Arrests Reveal Much Artillery On Oklahoma Men

Two men wanted at Wantonga, Oklahoma, were arrested here Saturday night by Chief of Police Shannon Layne and Night Officer Jack McGraw, and in their arrest a chase of six months was ended by the Oklahoma officers, who stated that they had trailed the two into Louisiana and back to West Texas, and incidentally, their arrest revealed that they were prepared for most any emergency that might arise, as they had in their possession two six-shooters, two rifles and three shotguns, and according to the Oklahoma officers, were considered dangerous characters in their native habitat. The men gave their names here as Al Smith and Fred Smith, but Oklahoma officers assert that they are Al and Fred Jones, brothers, and are wanted at Wantonga for burglary, liquor manufacturing and five other charges.

The two men were lodged in the city jail Saturday night where they remained until Sunday when Sheriff Henry Law and a deputy from Wantonga came after them and returned them to that place to stand trial. They had been picking cotton in this community and were arrested a few miles south of town.

"Harry Taylor, school principal here, has a stone apple-jar that has been in the family 100 years. Next year it will be one hundred and ten years old."

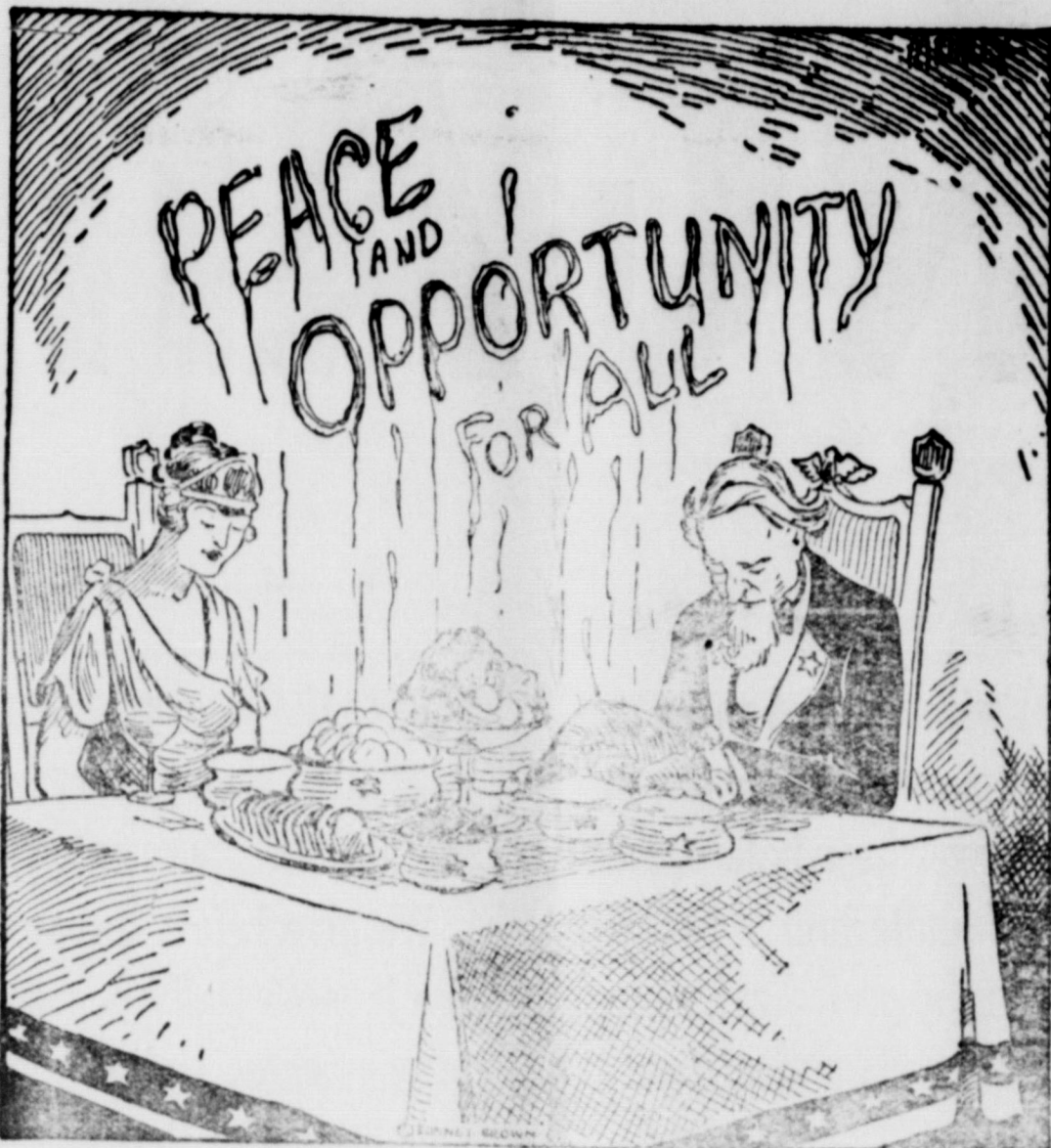

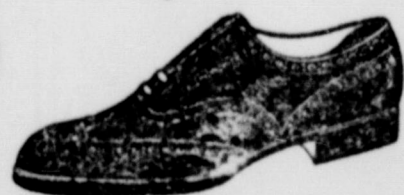

Pumpkin Pie
1 1/2 cups of steamed and strained pumpkin. (Canned pumpkin can be used.)
2-3 cup of brown sugar.
1 teaspoon of cinnamon.
1/2 teaspoon of ginger.
Little salt.
2 eggs.
1 1/2 cups of milk.
1 1/2 cup of cream.

Method: Mix in order given. Pour in pie shell and bake. This makes 2 pies. The ingredients will keep several days if poured in mason jar and kept in the ice box.

Baked Squash.

Cut squash in attractive size pieces. Remove seeds. Bake same as baked potatoes. Serve this way and the individual may fix his own helping of squash at table the same as one fixes baked potato.
