their pursuit from the split-6 defense is one of the Panthers strongest points.

The Mogul coaches are pretty well pleased with the progress made by the local team since practice sessions began. With their team relationship and desire to perform as a team, and with their conditioning during the past weeks, Coach Pope and his assistants are expecting a good performance from the players next Friday night.

Fans are important, too, in the team's attitude and performance, and a good crowd is expected to accompany them to Panther Field to give the Moguls their support.

Probable starters for the Moguls against Seymour will be Buddy Cypert, tight end, R. Q. Toliver, tackle, Sammy Alcala, guard, Wayne Melton, center,

Jerry Lowe, guard, David Michalik, tackle, Mike Urbanczyk, split end, Andy Haynie, quarterback, Jimmy Cooke, fullback, Robbie Thompson, wing back and Robert Spells, tailback.

Coach Pope stated that the scrimmage with Electra Friday night was pleasing. "We wanted to look at our secondary coverage. There were some mistakes, but with this week's workouts most of them should be ironed out."

The offensive line did show some improvement, but they are not reading the types of defenses being run at them. One thing that was an improvement this week over the Chillicothe scrimmage was that they were firing out a little better. The offensive line is probably the most difficult position in football to play and this phase usually comes somewhat slower than the rest.

The fullbacks did a much better job of blocking than the week before; Cypert and Cooke cleared the way on several runs. Spells had a good night and is improving.

"We were very pleased with the play of Scotty Abbott at his strong safety position. Scotty reads the plays real well and finds his way to the ball. Rudy Esquivel, Robby Thompson, and Danny Stone were improving as the scrimmage progressed," said Pope.

Mike Urbanczyk had an outstanding night both offensively and defensively. Andy Haynie has been plugging right along and his execution was improved. Electra was stunting and taking away his option and at times Andy ate the ball rather than losing by pitching...New plays will be added this week and should eliminate most of this problem.

Recently, we had occasion to visit the Copper Breaks State Park on the north banks of the Pease River between Crowell and Quanah.

This was for a second look-see, since we had motored around the rough terrain of the cedar breaks once before after the area became a park.

We remarked to a person that this would be a good spot to go for a time to get away from it all, and this person didn't know that such a place was in existence. This, in spite of the fact there have been numerous newspaper articles published in this vicinity, including one or two in the Munday paper.

We found some changes in the park area, which were improvements from the time of our first visit. Yet, there remains a vast area of the acreage that is "still in the rough" and not changed by the hands and machinery of man.

An attractive building which we are told is to become an interesting museum has been constructed at the entrance to the park. The "toll gate" on the road leading to the park area has been removed, and people in charge of taking in the toll are now located in the museum building.

From this point, a network of hard-topped roads, with numerous signs, guide the visitor to many sections of the park. Motoring along at reduced speeds in obedience to instructions, one comes upon restrooms at strategic points near swimming areas, camping areas, picnic areas, etc.

Folks constructing a dam to form a lake were more fortunate than we have been about Millers Creek. They barely had the dam completed when a series of heavy rains ranging from 5 to 12 inches hit portions of the area, and the lake filled up and overflowed through the spillway into Pease River.

Here you find a swimming area that is securely marked off, a place for launching boats, and different forms of recreational things. About a year from now the lake, which appears to us to compare with the League Ranch lake in size, will be a good fishing area, for it is being stocked since completion.

But you don't have to wait for this. There's a number of ponds which had already been formed when the land was acquired, and these have been stocked with bass, channel cat, bream, and blue gill. Along the artery of black top are signs pointing to camping areas, picnic areas and fishing areas.

Atop a cedar dotted hill, a number of tee-pee type shelters have been erected and this area has been designed for trailer homes, campers, etc., with water and electricity readily available. There is a charge for use of these facilities, other than the entrance fee. We found a number of these places latched onto, while people lolled around in the shade of the shelters.

Farm And Ranch News

LAW PROTECTS PLANT VARIETIES

The Federal Seed Act of 1970 protects plant breeders, seed companies and owners of varieties from exploitation by others. The Act provides for certification of particular varieties just as individuals or companies apply for patent rights to inventions. Thus plant breeders and variety owners can control for a period of years the sale and distribution of the seed they have developed so that they can recover most of the development cost. The Act should boost breeding programs, and the end result should be better adapted crop varieties for the future, says a cotton specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

EASE IN FARM EQUIPMENT PRICES

According to an economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the coming months may bring an easing of farm equipment prices. Equipment supplies are once again increasing to the point that prices may ease somewhat during the remainder of the year. And expansions in crop acreage and the recent strength in livestock prices may stimulate some equipment purchases later in the year. Since dealer margins on farm equipment have increased in recent years and inventories are now increasing, the time may be ripe for farmers to do some bargaining.

CATLEMEN IN FINANCIAL TROUBLE

Almost four out of 10 cattlemen are in "bad" to "moderate" financial trouble, says the head of Texas A&M's Department of Agricultural Economics after a nationwide survey of some 300 bankers. The bankers indicated that some 20 percent of the cattlemen may not survive another year of low calf prices.

Cattlemen are being outdone by prune producers. At least as far as product promotion is concerned. Paul Horn, writing in one of this summer's issues of THE CATTLEMAN, cites the fact that the prune growers association of California spends more total dollars pushing prunes than the entire cattle industry does in promoting beef. This latest wrinkle comes as a part of the continuing push for the Beef Development Plan which could provide as much as 40 million dollars a year for the promotion and development of beef markets. Hold up on the operation still involves composition of the 68 member "Beef Board" and the mechanics of operating the "beef check-off" system which would provide financing for the promotion by collecting three-tenths of one percent of the sales price of slaughter cattle. If the still lingering problems are ironed out, collections could begin as early as next year.

## Deafness No Handicap For Relative Of Local Women

Jerry Nix of Waco is a young man who has the love and admiration of his Knox County kinspeople. He is a person who does not believe the world ends because of a serious handicap.

Jerry, son of Mr. and Mrs. Forman Nix of Waco, and his twin sister, Terri, both became deaf shortly after they were born. Despite this 18-year handicap, Jerry has completed high school and left in mid-August for Gallaudet College in Washington, D. C. to resume his studies. This is the only liberal arts college for the deaf in the world. He learned about the college through his friends and teachers.

With the aid of a hearing aid, Jerry can hear sounds but cannot understand words. His hearing loss is really working hard with the band to make it the best. He has some really great ideas for the band and is using them all.

The Big Purple Cloud has really put on these past few years and is coming in full swing to entertain this year as well.

considered severe, and he must rely on lip reading at which he is expert.

Graduating from Richfield High School in May, he was in the top half of his graduating class. He became associated with Bi-County Day School for the Deaf when it was opened in 1971, and his records were kept there while he went to the public schools.

Nix gave his teachers credit for much of his progress citing one-Mrs. Bernice Popp of Sanger Elementary School, who helped him with lip reading and prepared him for junior high school.

Teachers said Jerry could have taken advantage of his handicap, but he didn't! He sees the bright side, is optimistic, mechanically inclined and academically inclined.

He was excited and optimistic upon entering this exclusive school, although apprehensive about leaving home for college.

To get into Gallaudet College an applicant must have excellent grades and pass an entrance examination, and the student's loss

of hearing must be such that he would have difficulty in attending an institution of higher learning for students with normal hearing.

Normally a student goes to Gallaudet for five years--the first year is a remedial preparatory program for those who have deficiencies in English and math. Jerry scored so high on his placement examination that he advanced directly into freshman class, foregoing the preparatory year.

In college, Jerry is

learning sign language and finger spelling and is expected to become very fluent in these by Christmas. When he entered college, he said he was thinking about computer technician, but he wasn't sure what he wanted to be.

Jerry is the grandson of the late Mr. and Mrs. M. G. Nix of the Sunset community, and is a nephew of Mrs. Irene Claburn and Mrs. Ruth Moore, who lives near Munday.
