

Voters Reminded To Cast Ballots November 8

Tuesday, November 8 the polls will open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. for the registered voters of Knox County to cast their ballots on the seven proposed constitutional amendments.

The amendments and widows of veterans to their contents are as follows:

Amendment No. 1 - The constitutional amendment increasing the size of the Court of Criminal Appeals to nine judges, and permitting the court to sit in panels of three judges.

Greyhounds Fall To Moguls 21-0

Jimmy Cooke and Robert Spells amassed 18 points between themselves and Larry Welch added the 3 PATS to blast the Knox City Greyhounds 21-0 in District 7-A action Friday night.

With 5:18 left in the first quarter, Mogul Robert Spells scored the first touchdown of the night on a 30 yard run off left tackle. Welch added the one point conversion. The TD was set-up on a pass interception by Tony Myers. Defense ruled the second

The third quarter found Spells scoring from 24 yards out and Welch again splitting the up-rights for the PAT.

In the final period Jimmy Cooke took over the scoring honors on a 1 yard plunge for the final TD of the night. Welch was 100% for the night as he added his third and final one point conversion to make the score 21-0.

Penalties plagued the Moguls and interceptions controlled the progress of the Hounds. The Moguls will travel to Paducah this Friday night as they take on the Dragons. Remember game starts at 7:30.

Re-Election

State Senator Ray Farabee announced his candidacy today for re-election to the Texas Senate representing the 30th District. The 30th Senatorial District covers a twenty-nine county area in North Central and Northwest Texas including Knox County. Farabee, who is 45 and a Democrat, was elected to the State Senate in 1974 and is now completing his first term of office.

Lieutenant Governor Bill Hobby recently appointed Senator Farabee to the Legislative Budget Board which meets during the interim between sessions to prepare the budget for the State. He also serves on the Senate Finance Committee, the Jurisprudence Committee, and the Natural Resources Committee, which deals with issues concerning

agriculture and energy. The Texas Farmers Union presented Senator Farabee with the Senate Member Outstanding Legislative Service Award in 1975 and he recently received the Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association's
