Mr. Alfred and Miss Nora Hertel of Benjamin, were visiting Mr. E. F. Jungman last Sunday.

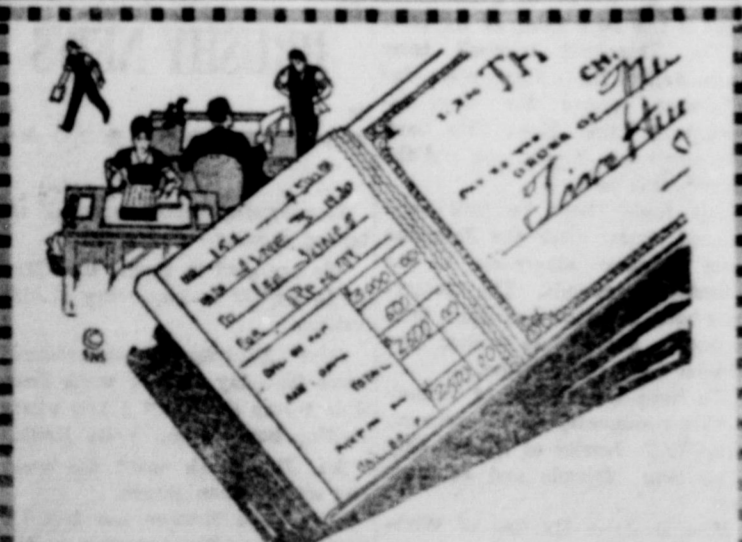

We have heard much comment recently upon the lack of interest in the political campaign. Very few have been heard to express their preference for governor, while ordinarily most everyone has his favorite picked at this stage of the campaign. This is possibly due to the belief of the people that none of the candidates can offer any great relief from the burdensome taxation under which the people are laboring. Campaign promises have lost their glow, and people have decided that most all the political palaver is pure "hokum." Furthermore, of the number of candidates for governor there are no real orators as there have been in many campaigns. Let us hope that this lack of interest is due to the determination of the people of Texas to elect a governor who can render a real service to the people of Texas. Let us hope that Texas has been freed for all time of the political strife and hatred that has characterized campaigns in the past.

Of course it's none of our business, but we just can't keep from wondering why candidate Thos. B. Love doesn't take a dig at President Hoover for having given his unqualified endorsement to the Hon. Dwight Morrow, who favors the repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment, and who won the Republican nomination for United States Senator over a dry opponent in New Jersey largely through the influence of Mr. Hoover's endorsement, thereby adding one more wet to the roster in the United States Senate. Mr. Love has much criticism for Texas Democrats who voted for a wet candidate for the presidency, but not one word of criticism for the Republican president who hosts a wet candidate for United States Senate into office, and who gained that office largely through the influence of the prohibitionists of the nation.

On the night of June 13 this section was visited by a heavy rain. The floodwaters from Lake Creek washed out about 300 feet of the railroad dump just north of Grove. The same flood waters washed out about the same amount of the dump on Highway 30 which parallels the railroad. Early the following morning—before the water had gone down—railroad crews were at work rebuilding the tracks, and traffic over the road was resumed within 48 hours. About twenty days have intervened since then and not one particle of work has been done toward restoring traffic on the highway insofar as we have been able to learn, and we are informed by those supposed to know that it will likely be 60 or 90 days before the work of repairing the damage will be started. All of which shows the contrast of efficiency between privately owned and controlled enterprise and government owned and operated enterprise, and which likely accounts for the sharp decline that has come about in the amount of clamor for government ownership of railroads in recent years. Anyway, this might give some of our socialistically inclined friends something to think about.

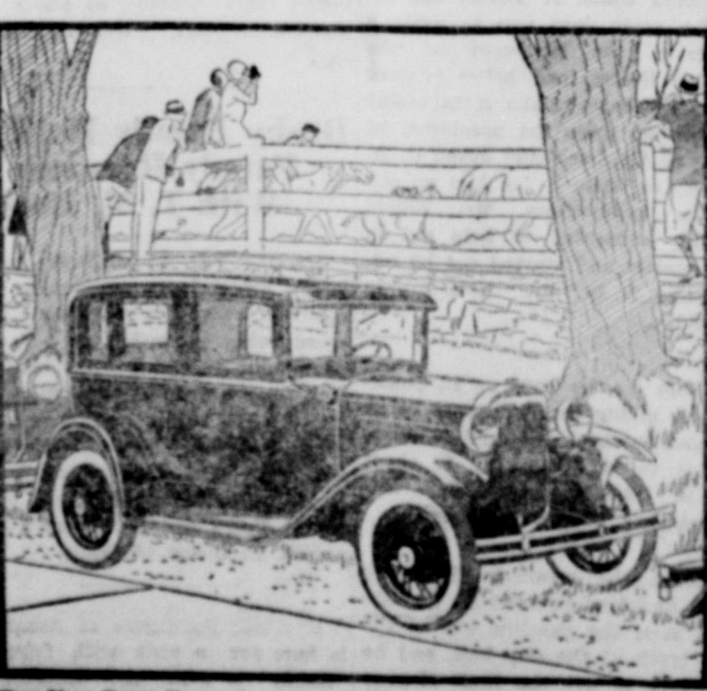
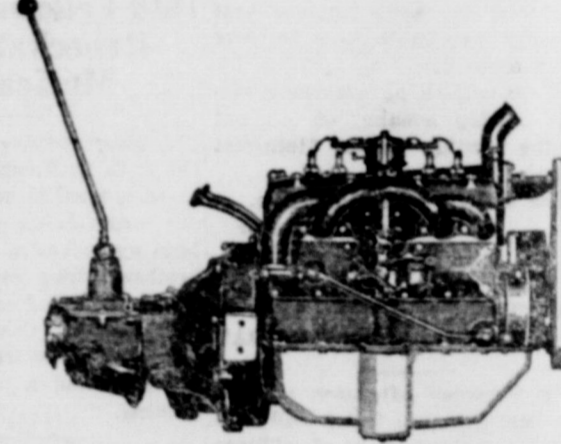

## POULTRY

### BEST LITTER TO USE IN BROODER

Shavings, Cut Straw and Cut Hay Meet With Favor.

One of the commonest questions asked of the poultry department of the New Jersey agricultural experiment station during the spring is, "What is the best litter to use in the brooder house?" For the benefit of all poultrymen who are troubled with this problem the station issues the following statement:

There is no best litter, but there are certain requirements that litter must meet in order to be satisfactory for use in brooding chicks. These requirements are that it should be: Light in weight, thus allowing the droppings and dirt to work to the floor so the chicks are not likely to pick up contaminated material; absorbent, and therefore capable of keeping the brooder house floor dry; cheap, so one can afford to replace it every five days after the first four weeks; and clean, which means freedom from mold, mustiness, and dust.

Shavings, cut straw, and cut hay meet these requirements. They are not the only materials that one can use, but they are among the best. Straw or hay used for litter should always be cut. If the straw or hay is not cut it becomes matted, and covered with droppings, and is therefore of no value for litter.

Bacterial white diarrhea, coccidiosis, and intestinal worms are spread to a large extent by the use of dirty litter, the experiment station warns. One rule in brooding chicks that should be followed, if all others are forgotten, is, "Clean the brooder house every five days." This means removing the litter, sweeping the floor of the brooder house, and putting in clean litter.

## Jazz Recognized Pure American Art



PHIL SPITALNY

Phil Spitalny, Famous Musician, Finds Our Music Indigenous

New York City.—Jazz is pure American and no other nation can play it.

This is the opinion of Phil Spitalny, one of the country's great orchestra leaders, who came here as a poor Russian emigrant.

"My training in Russia where I lived until I was fifteen," Spitalny explains, "was of course, all along classical lines. I came from six generations of musicians on both my father's and mother's side, and I was fairly fed up on the great masters.

"When I came to this country I was several years absorbing the spirit of the thing called jazz, before I could even attempt to play it. For fifteen years I was becoming American and unconsciously

getting the American spirit musically and every other way.

"Last year I went abroad and for the first time appreciated how American I had become. The bands in Berlin were still playing German music, although the compositions were American tunes. The bands in France were playing French music and there the compositions were also American fox-trots, and so it was in each country. I realized then how much our music was really a part of this great country, and that no one but an American can interpret it.

"Often I hear disparaging statements about our music, but it has a versatility and distinctness, and it is so much the soul of the people that I think it will live forever. True, a great number of our songs will pass out of the picture, and this is mainly because our production is greater than the rest of the world put together, but many of them, such as 'Song Of The Bayou' will last as long as there is music."
