Voters Reminded To Cast Ballots November 8

Tuesday, November 8 the polls will open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. for the registered voters of Knox County to cast their ballots on the seven proposed constitutional amendments.

The amendments and their contents are as follows: Amendment No. 1 - The constitutional amendment increasing the size of the Court of Criminal Appeals to nine judges, and permitting the court to sit in panels of three judges.

Amendment No. 2 - The constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$200 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund and to allow surviving widows of veterans to purchase tracts under certain circumstances.

Amendment No. 3 - The constitutional amendment permitting denial of bail to a person charged with a felony offense who has been theretofore twice convicted

of a felony offense, or charged with a felony offense committed while that person was admitted to bail on a prior felony indictment, or charged with a crime involving the use of a deadly weapon where there is evidence such person has been convicted of a prior felony offense; providing for a 60-day limit to that person's incarceration without trial; and providing for that person's right of appeal.

Amendment No. 4 - The constitutional amendment authorizing tax relief to preserve certain cultural, historical, or natural history resources.

Amendment No. 5 - The constitutional amendment authorizing the formation of agricultural or marine associations which may mandate the collection of refundable assessments for improvement of production, marketing, or use of their products.

Amendment No. 6 - The constitutional amendment to give the legislature the power to authorize state and national banks to exercise banking and discounting privileges by use of electronic devices or machines.

Amendment No. 7 - The constitutional amendment changing the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct, and relating to the commission and the powers and proceedings of the commission, a master, and the Supreme Court, or Court of Civil Appeals justices serving in place of the Supreme Court, for the suspension, censure, removal, or involuntary retirement of a justice, judge, or justice of the peace under certain circumstances.

These amendments can only pass or fail if you vote. If you want to have an interest in your government, VOTE, November 8.

With 5:18 left in the first quarter, Mogul Robert Spells scored the first touchdown of the night on a 30 yard run off left tackle. Welch added the one point conversion. The TD was set-up on a pass interception by Tony Myers.

Defense ruled the second

quarter as neither team could manage to cross the goal line.

The third quarter found Spells scoring from 24 yards out and Welch again splitting the up-rights for the PAT.

In the final period Jimmy Cooke took over the scoring honors on a 1 yard plunge for the final TD of the night. Welch was 100% for the night as he added his third and final one point conversion to make the score 21-0.

Penalties plagued the Moguls and interceptions controlled the progress of the Hounds.

Senator Farabee Seeks Re-Election

State Senator Ray Farabee announced his candidacy today for re-election to the Texas Senate representing the 30th District. The 30th Senatorial District covers a twenty-nine county area in North Central and Northwest Texas including Knox County. Farabee, who is 45 and a Democrat, was elected to the State Senate in 1974 and is now completing his first term of office.

Lieutenant Governor Bill Hobby recently appointed Senator Farabee to the Legislative Budget Board which meets during the interim between sessions to prepare the budget for the State. He also serves on the Senate Finance Committee, the Jurisprudence Committee, and the Natural Resources Committee, which deals with issues concerning agriculture and energy.

The Texas Farmers Union presented Senator Farabee with the Senate Member Outstanding Legislative Service Award in 1975 and he recently received the Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association's

Texas Distinguished Legislator Award.

Senator Farabee, in announcing his candidacy, said, "My first term in the Legislature has been productive and worthwhile. I was fortunate to receive excellent committee assignments and have sponsored legislation which is now law that benefits both the 30th District and the State of Texas. I would like to continue my public service in the Texas Senate. I want to utilize the experience and seniority which comes with a second term to serve the people of this area."

In 1975 Texas Monthly magazine selected Senator Farabee as the outstanding newcomer to the Senate and in 1977 named him as one of three senators among the ten best legislators in Texas. In making this selection, Texas Monthly cited him as being "conscientious, hard-working, smart, fair, independent, someone who does his homework."

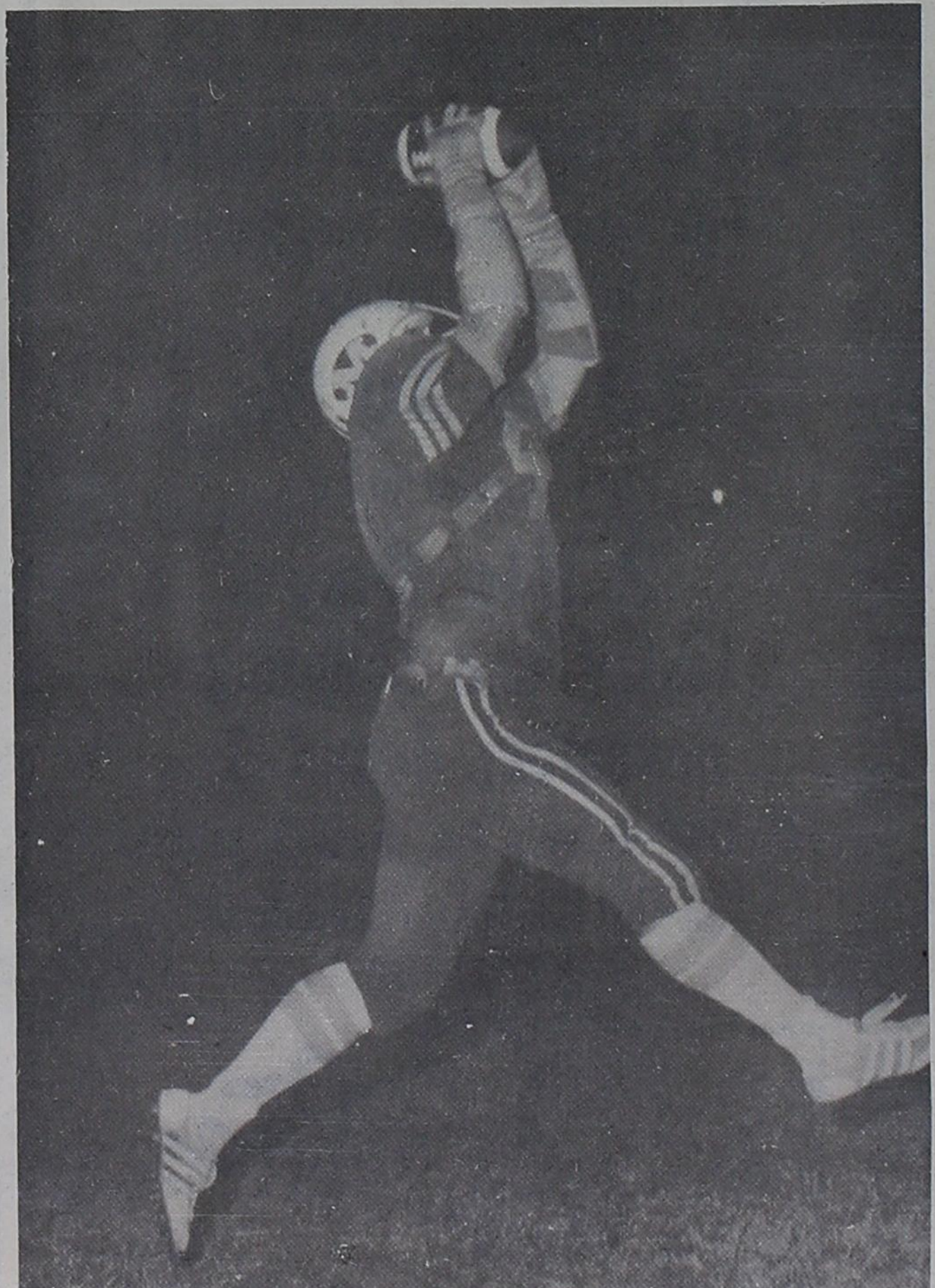
FM 2534, 6.096 mi., From SH 6, E, to FM 3202.

Meeting On Beef Cattle Nov. 8

A Beef Cattle Producers meeting will be held Tuesday, November 8 in the Knox County Court House at 7:00 p.m., according to Tommy Antilley, county extension agent.

The program will include four extension specialists discussing heifer management, cross breeding, health programs, economics of cow and calf production, weed and brush control and improved pastures.

Antilley encourages all producers to attend.

Vote For Amendment Five A Vote For Family Farmers

A vote for Number Five is a firm vote for Texas' family farms, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown commented today, as he urged passage of the fifth proposed constitutional amendment being voted on during statewide elections November 8.

Amendment Five authorizes the formation of agricultural or marine associations which may mandate the collection of refundable assessments for improvement of production, marketing, or use of their products.

Noting that 3,000 farmers are expected to go out of business in Texas during 1977, Brown explained, "It has become increasingly difficult for the small, family farmer to compete in an industry which constantly rides the boom and bust economic roller coaster."

"Agricultural associations are an essential means for family farmers, who might otherwise be weak by themselves, to join together to solve their own problems," he stated.

Viable, healthy farmer associations are in reality consumer organizations as well, Brown added, "because assessments allow agriculturalists to increase research and marketing techniques which lead to a more efficient and plentiful food supply."

One out of every five jobs in the state is directly or indirectly related to the Texas farm and ranch industry so that the statewide goal of making Texas agriculture Number One means increased economic stability for every Texan.

Brown said, "A positive vote for Amendment Five will secure the future of farm associations which provide a major tool in our fight for economic stability as a state," he concluded.

Lions Change Meeting Place

Meeting for the first time in the newly-reopened Cottage Inn, members of the Munday Lions Club voted by unanimous decision to make this the permanent weekly meeting place. Due to a slight increase in meals, the members voted an increase in monthly dues from \$11.25 to \$12.50.

Other matters coming before the club at this regular business meeting included:

A unanimous vote to have Lions Club signs erected at the four entrances into the town of Munday, giving the time and meeting place of the club. This would likely encourage other Lions to visit the local club, if traveling through Munday at the noon hour.

It was also voted to confer with local Jaycees on the proposition of erecting their sign on the same poles.

Lion Edgar brought before the club the proposition of making regular annual contributions to worthwhile organizations, such as: Texas Lions Camp for Crippled Children, Lions Care Program, Lions Eye Bank, West Texas Rehab Center in Abilene, and the Guide Dog Foundation for the Blind. These contributions are made possible through local patronage of Lions fund raising projects, such as the annual broom sale.

It was also voted to continue newspaper advertising of the monthly health clinic held on the second Wednesday of each month, and to place this event on the community sign on the city hall lawn.
