Seal Coat Project Near Completion

Seal coating of various streets in Munday was completed Wednesday by Coltharp Construction Company of Seymour.

Approximately three weeks ago a crew of three from the City of Munday began patching designated streets to prepare them for the topping project. Seven hundred dollars of patching materials plus labor was involved in repairing holes and working intersections for better drainage. Between 15 and 16 thousand dollars will be spent on the seal coating alone.

A survey made of all paved streets in the city was conducted by councilman of streets Von Marr, city administrator Walter Hertel and inspector of project L. O. Jackson Sr. Streets to receive the seal coat were selected on the basis of deterioration. Those with the most needs for repairs

were put on the top of the list. Monies budgeted was used to cover these streets as far as allotted funds would permit.

Funds for the street seal coating project were allotted in the operating budget and were taken from the general fund and street paving special fund. Other streets in the city will be seal coated next year if funds are avail-

able and allotted in the new budget.

Some streets in Munday have no paving but due to the necessity of maintaining present paved streets funds are not available at this time to initiate a new city street paving project. Unless the city maintains streets already paved they will be lost due to deterioration.

Streets receiving a new seal coat include: north 12th Avenue, north 10th Avenue, 7th Avenue from Main to north end; G street from 5th to 7th; C St., Munday Ave. to 3rd; G St., Birch to Cedar and Cedar Ave., G to I. A strip seal was applied on B St. and approximately 2 blocks on Birch Ave. All of the above streets are on the north side of the city.

On the south side of Munday these streets received a new top. Bowie St. from 4th to 5th; 7th Ave., Eden to Dallas and a 10 ft. strip from Dallas to Cisco; West Gail, 10th to 12th; 10th Ave., Gail to Eden; 11th Ave., Eden to Forest and Forest from 11th to 12th.

For the past two years the City of Munday has applied for and been denied funds from the federal government to pave certain areas in Munday. According to Walter Hertel if a program is made available in 1979, the City will again put their application in for the program.

Moguls Prepare For Seymour In Opener

Head coach Steve Rodgers and assistant coaches, John Poulos, Danny Diggs, Bill Dennis and Scott Barton are preparing the 1978 Moguls for the season opener against Seymour Friday night in Munday at 8:00 p.m.

The Panthers finished the season with a 4-1 district record losing to Childress after two late touchdowns. First year head coach Fred Maples will have seven returning lettermen, four offense and three defense. Basic offense is wing T and defense is stack 4. Team strength is quickness and weakness is little experience and weight.

Munday will return 10 lettermen, five offense and seven defense. Returning to the backfield for the Moguls will be Billy Welch, Kevin Herring, Doug Michalik, Ism Murray and Omar Chaucair. Two all area players return to the squad this year and they are end Lrry Welch and guard Ronnie Phillips. Because of an injury suffered in the summer it is not likely Phillips will start. Other returning starters on defense are end Bobby Therwanger, tackles Y. Ramirez and Phil Johnson, halfback and corner back Kevin Herring, nose guard Johnny Melton and strong safety Keith Sanders. Newcomers moving up from junior varsity are guard Ricky Sosa, fullback Johnny Dockins and Randy Waggoner and quarterback Randy Ronton. Moving from Petrolia and a senior will be linebacker Wayne Mints.

The Moguls will be running from either the I or T with a 55 defense. Defense is the strong point of the Moguls along with attitude. Offensively the team could be weak with a new back-

field.

As time rolls on, and two scrimmages under their belts, the Moguls will be out to cage the Panthers. Mistakes have been made and the coaches are working to correct and improve the playing of positions. Offensively the Moguls have been able to move the ball in scrimmages. Defensively the team has held their opponents to short yardage only to see them cross the goal line on a long run by speedsters of the opposing team.

In '76" the Moguls defeated the Panthers by a score of 21 to 6. 1977 saw a 13-13 deadlock with both teams seeking a win in '78. A win by the Moguls would be the second in 28 years.

In the scrimmage against Electra Friday the Moguls had improved since Rotan. Mistakes were still made with workouts this week aimed at decreasing or eliminating them. Physically the Moguls are ready for the Panthers. Team spirit is building and the coaching staff is preparing for a tough battle.

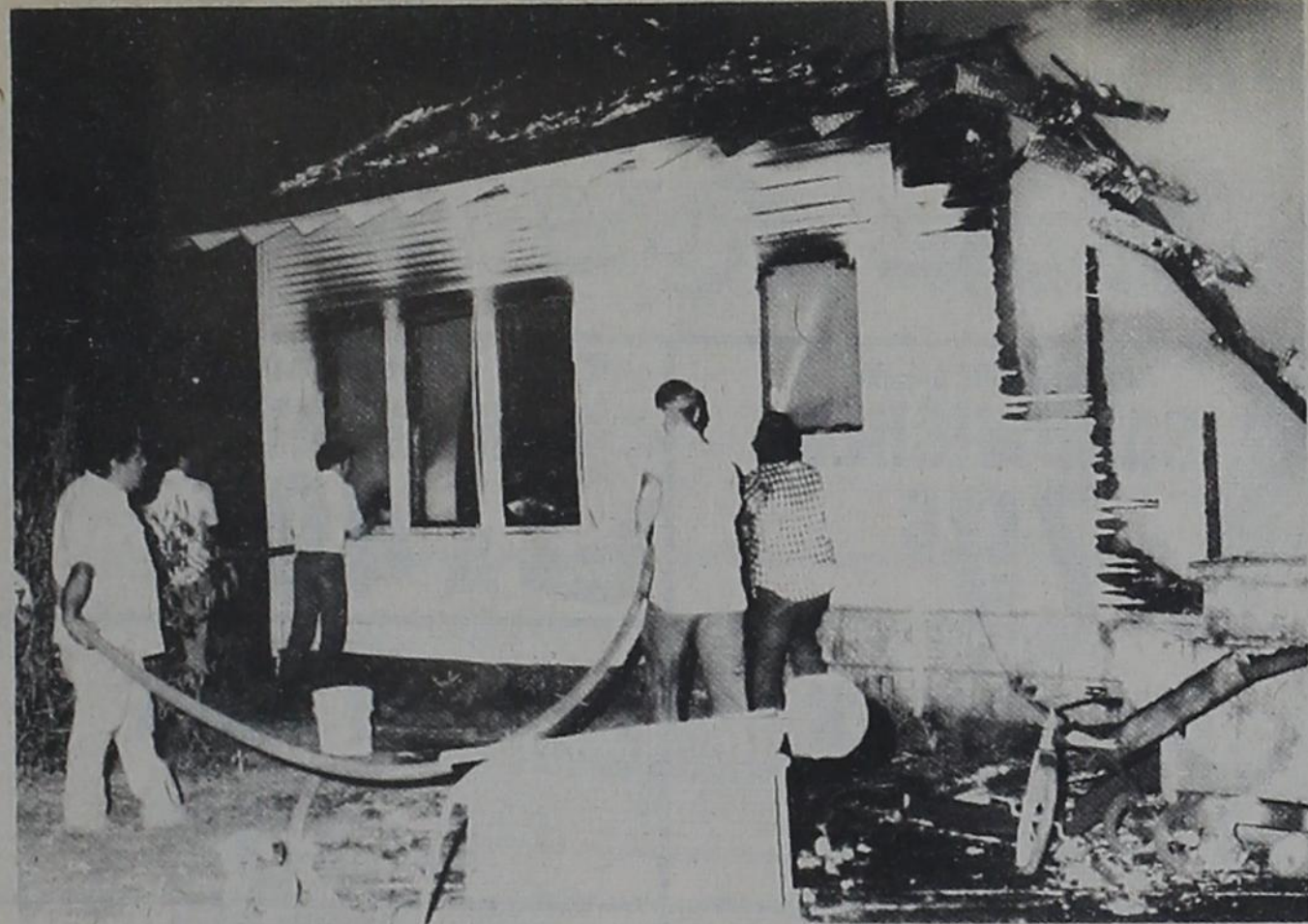
Loyal supporters of the Moguls are getting ready for the season to open as could be seen by the turnout Friday night in the rain. The Big Purple Cloud,

Fire Destroys Castorena Home In Goree

Two units from the Munday Volunteer Fire Department answered a call to assist the Goree Fire Department at the home of Guadalupe Castorena in Goree Saturday night.

When the units from Munday arrived the house was engulfed by flames and wind carried sparks were threatening another house to the north where hay had been stored. Munday's pumper immediately began operations to hose down the threatened building while another line was diverted to assist the Goree firemen in extinguishing the roaring blaze. Munday's rural unit took the east end of the house and fought the smoldering fire in the station wagon.

The fire in Goree resulted in the loss of home and contents of the Castorena family. Approximate dollar damage was said to be estimated at around \$6,000.

Officers of the Knox County Chapter of the American Heart Association met Wednesday to plan activities for the upcoming drive in Knox County.

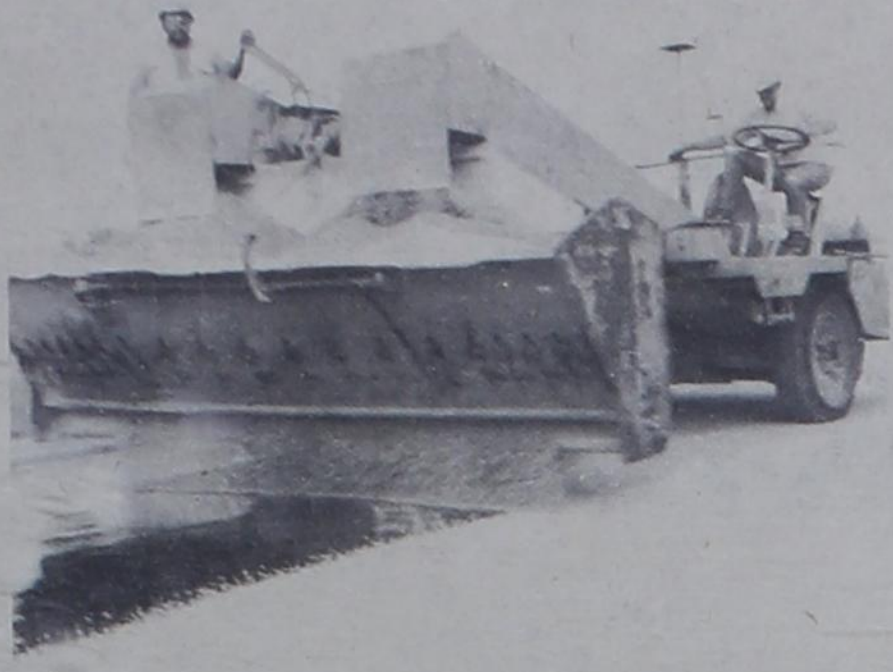
The chapter is a county wide organization that informs the people of heart diseases and sponsors clinics

AG BRIEFS
LARGE WHEAT SUPPLIES LEAD TO SET-ASIDE PROGRAM—Due to large wheat supplies in the U.S., the USDA has announced a set-aside program to trim production. Even with the acreage cut-back, wheat prices will not improve much this fall unless crop problems develop in other parts of the world, notes a grain marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Also, the decline of the value of the dollar could help give importers "bargain" prices for U.S. wheat and thus increase exports. The 1979 wheat program is similar to that of last year and revolves around a 20 percent set-aside of planted acreage.

Deadline Set For Gas And Electric Tax

State Comptroller Bob Bullock today reminded city governments that they have until September 10 to notify his office if they wish to repeal the one percent city tax on residential gas and electric bills October 1. "It's absolutely essential that we be notified by that date if the tax break is to become effective on October 1, the earliest possible date under the new law," Bullock said. Bullock said those cities that repeal the tax after that date will have to wait a full calendar quarter before the tax break goes into effect. The Texas Legislature passed a law during its recent special session repealing the four percent state tax on residential utility bills effective October 1.

That law also automatically repeals the one percent city tax on residential utilities October 1, 1979, unless the city government votes to continue the tax. Cities that wish, however, can by majority vote of the council repeal the city tax effective October 1, 1978, — the same day the state tax exemption becomes effective. Bullock said that 39 cities have informed his office that they intend to repeal the city tax, while another 45 said they will retain it.

EXTENSION ECONOMIST IN MANAGEMENT NAMED—James R. Ahrenholz has been named to the position of economist-management with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. He will coordinate statewide educational programs in farm and ranch management, including such areas as production economics and estate planning. Ahrenholz served as a management specialist with the Iowa Extension Service for six years.

Retirement And Survivors Insurance

Congress recently increased the amounts beneficiaries may earn without losing some of their social security checks. Beginning this year, there are two basic retirement tests. One is for people 65 or older, and the other for those under 65.

If you are 65 now, or will be before January 2, 1979, you may earn \$4000 this year without suffering any loss of benefits. If you are under 65, the new limit for 1978 is \$3240.

People who earn over the allowable amount may still be eligible for some payments. One dollar must be withheld from total annual benefits for every two dollars by which you go over the limit.

In future years the limit for people under 65 will increase automatically as wages increase. For those 65 and over, the exempt

amount will increase to \$4500 in 1981 and \$6000 in 1982. After 1982 any future increases will be made automatically as wages go up.

Starting in 1982 there will be no limit on earnings for people 70 or older. Until

then, there is still a limit on earnings until a person is 72 years old.

People wanting more detailed information as to how these new rules affect them should contact the Vernon Social Security Office.

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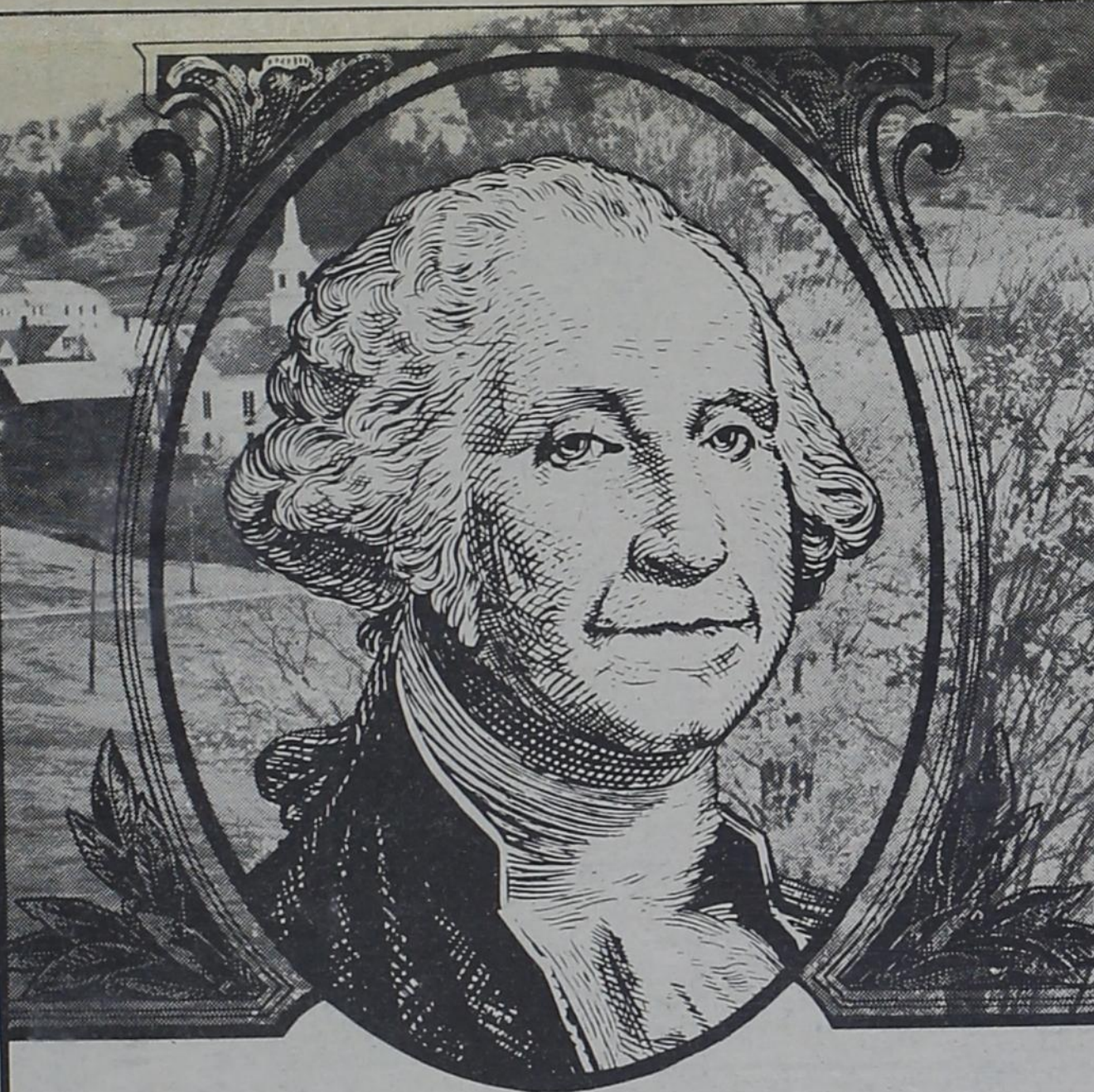

College at Munday. I was fairly well posted because I handled the telegrams. I will remember the C of C and other citizens met with the committee under a brush arbor on the East side of City Hall.

June 19, 1922 five thousand Ku Klux Klansmen converged on Munday. They came from all about including one special train from Abilene and one from Wichita Falls. I had seen the Knox County Treasurer of the Klan hand the then Railway Station Agent J. W. "Pete" Wiley a check for three thousand dollars guaranteeing the fare for the two trains.

The Klansmen marched from the business district to a pasture about one half mile East of the Railroad station where they had an area topped off with barbecue pits tables etc. and wired for electric lights.

Munday obtained electric power from Haskell then. Sometime after dark someone pulled a prank on the Klan by placing a piece of steel on the end of a wire and throwing it across the highline cutting off all electric power from the Munday area until about ten the next morning. This happened between Munday and Weinert.

In 1921 I witnessed the devastating fire that caused Munday to install a modern water-system fire department and disaster signal. Up to then there was no water system and the only fire fighting equipment was a two wheeled cart with two fifty gallon water drums, a hand pump and the cart was hand propelled. Fire alarm was shooting guns.

The fire occurred about 2:00 or 3:00 a.m. I was standing on the sidewalk across the street North of The First National Bank building. I was only fourteen and was entertaining ideas of making a dash to rear of the last building and assisting in carrying out the merchandise when my brother Clifford walked up and said, "Howard don't you go near that building someone is 'gonna' get hurt there in just a few minutes."

In six or eight minutes the building exploded and the brick wall collapsed. I was standing about three feet from the men who carried Walter West out dead, Mr. Huskinson who had jumped from top of the building and Ed Hensley. Huskinson spent several months in the hospital and Hensley died later as a result of his injuries.


I didn't know until recently that City Marshall C. R. Elliott had ordered the men out, but some were not lucky enough to make it. DeWitt Yost, who now resides in Fort Worth, tells me that he got out of the building as soon as "CR" ordered them out.

When I was a boy at Munday, Milam Diggs and others had a croquet ground and set at the Post office. They allowed we boys to play with their equipment when the men weren't playing. Some of we boys got to be pretty good on that smooth court and the good balls and mallets.

Krueger Co-Sponsors Ag Bill

U. S. Rep. Bob Krueger has announced his decision to cosponsor House Joint Resolution 1093 in an effort to "help save the American farm family from financial ruin by raising farm prices to 90 per cent of parity before Congress adjourns for the year."

The resolution mandates an increase in price support levels for milk, wheat, feed grains, soybeans and cotton to 90 per cent of the parity price and adjusts the grain reserve's release and call-in levels to 100 per cent and 110 per cent respectively.

"When flexible parity legislation, which I co-sponsored, was defeated by the House of Representatives earlier this year under threat of presidential veto, I expressed my continuing commitment to the parity concept and vowed to work toward development of new agricultural policy assuring the farmer a fair price for his crops and less federal intervention," Krueger said.

"The resolution I am now co-sponsoring will achieve this without a dramatic increase in consumer prices."

Cong. Richard Nolan, (D-Minn.), who has introduced the resolution in the House, estimates the increase in prices resulting from 90 per cent parity levels as provided in the resolution would be: milk, plus, 0286c/lb.; wheat, plus, 0832c/lb.; soybeans, plus 0252c/lb.; and cotton, plus 2444c/lb.

"The way to improve our nation's economy is not to force the farmer into the ranks of the unemployed, but to ensure that agriculture is a business in which farmers can provide a decent living for their families through fair market prices," Krueger said.

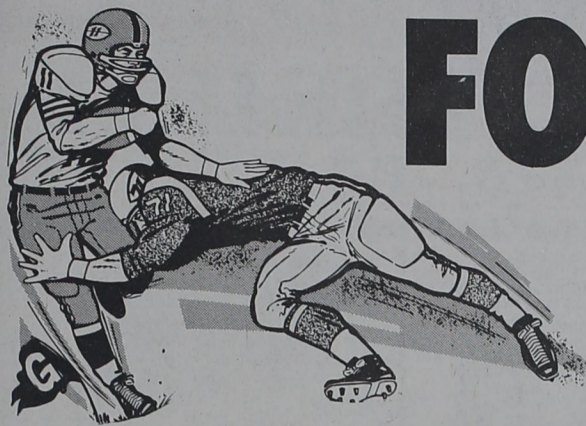

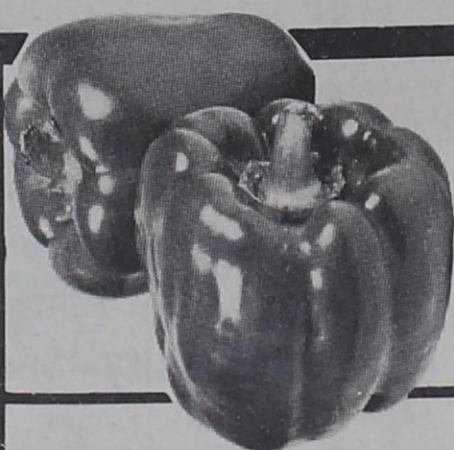

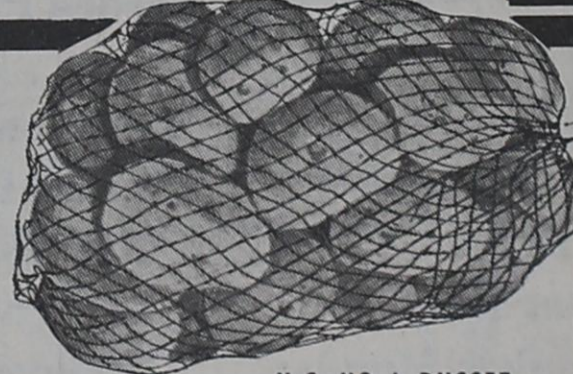
