Mogulettes And Bravettes Win District Track Championships

The two Munday teams finished first in both the varsity, 118 points, and junior high divisions, 123 points. It took total team effort in placing in the six places that produced points for the teams. A first or second place finish in the varsity division qualified the participant for the regional meet to be held, Friday and Saturday April 21 and 22 at Odessa. Finishing third and below may not have qualified any of the team members to advance further into the upcoming regional or state meets but, the desire to do the best they could helped accomplish a team victory and two trophies for the 1978 Mogulettes and Bravettes of Munday.

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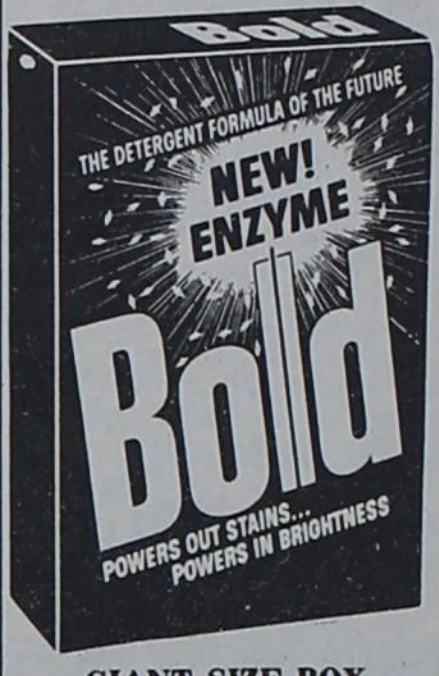

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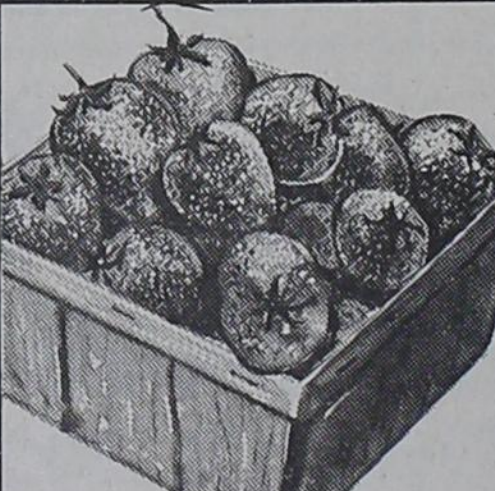
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Uniform Planting Date For Cotton May 20

Boll weevil populations in the Rolling Plains are at low levels now. About 95% of the population which went into overwintering habitat has been unable to survive the hard winter. The weevils that did survive will soon begin to emerge from below broad-leaf litter in search of cotton. By using a uniform planting date of May 20 or later, as suggested by the Knox County Crops and Fertility Committee, producers can greatly reduce the number of weevils that infest their fields.

Research has shown that boll weevils live 8 to 22 days after emerging from overwintering habitat. When cotton is planted on May 20 or later it will be the first or second week in July before 1/3 grown squares are present. Since boll weevils cannot deposit eggs that will produce adult weevils until the squares are 1/3 grown most of the female weevils do not survive to deposit

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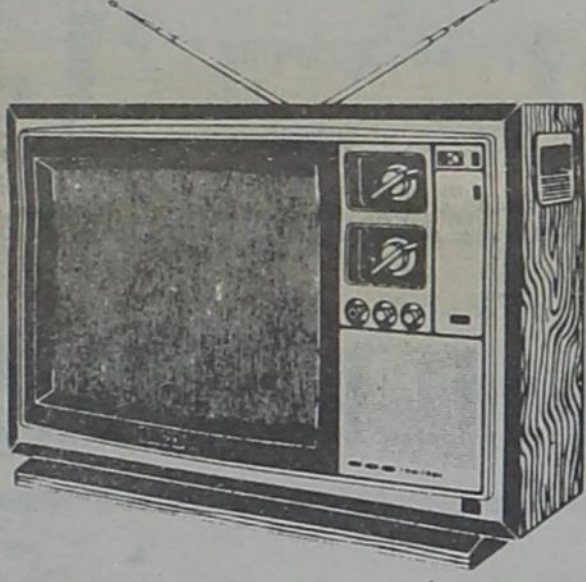
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their eggs. Recent research conducted by Mr. James White and Dr. Don Rummel of the Research and Extension Center at Lubbock, indicates that only 5 to 10% of the overwintered weevils are able to survive and infest cotton that is squaring the first week in July.

When all the producers in an area use the same general planting date the amount of weevil damage will be reduced during most of the growing season. Once cotton produces 1/3 grown squares until the second generation weevil adult begins to emerge in mid August, there is little movement of weevils from field to field. Therefore, weevil populations will remain low in fields that were not infested with overwintered weevils or where early season control was carried out until weevil migration begins in mid August.

July, producers will need to control the weevils with an early season application just before the first squares are 1/3 grown.

In most cases, only one application will be needed. However, in early May planted fields several applications may be needed to control overwintered weevils.

AG BRIEF

ONCE DAILY SUCKLING SPEEDS UP REBREEDING—Beef cattle producers who have difficulty maintaining a 12-month calving interval with first-calf heifers might consider the "once daily suckling" technique, notes a beef cattle specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

PROFESSIONAL LAWN SERVICE—What are reasonable expectations of a lawn service company? The company should describe its service in detail, provide advance notification of applications of fertilizers, herbicides and pesticides, respond within a reasonable time to problem calls, and provide trained and qualified applicators, says a turfgrass specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

RELIEF FOR LABOR SHORTAGE—Many labor markets are experiencing a shortage of workers rather than a shortage of jobs because employers are not making the best use of the current labor force, contends an economist in business development with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Employers should consider all segments of the labor force, including handicapped persons, older as well as younger workers, and women who are entering the labor market in non-traditional occupations. Employers should also review applicant procedures and educational requirements and should be flexible to employee needs.

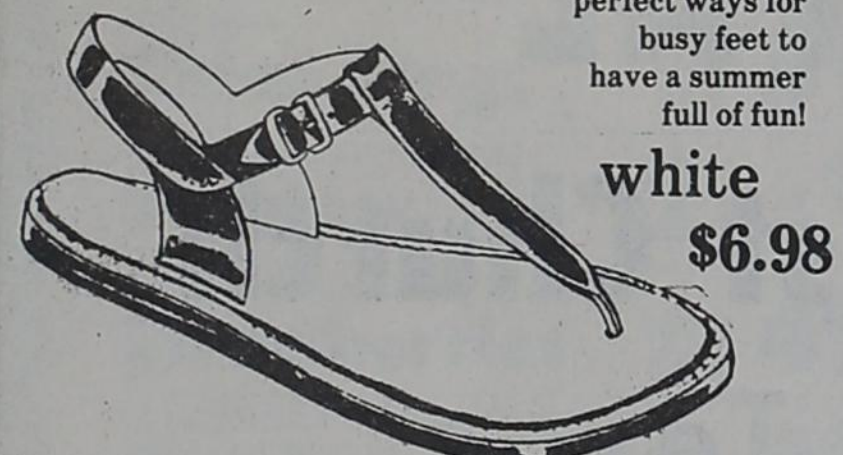

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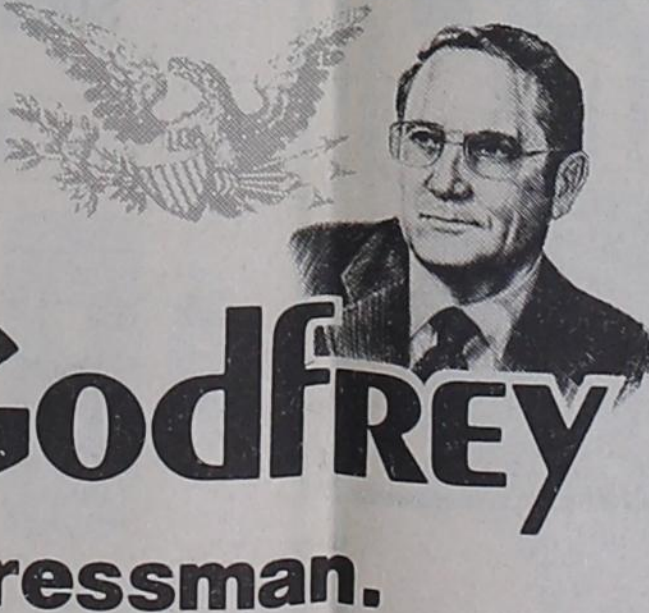

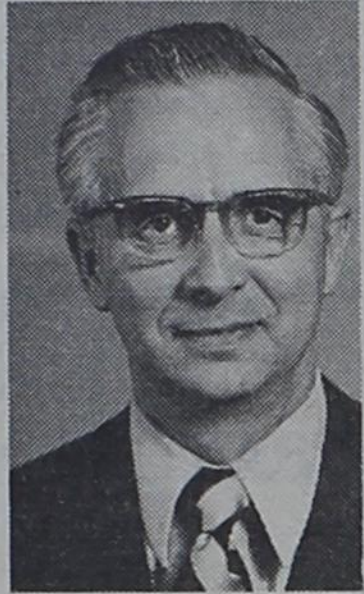

Hill Caravan Stops In Munday To Campaign

State Rep. Bill Clark was in Munday, April 17 campaigning for governor for his father-in-law, Attorney General John Hill, said today Dolph Briscoe still has not answered the bell in the national energy fight.

"We need a governor who will come out swinging from the moment the bell sounds in the first round," Rep. Clark of Tyler said during stops on a 500-mile Hill for Governor campaign caravan from Haskell to Austin.

The caravan is one of 10 being led by Hill family members and supporters April 17-21 throughout the state. They will converge Friday in Austin, where the candidate will speak at a San Jacinto Day Caravan Party (Noon, April 21, Waterloo Park, 11th and Red River). The caravans will cover

6,500 miles and will stop at 225 cities.

"Instead of fighting for our state's interests on energy, the government has danced around on this issue. Every time he's gone to Washington for a showdown over the energy bill's obvious unfair treatment of Texas, all he has done is tiptoe around the real problem.

"The real problem is that Washington is treating

Texas like a colony instead of a working partner. It wants Texas to provide the oil and natural gas to heat the rest of the nation's homes and run the rest of the nation's factories, but isn't giving us anything in return except the bum's rush.


"If we continue to let our governor stand around and watch while we lose control of our free-market pricing in the intrastate gas market,

and while we lose control over allocation of our gas to other states, our economy will take a nose-dive in a hurry.

"This job calls for a leader, someone who can handle himself in Washington, John Hill has been to Washington to argue before the Supreme Court, and he's got a winning record. He knows what it takes to get results in Washington, because he's done it," Rep. Clark said.

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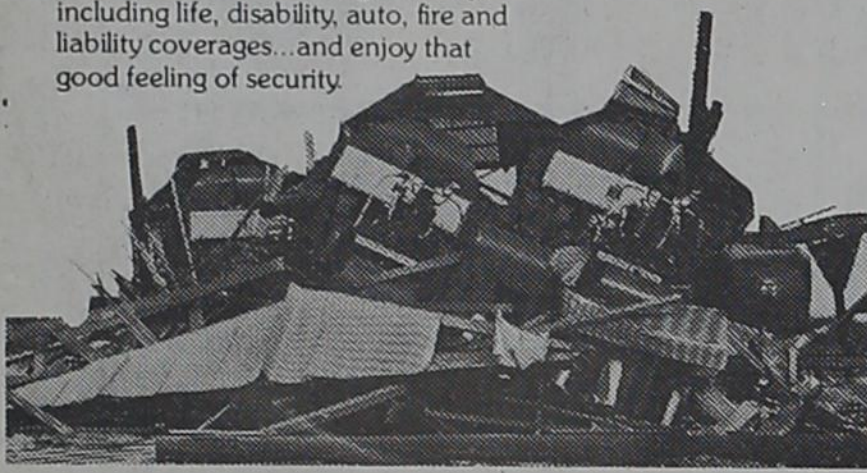
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Sales Tax Rebates Continue To Increase

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that city sales tax rebates for April are up 25 percent over last year.

Bullock said that his office Friday mailed rebate checks totaling \$20.2 million to 899 Texas cities as their April share of the local-option one percent city sales tax.

This compares to the \$16.2 million rebated last April. The latest rebates bring collections to date this year to \$121.6 million, compared to \$105.7 million for the first four months of 1977. This is a 15 percent increase.

In addition to these rebates, the recently created San Antonio Metropolitan Transit Authority received a rebate check—its first—totaling \$1.4 million.

The rebate check represents collections of an additional one-half cent sales tax

authorized by voters in San Antonio and seven neighboring cities, effective last January 1, for financing mass transit systems for the participating cities.

The residents of those cities are the first to take advantage of the special sales tax levy authorized by the legislative for certain large cities to finance mass transportation systems.

As usual, the City of Houston received the largest city sales tax rebate check—\$4.9 million. City sales tax collections there are running 18 percent ahead of last year.

The City of Dallas was sent a check for \$2.6 million; San Antonio, \$1.2 million; Ft. Worth, \$852,356; and Austin, \$628,355.

Munday received a check for \$865.31, and Knox City, \$1,399.66.
