Weekend Outing Turns Into Tragedy

What was planned as an enjoyable weekend for four Oklahoma men turned into tragedy in the death of two men last Saturday night at Miller Creek Lake.

One of the four died of accidental gunshot wounds, and another died in a car accident immediately following. The four men were brothers.

Baylor County Sheriff Don Mooney, who investigated, said Sunday: "They were down there having a good time and had an

accident." The four Osborne brothers are from Westville, Okla.

David Osborne, 29, was dead on arrival at the Knox County Hospital after the 10 p.m. shooting. His brother, 45-year-old Veachel, died early Sunday afternoon from injuries in a car accident shortly after the shooting.

Glenn Maston of Munday, who was a camper at Miller Creek, said he saw two of the brothers at the lake for a short while Friday evening, later leaving out. The two returned to the lake in a pickup camper at noon Saturday, he said, and the other two followed in a car later in the afternoon.

Shortly after dark, Maston and some friends at the campsite heard a shot. Minutes later, one of the four ran to the Maston camp and requested an ambulance, saying that a man had been shot.

While Maston drove to Munday for ambulance assistance, the brothers loaded David, who had been shot four inches below his left breast with a .22 caliber rifle, onto the pickup and were seen leaving.

Before the local ambulance arrived at the lake, Thelma Maston of the volunteer emergency service said a radio report of an accident in the area was received.

The Osborne pickup was found overturned in a field at the intersection of FM 1608 and FM 266, about four miles west of the lake. The ambulance took Veachel (the driver) and David, who had been shot, to the Knox County Hospital. Sheriff Mooney took Vernon, 41, to the Seymour Hospital.

The fourth brother, Johnnie, 40, walked into Goree Sunday morning. Both survivors suffered cracked ribs, split lips and other facial lacerations in the accident. Johnnie was also taken to the Seymour hospital, where both injured men were reported in stable condition Sunday night.

Veachel, who died at noon Sunday, was reported to have apparently fired the accidental shot which killed his brother. He had been in Knox County for a time before the incident, doing some work in Goree. The other three had been

employed by the Wilbarger Elevators, Inc., in Vernon. Local people working because of the tragedy are: Police Chief Saffel and Patrolman Gene Nix, who

assisted other officers; Thelma Maston, Gene Brown, Mickey Jackson and Melvin Cypert, all of the Volunteer Ambulance Service.

Freight Cars Derail, Causing Wheat Spill

Derailment of two freight cars on the Wichita Valley Railroad about five miles south of Weinert on Wednesday, June 13, caused wheat to be spilled along the right-of-way.

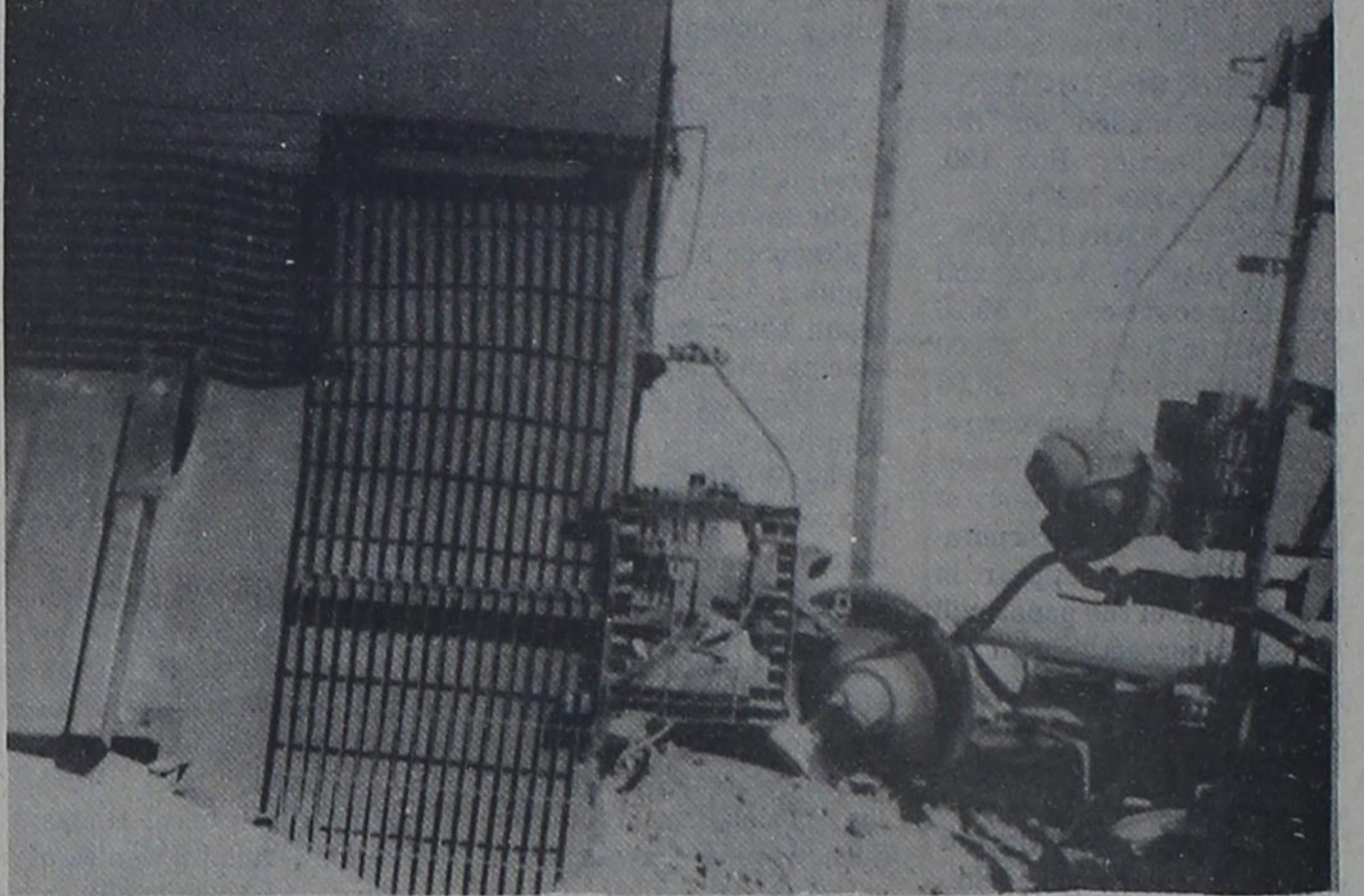
The accident occurred between 7 and 8 p.m., with two cars leaving the rails and another remaining half-way off the tracks. "Golden cargo" was spilled for quite some distance.

The remainder of the train, which was loaded in Stamford, appeared undamaged. Crossties, rails

and wheels were in complete disarray about the scene. A total of 13 cars were disconnected from the engine.

Exact cause of the derailment was not immediately determined. Ray Conrad, depot agent for Haskell, Munday, Weinert, Goree and Seymour, expressed the belief that a possible "sun kink" in the rails contributed to the mishap.

Traffic along the route was halted until repairs could be made.

Sheriff Stone Resigns

Sheriff H. C. Stone informed The Munday Courier that he has resigned as sheriff of Knox County. His statement was as follows: "I want to take this opportunity to thank all the people for their support while I have served as Sheriff of Knox County since 1961."

"I am retiring as Sheriff of Knox County effective June 18, 1979."

Sheriff Stone was deputy under Homer T. Melton from 1952 to 1961, and was appointed sheriff when Melton resigned to accept a position with the Texas Rangers.

During his tenure in office Sheriff Stone has had opponents on two different occasions. Otherwise he has run unopposed, serving the county these eighteen years. He did not reveal his plans for the immediate future.

Commissioners Court, in special session at 9:00 a.m. Tuesday, June 19, accepted the resignation of Sheriff H. C. Stone.

They will again meet on

Wednesday, June 27 at 9:00 a.m. to consider appointment of a replacement for Stone.

Knox County Commissioners requested any persons interested in appointment to please submit written application to County Judge Homer T. Melton prior to Wednesday, June 27 at 9:00 a.m.

Horton Named Outstanding Conservative Farmer Of '78

The Board of Directors of the Wichita-Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District selected Ernest Horton of Munday as the outstanding Conservation Farmer for 1978.

Mr. Horton used cost-share funds through the Great Plains Conservation Program to accomplish his objectives.

Since July of 1972, he has constructed and maintained 4 acres of grassed waterway, 52,080 feet of parallel terraces, 2,640 feet of livestock pipeline, and 40 acres of brush management and seeding plus management practices of crop rotation, crop residue management, contour farming, and proper grazing use. Mr. Horton's attitude and

concern for the land can be appreciated by generations to come. His comments following the award presentation were that he had always felt a moral obligation to leave the land in better condition than it was when he obtained it. As pointed out by Mr. Horton, this puts land owner and users in a caretaker's role. He stated that "we have and manage the land only for a short time, but it will be used by others for generations to come."

According to personnel of the local Soil Conservation Service office, Horton has done an outstanding job of conservation and has certainly exhibited with action his feelings of "taking care of the land."

Munday Lions Club's annual broom and mop sale is slated to "blast off" at 8 a.m. Tuesday, June 26, according to Bobby D. Burnett, president.

A truck loaded with various blind-made articles and branded "Lions Caravan Sales for the Blind" will arrive by 8 a.m. and will be parked on the west side of the city hall square. From this point, Lions will be headquartered for their annual sale.

Team captains and their team personnel will lead

pickups as fast as possible, and each team will go quickly to the assigned areas for a house-to-house canvass of the Munday business and residential areas.

Blind-made products will include varied types of brooms, mops, dish cloths and towels, oven mits, lawn rakes and other items.

An effort will be made to completely cover Munday's residential area. Purchases may also be made at the blind caravan vehicle.

This has been one of the main money-raising projects during the 26-year existence of the club. Proceeds will go to benefit the Blind Caravan, Texas Lions Camp at Kerrville, and other projects of the local club.

Mrs. Roxye Williams' Funeral Held Thursday

Mrs. P. V. (Roxye) Williams, whose activities for a period of almost three quarters of a century were synonymous with the progress and welfare of this little town of Munday, passed away at 4:30 a.m. Tuesday, June 12, in a Midland nursing home. She was 84 years of age.

She was born Roxye Maples on January 30, 1895, in Saint Jo, Texas, and moved to Haskell with her family in 1901. In 1903 the family moved to Munday, and Roxye was destined to have a part in the growth and activities of a young, but growing town.

She married Posey Virgil Williams on May 28, 1916, in Munday, and thus the couple began their many years of sharing the happiness, joys and sorrows of this tiny community.

The Williams, Posey and Roxye, gave the people of Munday one of their first places of entertainment of a "movie house" by establishing the Roxy Theatre. Mrs. Williams was organist for the theatre in days of silent films, then operated the mechanism that produced sound effects along with the picture, giving imitations of drum beats, thunder, crashing lightning and other sounds.

In spite of her duties as housewife and mother, Roxye Williams found time to devote to their movie house, her church and civic activities; then, as her brood of five children came along, she had time for school activities, for singing in the church choir, for sharing with friends and loved ones.

Her membership in the First Methodist Church meant something to her.

Mr. Williams preceded her in death on September 10, 1958, and she continued her home life here, making contributions to her community as long as health permitted.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Thursday from the First United Methodist Church in Munday with the pastor, Rev. Ivan Allen, officiating. A number of friends gathered to pay tribute to this one whose life had touched theirs many times for 75 years.

Burial was beside her husband in Johnson Memorial Cemetery under direction of McCauley-Smith Funeral Home. Serving as pallbearers were M. L. Wiggins, Travis Lee, Bruce Burnett, Paul Pendleton, W. R. Moore, Jr., and Charles Baker.

In Touch "Worship: A Discipline Of The Christian Life"

Disciplines are necessary in our lives if we are to achieve the goals we set for ourselves. This is true in our lives as Christian people as well. One of the disciplines we must develop as Christians is that of the worship of God. Jesus was going to Galilee one day and stopped for a rest near Jacob's well in Samaria. That day he

encountered a Samaritan woman who came to draw water. When Jesus asked for a drink, a conversation was begun and the woman soon realized Jesus was no ordinary person. She said to Jesus, "I see you are a prophet, sir. Now my ancestors worshipped God on this mountain, but you Jews say that Jerusalem is the place where we should worship God." (John 4:19-20, TEV).

The answer of Jesus was, "Believe me, the time will come when people will not worship the Father either on this mountain or in Jerusalem. But the time is coming and is already here, when by the power of God's Spirit people will worship the Father as he really is, offering him the true worship that he wants. God is Spirit, and only by the power of his Spirit can people worship him as he really is." (John 4:21,23-24, TEV).

What Is Christian Worship?

To worship as Christians means focusing our attention on the God of creation who is revealed in the person and life of the Lord Jesus Christ. We are able to experience this presence through the Holy Spirit. Our worship includes prayer, but more than prayer is involved. To worship our attitude must be right and we must desire to experience God's presence. Christian worship means opening life to God, and when we do that we run the risk of having our interests displaced by the purposes of God. Because this risk is so real many persons fail to worship God.

Where do Christians Worship?

One of the first thoughts that will come to the minds of many is that we worship in the sanctuaries of

Churches throughout the community. On a regular basis many persons in the community gather in the sanctuary of a Church to sing, to pray, to read and meditate on God's Word. These help us to worship, but unless we are able to focus our attention on God at such times we never really worship him. True worship of God results in some new and fresh experience of his presence and a new dedication and devotion of life to him.

We worship God in the Church, but many also worship him at home. Some families have a time each day when they gather to read the Bible and share with one another. In other families, a time of worship is experienced by individual members as they set aside cares and work in order to devote a period of time to prayer and meditation in the presence of God. During these times, God is able to touch our hearts, giving us

direction, courage, and strength.

The worship of God is a discipline Christians accept as a part of life for each day. As we offer him true worship, we will grow in the likeness of our Lord Jesus Christ.

TEXAS TALK



Now they're leveling land with a laser beam. Some Florida growers are doing a more efficient and faster land leveling job for top production of their crops using the beam, a land leveling system manufactured by the Laserplane Corporation of Dayton, Ohio. Farmers found that it cuts costs by reducing land surveying, eliminating rework and reducing skill required of the operator. The Laserplane system is an automatic controlled system mounted on a tractor-pulled scraper. The laser rotates in a fashion similar to that of an airport beacon, but at a speed of 300 revolutions per minute. The plane of light can be tilted for a single grade or a compound one. An average 20 acre field can be surveyed and leveled in a day and a half, and an operator can be trained to use it in an afternoon. The farmers found that after using the laser there were very few, if any, ponding and dead spots following a hard rain. There was even distribution of water throughout the field.

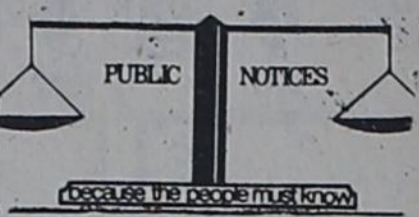

Farm Bureau Comments On New Tax Law

The Knox County Farm Bureau has asked taxing jurisdictions in this county to help put the new tax relief law into effect in 1979.

Larry Smith of Munday, president of the local county farm organization, states that this law provides for limiting tax valuation on agricultural land if the owner applies by July 15, 1979.

In a letter to tax officials Smith said: "If there is to be a proposed resolution or ordinance to deny this tax treatment in 1979, please let us know so that we can attend the hearing and present our views."

School district authorities are also reminded that any school districts which deny this valuation in 1979 will receive less state money.

A tax manual will be furnished by the School Tax Assessment Practices Board in late June. A training session will be offered in Austin at the University of Texas Special Events Center on June 25.

The local farm leader said that his organization was helping notify farmers and ranchers that they should apply with all their local tax offices between July 1 - 15. The County Farm Bureau office will have a supply of sample applications forms for use in preparing the information for the official form.
