**Look To The East**

Congratulations to elders of the Church of Christ in Munday! They did something several days ago that's worthy of comment.

It was a "condition" at the Munday church.

It was something that added beauty to the church grounds, or was intended for that purpose when it was first initiated.

But as the years went by, and the beauty increased by an increase in growth, this became a hazard to other people. It was so much so that it detracted from the beauty.

Some complaints were made to some people. We can't say if any officials of the church received complaints or not, or whether some member of the church discovered the hazardous condition and asked that something be done about it.

We're speaking of an evergreen shrub that was growing on the southwest corner of the church grounds. It had grown to such an extent that it created a "blind spot" for motorists as they came to this street intersection.

Drivers had to ease well into the street in order to see traffic approaching from the north; that is, if they considered the situation a hazardous one. Driving across the street, or even making a left turn toward the post office created some danger.

Then, one day, as we reached the street intersection, we noticed that this shrub had been uprooted. Soon it was hauled away.

Within the next day or so, we saw three of the church members putting the church sign back into place. It also had to be removed in order to dig the shrub up.

Now, as you approach the street intersection at the southwest corner of the church, you have a clear vision of traffic approaching from both directions.

This is an example that should be followed by others—maybe at other churches or public buildings, maybe on private property or along business places. We note some blind corners that would be hard to eliminate, but those that can be should be.

It would make motoring within the town less hazardous.

And another reminder: Since we are receiving the "April showers that bring May flowers" now, we should be cognizant of the fact that the showers bring more than flowers.

Along with them come weeds and things that, if left unattended, will grow up and make "blind corners" and traffic hazards. This happens every spring.

That's why at a certain period, city officials and others become interested in a spring clean-up—to prevent such things from happening and to give the town a cleaner appearance to those who visit here, or pass through on a vacation journey.

Yes, clean-up time is approaching; and along with planting our gardens, putting out plants and flowers to increase the beauty of homes, we should give some thought to taking care of the miscellaneous growth of those

## County To Receive Grant

Congressman Omar Burleson announces the approval of a \$103,763.90 Office of Education grant to Knox County. The allotment of these funds for fiscal year 1978 is under the provisions of Part A of Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, Public Law 89-10, as amended.

These funds will provide services for children residing in low-income areas and State-operated or supported institutions for neglected and delinquent children, who have need for special educational assistance in order that their level of educational attainment may be raised to that appropriate for children of their age.

These funds shall become available on July 1, 1977. The State Department of Education will distribute the county amounts to the school districts in accordance with Federal Regulations. Each school district is guaranteed no less than 85 percent of its fiscal year 1977 allocation.

## Hamlin Winner of District Meet

The Munday Mogul track team finally met their match Tuesday afternoon as Hamlin claimed the district title at the Jayton meet. ## Accidents Investigated In County

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated three accidents on rural highways in Knox County during the month of March, 1977 according to Sergeant Frank Jirick, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and three persons injured. The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first three months of 1977 shows a total of nine accidents resulting in no persons killed and five persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for March, 1977 shows a total of 467 accidents resulting in 23 persons killed and 293 persons injured, as compared to March, 1976, with 448 accidents resulting in 15 persons killed and 261 persons injured. This was 19 more accidents, eight more killed, and 32 more injured in 1977 at the same period of time.

The 23 traffic deaths for the month of March, 1977 occurred in the following counties: Four in Jack; three each in Young and Potter; and one each in Clay, Garza, Hockley, Lubbock, Montague, Wise, Carson, Deaf Smith, and Hartley.

## Initial Work On Salt Pollution Begins This Week Near Truscott

The establishment of a construction resident office at Truscott and the appointment of Phillip A. Lutz to head it were announced Friday by Col. Anthony A. Smith, Tulsa District Engineer.



Lutz begins his new duties Monday and his initial responsibility will be to supervise the construction of a low flow dam with deflatable weir, service road and pumping station which is the beginning of construction to control salt pollution in the Red and Arkansas Rivers.

Construction began at Chloride Control Area VIII on the South Fork of the Wichita River about seven miles east of Guthrie, Texas last month. R. R. Tway, Inc. of Oklahoma City has the \$529,066 contract for the work.

Lutz joined the Corps of Engineers in 1964 and served as a design engineer in the Engineering Division until 1969 when he was assigned to the Flood Plain

Management Branch. He moved to the Supervision and Inspection Branch of the Construction Division in 1972 where he remained

## Two Accidents Investigated

## Moisture Benefits All Area

Everything looked different Monday, as the sun cast its early-morning rays through dust-cleared space onto a world freshly washed by early spring rains. The precipitation extending over a period of several days during the weekend "carried the area" through a well needed wash. Spring foliage was displayed in all its green finery.

There were no lake-filling runoffs, but small grain crops stretched out toward a bright sky after receiving thirst-quenching moisture. "We're liable to make a pretty good wheat crop, now," several have stated.

The rains started about mid-week and continued through Sunday. Munday gauges registered in excess of 2.50 inches; others showed 2.60 or better, and Goree seemed to be favored with 3.30 inches.

The consensus of opinion was that around 2.50 inches were received in all areas of the county.

Official rainfall for Munday was 2.30 inches, according to the records of Goodson Sellers, U. S. weather observer.

**Payment of Sales Taxes For Period Show Increase**

Comptroller Bob Bullock mailed checks totaling \$16.2 million to Texas cities and towns Friday, representing the April rebate of the one-cent sales tax they assess.

Bullock said his office has remitted \$105.7 million in city sales taxes this year to date, an increase of 21 percent over the same period in 1976. However, he explained, part of the increase is due to a change

made by his office effective this month.

The Comptroller's Office has historically retained 4.76 percent of the cities' sales tax collections to cover refunds or bad checks. Bullock said this amount has been reduced to 2 percent, so that cities now will receive nearly 3 percent more of their sales tax promptly for spending or investment.

Even without the change, he noted, "city sales tax collections are running a healthy 18 percent ahead of last year."

Bullock also asked merchants to refrain from changing the due dates and period dates on the printed sales tax return forms they now receive from his office. He said the practice has caused many taxpayers' payments to be credited to the wrong reporting periods, sometimes resulting in erroneous billings being

issued by his office.

The Comptroller's printed city sales tax allocation took a new form this month as well, with figures comparing each city's collections in 1977 with the same periods in 1976.

Increase percentages for towns of Knox County are: Benjamin, \$408.76 for this year, against \$340.97 last year, increase of 19 per cent; Goree, \$473.84 for 1977, \$448.61 for '76, increase 27 per cent.

Knox City: \$980.16 this period, \$9,425.54 to date, \$9,022.95 in 1976, increase 4 per cent.

Munday: \$1,410.88 this period, \$8,381.78 this year, \$8,135.13 in 1976, increase 3 per cent.

Agricultural economists are painting a brighter picture for the coming market year, at least for world market activities. Market observers say it will be virtually impossible for another world wheat crop to be as high as last year's. They hedge their optimism for farmers by admitting it could take a production drop of as much as 7-10 per cent to significantly raise farm prices. Most of the experts are in agreement that soybean exports should stay strong, perhaps matching or exceeding the 555-million bushels sold in foreign markets last year. Those following the progress of the world markets for beef say that two good signs are the upturns in the past three years of beef buying in both the Soviet Union and the Middle East. For our farmers and ranchers the world continues to shrink.

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
