Odd Bits Salvaged

They were amazed at what they saw—and heard!

That's what the spokesman for the Abilene group, Eldon Mahon, said as they made a field tour of the Munday area last Friday. Around 38 Abilene persons, including one brave woman, Lena B. Crow of Sunshine Advertising, made the trip.

First stop was at the Gene Thompson potato field southwest of Munday. There they saw a potato digger at work bring the potatoes to the top of the ground, and laborers were busy gathering them into sacks to be transported to the processing sheds.

Here the group learned what most of us didn't know—that potatoes actually produce seeds under certain conditions. They were shown tiny pods of seeds which looked like small green tomatoes and were told the cooler spring weather caused this to happen. Most of us thought you could only get a potato plant by planting the eye. Taint necessarily so!

Next stop was at an onion patch on the B. E. Smith and Son operations. Here the onions, a contracted patch, were being harvested, topped and sacked.

On the two Munday school buses carried the visiting group and local people to the Smith potato operations, where they saw the automatic potato digger and loader in operation. This machine conveys the spuds from the ground into the trailer to be conveyed to the processing shed.

A short drive further, and the group witnessed processing of the spuds at the Smith sheds. The potatoes were being washed, graded, sacked and loaded into trucks to be taken on to market. Even the "culls" were being loaded on a separate truck, and we were told they were going to Altus, Okla.

The next drive took the group some six or eight miles over the area's agricultural fields, where they saw cantaloupes, cotton, milo and other crops growing—some among the oil wells north of town—before arriving at Baty's Aviaries, which is operated by Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Baty.

Upon arrival, the group was greeted by J. C. Baty, then the girls, Diedra and Sandra Lee, came out with an urn of coffee, followed by Mrs. Baty, who had doughnuts. Everyone enjoyed the refreshments, as well as a look-see at the beautiful and rare birds and a tour of one of the bird houses, where thousands of birds were seen.

J. C. explained that another and larger bird house was closed to the viewers because the birds were nesting.

On the way back to town, the busses stopped at the cantaloupe fields of Philip Homer and Wilford Bellinghausen. Melons the size of teacups were seen, and we were told no melons would be harvested until around July 15. A hail a few weeks ago beat off many small melons and set the crop back considerably; however, it was thought this patch was further advanced than others.

Back in Munday, a visit was paid to the cotton classing building, where experts from experiment stations were checking the 158 varieties of potatoes which were grown in test plots this year.

They just took a passing-by look-see at the two processing sheds, since they had seen practically the same operations at the Smith shed. Besides, most of the bunch were getting hungry.

At the school lunch room, the visitors and local people, some 60 in all, were fed a delicious meal of products grown in Knox County; except, we were told the roasting ears were outside the area because we were a mite too early for the local crop.

This ended a delightful tour, as local townspeople were hosts to the Abilene visitors in an enjoyable and enlightening tour. Abileneans wanted to be invited back.

And our guess is that they will be!



Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

come effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the 7th day of September, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.
