At first we found two reasons, which might be beneficial to Munday, for editor Roy Craig's "Sampling" our town...

The second reason, we discovered right off, might have been to inform local people of the City of Haskell's efforts...

"The council was also visited by members of the city council of the City of Haskell who presented to the Stamford body a proposal for Haskell to purchase raw water from Lake Stamford...

"The Proposal as offered by the Haskell officials proposed that Haskell would purchase a minimum of 10,500,000 gallons of raw water per month...

"The pumping plant and pipeline required to move the water from Lake Stamford to the Haskell filtration plant would be constructed at the expense of the City of Haskell.

"The Haskell officials also proposed the contract be drawn to run for 30 years.

"The Stamford City Council took the proposal under advisement, but deferred action pending further investigation into the situation.

"The Industrial Committee of the Stamford Chamber of Commerce is currently conducting a study on the current water needs of Stamford, and the projects needs of the city, in an effort to determine if Stamford can afford to sell water from Lake Stamford to another community without endangering the city water supply and hampering the city's growth...

If memory serves us correctly, Haskell could be enjoying water from Lake Stamford but for disagreements during the time the Paint Creek reservoir was in the making.

In our opinion, Haskell people could be enjoying an abundance of water from the Miller Creek Reservoir but for certain litigations in which the City of Haskell has played a major role.

Still another reason, we found, which might have been responsible for Stamford papers coming into the Munday area was an anniversary sale staged by one of Stamford's stores.

The rains during Sunday night—ranging from a half-inch in the Munday area to better than two inches southeast of town—again halted wheat harvest and cotton planting. There's so much to be done; it's too wet to plow, and "time's awastin'!"

We saw one patch of cantaloupes from the highway Sunday, and they're going to have to hump up considerably if they produce cantaloupes for the Vegetable Festival, which is just about two weeks away. We hope the area has a whole batch of vegetables to show at that time.

The vegetable hats are here, and a number of people are already wearing them!

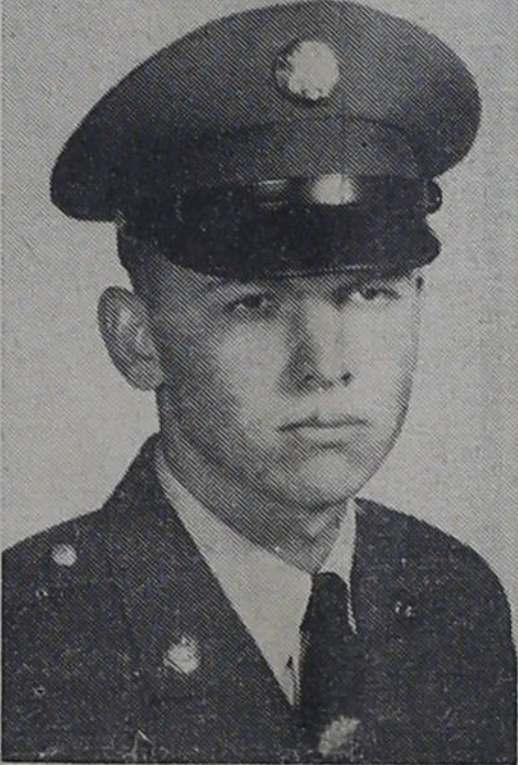
Health Scholarships Given Two Students

**FARM and RANCH Notes**  
**JOE W. DOBY**  
COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENT

Showers are prolonging the wheat harvest in Knox County this year. While the moisture is always welcome, it has been the cause of much replanting of cotton, as well as a good crop of careless weeds. This looks like a good year to have used chemical weed control. We have observed several fields that have been treated and the cotton planted on the bed. It appears to be making good growth thus far. It would have probably drowned out in many places had these fields been planted in the furrow.

Wheat yields are not as high as many farmers expected when harvest began. We think rust damaged wheat this year more than people realized. It can lower yields by weakening the plant so it does not send up as many heads as it would otherwise. It can cause a lower test weight by damaging the food manufacturing part of the plant, namely the leaf. Rust caused a plant to transpire more moisture through the leaf into the air.

Cantaloupes and watermelons have been making slow growth this year as have most vegetables. Potatoes have made an exceptionally large growth of vines this year. This may indicate there isn't must underneath the ground. Cherokees, in particular, have made the largest growth they have ever made since their introduction into the commercial crop. Potato harvest is expected to start about June 15.

Official rainfall for the year in Benjamin totals 8.66 inches through May 31. Rainfall for May totaled 3.42 inches. There were 10 showers this month with the largest being .52 inches. This means it has all gone into the ground with very little runoff. It should be a good year for the ranchers. Prospects are excellent for a big hay crop. Many fields are planted to sudan and sorghum-sudan crosses to be cut for hay.


Deferred grazing is one of the best practices a rancher can use to improve the condition of his ranges. There are several systems that can be used. The switch-back using one herd on two pastures switching every four months is one example. Another is the four pasture system using three herds, switching every four months, leaving one pasture empty. This four month rest comes at a different time each year so different grasses will seed during the rest period.

This four-pasture system is coming to the front in the Texas Experimental Ranch near Throckmorton. It was making more money last year and the grass is improving each year. The continuous grazed pasture had been making more money in the Throckmorton work until last year. Dr. Dub Waldrip, Station Manager, says that it takes several years to lower a range's productivity just as it takes several years to lower a range's isn't much doubt in looking at the continuous grazed pasture that the cattle are eating up the ranch's capital investment, while ones in the four-pasture system are living off the interest.

**"Why Pick on Me?"**

You are driving along the street about 15 miles an hour faster than you should. But your conscience is eased by the fact that several other motorists are doing exactly the same thing.

Unhappily, when a motorcycle officer takes up the chase, he singles you out as his target. Result: a ticket for speeding. "Why pick on me?" you may

trees, shrubs or vines or a permanent shed. The bed can vary in size from a tub two feet in diameter which should produce from 3,000 to 5,000 worms annually to an operation that will produce worms in commercial quantities.

We would offer these hints for a successful backyard operation. If a tub or half of an oil drum is used, a two-inch hole should be cut in the bottom to provide for proper drainage. A fine copper screen should be placed over the hole and secured with hot coal tar. Tub beds may be kept in the garage or buried in the ground. But leave about four inches of the tub above the ground to prevent surface water from flooding the worm bed.

Fill the tub to within four to six inches of the top with fine loam containing lots of humus or well decayed organic matter. Stock the bed with 50 to 100 worms of type desired. "Red wigglers" or "English redworms" are preferred by most fishermen. In 60 to 90 days after your seed stock begins to lay eggs, you should have mature worms and plenty of fish bait provided the worm bed has been kept moist and the worms fed.

well ask in injured innocence. "I'm no more guilty than those other drivers, who are all getting off scot-free. The United States Constitution must have something to say about this."

If the officer singled you out because of some personal animosity, there may indeed be a constitutional issue. Laws should not be enforced, the Supreme Court has warned, "with an evil eye and an unequal hand."

But if the discrimination was not intentional, you have no grounds for complaint. Your offense is not excused by the fact that other offenders are going unpunished.

Isn't that unfair? Certainly the law should be enforced alike against everyone—theoretically. But there are practical difficulties that must be faced.

Consider the findings of a traffic study made in a city of about 100,000 population. Based on surveillance of a typical intersection, the study indicated that there were no fewer than 3,000,000 traffic violations in the city every day.

Citing each violator would have required some 14,000 policemen—almost half of the adult

male population of the city. And all 14,000 would be occupied with traffic full time, leaving no policemen to chase burglars, lead funerals, comfort lost children, or remove drunks from the city hall steps.

In short, a rule of "all or none" in law enforcement could mean that none—not all—would be punished. We forego what is perfect to achieve what is possible.

It is true that, with less-than-perfect enforcement, you run the risk of getting more traffic tickets than your precise mathematical share. But take heart. A veteran judge estimates that, for every offense you are caught at, you commit a hundred.

### Regular Season Control For Cotton Insects

Cotton should be checked weekly by examining 100 squares at least one-third grown. Squares should be selected at random from several representative areas of the field. When 15 to 25 percent or more have weevil punctures, begin treatment. Apply insecticides at five-day intervals.

After one-third grown squares are present and egg laying has started, infestations may still be confined to small areas of the field in some cases.

Check your field carefully, if punctured squares are found in only a portion of the field, spray only that area. The spot treatment method where applicable is cheaper and beneficial insects are not affected in the unsprayed areas of the field.
