## Halloween Carnival Monday October 31

## Big Purple Cloud Earns I

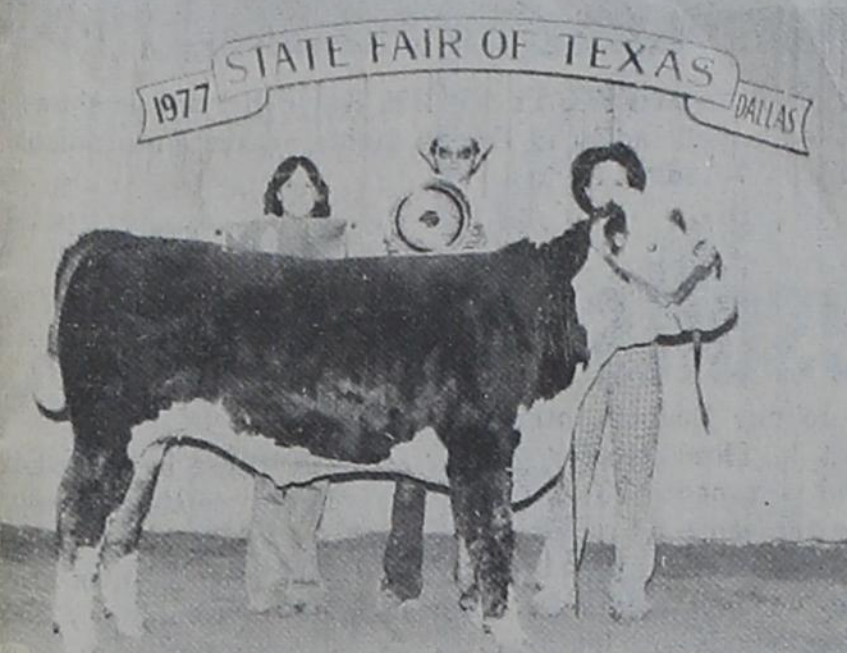

Members of the Knox County 4-H Club competed in the Junior Livestock Show at the State Fair of Texas last Wednesday, October 19.

These young people of the area showed great showmanship and walked away with two top honors at the show.

Melissa Zeissel, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Vernal Zeissel, exhibited her steer to a first place award in the heavy Hereford class and went on to show the steer to grand champion Hereford of the show.

Dave Partridge, son of Mr. and Mrs. Wendell Partridge, placed second in the heavy Angus class. Dave then showed his steer to

reserve champion Angus.

Other members showing and placing were: Tammy Carver of Benjamin, 3rd

place light Angus; Janet Zeissel of Munday, 3rd place heavy Angus and Doug Brown of Benjamin, 30th

place heavy crossbred.

On Friday, October 21 these steers were sold at the fair and brought the following amounts: grand champion Hereford, \$1700; reserve champion Angus, \$1550; 3rd place light Angus, \$720; 3rd place heavy Angus, \$792; and 30th place heavy crossbred \$793. Melissa's grand champion Hereford was purchased by Southland Life Insurance Co. and Dave's reserve champion Angus was sold to rancher, Bob Hunsaker.

Neil Waggoner, Julie Partridge, Mary Zeissel, all of Munday and Sherri Brown of Benjamin also competed but failed to place in the show.

## Light Shower Halted Area Cotton Harvest

The weather this past week has helped the trailer situation at some area gins but some still have a backlog of trailers and cotton on the yard. The .23 shower stopped the cotton strippers but was unable to provide the moisture needed to start the wheat drills in the area. Some farmers are dry sowing in hopes of a good rain.

Reports from the area gins show from just less than 50 per cent to approximately 60 per cent of the cotton being gathered. Rhineland Co-op Gin reports 2800 bales ginned with 400 bales on the yard. Knox Prairie shows 2950 ginned and one of the two gins which caught up during the recent weather with 12 bales on the yard. Munday Gin and Seed reports 14 bales on the yard with 2230 bales being ginned.

In the Weinert area both gins report that in a couple of weeks, with pretty weather, the cotton harvest will be complete. Weinert Gin show 4400 ginned with 900 on the yard. Paymaster

Gin reports 5763 ginned and 401 on the yard.

Goree Producers Cooperative reports 1500 bales ginned with approximately 150 to be ginned on the yard.

These figures were taken at noon, Tuesday, October 25.

## Cotton Classing Report

Cotton prices remained steady with mixed lots of grade 32 and higher bringing from 44 to 45.75 cents per pound, according to Sidney Ferrell, in charge of the Munday Classing Office. Trading was slow with lots offered being mainly small to medium in size. White grades accounted for 85 percent of the cotton classed this week. The predominant quality was grade 31 with 67 percent. Grades 40 and 32 accounted for 11 percent and 14 percent of the weeks total classings. Four percent of the cotton was reduced in grade because of bark or grass. Predominant staple lengths were staple 31 with 64 percent and staple 32 with 26 percent. Mike reading were in the desirable range of 3.5 to 4.9 on 95 percent of the samples tested.

About 14,700 samples were classed by the Munday Classing Office for the week ending Friday, October 21. Our season total now stands at 38,000, plus 9,000 classed in the Abilene office, prior to the opening of this office.

## EMPLOYER'S QUARTERLY FEDERAL TAX RETURN DEADLINE APPROACHING

Employers must report and pay Social Security and withheld Federal income taxes for the third quarter of 1977 by Monday, October 31.

Persons who have deposited the entire quarterly tax liability on time in a Federal Reserve Bank or authorized commercial bank have until November 10 to file Form 941, "Employer's Quarterly Federal Tax Return," the Internal Revenue Service said.

Employers should use the preaddressed Forms 941 mailed to them by the IRS or obtain copies of the form from the nearest IRS office. IRS Publication 15, "Circular E-Employer's Tax Guide," provides more information and is available free from local IRS offices.

### APPEALING APPLES

September to March is apple time--and October is National Apple Month.

Apples that break into pieces when cooked are usually best for applesauce. The best baking apples keep their shape. Tart apples are good for cooking; sweeter apples are better for eating raw.

For a main course, try Sweet Potato-Apple Casserole. Apples also make exciting salads and desserts to perk up fall meals.

### Sweet Potato-Apple Casserole

(makes 6 servings)

- 1 can (18 oz.) sweet potatoes, drained.
- 1/4 cup sweet potato liquid or orange juice
- 1 can (20 oz.) apple pie filling
- 1 tsp. grated orange rind, if desired
- 1 tsp lemon juice
- 1 cup bread cubes
- 2 tblsp butter or oleo, melted

Arrange sweet potatoes in a 2-quart casserole. Blend remaining ingredients except bread cubes and butter. Pour over sweet potatoes. Mix bread cubes with butter and sprinkle over apples. Bake at 375° F (moderate oven) until liquid is bubbly and bread cubes are lightly browned.

### Carrot-Apple Salad

(makes 6 servings)

- 1 large carrot, shredded
- 3 cups diced apples
- 1/8 tsp salt
- 1/3 cup raisins
- 1/3 cup salad dressing or mayonnaise
- 1 tblsp lemon juice, if desired

Combine ingredients and mix well.

### Apple Spice Muffins

(makes 12)

- 3/4 cup milk
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1/4 cup melted fat
- 2 cups unsifted flour
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 tblsp baking powder
- 1/2 tsp salt

- 1 tsp cinnamon
- 1 cup finely chopped apples
- 1/4 cup raisins

Add milk to egg; stir in fat. Mix dry ingredients thoroughly; stir in apples and raisins. Add liquid mixture and stir just until most of the dry ingredients are moistened. Do not overmix; batter should be lumpy. Fill greased muffin tins 2/3 full. Bake at 400° F (hot oven) 20 to 25 minutes until golden brown.

Apple Coffeecake makes 9 servings

- 1/2 cup lt. brown sugar
- 2 tblsp butter or oleo
- 2 tblsp flour
- 1/2 to 3/4 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup shortening
- 1 egg
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1 1/2 cups unsifted flour
- 2 tsp baking powder
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 2 cups thinly sliced apples

Blend together the brown sugar, 2 tblsp flour, butter and cinnamon. In another bowl, combine sugar, shortening, and egg; beat thor-

oughly. Stir in milk.

Mix 1 1/2 cups flour, baking powder, and salt thoroughly; stir into egg mixture just until smooth.

Spread half the batter in a greased 9-inch pan; cover with half the apples; top with half the brown sugar mixture. Repeat.

Bake at 375° F (moderate oven) for 45 to 50 min. or until cake is set. NOTE: If preferred, put all the batter in pan at once. Arrange the apples on top of the batter and sprinkle with brown sugar mixture.

## New Metric System Is Lions Topic

The new metric system of weights and measures which is actually in process of being adopted in the U. S. was explained at Tuesday's meeting of the Munday Lions Club by Lion Bill

Kingston.

Projecting several charts of the system on the screen, Kingston explained the system, as compared to the U. S. system. "Whether we like it or not, this is coming," he said, "and we will be with it within the next generation or so."

"Once we learn it, the system is even more simple than our present system. It does away with a lot of figuring since you arrive at a certain figure by merely moving the decimal point over."

It was pointed out that the U. S. is the only country in the world with the present system; and, dollar-wise, it is very costly to deal with other nations of the world by having to use the two systems.

The club voted to have next Tuesday's meal at the newly-opened Cottage Inn, at which time the regular meeting place in the future will be decided.

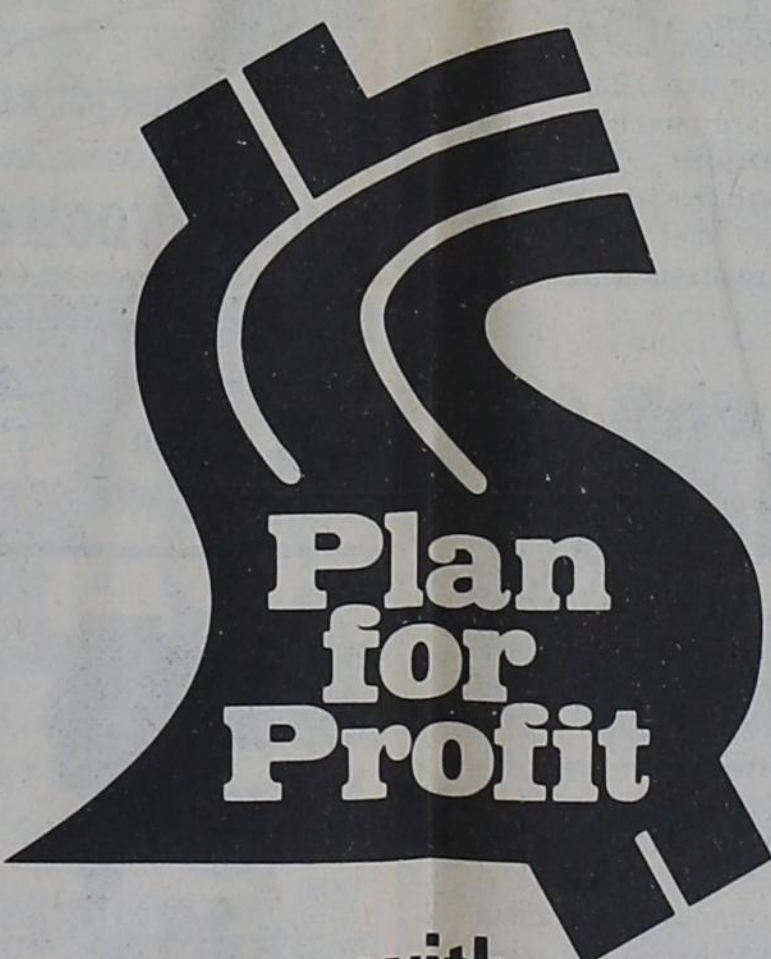

## New Equipment At WTU In Abilene

Computer equipment known as Economic Dispatch Control has been installed by West Texas Utilities Co. and is now being used to automatically manage the company's electric energy production.

Generation units at the company's power plants are connected with the computer, and the desired output from each unit under various conditions is obtained in the most efficient manner.

The equipment is located in the System Operations Office at North 4th and Plum, and is operated under the direction of Carl Yancy, manager of system operations, and Jim Hoffman, dispatch supervisor.

The computer performs a variety of functions which previously were done manually.

One of the most important functions from the customer's standpoint is operating the system's generation units at the most economical level. WTU has eight major power plants and a total of 19 generation units. The Economic Dispatch Control constantly calls on the best combination of production from these units to provide the most economical results.

Variables considered by the computer include fuel costs, individual boiler limitations and capabilities, speed of generator response, and the amount of energy demand being placed on the

Local people have been served with groceries and clothing. Transient families have been given gasoline to get them on their way, and in some instances also given groceries. At time it has been necessary to lodge a transient in the motel for a night.

When the amount is received from the United Fund two-thirds of the amount goes to the District Salvation Army office in

Dallas. One-third is retained for local expenditures. There are times that a need arises and the District office may have to ask for additional funds. The funds are provided if there are ample funds in the local account to do so.

The Knox County Chapter of the American Red Cross is silently active in several activities in this area. It is always standing by in case of a large scale emergency or disaster to offer aid and relief to needy victims. The National Organization

stands behind this effort and is on the scene in only hours after such a disaster. On the local everyday scene the chapter helps local organizations in such efforts as the Bloodmobile, First-Aid Courses, Swimming Lessons, and any other worthwhile undertakings.

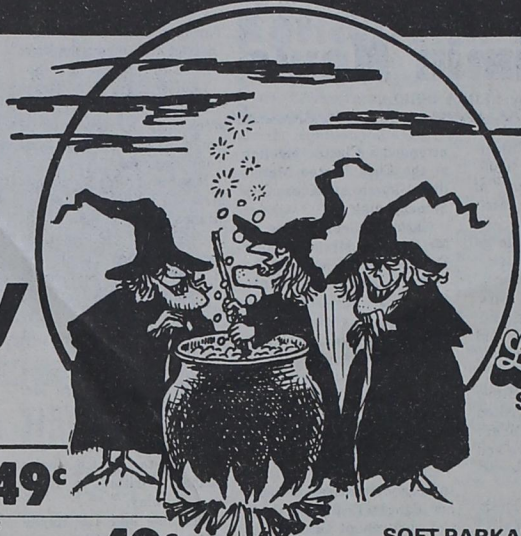

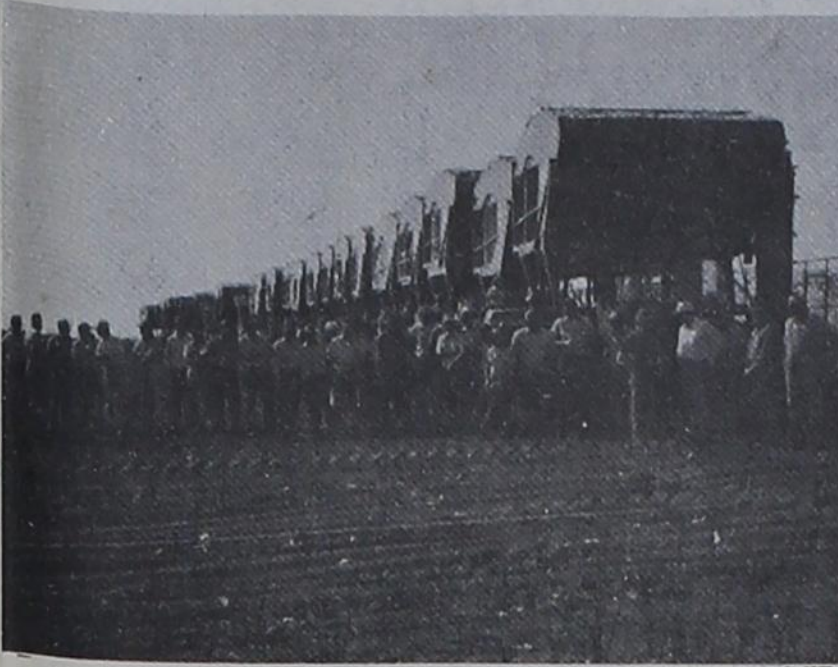

## Agricultural Briefs

**TIPS ON BUYING FIREWOOD**--Homeowners shopping for firewood should know the right kind of wood to buy and how it is sold, says a forestry specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Firewood may be sold by the standard cord (8 feet long, 4 feet high, 4 feet wide), face cord (4 feet by 8 feet) or truck load. The best way to compare prices is to calculate the cubic feet of wood. Hickory, white oak, red oak and pecan are excellent, long-burning woods with high heat output. Always select dry, lightweight wood.

Register and are designed to provide additional protection to customers who trade commodity futures, options or leverage contracts, says a livestock marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

**GREENHOUSE GROWERS TO MEET**--Greenhouse growers of flowers, bedding and foliage plants are invited to attend the Texas Greenhouse Growers Conference at Texas A&M University Nov. 8-10, says a landscape horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Discussion topics include growing media, greenhouse sanitation, tissue culture, production costs, chemical pruning, growth regulators, energy sources and plant rental services.

**WHY BUM MUMS?**--If your mums aren't doing to well this fall, there may be a good reason, says a landscape horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Mums need full sunlight, good air circulation and well-drained soil. There should be no tree roots interfering with plant growth. And mums should not be planted where they will be affected by outdoor lights at night as this will interfere with their growth patterns. When buying mum plants, get the early flowering type.

**ACCIDENT CONTROL**--On Halloween night, watch for children in dark costumes walking on roadway shoulders and other places where you normally do not expect to see them. Their costumes may restrict their vision and movement, says the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

## Texas Receives Grant

The State of Texas has been awarded a grant of \$423,000 to implement a Home Weatherization Program throughout the State, it was announced today by Curtis E. Carlson, Jr., Acting Regional Representative of the Department of Energy (DOE) in Dallas.

Texas is one of the first states in the nation to qualify for such a grant under Title IV, Part A, of the Energy Conservation and Production Act. DOE's Weatherization Program, which was authorized by Congress and became law on August 4, 1976, has a three-year authorized budget of \$200 million of which \$27.5 million was appropriated for FY 1977.

The Texas Grant of \$423,000 for fiscal year 1977 will allow the State to weatherize approximately 2000 homes of low-income persons under a plan developed by the Office of the Governor. Under the program, 90 percent of the funds will be allocated for materials, tools, and equipment while only 10 percent will be allocated for labor and administration.  
"Due to the quick action of the State of Texas in submitting an application, many of the homes will be weatherized prior to the onset of cold weather," said Carlson.

"This is a significant program that will not only conserve energy, but will also assist greatly in lowering the energy costs of the low-income elderly and handicapped citizens," Carlson added.

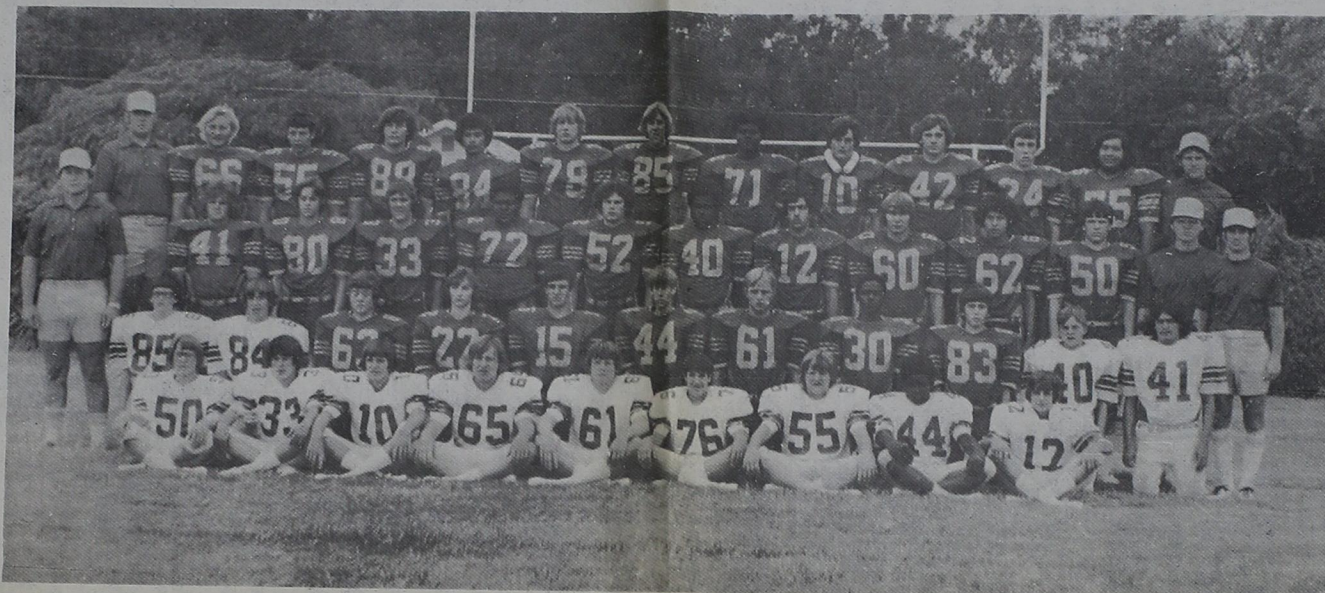

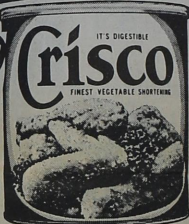
