The wagon train riders spent the day resting, visiting local and out-oftown sightseers and performing a variety of chores in preparation for the next day of travel. The train set out at 7 a.m. Tuesday, turned onto Highway 6 in Benjamin and continued through Knox City to Rochester, where it was to camp Tuesday night.



# **FmHA Announces Operation Assist For Farm Financing**

The Farmers Home Administration office in Knox City will begin immediately to participate in "Operation Assist," Joe Boone, county supervisor, announced recently.

Operation Assist is a new effort by FmHA to help farmers obtain guaranteed operating loans. County supervisors for FmHA will take The wagoneers said Benjamin's completed farm credit applications to local banks or other lenders, along with the farmer wishing to apply for a guaranteed loan.

> "We will handcarry the applications, and personally introduce the applicants to our lenders," said

Boone. "We will present a complete loan package, including cash flows, financial statements and appraisals. If necessary, we will make a committment to work with the lender to do an interest buydown. We will do everything we can to help the lender, and the borrower, by committing to guarantee the loan at our maximum

While direct operating loan funds are used up in some areas, there is still nearly \$800 million available for the guarantee program. County FmHA officials hope other lenders will make operating credit available under the guarantee, with most of the paperwork done beforehand by

Borrowers and lenders interested in an FmHA guaranteed loan should contact the FmHA county office.

Campbell and Jim Brady for Justice, Supreme Court, Place 2; Raul H. # Elementary Yard To Receive Facelift

A healthier, prettier yard is in store for students at Munday Elementary school when they return to classes in the fall, if the current plans are carried out. A project at the school this summer is to clear out some trees so more grass can be grown, according to school superintendent Doyle Lowrance.

An irrigation system will also be installed on the campus, Lowrance said. This has already been done at the high school campus, but the elementary installation had to wait until this summer because of the renovation being done last year.

Also planned for the elementary campus is a parking lot for teachers to the east of the building so the front lot can be reserved for parents bringing their children to or picking them up from school. All the work will be done with local labor provided by the school and county.

# Cloudy Skies Settle **Over Knox County**

Farmers and vegetable producers are still trying without much luck to get into their fields for harvest, as damp, cool weather has prevailed over much of this area for several days.

Elevator managers estimate that over 95 percent of Knox County wheat has been cut, and a couple of days of good "drying weather" would allow the rest of the crop to be harvested. The wheat that remains in the fields is deteriorating rapidly in grade and weight, and farmers would like to be able to get it in storage before it is completely lost.

Very few patches of wheat are still too green to cut. Those are now growing as many weeds as wheat stalks, and moisture from the weeds will present a problem when the grain is cut.

The picture looks a little brighter for potato growers. Although they are behind on this year's harvest, producers in other areas are facing the same problem - unfavorable weather conditions. So the local crop will not be late on the market if it can be harvested soon.

The quality of the potatoes is still good, said one producer, as the area hasn't received enough rain to hurt the crop. But the damp air has kept the fields from drying enough that diggers can be brought in. And in

# Festival Display To Include Photography And Brag Corner

#### **Savings Bonds Sales Up 16 Percent In Texas**

During the first quarter of calendar year 1986, Texas sales of U.S. Savings Bonds amounted to \$94,802,245, an increase of over \$13 million over 1985 for 16.4%. These sales represent 25.6% of the state's 1986 assigned dollar goal of \$370 million. March 1986 sales of Series EE Bonds were \$33,634,254, an increase of 15.1% over March 1985.

Sales of Series EE Bonds amounted to \$26,154 during March 1986 in Knox County, M.L. Wiggins, volunteer county chairman, said. Total sales in the county during the period January-March, 1986, were \$39,531, which represents 15.3% of the county's 1986 assigned dollar

Nationally, March sales of U.S. Savings Bonds totaled \$600 million, 40% above March a year ago and the highest sales for any March since 1979. Sales of U.S. Savings Bonds for the first half of fiscal 1986 increased 40% over the same period a year ago. Savings Bonds held by the American public reached an all-time high -- over \$81 billion for the first time ever -- to \$81.42 billion.



#### **ALUMINUM FROZEN DINNER** TRAYS BECOME COLLECTIBLE

The aluminum frozen dinner tray associated with the popular TV dinner made its debut in 1954, when technology brought the home freezer into the kitchen and Milton Berle into the living room. The Swanson family of Omaha, Nebraska, developed the first frozen dinner, a self-contained meal suitable for eating in front of the family television screen.

Just as the popularity of the home freezer resulted in the development of the first TV dinner's aluminum tray with its freezer-to-oven-to-table capability, another appliance now has dictated its end and the beginning of its successor. With microwave ovens finding their way into half the kitchens in the United States, the old tray has reached the end of its usefulness.

The new container is made of PET, an acronym for polyethlene terephthalate, which has widespread use in the form of plastic soft drink bottles. Through a crystallization of PET, packages are sturdier than aluminum and flimsy paper trays. The new white plastic dish is microwave safe and designed with rounded corners to eliminate cold or hot spots for more even heating. It is also equally suited for conventional

#### **Letter To The Editor**

I am concerned! Are you? We the citizens of Knox City, Knox County and the surrounding area are faced with a formidable problem. We are looking at a real possibility that our life support system could close; the Knox County Hospital. I feel the question is do we want that to happen?

Here are some facts that the people are unaware of or ill informed about:

1) The hospital over a period of approximately two (2) years has been losing money at the rate of around \$1,000 per day (over \$300,000 per year). Due to this the professional staff has been cut back and needed services have been curtailed. This indebtedness has created an atmosphere of doubt, possible loss of needed local medical care and despair.

2) A point that needs to be made without malice toward any individual is that the people we have representing us (the Hospital Board) collectively and by and large, individually, do not use this facility or the physicians that support the facility. Is it possible that a governing body can objectively assess a situation or work toward the good of everyone concerned unless they are actively involved and their wellbeing is also at stake?

My thoughts are not to tear down what many have worked diligently to build up. I feel that when the citizens become aware of the total picture and the possible loss at hand, 'hav will actively become involved and seek all of the facts (including financial statements) to expedite a workable solution to this vital need for all of us.

One may wonder at this point why I am this concerned. Granted I asked for courtesy staff privileges and was denied them without a plausible explanation and where a similar precedent was already set; placing me in a position of being unable to utilize this facility for my patients. Also, at this time I am dealing with a problem concerning Medicare and my patients that are directly affected by this dilemma. However, I am optimistic enough to believe that both situations will be resolved to the best interests of all of us, when the total community becomes involved.

Truly, I am concerned! I do care! I am willing to work toward the common goal that will be of benefit to all of us; we need the hospital, the area needs the support the employment of this entity provides.

Without the Knox County Hospital we will all lose more than you

# METER TAMPERING NOW A FELONY

The State of Texas has recently adopted an amendment to the State Penal Code making meter tampering a third degree felony. A third degree felony comes with a punishment of confinement in the Texas Department of Corrections for a term of not more than 10 or less than 2 years. In addition to imprisonment, an individual adjudged guilty of a third degree felony may be punished by a fine not to exceed \$5,000.

Before the amendment of the new law, it was a class A misdemeanor for meter tampering unless the loss of service was more than \$200. Under the new law, any meter tampering regardless of the amount of loss is now a felony of the third degree.

Meter tampering consists of, but is not limited to:

(1) Diverting electricity from passing through a meter device. (2) Preventing electric service from being correctly registered by a meter device.

(3) Unauthorized activation of electric service.

As a special note to our members, it will also be considered meter tampering if a meter is reset and electrical service is restored by anyone other than a Cooperative employee.

All Cooperative meters are sealed. This seal should not be cut or broken without special authorization. In cases where the seal must be cut for emergencies the Cooperative should be notified as soon as possible so that the meter can be resealed.

# **Knox County Man's Probation Revoked**

In district court activities on May 16, 50th District Judge David Hajek heard the case of State of Texas vs. B.B. Eddington. The defendant was found to have violated the terms of his probation and was sentenced to three years in the Texas Department of Corrections.

The State was represented by Knox County Attorney Bobby D. Burnett, acting District Attorney for W.H. Heatly.

Eddington, of Knox City, was serving a five-year probation for criminal mischief and aggravated assault. During his probation he was arrested for making a controlled substance available to a minor, and has been jailed for some time awaiting the official order revocating his probation.

# **FmHA** Committee Candidates Sought

Eligible farmers in Knox County are invited to become nominees for the Farmers Home Administration county committee, FmHA county supervisor Joe Boone announced recently.

As a result of the 1985 farm bill, two of the three members of FmHA county committees must be elected. The third member is appointed by FmHA. The Knox County committee assists the FmHA county office in reviewing applications for FmHA

Generally, farmers who are residents of the county but not FmHA borrowers are eligible to become nominees for the FmHA county committee. "Farmers in this county, serving on the committee, can play an important role by assisting in the process of loan applications and reviews," said Boone.

For this first election only, two members will be elected at the same time. One will serve a one year term of office and the other will serve two years. In the future, all terms of serice will be for three years each on a aggered basis.

Nominating petitions must be teturned to the FmHA Knox County office by June 10, 1986.
