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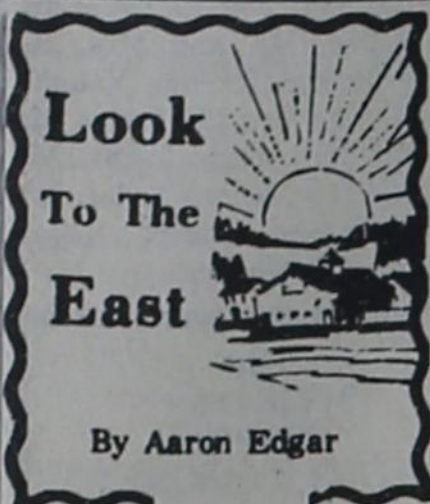

REA Gets Loan For Expansion

Congressman Omar Burleson announced last Monday the approval of an \$829,000 Rural Electrification Administration loan to B-K Electric Cooperative, Inc., with headquarters in Seymour.

The purpose of the loan is to finance service for 310 additional consumers, finance 44 miles of distribution line, as well as system improvements.

Counties served by B-K Electric are Knox, Baylor, Haskell, Stonewall, Throckmorton, Archer, Foard, King and Wilbarger.

Kingston Attends Meeting

Dr. Bill Kingston of the NCR-100 committee attended a meeting in Madison, Wisconsin September 8 and 9.

The meeting pertained to the control of cabbage diseases and methods of assuring availability of disease free seed. Since the Texas A&M Research Station in Munday has started a cabbage breeding program to resist diseases, Dr. Kingston was chosen to represent the state from Texas A&M.

Thirty-five people, including state experiment scientists, private seed companies from Japan, Holland, Denmark, Germany and the United States, gathered for this conference. Thursday the group met in conference and Friday they attended Hancock Experiment Station north of Madison.

A tour of the Del Monte plant where sauerkraut and sweet corn were being canned was made on the return trip to the University of Wisconsin.

EMS Meets September 8

The Munday Emergency Medical Service met on Thursday, September 8, at Irene's Flower Shop.

Members approved the purchase of a 1,000-watt inverter for the new ambulance at an approximated cost of \$500. This equipment converts the DC power of the engine to 110 AC volts. Also discussed was the purchase of supplies, such as bandages, etc.

An emergency care attendant course is planned for the near future, and anyone interested in the course should contact Bobby Hutchinson or Mickey Jackson.

Election of new officers will be on the agenda of the next meeting, which will be announced later.

Moguls Sail To 54-0 Win Over Rochester

The Munday Moguls broke loose with the harness on and fairly demolished Scruggs Field as they ran roughshod over the visiting Rochester Steers Friday night.

As Jimmy Durante would have said: "Everybody tried to get into the act," when the Mogul offense racked up 54 points in the first three periods, then drew a blank in the fourth, to defeat the hapless Steers 54 to 0.

Doug Michalik ran two punts back for TDs, and the Moguls ran up 433 yards rushing to salt away this non-district game.

The local boys displayed both a potent offense and a strangling defense, allowing the Steers only 38 yards in offense. The Moguls improved their record 1-0-1, while the Steers dropped to 0-2 in early season stats.

Kevin Herring accounted for two touchdowns, the first with a five-yard run with 9:50 left in the first quarter. Michalik repeated shortly thereafter with a 35-yard punt return for the Moguls second score.

The Moguls put a total of 22 points on the board during 12 minutes of play: three counters by means of an 18-yard field goal by Larry Welch. With 7:58 remaining in the second period, Cary Shawver, quarterback, passed 20 yards to Welch for a TD. With 5:20 yet to be played, Robert Spells, halfback, broke loose for a 34-yard touchdown jaunt. With only 54 seconds remaining, Jimmy Cook scored from one yard out.

Michalik and Herring scored again in the third stanza, Michalik on a 77-yard punt return with 9:18 left, and Billy Welch, halfback, added another TD from three yards out and with 5:08 yet in the quarter. Herring scored again on a two-yard plunge to end the Mogul onslaught.

game, if you were a Mogul fan who likes lots of action. It was, on the other hand, bitter defeat for the Rochester group.

Coach's Comments:

"The Rochester game let us play some of the younger players. We were doing some things right that we haven't been doing, such as stepping properly on blocks. Rochester was a scrappy team but very weak, but time will tell if the game helped us."

Mogul coaches picked Joe Nelson as the "Head Hunter" of this game, with Otis Adams running a close second.

Munday took a clean sweep of Archer City last week, as the seventh graders won 21-0, eighth, 14-0, and junior varsity, 7-0. This week these teams will host Knox City at 5 p. m. Thursday.

Enrollment in the Munday Public Schools for this year continued its downward trend of the past few years, according to Supt. Douglas Myers. Figures were announced Monday for the first week of school, showing a total of 504 students enrolled, as compared with 522 last year.

Figures by classes were announced as follows: Elementary school: Kindergarten, 30; first grade, 27; second grade, 30; third grade, 40; fourth grade, 39; fifth grade, 32; total, 198, gain of 4.

Myers stated that grades 2 through 5 are now divided into two classes each.

Junior High: Sixth grade, 31; seventh, 49, and eighth, 42, for a total of 122, off 22.

High School: Freshmen, 52; sophomores, 50; juniors, 39; seniors, 43; total, 184, the same number as last year.

First '77 Cotton Ginned on Friday

The first cotton to be harvested from the 1977 crop was ginned by the Munday Gin and Seed, Inc., last Friday afternoon, September 9.

It was brought in by Wally Roberts, who farms southwest of Goree.

According to Bobby Hutchinson, manager of the gin, Mr. Roberts brought in 1,980 pounds of seed cotton, which had been hand picked, and he received a 470-pound bale of lint cotton and 780 pounds of seed.

The first bale was ginned at 3:30 p. m. Friday, Mr. Hutchinson reported.

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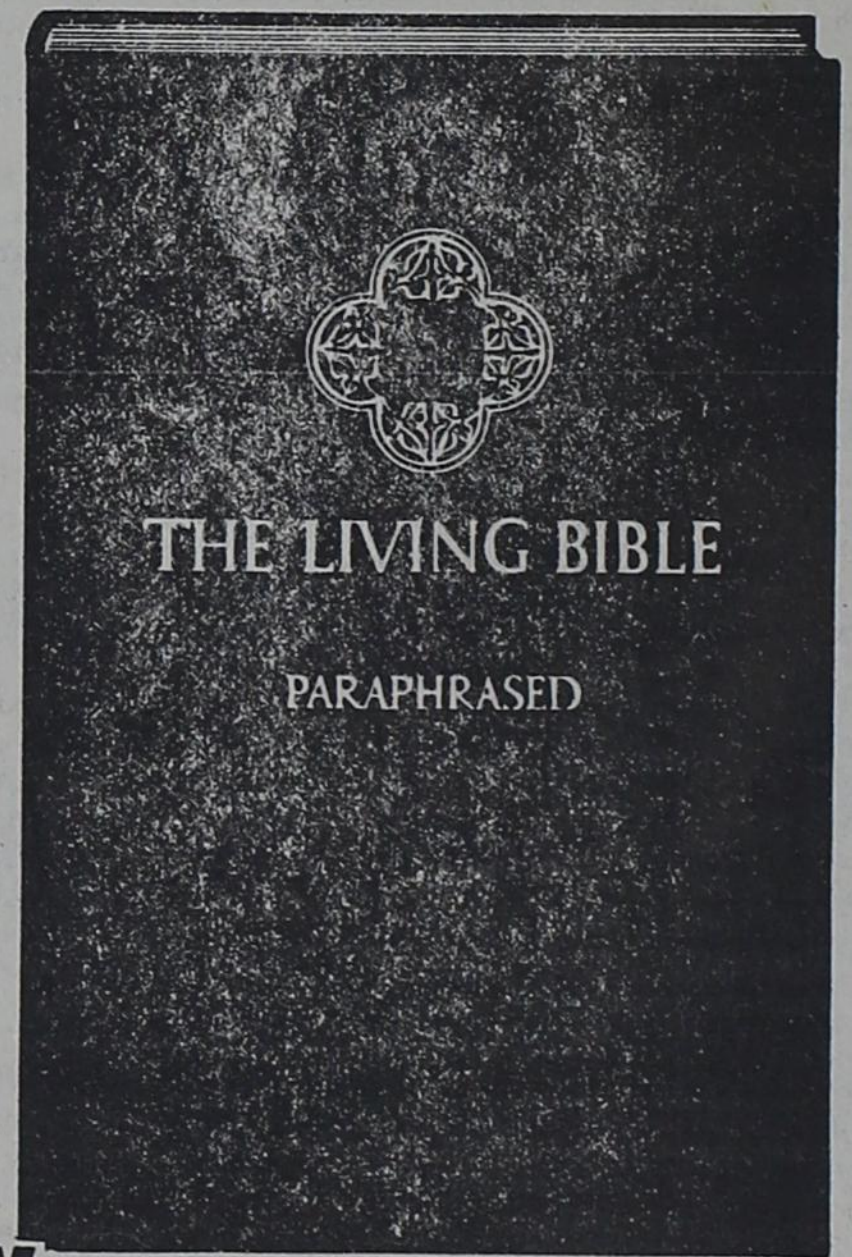

Goree scored first, but the kick for extra point by Robert Reagins was no good.

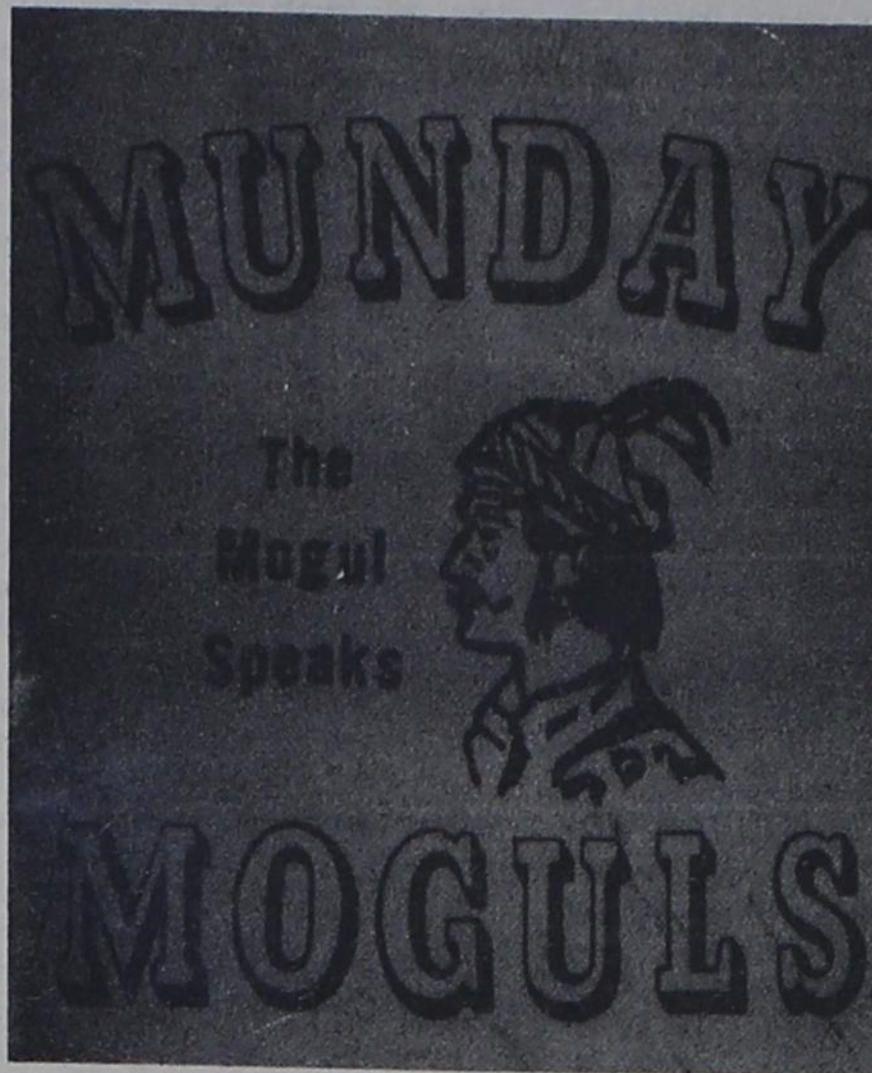
