

## FIRE RAZES BROCK HOME EARLY FRIDAY

### Family, Awakened By Flames, Lose All Belongings

An early morning fire cost Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Brock their home and contents, including practically all of their clothing last Friday. Being awakened by the flames, which were discovered shortly after two o'clock Friday morning, members of the family found themselves almost entirely surrounded by fire, and barely escaped with their lives. Mrs. Brock entered a room to save a portion of her clothing, and only by leaving the room by a different way did she escape being trapped in the burning building. Firemen hurried to the scene soon after the alarm was given, but were unable to save the building, which burned to the ground. The entire building and contents were totally destroyed, the family saving only a small portion of their clothing.

## Better Cotton Meeting Held On Thursday

A meeting of interested farmers was held here last Thursday for discussing the possibility and advantages of one-variety cotton communities for improvement of cotton staples locally. The meeting was held in the Farmers Union hall, over Moore Chevrolet.

About forty farmers were in attendance, and the meeting was in charge of J. A. Scofield, district extension agent; E. A. Miller, extension agronomist, and F. E. Lichte, ginning specialist, all of College Station. These men spoke on the advantages of a community growing a one-variety cotton, although no certain type of cotton was recommended. By the one-variety method, it was pointed out, the communities are able to produce cotton of one staple, and the type that is in demand among the spinners.

Advantages of each community specializing in one variety of cotton were given, enabling that community to have cotton of uniform staple. County agent W. W. Rice was also at the meeting.

To Meet Again  
A meeting of all farmers is planned in January, at which the possibility of extending government service to one-variety communities will be discussed. This will be a tri-county meeting which will include farmers from Baylor, Knox and Haskell counties. Dr. P. K. Norris, marketing specialist, and A. M. Dixon, senior marketing specialist of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration, Washington, D.C., are expected to attend this meeting. It is hoped to have the meeting about January 20, but as soon as the date is definitely set, farmers will be notified.

## Knox Farmers Favor Cotton Quota For '39

### Ballot 659 in Favor Of; 120 Against, New 1939 Program

Polling a somewhat lighter vote than last year, cotton farmers of Knox county went to the voting places last Saturday and voiced their favor of the cotton marketing quotas for 1939.

The vote was at nine voting boxes in the county, with heaviest voting at the Munday box, where 170 voted for the quotas and 33 against.

### Hanyes Urges All To Mail Christmas Gifts Early

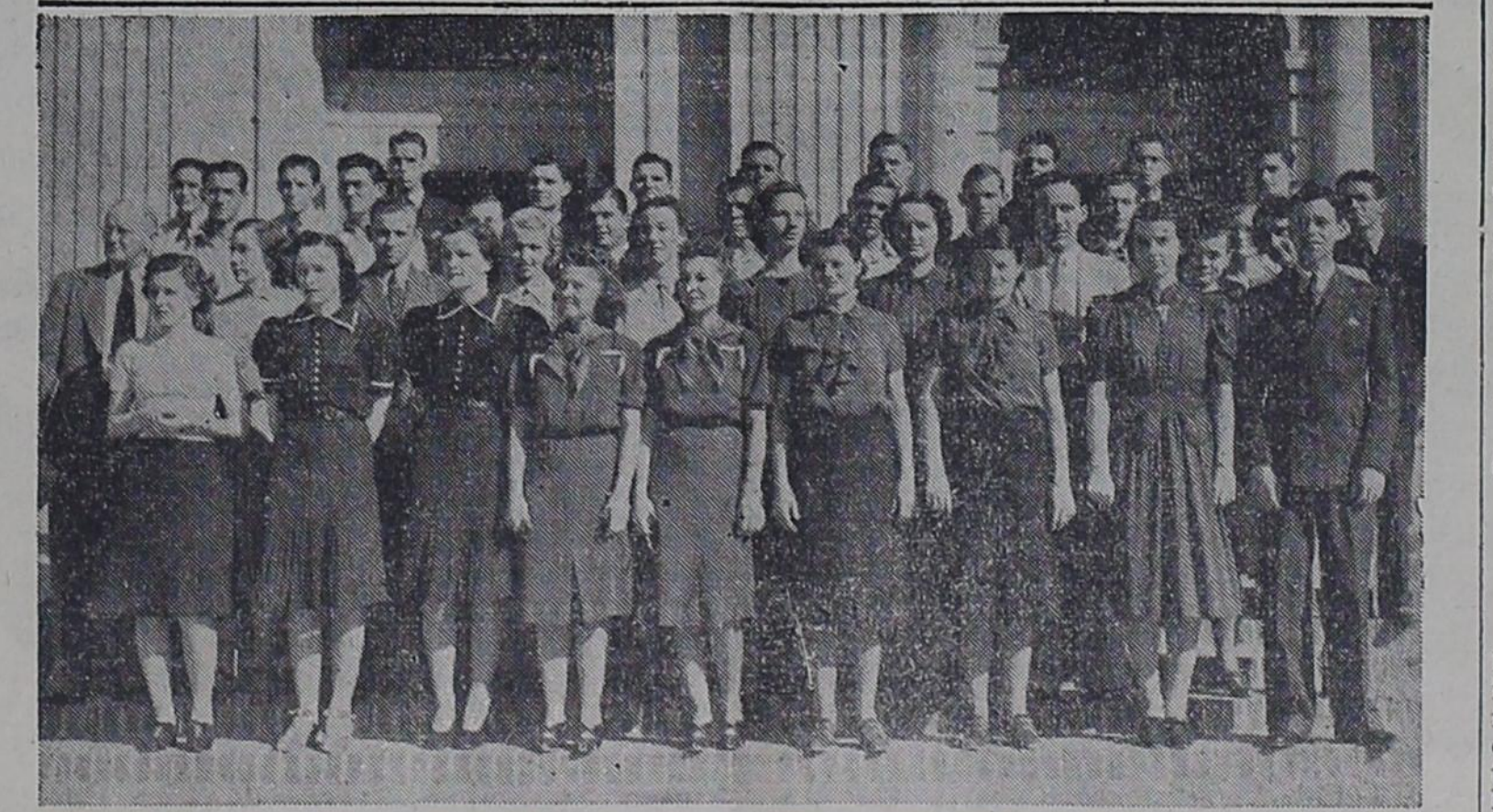
Postmaster Lee Hanyes announced on Wednesday that the post office in Munday will remain open on Saturday afternoon for the next two Saturdays.

## ALL U.S. BATTLESHIPS COULD BE SUNK WITH MOTORISTS' TAX BILL

Every battleship in the war fleet of the United States could be sunk by the weight of the annual tax bill paid by the motorists to the federal and state governments!

If motorists paid in pennies their gasoline taxes and other automotive levies in a lump sum once a year, an average of 36 pounds of money would be required of each motorist. One cent weighs 48 grains and there are 146 cents in an averdupois pound. The average motorist pays \$53 annually in automotive taxes, chiefly in pennies on the gasoline that he uses.

A total of 540,000 tons of pennies would be required annually to pay the automotive tax bill on the 30,000,000 motor vehicles in the nation. Since the total displacement of all American battleships afloat is only 474,000 tons, motorists' tax pennies placed in the ships would send them to the bottom.

## 24,089 Bales Cotton Ginned Here in 1938

Census reports from the Department of Commerce, Bureau of Census, Washington, shows that there were 24,089 bales of cotton, counting round as half bales, ginned in Knox county prior to December 1, 1938.

This figure is much lower than that of the same period last year, the report shows, there being 35,613 bales ginned to the same date in 1937. The report was given the Times office by Hoyle Sullins.

Gins have not been rushed in several weeks, and cotton gathering is almost a past activity for 1938.

## Munday Exports 230 Bales 1938 Acala Cotton

Two hundred and thirty bales of 1938 cotton was exported from Munday to foreign markets, according to a report made recently by the Farmers Union Co-operative Gin. This cotton was the one-variety Acala cotton, which was grown by Knox county farmers and ginned separately from the other cotton. One gin was set aside this year for ginning only the one-variety cotton.

Munday was one of three Texas communities to furnish cotton to foreign markets. Other communities were Seymour and Victoria, Texas, it was stated. There are only about eight such communities located in the United States.

Finding a ready market for this cotton, which also brought a higher price, has led those who grew the one-variety to become more thoroughly sold on one-variety cotton communities.

All cotton shipped from Munday averaged better than 1-inch staple and the price ranged from 9.35 cents to 10.50 cents.

The 230 bales were shipped to Houston, and from there were sent in smaller lots direct to the spinners.

## A Warning—

### Ordinance Frowns On Shooting Of Fire Works in City

As Christmas season approaches, local officers have issued a warning that it is unlawful to shoot firecrackers in the business district of Munday. This is done in order to eliminate all unnecessary fire hazards within the city.

A statement issued this week by D. C. Osborne, mayor, is as follows:

"Warning is issued by the City of Munday that there is a city ordinance against the shooting of fire crackers within the fire zone and business district of Munday. Violators are subject to arrest and fine."

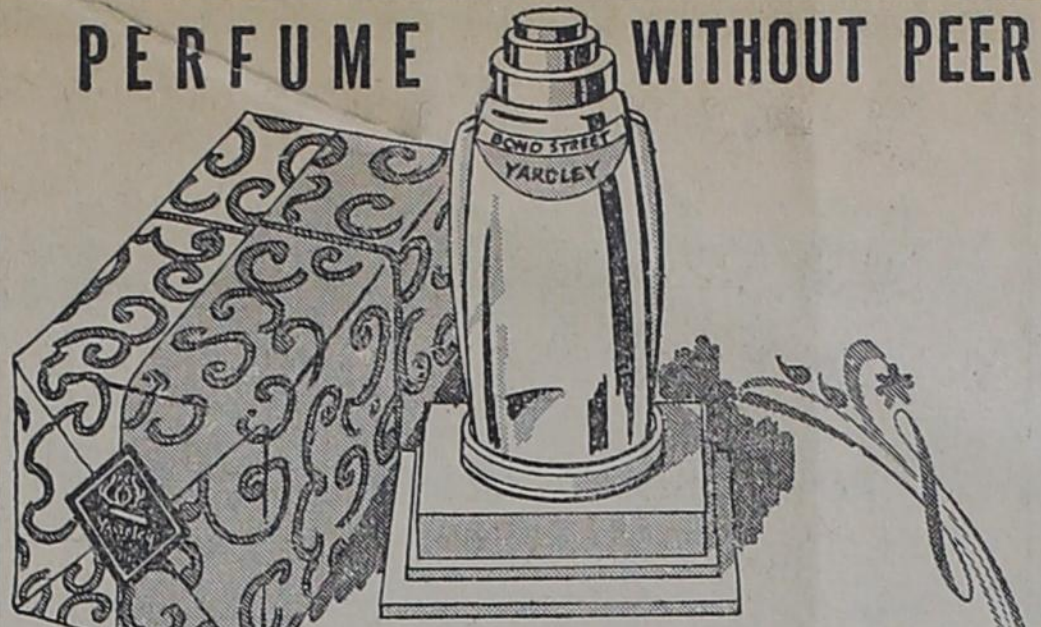

### Outstanding Teams In Class B Circles Win Titles

As high school football brings "curtains down" on the 1938 season, various regional winners have been listed. An Associated Press article appearing recently in the daily papers listed a number of winners in Texas.

"The Hull-Daisetta Bobcats completed their third football campaign without a defeat last Friday," the article stated, "to run up one of the most amazing victory strings in Texas interscholastic history—35 straight. The Bobcats downed Alvin 13-6 for the region 10 championship in the class B division. This gave them 46 victories in the last 52 games, along with five ties and one loss. During that period the Hull-Daisetta team ran up a total of 1242 points to 161 for the opposition."

Another outstanding team closed the season Saturday when the Wink Wildcats defeated Rotan 20-7 at Odessa for the region 2 title. This made the 25th straight victory for Wink.

Mount Vernon's Tigers, another team with a fine record, completed the campaign Friday with a 40-13 victory over Royse City to clinch the region 5 championship.

Wellington won the region 1 title with a 12-6 victory over Panhandle at Panhandle.

Nearer home, the Crowell boys beat Newcastle 26-7 on Crowell's gridiron to take the region 3 title.

Taylor took the region 7 crown with a 13-0 victory over the Brady Bulldogs.

McGregor won the championship victory over Calvert 18-6 to bag the region 8 victory.

Down in Region 11, the pennant went to Junction's Eagles, which team won from Cuero last Friday to the tune of 19-10.

### RISE IN TEXAS IN NOVEMBER

Austin, Texas, Dec. 12.—Sales of new automobiles in Texas during November rose sharply over the preceding month and substantially over the corresponding month last year, according to the Bureau of Business Research of The University of Texas.

Reports from seventeen representative Texas counties show an increase in sales of 88.1 per cent over October and 17.9 per cent over November last year. Aggregate sales in these counties during the entire eleven months of the year, however, were still 32.4 per cent below the corresponding period last year.

Marked increases occurred over October and over November last year in all price groups, the Bureau's report said.

Jinks McGee of Abilene is to be floor manager while leaders of the Grand March on the opening night will be Mr. and Mrs. Robert Nelson of Abilene.

All will be attired in fashions of the 80's as the Ball is offering cash prizes each of the three nights to those attired in fashions most typical of the by-gone days. The dances, too, will be the same as those at the original Ball, the schottische, heel and toe polka, Virginia Reel and the square.

The Ball will be held in the high school gymnasium and will be broadcast over the radio. On hand will be the same group who presented the Ball at Dallas, Fort Worth, the Chicago Folk Festival and at the Folk Festival at Washington this year, where they tied up traffic in the park by their presentation, joined in by Texas Congressmen and Senators, and later on the Capitol lawn.

Large crowds are expected as several from far-distant points have already written that they will be on hand. This is an unusual event and the first Ball made famous by the poem, "The Cowboys' Christmas Ball," by Larry Chittenden.

## Deer Hunting Death Toll Is Placed at 134

An Associated Press article under December 12 dateline reported the death toll among deer hunters at 134 sportsmen dead from gunshot wounds or other accidents on the trail, as the annual deer season approached its end.

Although complete figures were not yet available, it was estimated Monday that more than 600,000 hunters took to the woods in 16 states, and that they bagged more than 275,000 deer.

Reports from hunting districts throughout the country showed both deer and hunters were more plentiful in 1938. They indicated that while the death rate of the man behind the gun was still high, it had been reduced from last year's total in many states.

For the second consecutive year, Wyoming reported a deer season without a fatal accident. Lester Bagley, state game warden, declaring Wyoming was still more or less a frontier state, attributed the record to "native caution" of its hunters.

Deaths by states from all causes connected with the hunting season follows:

New York, 22; Michigan, 16; Wisconsin, 15; Oregon and Montana, 14 each; Pennsylvania, 11; California and Minnesota 10 each; Washington, 7; Idaho, 5; Arizona, and Utah, 3 each; Texas, 2; New Mexico and Colorado, 1 each.

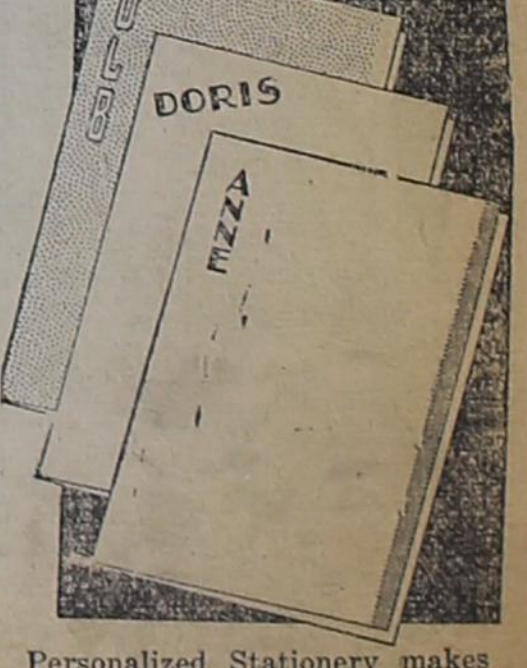
