MOTHERS' DAY AND DEATHS

The Munday Times enthusiastically endorse the spirit of Mothers' Day, with its family visits and expressions of tender regard for those who have brought individuals into life.

It is valuable as a day set apart for the performance of small acts which evidence deep emotions in human hearts, but which, very often, would go unexpressed without a set occasion for their exhibition.

We sense, however, the obligation of a duty more potent than the transmission of endearing messages, lovely flowers and gift-tokens of love. It is a duty that the race owes to mothers in general to undertake, in their behalf and because of them, to improve the conditions that surround mothers everywhere.

It will probably come as a shock to the reader to be told that the United States has a higher death-rate for mothers in childbirth than in any other civilized nation. Dr. Howard W. Haggard, of Yale University, declares that 10,000 mothers could be saved every year in this country by adequate maternity care.

Of what avail are flowers, candy and telegrams to the ten thousand women scheduled to die in the next twelve months? How real to them is man's boasted worship of motherhood? What are the words of the race worth?

"Gifts of flowers are a sentimental and hypocritical gesture," said Dr. Haggard. "The fortunate ones—the survivors—get a flower. But what are the sons and daughters, the presenters of the flowers who thus cheaply achieve a glow of self-satisfaction, doing to prevent the unnecessary death of 10,000 mothers this year? They can be saved, but not by holding out to them the promise of a potted plant. How can these millions of mothers receive the flowers when they think of the other and younger mothers—the 10,000 who will die needlessly this year?"

"We as a country would rise to war," continued Dr. Haggard, "if one American mother were deliberately shot by an alien government. Yet at the same time, such is our nature, we stand by unconcerned while 10,000 mothers die needlessly. The means exist to prevent these deaths, but the fact that they continue year in and year out means that we are recklessly indifferent to their wants—the figures prove it.

"Moreover, the deaths are only part of the tragedy. Think of the disorganized, disrupted homes, a hazardous future for the newborn babies, an uncertain one for the older children; the orphanage, the street, crime, the reform school, the prison."

Radio Audiences Demand Mystery and Suspense



GEORGE SHACKLEY

Even in Music, This Is Chief Requirement, Says Director

New York City.—The great audience of the air demands music of mystery, of romance, of suspense.

This is the belief of George Shackle, famous organist and conductor, now musical director of Station WOR.

Mr. Shackle has done much to give the air audience what it wants for he has made many popular arrangements that combine the music of the Orient with that of the Occident.

"Oriental music has all the qualities of romance that the present age in this country craves but is not able to get from our own frank straight forward music," he declares.

"Oriental music, alone, would not suit the Occidental taste entirely, either. But when a suggestion of the East is blended with the West, the combination is exactly what the microphone ordered."

"An example of an extremely felicitous blending of this sort is found in 'Millie,' from the Radio Picture, 'Millie,' a song with a typically American theme, but orchestrated with an Oriental slant. Audiences do not know why this kind of music satisfies them but it does, and their letters testify to it."

Shackle is a New Englander whose training in the organ was gained in many famous churches. He is also famous as the organist and conductor for the Metropolitan Opera, a well-known night club, featuring four noted voices.
