

It was hoped that the \$60,000 estimated cost of the plant might be raised locally, although the board might feel safe to proceed toward erection of the plant with a

### Water Adds 24 **Victims In Outdoors**

Water sports fatalities added another 24 Texans since the last compilation of 13 victims was made by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department two weeks

J. Weldon Watson, Executive Director of the Department, said publicity is being given the tragedies as a means of encouraging greater safety during the outdoor recreational season now gaining momentum.

Ten of the latest persons to drown were fishermen, seven were swimmers and three were boating. All of the latter, three Bryan youths, perished in one accident when their boat overturned.

The Bryan incident marked multiple tragedies. Two Austin men drowned when their motorized 12-foot flat-bottom boat sank. Two children escaped. Three Houston men, caught off shore in a sudden storm, were swept to their deaths by high

waves. Two persons drowned vainly trying to save another, in separate accdients. One was from Abilene and the other from



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
