I have known Orville Bullington for the past twenty-four years. He is one of the best, and closest friends I have in the world. My acquaintance with him began soon after he graduated from the University of Texas. Bullington and I have not always agreed on every question, but in spite of our political disagreements we have never ceased for one moment to

However, well a I know him, I can shed no light whatever on the matter in question. I am not a physician, hence not capable of posing as a diagnostician. The Post's accusation might mean anything from adenoids to fallen arches.

In making the statement which is equally damaging whether true or untrue, the Post has buttoned the bullet-proof vest of security about itself by saying, "We are not the author nor de vouch for the credence of the statement of the above braggart that when he came to Munday that all he had was \$.35 and an unmentionable disease." The longtongued gossip who begins by saying, "I do not know whether it is so or not," has sent many a pure girl down the primrose path to where her feet took hold on Hell, and a respectable boy has been driven to where a self-inflicted bullet ends it all.

Mr. Cousins has spoken, and, as the Post has stated, "if he told anything about the escapade he would tell the truth," and the citizens of Knox County who know Orville Bullington will agree that there is far more cause to apologize to Texas for the existence in Knox County of such low-type journalism than there is cause to apologize for the fact that Orville Bullington was formerly a citizen of Knox County and was honored with public office by the citizens of the county.

## Let's Keep the Record Straight!

Both The Benjamin Post and Goree Advocate, supporters of the Fergusons, have stated that Orville Bullington was defeated for a second term for County Attorney of Knox County by an unknown cotton picker. Whether these newspapers have wilfully misrepresented the facts, we sio not know, but we do know that they could have easily have verified any statement made concerning Mr. Bullington's official career in Knox County by cosulting the records in the County Clerk's office at Benjamin.

And had they desired that the exact facts be made known they would have found that Mr. Bullington was not defeated for a second term. Mr. Bullington was defeated when he ran for the office the first time-when he had not been in the county a sufficient length of time to get his name on the ballot, and his name was written on the ballot by hundreds of Knox County citizens who knew him, but not in sufficient number to elect him over the candidate whom the Fergusonized press of the county has

Two years later Mr. Bullington made the race and was elected by a substantial majority in November 1928, and the following June he resigned to move to Wichita Falls, and was succeeded by a Mr. Tipton, who
